Barnett to speak at Homcroft Community Association meeting

Geoff Barnett, goalkeeper for the Minnesota Kicks, will be the featured speaker at the Homcroft Community Association meeting, to be held Tuesday, January 24 at 7:30 p.m. in the Homcroft gymnasium.

A native of Northwick, England, Barnett came to the Kicks following seven seasons with Everton and seven with Arsenal, both first division British soccer teams.

In his first season with the Kicks, Barnett recorded seven shut-outs in 22 games played. This past season he posted a streak of 457 minutes and 18 seconds of score-less goal tending.

Barnett tore a cartilage in the second game of the playoffs against Seattle and was removed from the starting line-up. Surgery has since repaired the damage and Barnett says he's "100 percent fit" for the coming season.

Legislative Preview Forum to be held Thursday at JCC

District 63 solons Senator Ron Sietoff (I-R) and Representatives Ray Faricy (DFL, 63A) and Dick Cohen (DFL, 63B) have been invited to attend a "1978 Legislative Preview Forum," to be held at 7:30 p.m. this Thursday, January 12 at the Jewish Community Center, 1375 St. Paul Ave.

Organized by the College of St. Thomas board of the Minnesota Public Interest Research Group (MPIRG), the forum is co-sponsored by a slew of community organizations, including the Macalester College board of MPIRG, the District 63 DFL and I-R parties, the Minnesota Energy Conser-

vation Committee, the St. Paul League of Women Voters, the Highland-Groveland-Macalester Community Association, Citizens for Community Action, and Minnesota Citizens Concerned for Life.

Purpose of the forum, according to James Grathwol of the St. Thomas MPIRG board, is to "bring local legislators and their constituents together so that each may sound out the other before the 1978 legislative session begins on issues whose fates will be determined in the upcoming months."

All Highland area residents are invited to attend.

St. Paul Winter Carnival gets underway January 26

Since its creation in 1886 by indignant city fathers who resented a visiting reporter's description of Minnesota and its capital city as "another Siberia, unfit for human habitation," the St. Paul Winter Carnival has grown dramatically. Scheduled for this year's 92nd annual celebration. Highlighting the 1978 "Snowflake Fantasy" will be the creation of a 27-foot high by 49-foot long snow sculpture by seven visiting artists from the Sapporo Japan Snow Festival. Approximately 600 tons of snow will be required to complete the sculpture in Como Park.

Among the 19 new attractions scheduled for the ten-day carnival, January 27 through February 5, are a hockey game between the St. Paul Fire and Police Departments, a women's invitational hockey tournament,

a pops concert by the Minnesota Dance Theatre, World's Professional Squash Tournaments, basketball, bocce ball, tennis and checkers tournaments, performances by escape artist Bernie Orlando, an exhibit of Eskimo prints and Egyptian tapestries, downhill skiing, a cross country ski-a-thon, a kennel club demonstration and novice speed skating competition.

Since 1966 the St. Paul Winter Carnival has been preceded by the International 500 Snowmobile Race, which will start in Winnipeg on January 23 and finish in St. Paul on January 26 to mark the official opening of the Winter Carnival.

The 13th annual "500" will include drivers from both the U.S. and Canada as they compete for their share of up to \$50,000 in cash awards.

Homcroft gym plans to be detailed at Jan. 11 meeting

The Homcroft Gym Building Committee has scheduled an open community meeting to show the completed floor plans and sketches of the proposed Homcroft gym addition and new warming house. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, January 11 at Homcroft Elementary School, 1845 Sheridan Ave.

The plan calls for developing a full-sized gymnasium, turning empty classrooms into usable recreational space, and enlarging the current kitchen facilities.

The building committee came up with its plan after many months of meetings with members of the community, the Parks and Recreation Board, school district officials and the architectural firm of Adkins Association of St. Paul.

Bonds totalling \$349,000

have already been authorized for the gymnasium project by the Capital Improvements Budget Committee and the St. Paul City Council.

Mac publishes economic paper

The Bureau of Economic Studies at Macalester College has published the first paper in a new series of publications.

Entitled "Food Production Potentials in Developing Countries—Will They Be Realized?", the paper is a reprint of an address made to the Macalester College community in October 1977 by D. Gale Johnson, Professor of Economics at the University of Chicago. Johnson visited Macalester

last year as a Hubert H. Humphrey lecturer.

