WINTER FUN IN MINNESOTA depends partly on good facilities such as the newlyopened recreational shelter building at Homecroft Playground, Edgcumbe and Sheridan.
Located adjacent to the hockey and skating rinks, the building provides a warming room,
lavatories, drinking fountain. Overhead garage door at left pairs with another on opposite
side of building to provide storage space for snow plows, tractors and other equipment. In
summer both big doors can be opened for fresh-air ping-pong space. Also included in the
80x60' building is office space for a playground supervisor and a storage room for sports
equipment. The St. Paul department of parks and playgrounds provides supervised outdoor
activities 30 weeks out of the year. For the 20-week indoor program, kitchen and gym
facilities of Homecroft School across the street are used. The \$27,000 shelter building was
built with funds from the city bond issue passed in 1953.
