THREE HIGHLAND HIGH SCHOOLS SCHEDULE JOINT FACULTY MEET

Three neighboring high schools in the Highland Park area of St. Paul plan a joint faculty meeting on Wednesday, August 27, as part of the program for the opening of the new school year. This event is unique in that it is the first time that these three institutions—two non-public and one public—have had any kind of joint program. The schools involved are Highland Park Senior High School, Derham Hall High School, and Cretin High School.

Dr. Mulford Q. Sibley, well-known sociology professor at the University of Minnesota, will be the principal speaker at the meeting. Also included on the program are departmental sessions in which faculty members from the three schools who

teach in the same subject area will meet to become acquainted and to discuss common curriculum matters.

The meeting will be held at Highland Park Senior High School at 1:15 p.m., Wednesday, August 27, with Mr. William P. Scanlan, principal, as host. This is planned as the first of a series of joint sessions among the faculty of the three schools.

Cretin High School and Derham High School have had an extensive program of student and teacher exchange during the past school year. This will be continued the coming year. Mr. Darel H. Leipold is the new principal of Derham Hall, and Brother Theodore R. Drahmann, FSC, the principal of Cretin.

Macalester Couple 1st American Teachers In South Pacific School

Two newlywed 1969 Macalester College graduates will leave this month for their first teaching assignment in a school founded by a St. Paul man on a South Pacific island.

They are Jerry Parks, 22, and his wife, Ann, 21, who were married June 1, a week after graduation. They will be the first Americans to teach at the Airmen's Memorial School on the island of New Britain, one of the islands which comprises the territory of New Guinea north of Australia.

The shortage of trained teachers there can only be described as desperate; only two of the five native teachers at the Airmen's School have gone beyond the eighth grade and there are less than a half-dozen college graduates in all of New Guinea, which has a total population of two million people.

The Parks' arrival will enable two of the school's teachers to attend college to upgrade their credentials. To supplement their backgrounds, Jerry and Ann will stop during the 10,000-mile journey to visit Australia, which governs New Guinea under a United Nations mandate. They will also meet students at the two-year-old University of New Guinea, which is training the area's first generation of native educators.

Before they take over classrooms in February, when the 10-month academic year begins, Jerry and Ann will teach on a team basis and tutor the native staff in English—the official school language partly because the 210 first—through sixth—grade students speak a total of 16 different languages and dialects among them.

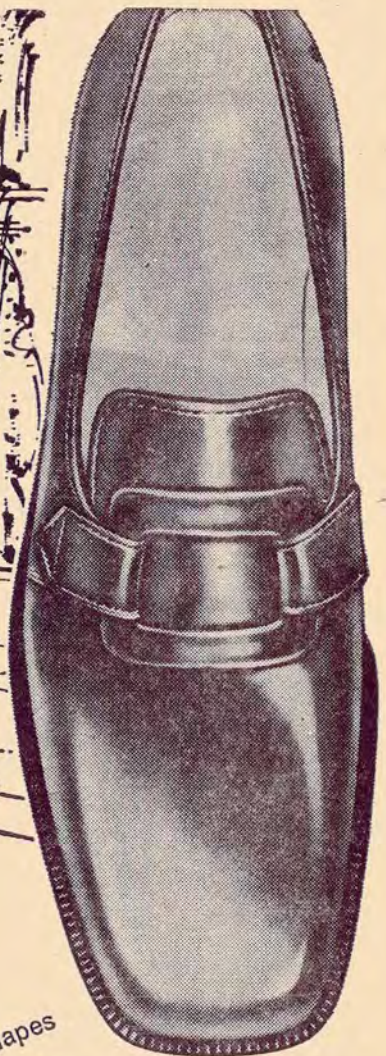

Fair Theme-Quality Of Minnesota Life

The general theme for the State Fair this year will be "Minnesota's Showcase — Its Quality of Life." According to Fair officials a particular effort will be made to show visitors why Minnesota ranks high on the national list of places to live, work and play.

Fair management will be working in close cooperation with the Minnesota Department of Economic Development as well as with other public and private agencies and the news media in developing the theme concept.

The "Quality of Life" theme takes its name from a recent study conducted on behalf of the Midwest Research Institute in Kansas City by John Wilson, now with Yale University. The study, which measured nine different aspects of life in each of the 50 states, concluded that Minnesota ranks second only to California on the overall scale.

