

Safety Tips For Driving Small Cars

The size of a passenger car has said that very heavy loads carried likelihood of its being involved in an accident, Homer Thomas, general manager of the Automobile Club of Saint Paul, said today, but he added that a few special safety rules should be followed by the drivers of very small cars.

"The small foreign cars, excepting the high performance sport models, do not have the acceleration potential of the bignerical cars most American drivers are used to," the motor club official said, "so the first rule is to be extra careful when trying to be a small car should always have a long, clear distance ahead when passing on a two or three lane road. This is especially true special safety rules should be followed by the drivers of very small cars.

"The small foreign cars, excepting the high performance sport models, do not have the acceleration potential of the bigengined cars most American drivers are used to," the motor club official said, "so the first rule is to be extra careful when trying to pass with one. The driver of a small car should always have a long, clear distance ahead when passing on a two or three lane road. This is especially true when approaching the brow of a hill, because the low seating position shortens the distance that can be seen ahead."

Thomas also explained that because the small cars are generally more maneuverable, drivers tend to dart in and out of traffic. "While in an emergency situation maneuverability can be a great advantage, drivers should not use it to gain a car-length or two in heavy traffic. It's bad traffic manners, and because the small car is harder for other drivers to see, it's doubly dangerous," he added.

When taking long trips, Thomas cautioned the drivers of small cars not to overload them. He


