## Crookston Campus To Name Gymnasium For Justice Knutson

Oscar R. Knutson, chief justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court, will be honored Feb. 28 at the University of Minnesota Technical Institute, Crookston, during ceremonies naming the college gymnasium as Knutson Hall.

The public ceremonies will be held in Kiehle auditorium on the campus at 2 p.m. University President Malcolm Moos, Regent Lyman Brink of Hallock, B.E. Youngquist, superintendent of the Northwest Experiment Station, and others will participate in the dedication. Stanley Sahlstrom, director of the Crookston campus, will preside.

A public reception will be held in the campus dining facilities at 3 p.m.

Chief Justice Knutson was graduated in 1919 from the former Northwest School of Agriculture (which has become the Crookston campus) and took his fourth year of studies at Warren high school. He attended St. Olaf College for two years and received a bachelor of law degree from the University of Minnesota in 1927. After practicing in Warren from 1927 to 1941, he was appointed judge of the ninth district court, a position he held until 1948 when he was made an associate justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court. In 1962 he became chief justice and was re-elected to that position in 1964.

Among the honors Judge Knutson has received are the Outstanding Achievement Award from the Regents of the University of Minnesota; the University Law School Outstanding Achievement Award; the Outstanding Alumnus Award, St. Olaf; Sons of Norway Outstanding Award; and honorary doctor of laws degree, William Mitchell College of Law.

## Falling—2nd Biggest Cause Of Death

Falls, which may provoke mirth in slapstick comedy, are in reality the second greatest cause of accidental deaths, the American Red Cross said today in its annual caution to Americans to avoid this painful and often lethal type of accident in the "slippery season."

Falls as a cause of fatal accidents are surpassed only by motor vehicle accidents, according to Judge Otis Godfrey, St. Paul chairman of Red Cross Safety Programs.

"In cases where falls are not fatal, they can break bones, cause skull fractures and serious concussions, and often leave the victim permanently disabled," Judge Godfrey warned.

He urged the following preventive measures:

### Out of Doors

- Watch where you step and slow down on slippery and uneven surfaces. Be alert for hazards when it is difficult to see.

- Wear shoes or boots appropriate to the walking surface. High heels and leather heels can be dangerous.

- In alighting from a vehicle, wait until it stops before getting off.

## Montessori Expert

Dr. Margaret Potts, well-known Montessori educator, will give a talk at the Prudential Insurance Company building, 3701 Wayzata Blvd., Minneapolis, Minn., on February 24 at 8 p.m.

Dr. Potts will give the second in the yearly series of Montessori lectures sponsored by the Montessori Foundation of Minnesota. She will talk about rise of Montessori education in the United States, its failure and rebirth.

Dr. Potts became one of the few people ever given "a letter of authority" from Dr. Montessori authorizing her to train and certify Montessori teachers around the world.

The impact of the Montessori approach to education is seen by Dr. Potts in many of the educational toys which are self teaching and self correcting such as the graduated stacking rings. She also notes with pride that the approach was used in many of the Head Start schools last summer.

- Keep floors clear of spilled liquids or foods. Wipe up spilled substances immediately.

- Keep floors and stairs clear of objects such as toys, tools, pencils, mops and brooms.

- When using a stepladder, maintain a handhold at all times possible. Avoid using chairs, tables, or boxes as substitutes for ladders.

- Loose objects such as throw rugs that can slip underfoot should be fastened to the floor or protected with non-slip backing.

- Repair or replace floor covering that causes uneven walking surfaces—worn carpeting, turned-up linoleum, loose floor boards, broken or loose stair-steps and treads.

- Provide and use non-slip mats and sturdy hand-holds in bathtubs and showers. Elderly and physically disabled persons may also need hand-holds adjacent to toilet facilities and special supports in other parts of the house.

- For persons with impaired sight, provide more light on walking surfaces; move low pieces of furniture away from normal walking areas, and mark stairs clearly.

- Older persons should avoid sudden head movements that result in a loss of equilibrium, especially when they are standing.

## Retarded Ass'ns To Legislature For Orientation

Approximately 500 members of associations for retarded children throughout the state will attend a "Day at the Legislature" on Wednesday, Feb. 26.

Purpose of the day is to acquaint ARC members with the working of the legislature and enable them to discuss with individual legislators the needs of the mentally retarded in Minnesota.