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Vivian Jenkins To Direct "Fame" At Augsburg

Miss Vivian Jenkins, formerly special services worker at the Phyllis Wheatley Community Center in Minneapolis, will assume her duties Aug. 15 at Augsburg College as director of the Fund for Assistance of Minority Education (FAME) program.

The program was set up to provide a complete orientation facility for minority students with a three-fold approach which includes a summer transition program, scholarship aid to make matriculation at Augsburg possible, and a continuing counseling program.

For the fall quarter at Augsburg 18 students will be enrolled in FAME. Ten students are returning and eight will be new to the campus, all receiving full or partial scholarships.

Miss Jenkins attended Dana College, Blair, Neb., for four years. She was elected to the Mobilization of Economic Resources (MOER) Board in 1967, and was appointed for 1968-70 to the Minnesota Human Rights Commission Advisory Board on Women's Affairs.

In addition, she was resident advisor for the Omaha (Neb.) Women's Job Corps, and at present is a member of the Greater Urban Parish Board of the American Lutheran Church.

Mrs. Jenkins, with rank of assistant professor, will be directly responsible to Dr. Thomas R. Holman, director of the new Student Development Center at Augsburg. Dr. Holman is the former FAME director.

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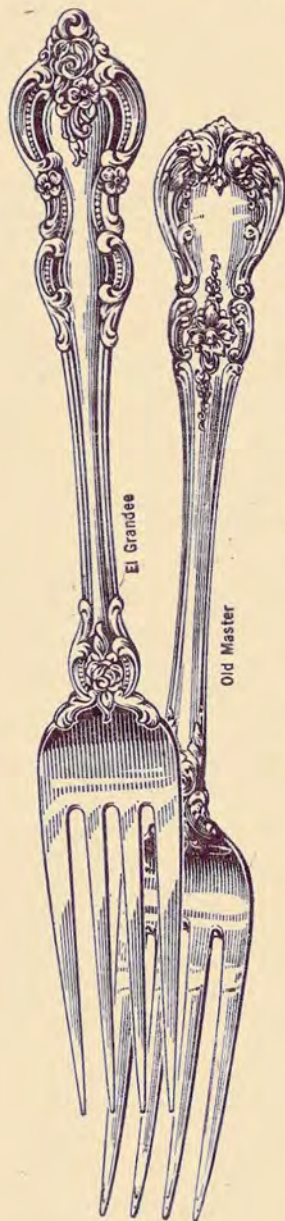
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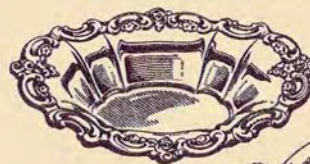

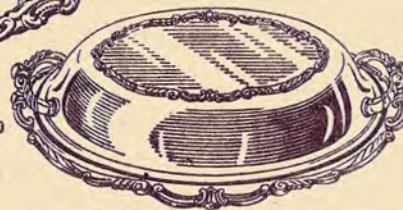

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Mpls. Schools Open Sept. 4th

School bells will soon ring for some 70,000 students to begin their first full day in the Minneapolis Public Schools on Thursday, Sept. 4.

Junior and Senior High Registration and Conferences will continue through August 29 the school staff including counselors will be available for registering and planning programs for students who recently moved into the school district or who find it necessary to make changes in their school program plans.

School officials stress the importance of registering during these days to insure the best course selection.

Minneapolis Public School hours for students are — elementary schools without school lunch programs, 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 12:45 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.; most elementary schools with lunch programs, 8:30 a.m. to 2:45 p.m.; junior and senior high schools, 8:20 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

For the first day of school only — 7th graders will report from 8:20 a.m. to 11:20 a.m. and 8th and 9th graders will report from 12 noon to 3 p.m. All other grades report at the regular time.

Kindergarten and Elementary Pupils

Kindergarten and elementary age children new to the district who were not registered last spring should report forenoons to their school sometime during the week of August 25 to August 29 to be enrolled. Only those children who are five years of age, or who will be five years old on or before November 1, 1969 are eligible for kindergarten. Parents are advised to bring birth certificates and proof of measles immunization with them at registration time for all students entering a Minnesota Public School for the first time.

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St. Paul Schools Funded To Recruit, Train Teachers For Learning Disabled

A new program to train teachers to work with junior and senior high school youth who have "special learning disabilities" has been funded for the St. Paul Public Schools under the Education Profession Development Act in the amount of \$109,015, Acting Superintendent of Schools John T. Lackner announced.