Purpose of the new publication series, according to Robert Bunting, chairman of the Macalester Department of Economics and Business, is to make the ideas and remarks of important campus visitors available to a greater Twin Cities audience. The series will also provide a publication outlet for some exceptional honors papers written by economics students, and will occasionally be used to reproduce technical papers in economics written by Macalester faculty.

St. Thomas women cagers show first-year promise

As mindful a man as CST women's basketball coach Tom Kosel is, he apparently forgot to inform his first-year team that fledgling athletic programs aren't supposed to produce winners.

Six games into their schedule, St. Thomas women cagers have already proven themselves a respectable college squad with a 3-3 record, as St. Thomas continues its first year of women's athletics.

Boasting only two sophomores on an otherwise all-freshman team, the female Toms opened the season with a nip-and-tuck 68-66 defeat at the hands of St. Scholastica in Duluth. The team rebounded from the loss with crushing victories over St. Paul Bible College (70-32) and Metropolitan Community College (72-20).

A victory over Augsburg (70-63), sandwiched between losses to a junior varsity squad from the University of Minnesota-Duluth (74-66) and Bethel (54-33), left Kosel and his cagers at .500 going into the Christmas break.

Kosel, who led Benilde-St. Margaret's girl basketball, cross country and track teams to a total of 14 Metropolitan Girls' Athletic League (MGAL) prep titles, is pleased with the balanced scoring of his team thus far.

Sophomore Maureen Peters, 1720 Portland Ave., and freshman April Mesna, 1717 Talmadge, Mpls., both of them graduates of Regina High School, hold single-game scoring honors for the Toms with 20 points each.

They lead the team back into action this Thursday, January 12, as St. Thomas plays host to Pillsbury Baptist in a 7:00 p.m. tilt at O'Shaughnessy Hall.

MISCH- MACH

So here we are, at the start of a new year... and writers and readers alike have been assessing the good and the bad of the year just past. Not quite so many are bold enough to make very definitive, outright predictions on what's ahead for us in '78... not for the record, anyway.

Taxes and their effect on our collective and individual lives were big news in '77... on all levels... local, state and national. Our state legislature has tried to provide some relief in local property taxes with the so-called 'circuit-breaker' geared to lower income levels, but also succeeded in overloading the circuits on our state income tax rates to the point where fuses were blowing all over the place.

It's not so much what the legislature did, as what they didn't do... make proper adjustments in the rates to avoid the evil, surreptitious, automatic escalation that inflation brings, when rates are so steeply progressive. It's so tempting to have adequate surpluses around for upcoming spending purposes, rather than take a hard look at places to cut, cut and cut... as though some added efficiencies might still be possible.

Meanwhile Governor Rudy has his ear to the ground enough to talk about tax 'cuts'... (he really means belated downward adjustments that should have been made, in good conscience, during the past several legislative bienniums.) But even the comparatively piddling figures he speaks of, seem to shock the DFL House and Senate leadership. Well, since there won't be a Super Bowl for the Vikings, at least we'll be able to raise a finger and say "We're number one"... in terms of high taxes and low celsius. Or is it just the big finger we're going to get... upcoming elections notwithstanding?

Will the Independent-Republicans take advantage of this and make hay at the voting machines and election boxes next November? I doubt it. Oh, they'll make some inroads all right... they can hardly go down from the present low count on their side of the aisle, in both chambers. But a lot of the old stalwarts will still worry about whether candidate John Doe or Mary Roe is really a 'pure' Republican or possibly inclined to be a bit too Independent. Can't tell about that fresh blood, you know! So you don't have to be a Jeanne Dixon to predict continued control of the legislature by the DFL.

Nationally, of course, we'll have to have a tax cut to offset the increase in Social Security deductions... so you may not even notice much difference in the size of your pay envelope... after, perhaps, another round of inflation to the tune of 6 to 7%.

Big voter gimmick has been the so-called 'three-martini lunch'. We don't see much of that in the Highland area; must be more of a phenomenon in the New York-Washington axis. Personally, I'd have to schedule an afternoon nap, were I ever to imbibe to that degree at lunchtime.

Reminds me of what a Madison Avenue advertising agency president told his account executives back when the 'breathless' vodka martini was getting to be the popular noon-time fare. Who could know they'd been drinking... no tell-tale odor on their breath. Anyway, this exec told them he'd prefer that their martinis contain the traditional gin. "I'd much rather have the client know that you're drunk," he bellowed, "than have him consider you just plain stupid!"

