Parish Festival

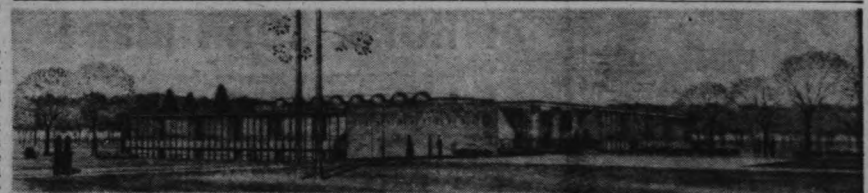

This school is famous all over the country for its work with mentally handicapped.

St. Catherine's President Announces Staff For Mental Health Workshop August 16-25

Staff members for the Mental Health Workshop, to be held at the College of St. Catherine from August 16-25, have just been announced by Sister Annette, CSJ, director of the workshop. Beside Sister Annette, other staff members include Sister M. Aloyse, I.H.M., Ph.D., who is chairman of the Psychology department and director of Psychological Services at Immaculate Heart College, Los Angeles. Sister M. Aloyse is also a member of the American Psychological Association, the American Catholic Psychological Association and is an associate member of the Guild of Catholic Psychiatrists.

Philip K. Arzt, M.D., a consulting psychiatrist and neurologist of Ancker Hospital, is on the medical staff of Wilder Dispensary and Alcoholic Service Center, St. Paul. Dr. Arzt is also assistant Clinical Professor at the University of Minnesota Medical School.

Leo H. Bartemeier, M.D., is the Medical Director of Seton Psychiatric Institute, Baltimore. He is a member of the Health Resources Advisory Committee of Office of Defense Mobilization and Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at Georgetown University Medical Center.

A member of Spring Hill College, Mobile, Alabama, Rev. Albert S. Foley, S.J., is also Vice President of the Alabama Council on Human Relations. Father Foley is a specialist in racial intergroup relations, role playing, group dynamics and communications.

Dean James L. Hayes, M.S., of the School of Business Administration, Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, is the author of "Principal Skills and Tools of Scientific Management" and has served as lecturer and discussion leader on problems of administration and organization at Workshops for Administrators of Psychiatric Hospitals throughout the United States and Canada.

Rev. Noel Mailloux, O.P., Ph.D., is a professor of Psychology at the University of Montreal. A member of the Canadian Psychological Association and the American Psychological Association, Father Mailloux is a frequent participant in conferences throughout the world on mental health and religion.

Joseph S. Skobba, M.D., is Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at Emory University School of Medicine and is Chief of Psychiatric Service at Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta, Georgia. He is a member of the Board of Regents of the Southern Psychiatric Association.

John J. Regan, M.D., is Clinical Instructor in the Department of Psychiatry and Neurology at the University of Minnesota. He is also on the staff of Minneapolis Neuropsychiatric Clinic, St. Mary's, Fairview, St. Barnabas, Minneapolis General and Glenwood Hills Hospitals.

Sister William, I.H.M., Ph.D., on the faculty of Immaculate Heart College, Los Angeles, wrote her doctoral dissertation on "Incidence of Mental Illness in Religious," and has contributed to the American Journal of Psychiatry.

The Mental Health Institute at St. Catherine's is co-sponsored by the National Institute of Mental Health, The College of St. Catherine, and the Sister Formation Conference. The main feature of the Institute, the ten day workshop, will present the exploration of the mental health aspects of the participants various educational and charitable works and permit them to become acquainted with new developments in the mental health sciences.

Contemporary Photos At Minneapolis Institute

Photography in the fine arts, an exhibition of 76 great contemporary photographs, are now at The Minneapolis Institute of Arts through September 6.

The exhibition was organized as part of a new national project, "Photography in the Fine Arts." This project was developed by the noted photographer, Ivan Dmitri, under the sponsorship of the national magazine, "Saturday Review." The idea grew out of national reaction to a "Saturday Review" column which described Mr. Dmitri's conviction that more museums should collect and display photographs as art. Museum directors across the country expressed agreement with Mr. Dmitri. They also pointed out a great need for finding a method of screening the best work in photography.

In summer of 1958 the project was set up under Ivan Dmitri's direction. A National Advisory Committee was organized with James J. Borimer, Director of The Metropolitan Museum of Art, as chairman.

The Reader's Digest Foundation to bring outstanding professors from foreign countries to Macalester is a new venture in education and marks a milestone at the college.



