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Moos Inauguration As U of M President To Include Symposium

The University of Minnesota will inaugurate its tenth president, Malcolm Moos, in a traditional ceremony to be held in Northrop auditorium at 1 p.m. Thursday, May 9.

In connection with the inauguration, a symposium will be held on the subject "The Race for Learning: Dreams and Deadlocks."

McGeorge Bundy, president of the Ford Foundation and adviser to the White House, will open the symposium with a speech at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 8, in Northrop auditorium. The following morning from 9 to 11 a.m., the symposium will be continued with talks by Kingman Brewster, Jr., president of Yale University, and Carl Rowan, author, columnist, former ambassador, and alumnus of the University.

Attending the two-day events will be hundreds of official delegates from colleges, universities, learned societies and professional organizations from throughout the United States and abroad. In addition, several thousand state and community leaders and officials, as well as University staff and students, will attend the events.

An academic procession up the Mall will signal the start of inauguration proceedings shortly before 1 p.m. May 9. Members of the University Board of Regents, student and alumni leaders and the official delegates will be among those who march up the Mall as Northrop's carillon bells are played. Lester A. Malkerson, chairman of the Board of Regents, and Minnesota Governor Harold LeVander will take part in the symbolic presentation of the University mace to President Moos.

Moos, who began at the University last Sept. 1 succeeding O. Meredith Wilson, then will give his inaugural address.

A reception on the Mall will be held after the ceremony, followed by tours of various parts of the campus for the visiting delegates. A buffet supper will be served from 5 to 8 p.m. in Mann court of the Architecture building.

Gabriella Tucci will star as Tosca in the opening opera Monday, May 13. Richard Tucker, the celebrated tenor, will appear opposite the renowned soprano in the role of Cavaradossi. Baritone Anselmo Colzani will play the evil Scarpia in this Verdi masterpiece.

Starring as Carmen in May 14 will be the fabulous soprano Grace Bumbry. When this magnificent new production opened last December, critics called her performance and the production itself "spectacular." Playing Don Jose will be Nicolai Gedda, and Micaela will be Mary Ellen Pracht.

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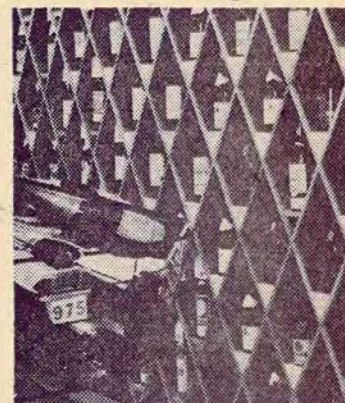
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Red Cross Vision Hearing Clinics

Highland Park area parents will have an opportunity to take their four-year-olds to free Red Cross vision and hearing screenings in the Jewish Community Center, 1375 St. Paul ave.

The sessions will be held on Thursdays, May 2, 9 and 16, from 9 a.m. until noon.

"A child with unrecognized sight or hearing problems is handicapped and may be thought slow when he enters school. He loses confidence, feels inadequate and is often left out of

groups at play.

"Screening discovers children in need of prompt medical examination at an age when most defects are correctable. They are referred to their family physicians for treatment," the Red Cross said.

The Red Cross Eye and Ear Alert program, now in its fourth year, is conducted by volunteers, who have been trained under a public service program of the Minnesota State Medical association.

Sessions are now being held from 9:30 a.m. to noon on Tuesdays in the Red Cross building, 413 Auditorium at Ninth St.

The Lions Clubs Eye Clinic for Children will be one segment of a proposed Sight Research Center at the University. This will be housed in the Medical Center complex now being planned.

Since their beginning, Lions Clubs International have been interested in sight preservation and are well-known for their philanthropic projects concerning sight, including eye banks. Their bylaws require that each club have a committee concerned with sight conservation, and they work to keep communities and citizens informed of what is being done to help the blind and the potentially blind, and what needs to be done.

The Minnesota Lions Eye Bank, located at the University, marks eight years of cooperative effort between the Lions and the University. Financed by contributions from individual Lions Clubs around the state, it provides for corneal transplants to persons who have lost sight in one or both eyes.

The planned new Eye Clinic for Children will enable the University ophthalmology department to concentrate research on the causes of blindness in children and to aim for prevention and better methods of treatment.

