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# Crookston Campus To Name Gymnasium For Justice Knutson

Oscar R. Knutson, chief justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court, will be honored Feb. 28 at the University of Minnesota Technical Institute, Crookston, during ceremonies naming the college gymnasium as Knutson Hall.

The public ceremonies will be held in Kiehle auditorium on the campus at 2 p.m. University President Malcolm Moos, Regent Lyman Brink of Hallock, B.E. Youngquist, superintendent of the Northwest Experiment Station, and others will participate in the dedication. Stanley Sahlstrom, director of the Crookston campus, will preside.

A public reception will be held in the campus dining facili-

ties at 3 p.m.

Chief Justice Knutson was graduated in 1919 from the former Northwest School of Agriculture (which has become the Crookston campus) and took his fourth year of studies at Warren high school. He attended St. Olaf College for two years and received a bachelor of law degree from the University of Minnesota in 1927. After practicing in Warren from 1927 to 1941, he was appointed judge of the ninth district court, a position he held until 1948 when he was made an associate justice of the Minnesota Supreme Court. In 1962 he became chief justice and was reelected to htat position in 1964.

Among the honors Judge Knutson has received are the Outstanding Achievement Award from the Regents of the University of Minnesota; the University Law School Outstanding Achievement Award; the Outstanding Alumnus Award, St. Olaf; Sons of Norway Outstanding Award; and honorary doctor of laws degree, William Mitchell College of Law.

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# Falling—2nd Biggest Cause Of Death

Falls, which may provoke mirth in slapstick comedy, are in reality the second greatest cause of accidental deaths, the American Red Cross said today in its annual caution to Americans to avoid this painful and often lethal type of accident in the "slippery season."

Falls as a cause of fatal accidents are surpassed only by motor vehicle accidents, according to Judge Otis Godfrey, St. Paul chairman of Red Cross Safety Programs.

"In cases where falls are not fatal, they can break bones, cause skull fractures and serious concussions, and often leave the victim permanently disabled," Judge Godfrey warned.

He urged the following preventive measures:

#### Out of Doors

- Watch where you step and slow down on slippery and uneven surfaces. Be alert for hazards when it is difficult to see.
- Wear shoes or boots appropriate to the walking surface. High heels and leather heels can be dangerous.
- In alighting from a vehicle, wait until it stops before getting off.

# • Keep floors clear of spi

- Keep floors clear of spilled liquids or foods. Wipe up spilled substances immediately.
- Keep floors and stairs clear of objects such as toys, tools, pencils, mops and brooms.
- When using a stepladder, maintain a handhold at all times possible. Avoid using chairs, tables, or boxes as substitutes for ladders.
- Loose objects such as throw rugs that can slip underfoot should be fastened to the floor or protected with non-slip backing.
- Repair or replace floor covering that causes uneven walking surfaces—worn carpeting, turned-up linoleum, loose floor boards, broken or loose stair-steps and treads.
- Provide and use non-slip mats and sturdy hand-holds in bathtubs and showers. Elderly and physically disabled persons may also need hand-holds adjacent to toilet facilities and special supports in other parts of the house.
- For persons with impaired sight, provide more light on walking surfaces; move low pieces of furniture away from normal walking areas, and mark stairs clearly.
- Older persons should avoid sudden head movements that result in a loss of equilibrium, especially when they are standing.

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
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# **Training Program** For Area Shoe Man

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### Disadvantaged To Be Served By New Program

Career Opportunities Preparation for Employment (COPE), recently funded by the Greater St. Paul United Fund & Council. Inc. and to be administered by the St. Paul Jewish Vocational Service, has been established to help economically deprived voung people to become responsible, employable and productive citizens through an intensive program of individual counseling and testing, scholarship and financial aid assistance, educational skills remediations and group guidance, it was announced today by Mr. Sherman Marrinson, President of the Jewish Vocational Service.

COPE will be serving young people between the ages of 16 and 25 who do not qualify and are not eligible for other employment and guidance antipoverty programs. 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
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
