The Board of Trustees at the College of St. Thomas announced the awarding of contracts for the construction of a new student union on the school campus. Made possible by a \$1.3 million dollar government-approved loan, and additional gifts from other friends of St. Thomas, the Union will centralize all eating facilities for a present student body of 1550 and over 200 faculty and staff members.

School bookstore and post office will be included as well as lounge areas, meeting and dining rooms, and student activity areas.

General contract was given Rauehorst Construction Company of Minneapolis whose bid was \$984,700. Other sub-contracts were awarded to W. J. Haake Company of St. Paul (mechanical), Peoples Electric Company of St. Paul, and R and O Elevator Company of Minneapolis.

Over 30 representatives from construction companies were present last week as bids were opened by the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, St. Thomas president, and read aloud, recorded, and reviewed by a regional representative of the United States Housing and Home Finance Agency.

Construction on the Union will begin immediately. It will be located in the lower quadrangle, opposite the science hall. Two temporary surplus World War II buildings and several veterans' housing units are being removed. Completion date on the Union is August of 1960.

The Union is the third major building to be constructed on the St. Thomas campus this year. Nearing completion is Dowling Hall, a 300-bed men's residence building, also made possible by a self-amortizing government loan, and O'Shaughnessy Library, gift of Mr. and Mrs. I. A. O'Shaughnessy of St. Paul.

## Apple For the Teacher For Youngsters Who Can Spear As Well As Spell

Plans for a huge back-to-school celebration by merchants in the Highland shopping area were outlined yesterday at a luncheon meeting of the Highland Civic Association.

Thirty-eight members of the association will sponsor a program called "An Apple For The Teacher Days" starting Thursday, Aug. 27 and continuing through Saturday, Aug. 29.

One of the highlights of the three-day event will be an apple spearing contest for youngsters 12 years old and under. Participants will attempt to spear apples from a water filled tank of apples. Several of the apples will be numbered and will entitle youngsters to select prizes from a large selection of gifts donated by members of the association.

Clarence Barr, Highland Civic Association president, pointed out that the three-day event will feature a wide selection of merchandise values by member firms of the association.

"We have planned this special back-to-school celebration so it will give Highland parents a wide assortment of merchandise at the lowest possible price," Mr. Barr said.



Topping the show are members of the internationally famous Bolshoi Theatre and Moiseyev Dance Company, including Nina Timofeyeva and Yuri Zhdanov of the Bolshoi and Tamara Zeifert of the Moiseyev, who, in private life is Mrs. Moiseyev.

Another highlight is the appearance of the 100-member Pianitsky Folk Choir which contains its own singers, dancers and musicians.

Also featured are soloists and groups from the Kiev State Ballet, Georgian State Dance Co., Kiev State Opera, Leningrad Ballet, Uzbekistan State Ballet, Armenian State Dance Co. and Kazakhstan State Dance Co.

Conductor is Gennadi Rozhdenskiy of the Bolshoi Theatre, one of Russia's most gifted young maestros.

Retreat Master is the Reverend Stanley J. Srnc, Consultant to the Spiritual Development Committee of the A.C.C.W.



## FOOT SAVING EDUCATION

A doctor reports that three out of every four persons develop foot trouble in the first twenty years.

## Safety Tips For Driving Small Cars

The size of a passenger car has little or nothing to do with the likelihood of its being involved in an accident, Homer Thomas, general manager of the Automobile Club of Saint Paul, said today, but he added that a few special safety rules should be followed by the drivers of very small cars.

"The small foreign cars, excepting the high performance sport models, do not have the acceleration potential of the big-engined cars most American drivers are used to," the motor club official said, "so the first rule is to be extra careful when trying to pass with one. The driver of a small car should always have a long, clear distance ahead when passing on a two or three lane road. This is especially true when approaching the brow of a hill, because the low seating position shortens the distance that can be seen ahead."

Thomas also explained that because the small cars are generally more maneuverable, drivers tend to dart in and out of traffic. "While in an emergency situation maneuverability can be a great advantage, drivers should not use it to gain a car-length or two in heavy traffic. It's bad traffic manners, and because the small car is harder for other drivers to see, it's doubly dangerous," he added.

When taking long trips, Thomas cautioned the drivers of small cars not to overload them. He

said that very heavy loads carried on the top can make the light car top-heavy, and too much weight in the back seat or trunk can cause the rear end to swing outward in a tight, fast turn. He suggested that when loading up for a trip, the owner of the light car should always check the manufacturer's recommendations for tire pressures, explaining that air pressure is more critical in a light car than in a heavy one.

His final suggestion for greater safety in a small car is that drivers be more scrupulous in signaling. Again, because the small car is less easily seen, a light tap on the horn, or flashed headlights at night, should be employed to let other drivers know when they are being passed.






