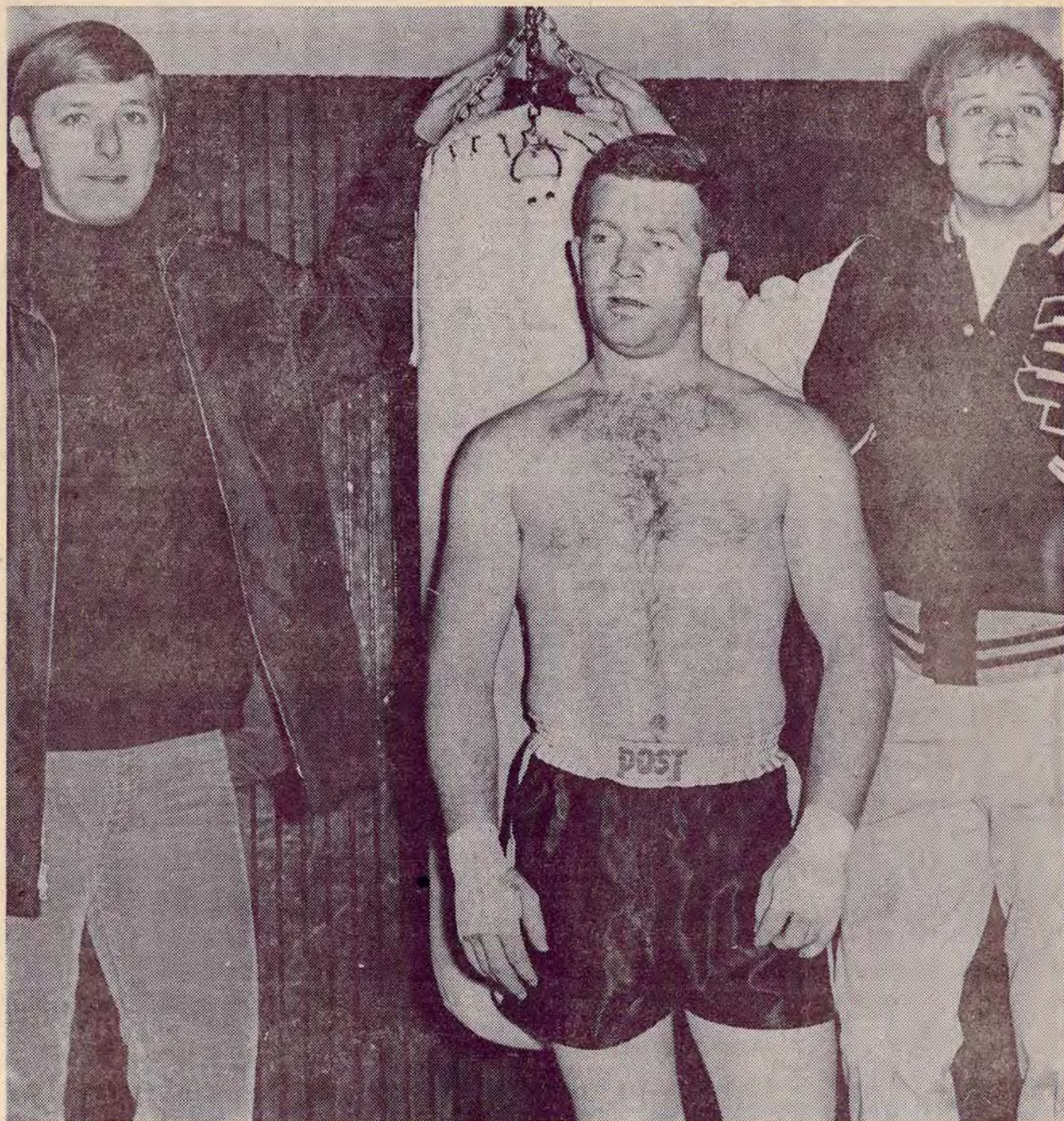

SPECIAL SERVICE FOR "TROUBLED"

Persons in trouble at night and on weekends will continue to receive immediate help by dialing 225-1515 for emergency social service, ESP, now an established program of the Greater St. Paul United Fund.