The funds will be used during the 1969-70 school year to recruit and train twenty teachers not now employed by any schools to deal with the special problems of youth with learning disabilities. (Interested applicants should contact the special education office in the St. Paul Schools.)

Project Director for the recruitment and training program will be Dr. Douglas E. Wiseman, a special education supervisor at the St. Paul Public Schools. The program is a cooperative undertaking of the St. Paul Schools, the University of Minnesota, and the Minnesota Department of Education. The grant is one of three made in Minnesota to assist schools in training new kinds of specialized personnel.

According to Charles M. Hagen, director of St. Paul's special education department, "The program will locate at the Como Park Junior High School. One immediate impact will be additional individual and small group instruction for youths who are not achieving as tests and measurements lead educators to expect they should." Eventually, it is hoped that some services of this kind can be provided

in every junior and senior high school.

"The teachers," Hagen said, "will have a demanding schedule which combines learning and earning."

The training will be directed toward developing meaningful services for youths who appear normal or above normal in ability, without physical or mental handicaps as such, but who do not achieve up to expectations. R. Thomas Starr, supervisor of SLD services in the St. Paul Schools characterizes their problem as a "learning disability."

"They comprise a special education gap," Starr says, "We have wanted to extend this type of program to secondary schools for some time."

The program was developed jointly by Dr. Hope Lea and Charles Hagen of the St. Paul Public Schools; Dr. P. J. Goraliski, Carolyn Elliot and Zoe Jenkins of the State Department of Education, and Professors Maynard Reynolds, Evelyn Deno, Richard Weatherman and John Rynders of the University of Minnesota.

Scientific Tabulation Proves Reading Speed Can Be Increased By Television

It is possible to increase the reading speed of high school students through the use of televised instruction. This point had been contended, but now statistics are available to prove the point, as it was previously proven for college students and adults generally.

At the request of Reynold Rehwalder, principal of Kellogg Senior High School, Roseville, the results of the televised series, "Efficient Reading," were evaluated. The course has been designed by Dr. James I. Brown, of the University of Minnesota, and was shown over station KTCA-TV, Channel 2, St. Paul, from March to May, 1969.

The series consists of 12 half-hour lessons televised over the educational channel, supplemented by a study guide and a practice workbook.

The televised series was begun with 112 Kellogg high school seniors, with 88 completing the course. All of these 88 had been tested on vocabulary and comprehension, but only 33 had been pre-tested on reading speed.

Before taking the televised instruction the 33 read at a speed of 264 words per minute. After taking the course of Dr. Brown, their reading speed had improved to 450 words per minute, for a gain of 186 words per minute or 70 per cent.

The initial range of reading speeds was from 115 to 600 words per minute while the final

range was from 235 to 615. Sixteen of the 33 students more than doubled their reading speed while six students read at 615 words per minute.

The 55 other students who had no initial reading rate score had a final average reading rate of 401 words per minute. It is assumed that their initial reading rate was comparable to those with initial scores available.

Results of testing for vocabulary and comprehension were expressed in terms of grade level. The 71 Kellogg seniors who were pre-tested on vocabulary averaged out to a grade level of 11.6. After taking the televised course of Dr. Brown they averaged out to a grade level of 12.3, for a gain of .69 of a grade.

In comprehension only there were 67 seniors pre-tested for an average grade level of 11.5. After their televised instruction they averaged out to a grade level of 11.9 in comprehension.

Dates Announced For Kindergarten Fall Registration

Registration for St. Paul Public School kindergarten is scheduled for September 2, 3 and 4. Parents are asked to register their children according to the following alphabetical schedule: September 2, A through G; September 3, H through O; and September 4, P through Z.

Children entering kindergarten this fall must be five on or before November 1, 1969. Parents should bring the following items with them when they register their child: a birth certificate or a certified copy of a birth record, a health report, a dental card and an emergency information card.

Minnesota law now requires that a child enrolling in a school for the first time should have protection against the red, seven-day measles. Written proof consists of a statement signed by your physician or health clinic to indicate that your child has had the measles or the measles vaccine. Bring this written proof with you at the beginning of the school year when you register your child.

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Urban Studies Lab at Hamline

An Urban Studies term that will use the Twin Cities as an urban laboratory for college students throughout the country has been announced by Hamline University, St. Paul.

