

### **Temple Israel 90th Anniversary**

Temple Israel, Minneapolis' oldest Jewish house of worship, will inaugurate its 90th anniversary with a religious service Friday evening, October 4.

Guest speaker will be Rabbi Levi A. Olan, Temple Emanu-El, Dallas, Texas and president, Central Conference of American Rabbis. Also on the dais will be Mayor Arthur Naftalin; Bishop Hamilton Kellogg, Episcopal Bishop of Minnesota; Mack Wolf, past president, Mt. Zion Congregation, St. Paul and others.

Rabbi Max A. Shapiro, spiritual head of Temple Israel, traced the Temple's origin to September, 1878, when Rabbi Henry Friedman came from Indianapolis, Indiana to head the new Reform congregation.

Longest tenure of leadership goes to Rabbi Emeritus Albert G. Minda with 47 years of service to Temple Israel and the community as a whole.

### **Jewish Women Begin Second Year Drew School Instruction Program**

struction Program (SIP) at Drew School begins itts second year with orientation programs for volunteers from the St. Paul Council of Jewish Women and parent aides-new to the program this year. Ruth Dunsmore, SLD remedial reading specialist, will be teacher-consultant for the project. Its purpose: to give the instructional attention needed by approximately four percent of students (national estimate) who are deficient in reading and language skills.

Evaluation from the Council and Drew Principal Warren Panushka indicates that most participating children averaged 1.2 years' gain in reading achievement in last year's SIP program. Some gained as much as 2.3 years in standard reading evaluation tests. Improvement in social adjustment were also observed.

The children "... got into less trouble in the classroom," said Panushke, and "... they had more self-assurance. They were not afraid to tackle prob-

Further inferences of the program's impact may be made statistically. SLD teachers in St. Paul usually carry a case load of 20 pupils per day. At Drew last year about 48 pupils per day were served by one SLD teacher-consultant with substantial paraprofessional volunteer help.

Both Panushka and Tom Starr, special education reading supervisor, feel that the 1.1 relationship typical of the SIP program is of primary importance, while the specific instructional materials used are a secondary factor. Without volunteer assistance, the 1.1 relationship could not be achieved at realistic cost: last year 59 women volunteers of the council, ranging in age from the early 20's through the 60's, put in 2,410 hours of volunteer service to the program.

Miss Dunsmore's first official task in the project has been to coordinate the orientation sessions for aides and volunteers, which begins today. Douglas Wiseman, supervisor of program development and eval-

Today the Supplementry In- uation, special education department, will explore with the group "the role of the paraprofessional in overcoming pupils' learning disabilities." Tomorrow a panel of specialists-a psychologist, speech-therapist, and others will review typical case studies with the group.

> In addition to coordinating the orientation of volunteers, Miss Dunsmore, as teacher-consultant for the SIP, will administer diagnostic tests to identify pupils who will participate in the program and, later, prescribe individualized instruction programs for them which the aides and volunteers will carry through in tutorial sessions.

> The St. Paul Council of Jewish Women considers this year to mark the beginning of a new phase in the Supplementary Instruction Program. Actually, they will begin a slow withdrawal from the program to be completed after the third year. By that time, the council anticipates it will be able to concentrate on getting similar programs started in other schools.

> About 50 percent of the council's volunteers gained experience in last year's program. The rest are new. Also new are five parent aides—the vanguard of those who will assume the tutorial aide roles pioneered at Drew school by the St. Paul Council of Jewish Women.





total education. Released-Time Religious Instruction is a privilege granted by law under which children are excused from public school up to three hours each week during regular school session at the request of their parents in order to receive religious education.

Those involved feel that it provides the one area of study for a well-rounded education which cannot be offered in the school system, providing an avenue for every child to learn about God, to learn to pray and to become acquainted with the Bible or other sacred writings. It instills moral values, and teaches a child his worth before God, helping to build the child's character.

In St. Paul and suburbs the sponsors for this program at present are: Association of Evangelicals, 360 Robert St., Catholic Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, 251 Summit Ave., Lutheran Council of St. Paul, 448 Wacouta St., St. Paul Area Council of Churches, 1671 Summit Ave. Other groups are invited to participate. Questions may be directed to representatives of the above groups who have formed an Inter-Faith Committee in order to carry out the program more efficiently.

Classes at present are offered to grades 4, 5, and 6 in the elementary schools and to a few Junior High Schools for one hour each week. In St. Paul the program has been in operation since 1923.

In order to enroll, the parent or guardian must sign a Parents' Request card as provided by the Inter-Faith Committee and available at the school. The parent should check his religious group preference and the child should return it to the public school office. It is not necessary that the parent or child be a member of any of the churches represented. A first, second, and third choice is offered by the Protestant groups for the convenience of the parent.



Eventually, your city is going to have to tax you more. That is a fact, and whether they get the State Legislature or the Federal Government or the Charter Commission to do their dirty work, it is still a fact, and which pocket the extra moola comes out of is strictly academic. They-the current administration-do not have the courage to tell you that you cost them too much money. They won't ask you whether you want a first class city or a second class city. They threaten to cut services if you don't legalize some taxing authority that does not presently exist. They knew this during the last City Election. The Mayor knew it. In fact, his opponnent, Mrs. Butler-who apparently didn't graduate from high school-was more correct in her arithmetic and more truthful about it than the ex-high school counsellor. That is beside the point, however-the point is that the loot is needed and it is needed now! It will be needed in ever increasing amounts to eternity! Why not devise a whole new tax structure in St. Paul and show Urban America the way out of the chaos caused by lying and cheating politicians? Let's use real estate as a base and have a point system for other factors like the number of children living at home (a plus factor); the income level of the head of household (a plus or minus factor); the age of the taxpayer (a minus factor for senior citizens) and a few other demographic criteria that are the main cause of tax inequities today. You can't get Charter Reform to raise taxing authority when 30 percent of your citizens are senior citizens living on fixed and dwindling incomes. Give them a break (or a point). You can't get tax reforms and charter authority from wage earners whose incomes do not allow them a recovery factor in prices or profits. Give them a point off! Families with six children use the city more than single people or couples without children. Add a point! The whole problem with urban taxes is inequality. When you ask people to vote to raise their taxes, they have to be motivated. If the politicians were smart they'd dream up a tax reform which would stick it to the people who are using the city and get the reform on the books with the votes of the people who use it very little. In St. Paul the non users are in the majority. Senior citizens, fixed income laborers and single working people. The people who cost a city money are the ones with large families. St. Paul has a lot of such families . . . and they are politically conservative about taxes and demanding of better city services. Therein lies the dilemma, and the politicians lie with impunity to both groups about what the city needs in the way of tax money and where it is going to come from. The result is a poorly organized and poorly planned future for your city. The people who need the city the most-people with growing families—are simply going to have to pay for it. All the others should pay their share, but not a cent more. Because they are being asked in as equal partners in the urban mess, senior citizens, single people and fixed income laborers are thumbing their noses at any hint of reform or legal authorization of higher taxing limits. Our present Mayor is at sixes and sevens with his own party on the matter of taxes, because the Charter Reform Proposal was roundly defeated by DFL wards in the city, while the higher income neighborhoods gave it its best support-though not a majority. This proves that higher income families are willing to pay the price-because they can- and that lower and fixed income people won't because they can't. It doesn't take a crystal ball to suggest that any future tax authority should be organized solidly behind those who wish to pay only what they can pay. I think a point system is the answer. (P.S.-I have three children, and count myself in the higher taxed group by my own definition. I happen to think that equality in taxes breeds better government, and I know what that might mean to my children.)