I know many people keep the VILLAGER in their home at least until the next one arrives... maybe even longer. If you promise not to keep this column around until the end of '78, maybe I'll indulge in a little guessing game with you... make a few predictions, as it were.

Let's start with some easy ones, just to get into the swing. In April, Mayor Latimer will be re-elected by a lopsided margin, opposed only by a Republican real estate or insurance salesman who felt he couldn't possibly be hurt by acquiring some instant name recognition. The five incumbent council persons will also be re-elected to assure DFL continuity, and we can see only DFL replacements for Sylvester and Roedler, too.

Rudy Perpich will make some mistakes during the legislative session and beyond, but a forgiving public will give him four years more, on his own this time. Al Quie will be his opponent, and will run a dignified campaign, hardly touching on the issues and barely critical of his polka-dancing, bocce-balling opponent. Republicans will be heard to lament the fact that they didn't go with Dave Durenberger, as the best horse for the stretch drive, to give Rudy Perpich a run for his money. Senate Report

by Senator Ron Sieloff
District 63

The second half of our legislative session begins January 17 and promises to be an interesting, fast-paced sixty days. We have been advised by the Senate leadership that only a limited number of bills will be considered.

Independent-Republicans will be giving special attention to two tax relief options as well as to the repeal of recent tax legislation affecting public and military pensions.

We are studying a permanent, across-the-board income tax cut to be financed by the surplus anticipated for this biennium. Minority leader Bob Ashback is spear-heading the tax-cut drive, citing a General Fund balance of \$273 million on July 1, 1977. Combining the fund balance with increased tax revenues should yield the state \$1.5 billion more than in the last biennium, while increased expenditures authorized by the 1977 legislature total about \$1.2 billion. Ashback has concluded there is ample revenue available for the tax cut.

Indexing the income tax rate schedule appears to be the best long-term solution for those who receive cost-of-living wage increases that push them into higher tax brackets. More withholding too often means less net take-home pay than before the raise, with no provision for the inflationary factors that make each dollar lower in purchasing power. Indexing would provide automatic adjustments to tax brackets.

Until we can achieve significant tax reform and correct existing inequities, we will maintain our unenviable income tax status among the 50 states.

From the Legislature

As the 1978 legislative session approaches, there are a number of issues which will come before us, several of which should take high priority.

First, I have called for a ten percent cut in personal and corporate income taxes, and I hope that the tax committees will act accordingly. The legislature did a good job on property tax relief during the past session, providing several hundred million in tax relief which will be coming in October.

In addition, the Ramsey County Delegation was able to "jawbone" the County Board, City Council and School Board so that property taxes will not rise this year. With the October refund checks, many people will be paying total property taxes comparable to 1975 or 1976 taxes. With an income tax reduction of the kind I have suggested, Minnesota's per capita tax rate would rank in the high teens or low twenties in the country.

A second major issue is to provide for a special Senate election. Although the bill passed the House during the last session, it was stalled in the Senate.

Third, a final resolution on the I-35E issue is needed. Again, House action in lifting the moratorium was successful during the past session, but the Senate killed the bill. Now, with a compromise package agreed upon, it is essential that the legislature finalize everything. The road is needed to remove traffic from Highland Park streets currently being used as freeway substitutes, and as an access road to and from downtown St. Paul.

The committees on which I serve also have high priorities. On the Criminal Justice Committee, we will be attempting to strengthen and correct the drunken driving laws. Several of us have authored major pieces of DWI legislation, and we expect to come out with a committee bill. In the Governmental Operations Committee, I will hold my first hearing on "sunset" legislation which provides for a periodic review and termination of every state agency. On the Higher Education Committee, we will be reviewing teaching time in the state universities.

My library office hours will continue on the first and third Mondays of each month, but because of the recent library hour changes, I will now be there from 7:00 to 8:00. Otherwise, please call me at my office at 296-3641 or stop in at Room 365, State Office Building.

My thanks to everyone who returned my legislative questionnaire, the results of which appear in an advertisement elsewhere in this issue of the *Highland Villager*. My thanks to Maury Mischke and the Villager staff for providing this means of communication with you during the upcoming session.