Supported initially by a three-year grant from the Division of Higher Education of the United Methodist Church, the project will be offered by Hamline beginning with the college's 1970 spring term and will bring a maximum of 30 students from other states to the Hamline campus for a study of urban problems and issues. Emphasis will be placed on field study and research in Twin City area government and community agencies.

Directing the program will be Dr. Donald P. Irish, Hamline sociology department chairman.

Irish said that the Twin Cities offers several distinct advantages for such a program over larger metropolitan centers. "Here a seven county urban-suburban complex faces typical problems of urban growth and change but still provides the travel convenience needed for field research," he said.

"Also important," said Irish, "is that problems here are still manageable and not as deep-seated, long standing or gigantic in scope as they are in our na-

tion's bigger and older cities. Students can complete their study and still have hope for urban life, rather than despair or disillusionment."

In addition to providing college students with an opportunity to learn about the challenges of urban life, Irish also hopes that the experience will stimulate a developing competence and continuing interest in urban affairs and that the research will contribute toward solutions of local and national urban problems.

Irish listed four basic types of study for the program in which each student will participate:

(1) Conduct individual research into some aspect of urban problems relevant to his major and of special interest to himself. Irish said that he envisioned these topics ranging from pollution for the biology or chemistry major to community recreation for the physical education major.

Sophomores, juniors and seniors from any accredited college may apply upon recommendation by their adviser. Special consideration will be given applicants from rural areas or those attending schools in non-urban communities. Scholarship funds are available where need is demonstrated.

At Hamline, the participants will live in college residences and costs will be based on Hamline's tuition, room and board.

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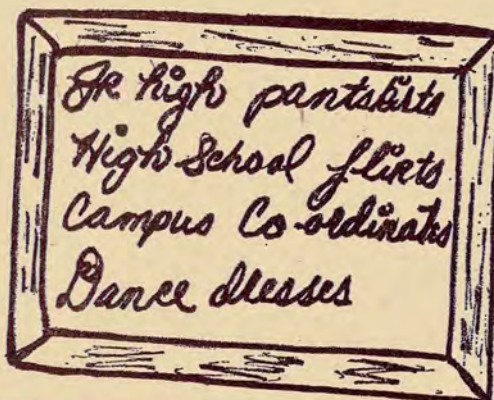

Opening the Bush season on Oct. 16 will be Herb Gardner's comedy "A Thousand Clowns."

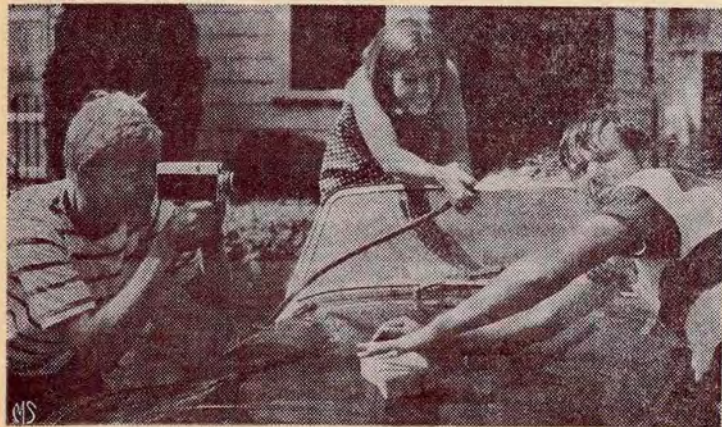

Young Film-makers Busy Preparing Entries For Seventh Annual Kodak Teen-age Movie Awards

Summertime is movie-making time for teen-agers having fun at work on their entries for the seventh annual Kodak Teen-age Movie Awards. They are outlining film stories, shooting documentaries, making film stars of their friends, and at work with their Disney-style cartoons and three dimensional animation. Entries must be postmarked not later than September 15.

A number of them are also trying their hands at making one-reelers—these are 50-foot unedited films for which there is a special category in this year's competition.

This is in addition to the traditional age categories—junior (12 through 15) and senior (16 through 19). Both age groups are eligible to compete in the "One-Reeler" competition for 8mm and super 8 silent films, and these entries will also be entered in the appropriate age category.

Winners in the junior and senior categories will receive cash prizes of \$150, \$100, and \$50 for first, second, and third place, respectively. "One-Reeler" winners will receive \$50. Special Award films

as selected by the judges will receive \$25 each. In addition to the cash award, the top winners will receive a bronze medallion, a certificate, and two rolls of Kodachrome II movie film. There will be at least 10 honorable mention awards given and winners of these will receive certificates and film.