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Blood Donors

"Walk a block for blood" is the order for 190 Highland area workers, who are starting this week to recruit donors for a Red Cross collection from 2 to 7 p.m. Monday, May 6, in Nativity school, Prior and Stanford.

Joining Nativity parish in supplying donors for the visit will be members of Macalester Presbyterian church. Mrs. Robert Berendt, 1808 Stanford Ave., is chairman of donor recruitment and Mrs. Harry Weisbecker, 2138 Berkeley Ave., is co-chairman.

Mrs. Berendt pointed out that a liberalization of regulations now makes it possible for persons to continue to donate until their 61st birthday. Cut-off until this time was age 60. At the other end of the age requirements, 18 to 21-year-olds may donate without written parental consent if they are self-supporting and living away from home.

On the loss side are donors who have had malaria, who can no longer give blood. Medical research ruled them out when it was determined that malaria may be passed on to a blood recipient as long as 20 years after the donor has suffered the disease. Until this time donors could give blood six months after recovery from an attack.

Another plus for donor recruitment is in the new ruling which allows women to donate six months after a pregnancy instead of waiting a full year.

Mrs. Berendt said her committee would like to have every donor scheduled for a definite appointment for the May 6 visit. "Those with appointments will be taken ahead of 'walk-in' donors, and waiting time will be shortened for everyone," she said. Her telephone number is 698-1056.

The AR-15 rifle fires rapidly, accurately, packs a wall-shattering wallop and causes indigestion among hippies and something akin to apoplexy in politicians. I don't like the things myself, because I feel that criminals and other elements who might fear the weapon will get their own rapid fire, accurate, wall-shattering rifles and cause those of us who can't hit the broad side of a barn a whole messy cross-fire of indigestion and apoplexy. However, Mayor Byrne did the right thing by backing his lawmen with weapons deemed necessary by modern policework standards. Three of these weapons—even if John Wayne, Sean Connery, and George Wallace were firing them do not constitute an overt threat to anybody's freedom. In fact, three of these weapons constitute a conservative purchase and wise decision **not** to intimidate society with a monster weapon, if, in fact, that is not an exaggerated adjective. The alternative to the AR-15 is a funny little pop-gun called a Thompson sub-machine gun. Anybody who has been in the Army knows that this little cookie spritzer is a monster only to the fool holding it who thinks he has something to protect himself with. As an offensive weapon it is as effective as throwing a handful of marbles into a crowd. Crowd, of course, is the key word. The liberals fear that the mob will be mowed down. The mob fears that the mob will be mowed down. The mob haters want the mob mowed down, and the mob lovers hate the police to mow down the mob. Such are the politics of the AR-15 rifle. Law enforcement men are urging police departments all over America to get rid of their cookie guns and upgrade their units with a real rifle. I think, Mayor Byrne's decision to go slow and buy three is probably realistic, though ten would probably constitute no more or no less of a threat to any law-abiding citizen's freedom.

Ramsey County police have had four of the controversial weapons for over two years. They have never been fired. Two years ago students were too busy burning their draft cards to worry about AR-15's. It only remains to be seen what next the 12 million youngsters in this country between the ages of 18 and 23 will find themselves in opposition to. The mistake of the press and politicians in America has been in the amount of significance and publicity they have given to student rebellions, terrorizing of University Administrations, draft card burning, dope addiction and other forms of free-wheeling liberalism that has found ample outlets in the inequities and incongruity of contemporary American life. I think Mayor Byrne acted prudently—standing firm on the AR-15, while recognizing any citizen's right to be in opposition. Those who are saying that it was a political ploy simply do not understand the situation, the younger generation, or the speed with which events are changing their lives. Before April 30th, the City Election, we are very likely going to see at least one more dramatic issue confronting the Mayor and his opponent. If Byrne passes that test as well as he did the AR-15—he should, and probably will be re-elected.

COUNCIL RACE . . .

Due to the events on the national scene, the two star performers in the Mayor's contest, and, generally, the inability of the challengers to find fault with the incumbents, the City Council make-up is probably only going to change by one seat if at all. Levine, Johnson, Loss and Weyandt, then, are fighting for one seat on the Council and a coin toss would make more sense than a prediction. I feel that a change on the Council of two or three votes would be good for the City—regardless of who goes or who arrives — simply because any new blood would have to prove something the first time in, and the present Council members seem reluctant to do anything except stand pat.

New tornado safety rules just issued by the American National Red Cross and the U.S. Weather Bureau are available to home owners without charge through the St. Paul Area chapter.