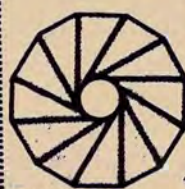

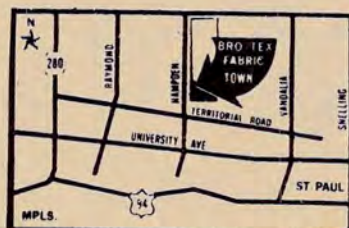

Volunteers: the life-blood of area agencies

With the annual hustle and bustle of the holiday season over, the staff at the Voluntary Action Center of the St. Paul Area reports a marked upswing in the number of requests from people looking for ways to beat the mid-winter doldrums.

For many, volunteering to spend a few hours each week at community agencies not only offers the prospect of at least a partial cure, but a way of doing something for their fellow area residents which never goes unappreciated.

Those local agencies, in turn, depend on these upsurges in volunteering for the life-blood of their programs and services. And Highland area organizations are no exception.

Lu Rogers, head of the volunteer program at the Highland Chateau Nursing Home, 2319 W. 7th St., feels it's a "special privilege" to have the services of community volunteers. "The volunteers provide the human touch that simply could not exist otherwise," she said.

Volunteers at Highland Chateau visit with patients, assist with games and activities, and help out at meal time. Some bring special skills and knowledge to share with the residents during Thursday morning arts and crafts session. According to Rogers, whatever service they become involved in, the volunteers seem to get as much pleasure from it as the residents of the home.

At Lincoln House, an area residence for young mothers and their children located at 1887 Lincoln Ave., volunteers do everything from baking cakes for special occasions to tutoring residents in reading and math. Volunteer coordinator Mary Lou Gladhill says their contribution is "invaluable" to the program. "They make the mothers feel someone is helping just because they care," she said.

The Veterans Administration Hospital at 54th St. and 48th Ave. So. in Minneapolis lists some 120 volunteer positions, but Lee

Brown says "Whatever a volunteer wanted to do, we could probably find a slot for him or her."

The VA hospital, which depends on the services of about 1300 volunteers regularly, is now particularly in need of office help or child care aides.

One of the many services provided by the Highland unit of the American Cancer Society is free transportation to medical appointments for cancer patients. The service is a vital one, and according to Joyce Kaminski, volunteer coordinator for the program, there is currently an urgent need for drivers to work a half or full day a week.

There are never enough volunteers to visit with sick and lonely people in the area, according to Diane Siegel at the Jewish Community Center, 1375 St. Paul Ave.

"Right now we need volunteers just to help these people prepare meals," she said. "We also use volunteers in the nursery school, in our senior sheltered workshop, for arts and crafts, and in many one-to-one situations. They're a tremendous source of manpower and a great addition to our program."

Emily Fuerste, volunteer coordinator at Family Tree, a community family planning clinic at 1599 Selby Ave., says "We could not function without volunteers. They're absolutely essential to our programs."

Family Tree volunteers are a highly qualified, professional group of people who provide assistance in patient education, counseling and lab work.

These examples of agencies and the services they offer within the community may not fit all potential volunteers' needs or interests, but they do indicate some of the ways volunteers are now providing the back-up services that make the programs work for area residents.

The Voluntary Action Center, which serves as a clearinghouse for volunteers seeking agencies and agencies seeking volunteers, has a job bank of over 600 such volunteer opportunities requiring a wide variety of skills, talents and interests. Positions currently available range from phone work to photography,

public speaking to legal assistance.

Those interested in using a few winter hours each week putting their skills to work for someone else are invited to call the Voluntary Action Center at 222-0561, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

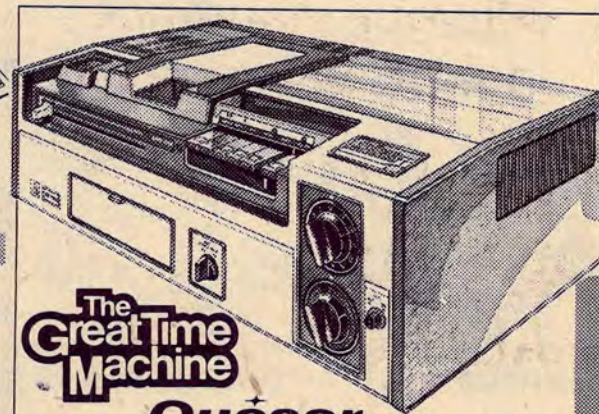

Village profile: Sister Mary Ann Hanley

CSC's resident expert on Africa and music

Sister Mary Ann Hanley is a woman of many loves, which accounts, in part, for the 1977 Faculty Merit Award she received recently for excellence in teaching and outstanding service to the College of St. Catherine.