In the junior and senior categories, films may be sound or silent; black-and-white or color; 8mm, 16mm, or super 8; any length up to 30 minutes; the work of one or more teen-agers.

Judging of the films will be directed by the University Film Foundation on behalf of the University Film Association, which, with the Council on International Nontheatrical Events (CINE), is associated with Kodak in sponsoring the Awards. Prize-winning films from past competitions have been shown in festivals abroad under auspices of CINE.

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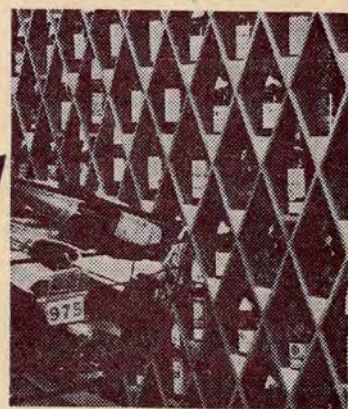

MDTA, N.A.B. Training Programs Lead to Jobs

Employment Security Commissioner George J. Vavoulis said that the percentage of graduates of Manpower Development and Training (MDTA) courses in Minnesota who find jobs has steadily increased.

In addition, the more recent Job Opportunities in the Business Sector (JOBS) program of the National Alliance of Businessmen (N.A.B.) has provided a major recent increase in on-the-job training for disadvantaged persons in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth.

A recent survey made by the State Department of Employment Security showed that 89 per cent of MDTA graduates still in the labor force are now employed.

Vavoulis noted that a similar survey of trainees showed 80 per cent employed through January, 1966. By June 30, 1966, the percentage had increased to 81 per cent. By June, 1968, the figure had risen to 85 per cent.

He pointed out that 56 per cent of the 3,703 trainees enrolled during the fiscal year which ended June 30 had poverty level incomes and, of these, 53 per cent had some type of disadvantage which was acting as a barrier to employment.

Vavoulis said that needy persons are considered disadvantaged if they are school dropouts, under 22 or over 45 years of age, handicapped or members of a racial minority.

Housing In 'U' Area Scarce

"No vacancy" is the word from the University of Minnesota Student Housing Bureau concerning off-campus housing in the University area.

Students will have to consider living away from the campus area, according to Margaret Space, associate director of the bureau.

Housing in the East and West Bank and Como vicinities was scarce and expensive to begin with, and now it's almost non-existent, says Miss Space.

Though apartments in outlying areas are usually less expensive, there are transportation problems to consider.

House-hunting aid on Saturdays will be available throughout the summer from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. During the week, the bureau's offices in 209 Eddy Hall and 101 Coffey hall are open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Both offices will be closed Aug. 30 for the Labor Day weekend.

The bureau also handles housing for University staff and faculty.

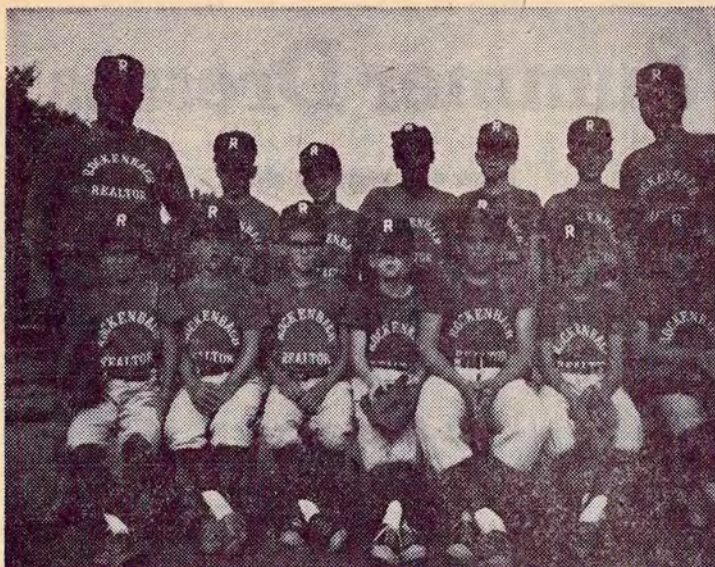

GI Bill For High Dropouts

High school dropouts who enter the service may return to get their diploma under the GI Bill, according to the Veterans Administration.

John R. Murphy, Manager, VA Center, St. Paul, said the VA will pay veterans up to \$130 a month for single and full-time students—more if they have dependents. Those attending adult evening school will be enrolled at half-time rate. He emphasized that these payments will not reduce their college or on-the-job training benefits.