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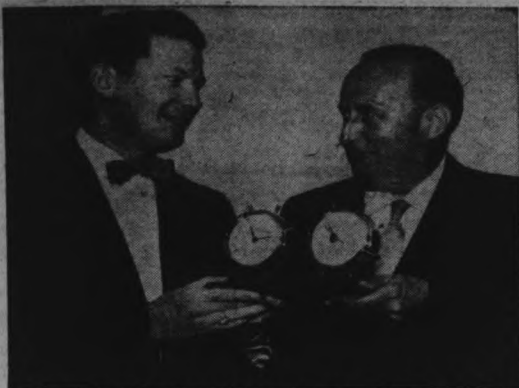

Mathematics Workshop at St. Catherine's Outlines New Objectives for Machine Age

"As math is taught in most schools today, students don't know what the teacher is talking about—and the teacher may not either." This statement was made by Rex Harvey, staff member of the Mathematics Workshop held at the College of St. Catherine.

Mr. Harvey, head of the Mathematics Department of the High Schools of Elkhart, Indiana, received his Bachelor of Science and Master of Science in Education from the Indiana State Teachers College, Terre Haute.

In 1954, he was awarded a General Electric Fellowship in Mathematics and attended Purdue University. In 1957 he received Science Foundation grant for additional study in Mathematics.

Mr. Harvey said "that with the advent of computing machines, the teacher and student must become better acquainted with the basic principles of mathematics. The purpose of these workshops is to present new techniques and ideas in order to permit both the student and the teacher to become better acquainted with these principles."

Continuing, Mr. Harvey stated: "The objective of the workshop is to explain and evaluate the stage in human learning of mathematical concepts and generalizations. There is evidence that students, whose courses are taught by teachers who promote and recognize this stage of learning, develop enthusiasm for the subject, power to do creative thinking, and a spirit and taste for research."

Attending the mathematics workshop at St. Catherine's were twenty in-service ninth grade mathematics teachers and twenty-eight students in a ninth grade demonstration class. These students have been selected from

the eighth grade classes of neighboring schools.

Sister Seraphim, CSJ, Chairman of the Department and Professor of Mathematics at St. Catherine's, was the Workshop Moderator.

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St. Catherine's Launch Proposed \$10 Million Expansion Program With New Library

With the selection of Lang and Raugland, Inc. of Minneapolis as architects and engineers for the new library building at the College of St. Catherine, St. Paul, the College began its twenty-year building program. This announcement was made by Sister Mary William, CSJ, president of the college, with the approval of Mother Antonine, CSJ, Provincial Superior, St. Joseph's Provincial House, St. Paul.

Estimated cost of the building program will be approximately \$10,000,000 (ten million dollars). The building program will be expanded southward of the present group of buildings. Included will be the new library, dormitory and classroom building, convent, fine arts building and expansion of the Service Building which houses the steam-heating plant.

St. Catherine's founded by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet in 1903, was named by the Most Reverend John Ireland, Archbishop of St. Paul. The campus covers an area of more than one hundred acres, and includes The Dew Drop, a small lake.

Derham Hall, the first unit of the College and administration building, named for Mr. Hugh Derham of Rosemount, whose gift of \$20,000 aided materially in its construction, was opened in January, 1905. Today, it contains in addition to administrative offices, the post office, offices for student organizations and publications, and provides residence for approximately 125 students and faculty members.

Other buildings include Caecilian Hall which houses the music studios, practice rooms, student rooms and classrooms; the Chapel of Our Lady of Victory also provides space on the ground floor for the main library; Fontbonne Hall houses the gymnasium, swimming pool, recreation room, health clinic, faculty offices and classrooms; Mendel Hall, or more commonly known as the Science Hall, houses classrooms, laboratories, book store and nursery school; the Reserve Library building houses the reserved book collection, record collection, and the cataloging offices; the Service Building houses the steam-heating and the laundry; and Whitby Hall which houses classrooms, auditorium and student rooms.

On January 4, 1955, Archbishop John Gregory Murray dedicated St. Joseph Hall, the student union, and the eighth building to be erected on the campus in the history of the college. The union was built at a cost of \$1,800,000. It is a four story building and serves both students and faculty. Social rooms, home economics and home management departments, a luncheonette, snack room, centralized food service, conference rooms and student rooms are housed in this building.

The estimated cost of the new library will be approximately \$1,000,000. With construction beginning this Fall, it is hoped that the

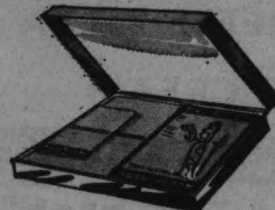