But the pervading love of her life—the one her other interests both serve and embellish—is music. Not too surprising, then, that Sister Mary Ann is currently serving as chairperson of the department of music at St. Catherine's.

Among the recent piano recitals her audiences still recall with pleasure was a rendition of Charles Griffes' Sonata, which she presented at the Walker Art Center last spring. In the audience that night were a few of the many Twin Citians who were fortunate enough to have been students of hers early in her career when she taught musicianship at St. Joseph's and Holy Angels Academies. As a music teacher and

department head at St. Catherine's, Sister Mary Ann is still attracting and nurturing music majors in ever increasing numbers. The excellence of her student-performers is widely recognized, according to Sister Eileen Gavin, chairperson of the psychology department at St. Kate's and one of the colleagues who recommended her for the recent faculty award.

"Sister Mary Ann has had prize winners in all the highly prestigious Schubert Club contests her students have entered," Sister Eileen said. "I am frankly astounded that a chairman of a large department can achieve so much in performing and teaching, along with the tasks of administration."

But even those administrative duties are far from odious to Sister Mary Ann. When she says, "I love administration," you know she means it. Organizing, planning, and managing are integral parts of Sister Mary's personality, as I sensed from the moment I met her.

When I knocked at the open door of the music department office, I was greeted by a slim brunette in a plaid pants suit who stepped forward with a welcoming smile and an outstretched hand. She had hardly introduced herself when I became aware of her firm control of the situation and her determination to make every second count.

To give of herself as generously as possible in the brief time she was able to allot to my visit, she managed a succinct lesson on the symbolic meaning of excrescences (one of many new words I learned that day) as she pointed out horns and other protuberances on the African masks we passed on the way to her desk.

When I mumbled something half-baked about "primitive" art, she stopped me short.

"African art is highly sophisticated," she insisted. "Like this chi wara." She pointed to a stylized sculpture of an antelope that stood on one of two grand pianos in her office.

"I guess Africans worship antelopes, huh?" I asked, biting my tongue as soon as I saw her frown.

"Perhaps you've heard their folk tales about the mythical power of antelopes," Sister said, "but Africans don't believe these tales any more than we believe folk and fairy tales. The Africans of which I speak, the ones I know and love from having spent three summers with them, are West Africans, where the official language is English and the religions are Muslim, Christian, and eight other traditional native religions."

"Then the West Africans aren't pantheists?" I asked. "Animism would be a better word," she said, "and animism is compatible with belief in a supreme God. I love the warm-hearted spirituality of the Africans—their way of seeing God's spirit everywhere."

Sister's love for the African people grew through her study of African music. Sister Rosalie Ryan, dean of the college, had asked her to teach a course in African music. To prepare herself, Sister spent a summer studying at UCLA under Africa's most renowned musicologist, Kwabena Nketia.

That summer marked the beginning of Sister Mary Ann's love affair with Africa. After that initiation and some independent study of her own, she received grants from the Hill Family Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities to spend three summers doing research in Ghana and Nigeria.

To Highland area residents like myself who have never seen the continent of Africa, "village" is merely the place we do our local shopping. But to Sister Mary Ann, "village" still calls to mind a crowd of naked Black children singing a welcome in their native tongue as her bus entered the village of Okaruse in Ghana. She remembers, too, the colorful religious songs and dances under a jungle moon that she not only watched but sometimes joined.

The Africans Sister studied and stayed with were Catholic, Presbyterian, Lutheran and the like, but their native art, music, and dance were an integral part of their religious ceremonies.

"In the past," Sister pointed out to me, "missionaries misunderstood the natives' masks, amulets, and drums as tools of the devil. But today religious teachers understand social and cultural anthropology and see no need to abolish native customs."

One of the customs of which she speaks woke Sister Mary Ann from a sound sleep the first night she had ever slept in a mud hut. Awakened by the sound of drums, Sister experienced that momentary instant of disorientation we've all had at some time in our lives on waking somewhere other than in our own bedrooms.

Four mud walls reminded Sister where she was, but it was only the next day that she found out the drums which had awakened her were the village's equivalent of church bells calling "Come and pray." Each morning afterwards, Sister answered the call of the drums and joined the sunrise ceremony of Gospel readings, prayer, singing and dancing.