This year, for the first time, Minnesota Mrs. Jaycees and the Episcopal Church Women of Minnesota will join the Minn. ARC in sponsoring the event, which will begin with registration in the Governor's Reception Room at 9:30 a.m. and close with afternoon attendance at a session of the House of Representatives or a committee meeting.

All legislators have been invited to a luncheon at the Holiday Inn near the Capitol from noon until 1:15 p.m.

Besides the legislators, guests of honor at the luncheon will be 12 year-old Ilona Le Mier, 1969 Minn. ARC Poster Child, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Le Mier of Proctor, Minn.

During the luncheon, 59 year-old Earl Ketzeback will answer questions and tell about his life and work as an example of what can be done to help mentally retarded people become tax paying citizens rather than institutionalized wards of the state.

Until two years ago, Earl had spent most of his life in Fairbault State Hospital. Then he was sent to the Outreach Community Center in Minneapolis. Here, retarded adults live and receive vocational training. After about a year in the Outreach Sheltered Workshop, Earl was able to go to work in the Leamington Hotel bakery where he now is a baker's assistant.

## Minn. Orchestra to Tour Eastern States

The Minnesota Orchestra, under the baton of music director Stanislaw Skrowaczewski, will perform in six Eastern states on a March 1-15 out-of-town tour which includes two performances in New York's Carnegie Hall.

The Orchestra will appear in Carnegie Hall on March 3 as part of the International Festival of Visiting Orchestras. On March 6 it will present, at Carnegie, the long-awaited New York premiere of Krzystof Penderecki's massive modern oratorio, the *Passion and Death of Jesus Christ According to St. Luke*. The premiere, originally scheduled for November 1967, was postponed when Maestro Skrowaczewski underwent emergency eye surgery.

The Orchestra tour will also include concerts in: Brooklyn, Syracuse and Cortland, N.Y., Lewisburg and Hershey, Pa.; New Bedford, Worcester and Boston, Mass.; Portland, Maine; Burlington, Vermont; and New London, Connecticut.

## Training Program For Area Shoe Man

William Yezek associated with The Village Bootery is one of 37 footwear specialists who are attending a week-long training program for Prescription Footwear Applicators at the Kitzelman Center, Ball State University, Muncie, Ind.

This residential program is designed for proprietors, managers, and assistants of stores dealing in corrective footwear. The program is planned to give footwear people special knowledge about the anatomy and physiology of the foot, as well as special instruction on shoe construction and filling footwear prescriptions.

Special lectures by physicians and orthopedic surgeons cover common foot disorders in children, functional disorders of feet requiring prescription footwear, and clinical conditions requiring prescription footwear.

## Disadvantaged To Be Served By New Program

Career Opportunities Preparation for Employment (COPE), recently funded by the Greater St. Paul United Fund & Council, Inc. and to be administered by the St. Paul Jewish Vocational Service, has been established to help economically deprived young people to become responsible, employable and productive citizens through an intensive program of individual counseling and testing, scholarship and financial aid assistance, educational skills remediations and group guidance, it was announced today by Mr. Sherman Marrinson, President of the Jewish Vocational Service.

COPE will be serving young people between the ages of 16 and 25 who do not qualify and are not eligible for other employment and guidance anti-poverty programs. According to Mr. Marrinson, it is estimated that between 80 and 100 disadvantaged youth will be served annually. Out-reach activity to recruit eligible youth into COPE will begin through a series of meetings with school guidance counselors, social service agencies, youth-serving groups, civil rights and minority group organizations. Certain aspects of the program which involve scholarship help for youth seeking financial aid to attend college are already under way.

St. Paul Jewish Vocational Service is an approved counseling service of the American Board on Counseling Services, Inc. of the American Personnel and Guidance Association.

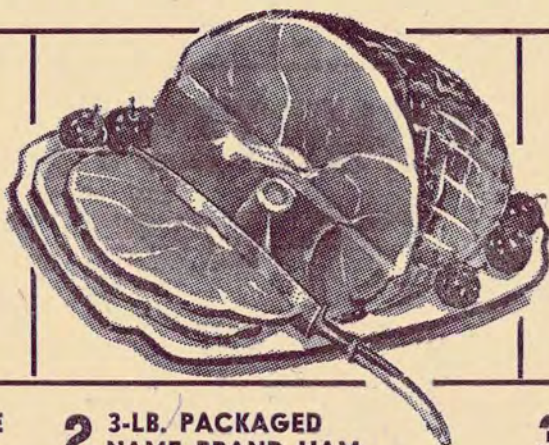
