Monroe, Central And Highland Junior High Adult Education Program

The St. Paul Department of Education Adult Education Classes will start their fall program September 29th, at three area schools. Classes will be held at Central High School Monday and Tuesday evenings; Highland Junior High on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and at Monroe High School on Monday and Wednesday evenings. Classes will meet at the above schools once each week from seven to nine p.m. for ten weeks.

The three schools will be open Monday evening, September 22, from seven to nine p.m. for counseling and registration, or you may register by phone during the week.

Bulletins will be distributed the week of September 15th through the area elementary schools or may be obtained by calling the schools at the following numbers: Central, MI. 4-0073; Highland, MI. 8-8800; Monroe, CA. 2-7491. Forty-five different courses will be offered at the three centers in clothing, fashions, hobbies, and general recreation.

Central High is offering a new course in Hi-Fi, which will give instruction in correct use of high fidelity record players and proper selection of records. A new course is also offered in crafts which will feature the making of articles in leathers, metals and mosaic tile.

Highland Junior High has added two new courses to their Thursday night offering. A course in the construction of bows and arrows and a course in the construction of lampshades.

Monroe High School is offering a new course in the operation and maintenance of boats and motors.

Fine Art Galleries to Feature Paul Hapke's Paint, Sculptor Works

A one man showing of works by Paul Hapke, a highly controversial modern painter and sculptor, will open Friday, September 19th, in the Fine Art Galleries, 29 East 5th street, St. Paul. The works include 15 expressionistic, abstract heads done in wood, iron, terra cotta, and bronze. These pieces of sculpture will be displayed in a totally dark room and lighted individually, dramatically accenting their highly emotional qualities. Mr. Hapke will also be showing 12 oil and 7 casein paintings, 4 ink drawings, and one woodcut. All of Paul Hapke's paintings are of a non-objective nature and unusually intense in chromatic value. His work has, for several years, provoked dissension among critics and patrons.

The show will open with a reception from 12:30 to 11:00 p. m. The galleries are at the end of a short alley between Cedar and Wabasha on Fifth.

Hapke was born in Illinois in 1922. He took his A.B. degree from Illinois college, received his M.F.A. from the California College of Arts and Crafts, and a master of arts from Mexico City College. 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
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St. Paul Public School's Vocational Evening Class Schedules Announced

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

St. Catherine Announces Adult Evening Class Schedule To Begin October 1

Sister Marie David, CSJ, director of the Adult Education Evening Division at the College of St. Catherine, St. Paul, has announced that evening classes will begin on Wednesday, October 1 and continue through December 3.

Sister Annette Walters, CSJ, will develop on a facet of her T-V course in Mental Health called "Mental Health and the Spiritual Life" in which she will try to show the most important relationships between health of mind and body and spiritual development. This class will be offered as an eight week course, and will carry a college credit, if desired.

Peter Lupori will again teach the perennial favorite, ceramic sculpture, which offers an opportunity for relaxation and the development of artistic ability. This course will include creative three-dimensional design from animal, human and abstract forms and will make use of various colored clays and glazes.

Second Harvest, a book-discussion course, is the re-examination, from an adult point of view, of great novels by Jane Austen, W. M. Thackeray, Charles Dickens, George Eliot and others. This course will be offered by Mrs. Catherine Lupori.
