St. Thomas Alumni Mass And Communion

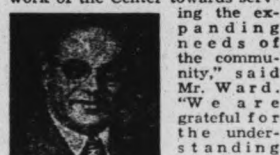

The 1958 campaign for funds by the St. Paul and Southeastern Minnesota Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society will be highlighted by a door-to-door solicitation from 7 to 9 p. m. Tuesday, May 13, by more than 3,000 women.

"It is particularly appropriate," Clifford E. Mikkelsen, 408 So. Pascal, local campaign chairman said, "that our MS Hope Chest campaign is scheduled to take place from Mother's Day to Father's Day, because multiple sclerosis usually hits young adults, the breadwinners and homemakers—parents of young and dependent families."

The disease is characterized by double vision, tremor, staggering gait and paralysis.

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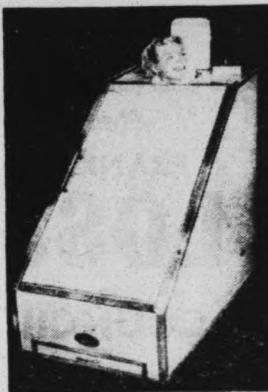

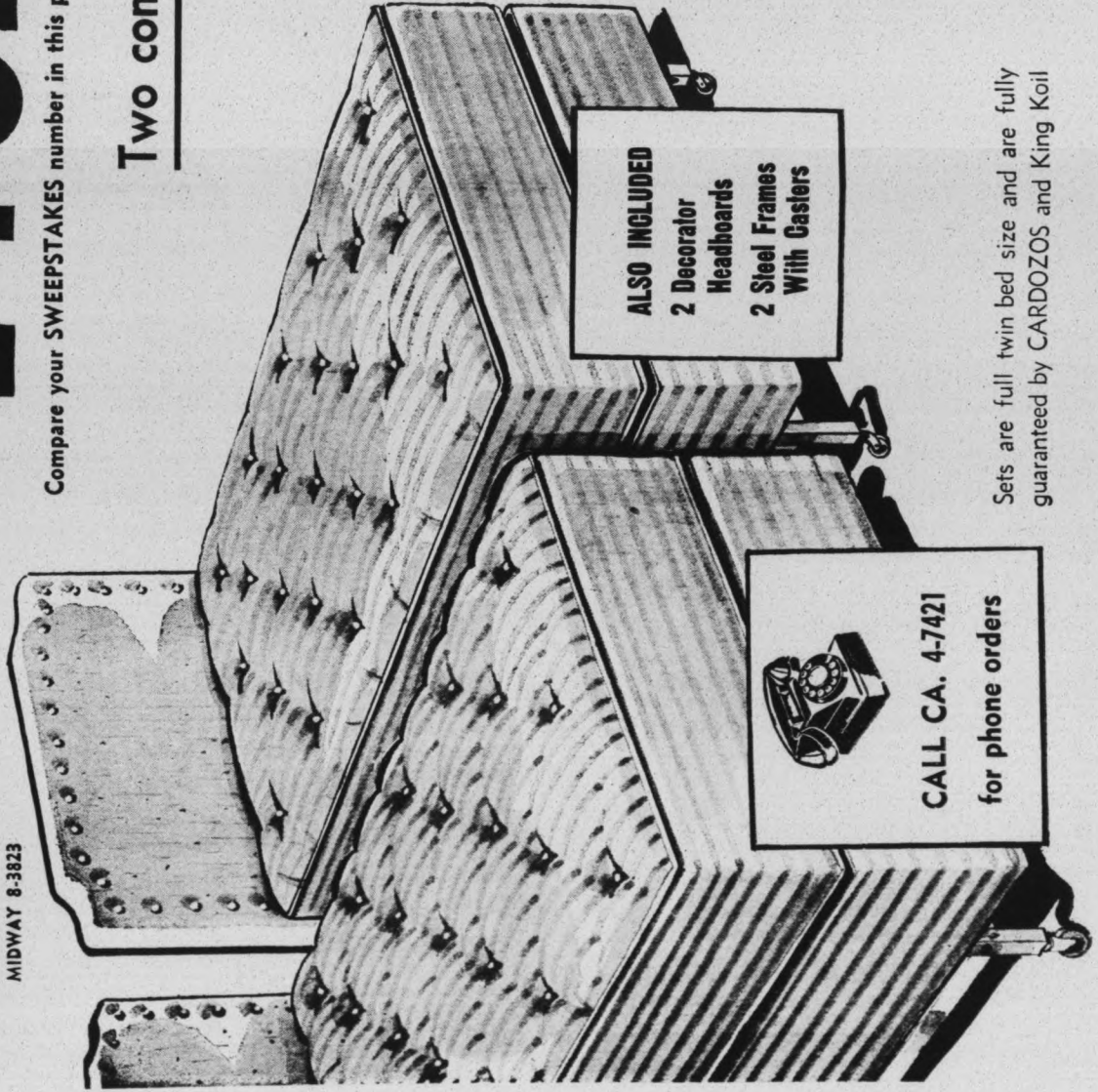

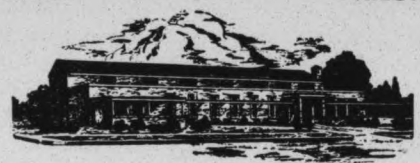

New Minnesota Stamp Makes Collector's Item

The new Minnesota Statehood Centennial commemorative postage stamp will go on first day sale at the Saint Paul Post Office on May 11.

Thousands of the new stamps cancelled here on May 11 will be saved as interesting collector's items regardless of whether the person is a stamp collector.

These "first-day covers" of the new stamp may be obtained easily.

ANYONE desiring first day of issue cancellations needs only to send the desired number of addressed envelopes to the local postmaster, before the scheduled date of issuance, May 11, with a U. S. postal money order enclosed to cover the cost of all of the stamps he wants affixed.

An enclosure of medium weight, such as 2 pieces of bond paper properly folded for the envelope, or a blotter, should be enclosed in each envelope. The flap may be sealed, or turned in. THERE MUST be enough money to buy at least one stamp for each envelope to be cancelled.

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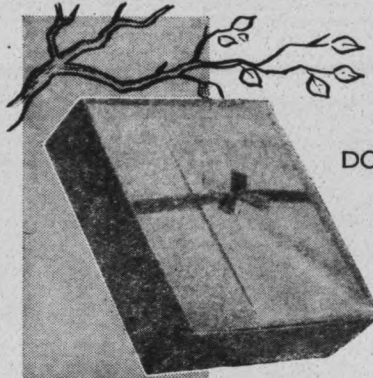