As I chatted with Sister Mary Ann in her office, I noticed the display of instruments used in those ceremonies behind her desk. There was a mbira (a string-less hand piano) which Sister Mary Ann played for me. With deft movements she demonstrated many of what she calls "self-sounding" instruments of the "ideophone" class, including gongs, bells and rattles. Then she elicited the sounds of the jungle bush with drums which she referred to as "membranophones."

In one "talking drum" rendition she varied the pitch and emphasis so cleverly so as to produce an uncanny imitation of a human voice saying "We ho ta sen," a greeting in one of the over 200 ethnic languages of West Africa.

One fascinating thing about the music of Africa is the complicated cross rhythms, she said. "I've known Africans who could tap their feet to one rhythm, sing in another, and clap still a third—all at the same time."

"Another fascinating thing is the extent to which Africans have assimilated Western music. I have always been impressed with the resilience with which Blacks in America adapted to Western culture. The same ability to acculturate struck me in my observation of the West Africans, one example of this being the hybrid African-Western music."

Sister Mary Ann made many tape recordings of this music to bring home with her. She uses some of them to illustrate her talks. Others are currently housed in the Archives of Traditional Music at Indiana University.

Writing for national publication and lecturing and giving workshops throughout the Northwest has enabled Sister Mary Ann to share the great wealth of knowledge of African music gained from her research.

Not long ago she spoke at an international conference as well—the 24th Conference of the International Folk Music Council in Hawaii—where she delivered a paper entitled "Christian Church Music of Ghana: A Study in Acculturation."

Sister Mary Ann is currently writing a book based on her research entitled "Church Music of Modern West Africa." When published, the book will enable her to share the knowledge and insight she has acquired through the years with an even wider audience.

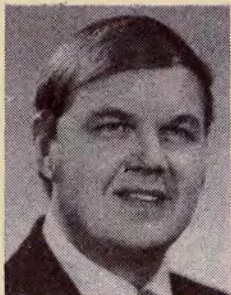

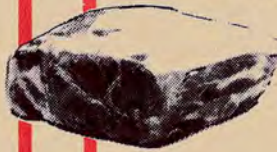

The banquet was superbly catered by Virginia Ball, Director of Food Services, as she and her cafeteria staff performed virtual (virtual?) miracles with the left-overs from the school district's "Plan A" lunch program.

In keeping with the school spirit of the festive occasion, cafeteria staff members scooped the banquet fare from the stainless steel steam tables and served it up on elegant styrofoam plates.

However, the highlight of the evening—the reason so many had come from far and near to lay down their 85 cents per plate—was the presentation of Talking Out Of School Traveling Trophies to the 16 winners who had already been cited in this column, and to one who we'd like to recognize in print right now.

He is Mr. Thomas Stochl, Chairman of the Mercury Cluster.

For comments made recently opposing a proposal for a moratorium on closing any more "small" schools in the district until a comprehensive long-range plan could be completed, Stochl was named the recipient of the "Do Unto Others Award."

The rationale for such a moratorium was put forward at a recent city-wide meeting by Sandy Weislow and Bill Clapp, area residents and officers of the Gemini Cluster Advisory Board, who saw a veritable Pandora's box of future school-switching problems if more buildings were closed before such a plan was completed.

Stochl, in the best biblical tradition of an eye for an eye, argued that since the school district had closed two small schools in the Mercury Cluster last year and only one in the Gemini Cluster, the school district should be able to close another school in Gemini this year, plan or no plan.

For his elementary approach to education, Stochl was given a golden rule.

The final award of the evening was presented to Villager columnists Carl Nelson and Bill Rosenbloom. The awards committee, apparently finding it difficult to decide whether the two should be recognized with the "Super Chutzpa Award" for brass, or the "Villager Idiots Award" for agreeing to take on an extra task every other week, bestowed on both the "Super Idiots Award."

There was a few minutes of unexpected excitement during the presentation when it appeared there was a grass roots movement afoot to change the name of the Talking Out Of School Traveling Trophy. A very vocal group in the back of the room made it clear that they wanted it to become known as the "Howie" in honor of retired school board member Howard Guthman.

However, an equally boisterous contingent sitting closer to the front felt it would be more appropriate if it were called the "George," in deference to the School District's current superintendent. Never ones to want to stir up controversy, Rosenbloom and Nelson decided to retain the present title.