Stephen L. Maxwell, chairman of Red Cross public relations, said the new directions will be mailed on request by postal sent to the Red Cross Public Relations Department, 413 Auditorium St., St. Paul, Minn. 55102.

"Knowing what to do when a warning is received, or a tornado observed approaching, may mean the difference between life and death," Judge Maxwell said. "A tornado warning means a tornado has actually been sighted. A tornado watch signifies that tornadoes are expected to develop. Remember the difference and don't panic."

Printed on the reverse side of the safety rules is tornado information based on research of the U.S. Environmental Science Services Administration and other U.S. government agencies. The Weather Bureau is the official source of tornado forecast information.

Harbingers of Spring—Crooks!

Spring is fast approaching and with it comes the usual season gimmicks. According to Robert C. Erickson, Jr., manager of the Better Business Bureau of Saint Paul, Inc., the spring season is a time for the itinerant home improvement salesman.

"There are seven major frauds typical to the spring season which home owners should be aware of," said Erickson. "They range all the way from model home offers to the tree surgeon gimmick."

The seven typical frauds will, unfortunately, cost Saint Paul area home owners thousands of dollars this year.

MODEL HOME DEAL: A salesman offers free installation of aluminum siding if the house can be used as a model in "before and after" advertisements. Home owners who fall for this pitch find the papers they have signed in their haste to take advantage of the offer turn out to be iron-clad contracts for a job which will cost hundreds of dollars more than reputable firms would charge.

TERMITE TALE: Itinerant "exterminators" find serious termite problems in a home and sell the owner a termite control job. The exterminators usually return several times in succeeding months and sell additional services after finding more termites. Such termite inspectors usually bring their own insects along to display if they can't find any on the property.

RE-ROOFING GYP: An alleged repairman shows the home owner a handful of shingles which he claims fell from the roof and warns the entire roof may cave in if not fixed immediately. The home owner usually winds up paying an exorbitant price for a shoddy job. Chimney repairmen use loose bricks to make a similar sales pitch.

DRIVEWAY SEALER: Claiming he just finished a job down the street and had some material left, this gypsy offers to resurface your driveway at a ing a quality sealer, the swindler will probably use something similar to old crankcase oil which doesn't dry and may damage carpeting if tracked into the home.

furnace inspection, by a man who claims to represent some official agency, reveals "serious and dangerous" defects. (These are usually non-existent.) After

FURNACE FARCE: A free nace, which he dismantled during the inspection, the "inspector" tries to sell a new furnace which is often way over-priced.

CARPET CAPER: An itinerant salesman claims to have just enough carpeting left from refusing to reassemble the fur-a nearby job to carpet a room. He will sell it at a bargain price. When the home owner attempts to lay the material, it is usually found to be much smaller than claimed and of a very cheap quality. Linoleum peddlers use the same gambit.

HUMUS GYPS: Salesmen offer humus, which they claim is good for grass, at around \$2.40 per bushel. They don't reveal how much it takes to cover the lawn and presnt huge bills after spreading it.

TREE SURGEONS: Wandering woodsmen offer low priced tree trimming services. They often leave shade trees in such bad condition that it requires years of care to reshape them properly.

Complaints about the gimmicks have been made to the Saint Paul Better Business Bureau each year. Bureau manager Erickson recommended that home owners proceed with extreme caution when dealing with unknown salesmen, and recommends the following precautions:

Deal only with firms whose dependability and reliability can be established by intelligent inquiry.

Be sure the salesman represents the company he claims to represent.

Don't sign papers before you understand the terms and conditions of the sale.

Before you sign, be sure the name and address of the firm is printed on the contract.

If promises are made verbally, be sure that they are represented in substance in the contract.

Retain a copy of the contract.

When you are satisfied that the job is completed, only then

should you sign a completion.

Pay your bill by check or money order made out to the firm. Don't pay cash to a salesman.

Compare price quotations with those of other firms.

Beware of inferences that because a loan is insured by a government agency this guarantees material and workmanship.

According to Erickson, "If the offer/sounds too good to be true . . . it usually is."

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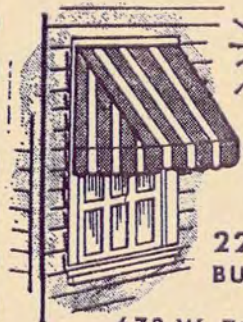