A number of colleges and universities have embarked on new programs for returning veterans who do not possess a diploma but do desire a higher education, he said. However, such veterans must meet certain qualifications established by the institutions and the VA.

Upon discharge, if the school and program desired are known, veterans should file at the nearest VA office for certificates of eligibility even though they may not use them immediately.

Information on all GI Bill benefits may be obtained from the St. Paul VA office located in the new Federal Building at Fort Snelling, or from the nearest Veterans County Service Officer.

National Indian Education Conference To Be Held in Minneapolis in November

A national conference on Indian education will be held in Minneapolis Nov. 20 and 21.

The American Indian community of the Minneapolis-St. Paul area is planning the conference, with cooperation from the University of Minnesota General Extension Division.

Although the conference is planned as a forum for exchange of ideas among Indians from throughout the country, anyone interested in Indian education will be welcome, a conference spokesman said.

Among the topics scheduled to be discussed are community control and parent participation through school boards and other councils; school finances; training of Indian educators and non-Indian teachers of Indian children; special programs for adult education and dropout prevention, and Upward Bound; and textbook evaluation and curriculum development in languages, history and college Indian studies departments.

Will Antell, director of Indian education for the Minnesota Department of Education, has been named honorary chairman of the conference.

Nader To Head 5th Annual Minn. Consumers Congress

What new expose of hazards to the American consumer does Ralph Nader have up his sleeve? Minnesotans may learn his newest field of attack on Saturday, Sept. 6th, when he addresses the closing session of the fifth annual Minnesota Consumer Congress at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis.

The address by the celebrated author and consumer crusader will be at 8:00 p.m. at Northrop Memorial Auditorium and will be open to the public as will be other sessions of the Congress held on Sept. 6th at Coffman Memorial Union.

Nader, who first came to fame with his accusations about unsafe features of cars in his book, "Unsafe At Any Speed," has since turned his sights on pollution hazards, unsafe or misgraded meats, and the shortcomings of federal regulatory agencies, such as the Federal Trade Commission, in being equipped to cope with the duties they are intended to carry out.

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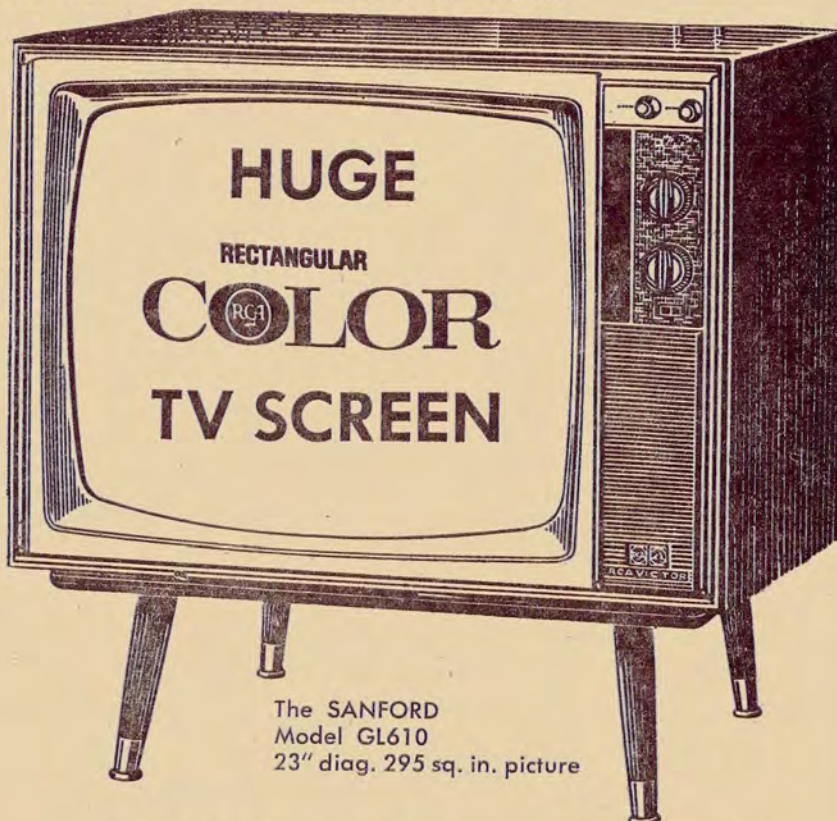
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