The banquet concluded on a festive note as all administrators in attendance voted to come back next year and compete even harder as they pursued the coveted "Traveling Trophy."

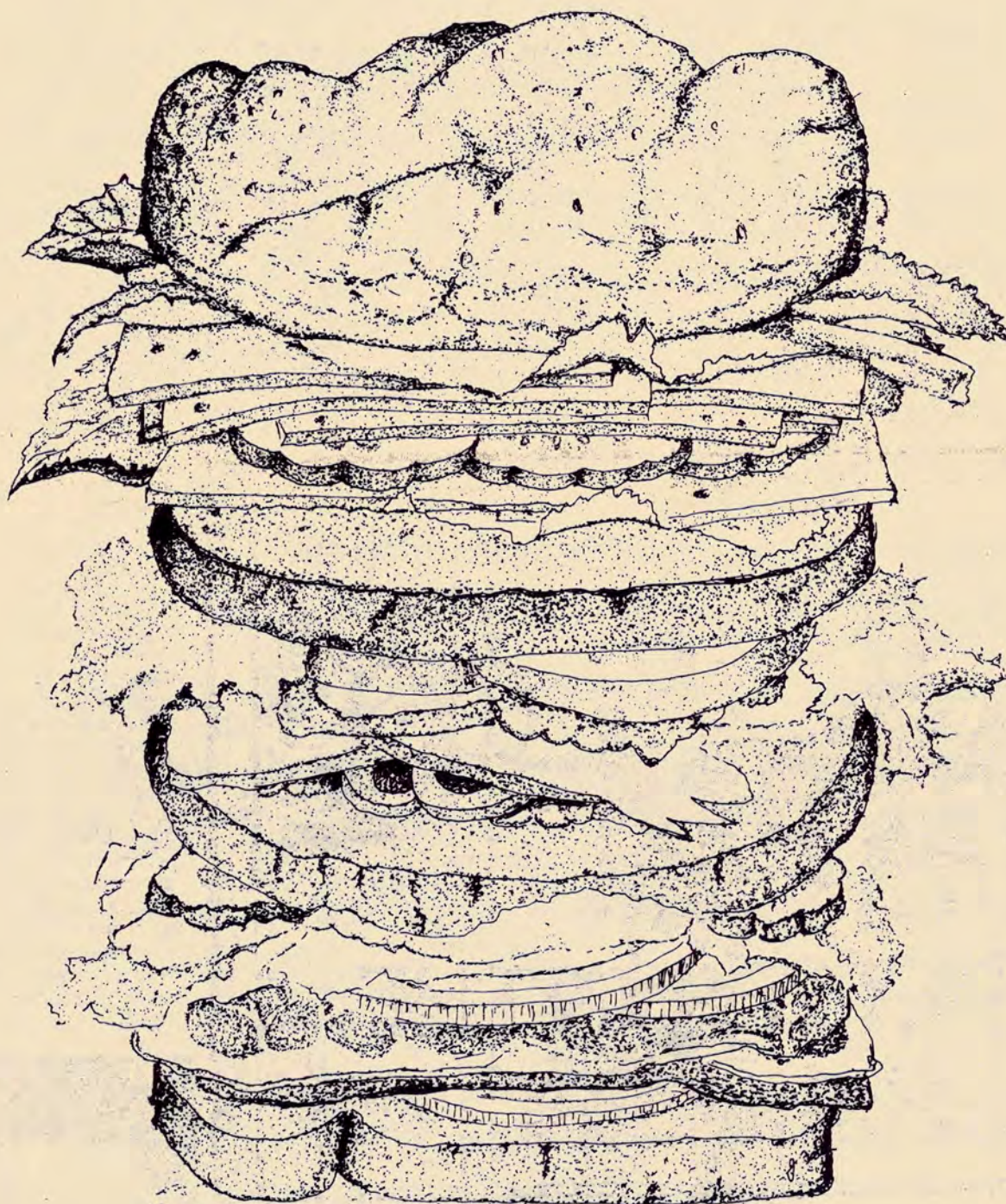

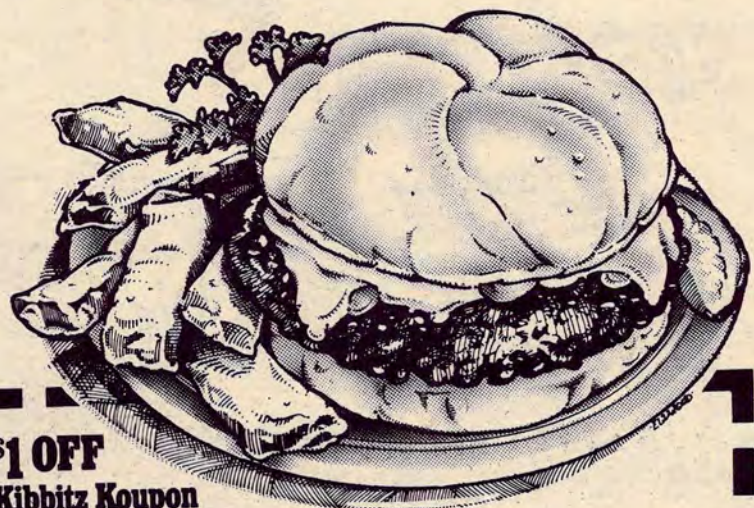

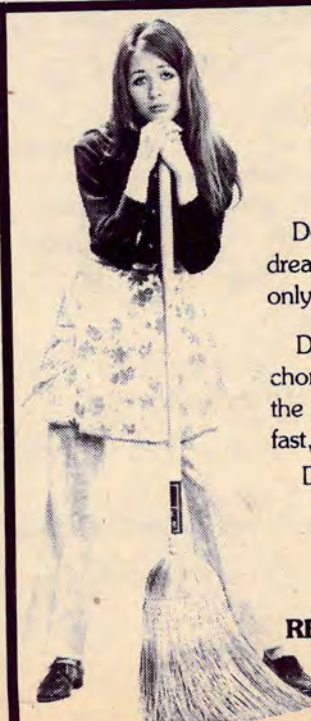

Citizens Against Throwaways urge Senator Ron Sieloff to support deposit legislation

Dear Senator Sieloff:

We the undersigned, residents of Senate District 63, believe that you would best represent the public by voting for Senate file #1, the bill to place a mandatory 10 cent deposit on all beer and soft drink containers sold in Minnesota. In a poll you conducted and published in the Sept. 29, 1976, *Highland Villager*, 60% of your constituents answered "YES" to the question "Do you favor mandatory deposits on nonreturnable beverage containers?"