Started last July as a pilot study, the telephone service in the Red Cross building has been funded for the past six months by the St. Paul Area Red Cross. It now operates on an annual grant of \$8,000 from the United Fund.

Those in need of help call in on a special telephone, answered around the clock. The Red Cross personnel on duty presses a button to connect the caller with one of three social workers, who serve in alternate weeks. They are skilled in finding solutions to both simple and complex problems.

During the pilot study period,

help was given to almost 500 callers over the "hot line." Included were those in need of food or shelter, victims of acute alcoholism, those in need of medical care, others with family and emotional problems and reports of neglected children.

Mrs. Bette Undis, who supervises the program, said most calls come from the affected individuals, but she urged anyone knowing of a situation where help is needed to report it. The same service is extended through the same telephone number during working hours on weekdays by Family Service, she said.

Founded on the recommendation of the Community Health and Welfare Council, ESP resources include all of the city's social agencies and public services.

Girl Scout Cookie Drive

"Can you imagine," said Mrs. F. Lindsay Power, 1896 Hillcrest, "a line of cookie boxes more than 52 miles long, stretching from St. Paul well past North Branch? Or a football field entirely covered with boxes of cookies? Well, that's how many the Girl Scout Council of St. Croix Valley is aiming to sell during its 1969 Cookie Sale . . . about 330,000 boxes." The annual Girl Scout Cookie sale starts March 14th. She heads a group of about 700 adults and 10,000 girls who are participating in this event. In the Highlands area she is assisted by Mrs. Melvin Bocourt, 1797 Munster Avenue.

Junior, Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts will take orders for cookies from March 14th thru the 24th. Cookies will be paid for when they are delivered, from April 16th thru April 28th.

The cookie sale is held to raise funds to support the Girl Scout camping program and to provide money for camperships and special girl opportunities, such as trips to national confer-

ences and workshops. Much of the profits from past Girl Scout cookie sales have been invested in the Council's camp properties, which now total over a thousand acres of camp lands.

Retardation Drive

"Any family can be struck by mental retardation. We plan to ask everyone to help us combat it," Dr. Robert K. Anderson said announcing a community wide membership campaign during February.

As President of the St. Paul Association for Retarded Children (SPARC) Dr. Anderson pointed out that three-quarters of the causes of mental retardation are unknown and that three out of every hundred persons in the United States is retarded. "Our membership must represent a cross-section of the St. Paul area if we are to help the retarded in our community."

The membership drive is part of a country-wide campaign being conducted by the 1,300 affiliated units of the National Association for Retarded Children.

"Men and women are needed to provide professional advice and assistance, to work with retarded children and young people, to open up employment opportunities and to build community programs," Dr. Anderson said.

Young people are needed to seek careers in the fields of special education, recreation, social work and scientific research. Teenagers are needed as camp counselors, scouting programs helpers and trained baby sitters, he continued.

Firearms Safety

Register now for the firearms safety class beginning on Tuesday, March 18, 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at Edgumbe Playgrounds for boys and girls aged 12 and over; this will be the last class in this area to make you eligible to hunt in the fall; instructor is Dan Gahl.

Residents under 14 who use a firearm for any purpose must be accompanied by their parent or legal guardian. Residents 14 or 15 years of age may hunt or use a firearm by themselves if they have a Firearms Safety Certificate. Residents 13, 14, or 15 years old must have a Firearms Safety Certificate to hunt small game. No resident under 16 years of age can purchase a small game hunting license. Residents under 12 years of age cannot hunt big game.

Guardian is defined as legal guardian or any other person over the age of 21 who has been selected by the parent or legal guardian to supervise the person under the age of 16 while he has in his possession or under control any firearm or air gun of any kind for hunting or target practice.
