Highland Sketchbook

Charles J. Ritt, Highland State Bank

(Editor's note: This is the eighth in a series of articles designed to acquaint our readers with members of the Highland Civic Association. Names are drawn at random from the membership roster. One SKETCH will appear in each issue of the Villager.)

Mr. Charles J. Ritt, president of the Highland Park State Bank of St. Paul, lives at 1751 Highland Parkway. He is married and has two sons who are both employed in the banking business.



Mr. Ritt has been in the banking business for 48 years. He has been president of the Highland Park State Bank since 1954, and prior to that time, vice president, and director since the initiation of the bank in April, 1946. He served for many years as a national bank examiner on the West Coast, and prior to his returning to St. Paul in 1945, he was vice president of the Citizens National Bank and Trust Company of Los Angeles.

He is a director of the St. Paul Clearing House and a veteran of World War I and a member of the American Legion. He is also a member of the Lion's Club, Town and Country Club, and other civic organizations. He has long been active in various other civic affairs.

A commemorative fund to be known as the "Rabbi's Publication Fund" will be used to publish materials selected by the rabbi.

Born in Germany, Rabbi Plaut holds a LLD degree as well as a doctorate of jurisprudence in International Law from the University of Berlin. He is a recognized athlete in fields of tennis, soccer and golf. He is a tournament chess player and has published chess problems.

In his ten years at Mt. Zion, where he came in 1948 from the Washington Boulevard Temple, Chicago, he has distinguished himself in many fields. He is well known on radio and TV, and is at present heard weekly on WMIN.

He has been a staff member of Macalester college in the department of philosophy, and president of the St. Paul Gallery and Art School since 1953. He serves on the governor's committee on ethics and government.

As a writer, he has published a book, "Mt. Zion, 100 Years," for the congregation's centennial, and has in publication now a history of the Jews in Minnesota. His children's services and dramas are used nationally in synagogues, and he has contributed to the Jewish Encyclopedia. He heads the Central Conference of Rabbi's committee for new literature for Reform Jews.

Rabbi Plaut lives at 1359 Fairmount and is married to Elizabeth Plaut, and has two children, Jonathan and Judy.

Lutherans Will Present Pageant in 8 Cities

A Minnesota Centennial play-pageant depicting the part played by the Lutheran Church in the state's growth during the past 100 years will be presented in eight Minnesota cities this fall, involving participation by 14 church bodies representing nearly a million Lutherans in some 2,100 Minnesota congregations.

The Rev. Otto E. Schmidt, St. Paul, general chairman, said a cast of more than 100, including a 60-voice choral group, will take part in the production, "Of Grace and Growth."

Scriptwriter and director is James S. Kerr of Minneapolis. Kerr is associate editor of ONE magazine, published by the Joint (Lutheran) Youth Publications Council.

He has written and produced more than 60 plays for church groups, primarily in his native Canada.

The opening performance will be October 23 at Rochester. A single performance is set for 4 p. m. Sunday, Oct. 26, in the St. Paul auditorium. Additional performances may be scheduled in some cities.

The play-pageant will consist of a series of flashbacks, depicting the growth of Minnesota Lutheranism from its beginning in the early 1850's to the present day, including education, evangelism, missions, music, social action and medicine. Prof. Paul O. Manz of Concordia college, St. Paul, will direct the choral group.

Plans for the pageant were launched last fall by an inter-synodical group of Twin Cities Lutherans headed by Mr. Schmidt, pastor of Como Park Lutheran church, St. Paul.

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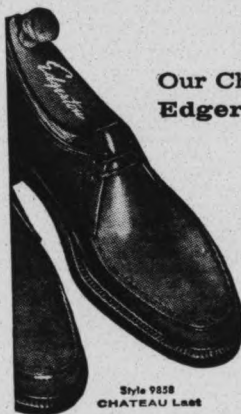

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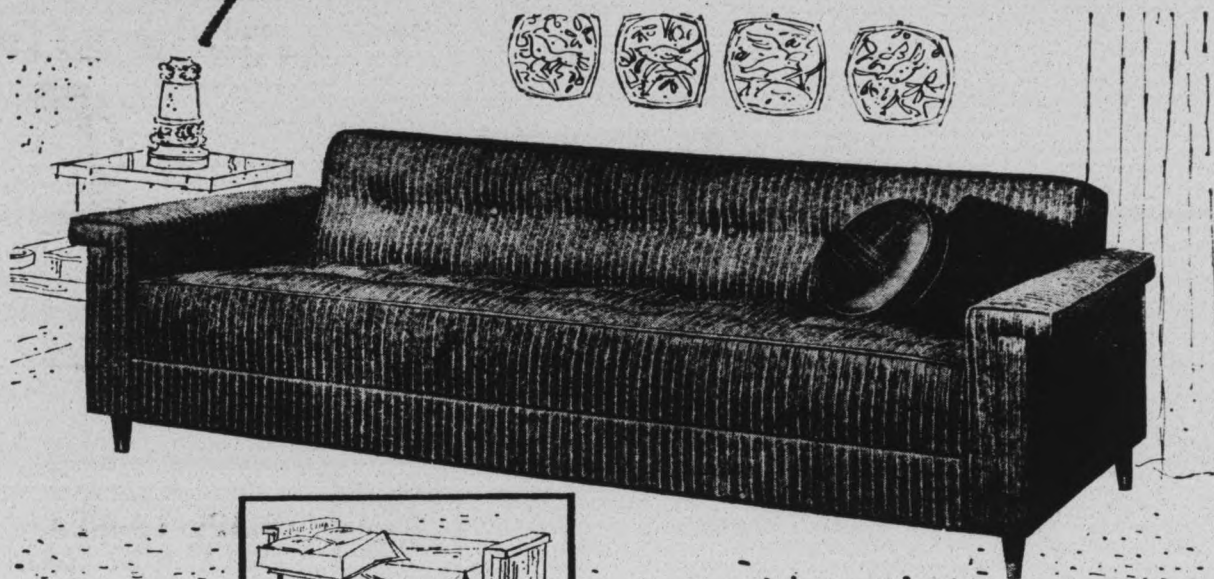

Iron Curtain Escapee To Teach at St. Thomas

An Iron Curtain escapee will be among the faculty in the Adult Evening program which began September 30 at the College of St. Thomas. An expanded credit course program is also listed.

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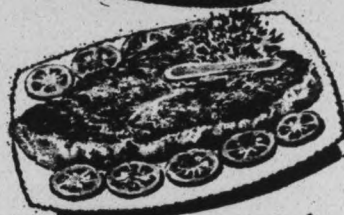
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Registration Closes Tuesday, October 14, For General Election

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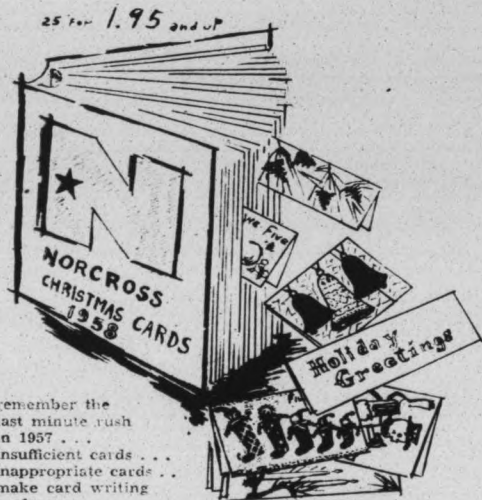
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