DEPOSIT LEGISLATION WORKS. In Oregon, beverage container litter declined 83% after enactment of their deposit bill in 1972, prompting former Republican Governor Tom McCall to refer to the bill as a "Rip-Roaring Success". Cans are returned for recycling. Refillable bottles now dominate the market and are returned more frequently than prior to the law's enactment. Support for the return to returnables was evidenced when a 1973 Oregon poll indicated that 91% of Oregon residents favored their refundable deposit law.

We believe a 10 cent refundable deposit on beverage containers will reduce litter, save resources and energy, and reduce solid waste as containers are returned for reuse and recycling.

We believe the deposit system provides economic incentive for industry to develop innovative refillable beverage container systems.

We believe that a return to returnables in Minnesota will result in a net gain in employment with more jobs in bottling, brewing, distributing, retailing, and recycling.

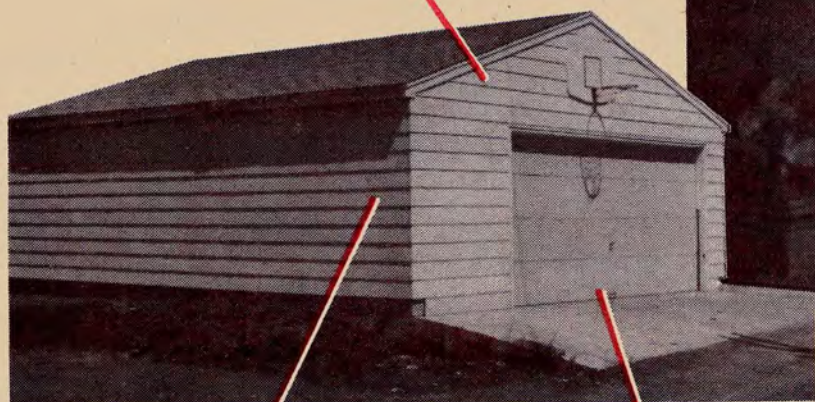
