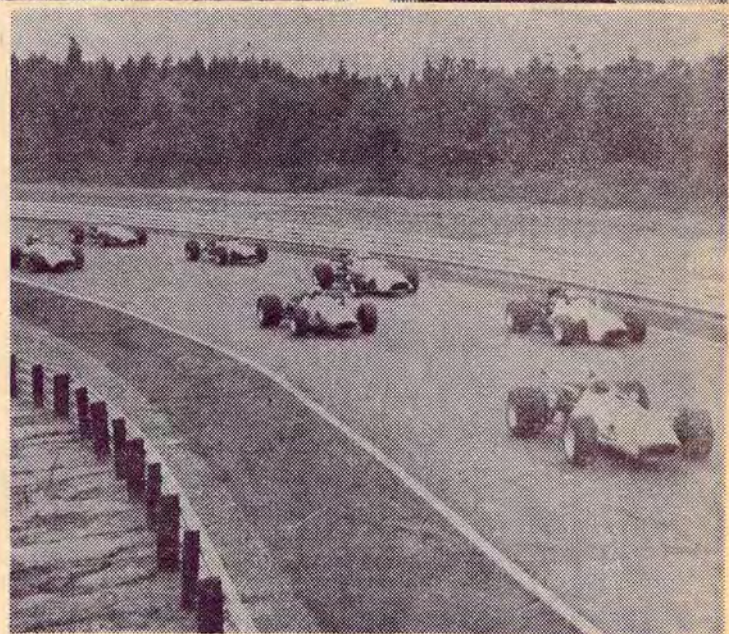

"UNITED FUND" EXPLAINED

The once-a-year United Fund campaign supports 65 health, welfare and character building agencies that offer services within the Greater St. Paul area. Their value to our community can be measured by the fact that in a given year, one out of four Saint Paul area residents receive some direct benefits from a United Fund agency. A far larger proportion benefits indirectly through knowledge gained by research and through the advantage of living in a community that helps meet its human needs through voluntary individual giving of time and

money. Through its agencies the UF reaches all neighborhoods, all ages and all economic groups within the Greater Saint Paul area. Almost every Saint Paul family, at one time or another, has enjoyed a camping experience or shared in programs offered by the Scouts, Camp Fire Girls, "Y" groups or neighborhood houses. Many of us have used the facilities or services offered to the community by our rehabilitation centers, Red Cross, the Hearing, Blind, Diabetes societies or others.

A United campaign saves campaign costs—the United Fund spends less than 9 cents on the dollar for campaign and year-round administrative costs; reduces the annoyance of numerous fund drives; saves time for everyone; makes sure your gift goes to legitimate and approved services. Lay and professional volunteers determine community needs and scrutinize budgets of member agencies to make sure the community gets the most of its dollars.

When we unite in our sharing our personal assistance is magnified and made more effective. By contributing to the United Fund the average person can do something truly meaningful and important.

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Midway Civic Club Members Drive Oct. 29-30

"Don't Go Half Way — Go Midway!"

That's the slogan for the 1968 Membership drive of the Midway Civic Club which will be conducted October 29 and 30 under the direction of Harold B. Shapira, chairman of the membership committee and a member of the Board of Directors of the Club.

The Midway Civic Club this year is observing its Golden Anniversary and the message of the Club's achievements as well as its goals for the coming year will be carried by the army of workers participating in the drive. It is hoped to add 200 additional members to the Club which has a present roster of 1500 members.

Among the 1968-1969 objectives of the Club are: To promote better transportation facilities within the Midway area, including rail, truck and bus and to push for speedy completion of Freeway No. 94 and improved north-south street access to the Midway area; to stimulate industrial and commercial growth and other needed facilities through coordinating and promoting Midway Land Use Development; work towards solutions of parking and traffic problems; assist retail development; publicize and promote the Midway through weekly news bulletins, newspaper, TV and as the Midway Citizen of the radio publicity and such projects as the Midway Citizen of the Year selection; assist schools and colleges of Midway area with their problems; boost Midway restaurant and night club life, motel accommodations, etc.; support civic functions such as St. Paul Winter Carnival, the Civic Opera, Twins baseball, Vikings football, North Stars hockey, Pipers basketball; work for a solution of Midway Stadium problem; sell the Midway as the crossroads of a great transportation, manufacturing and distribution area, and through appropriate committees keep watch on such things as city and state taxes, new Metro Council, St. Paul-Minneapolis International airport affairs, and all things political and civic affecting the Midway economy.

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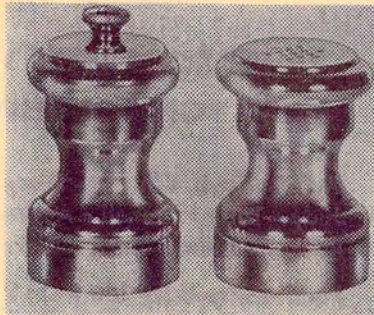
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CRETIN RETAINS HONOR ROTC RATING

It has recently been announced that Cretin High School received the rating of "Honor ROTC Unit" for the 1967-1968 school year. This marks the 38th consecutive year that this school has been awarded this distinction.

Major General B. O. Turnage, of 5th Army headquarters, Fort Sheridan, Illinois, in conferring the award, has written that Cretin received it as a school which has "attained exceptionally high standards of military training and discipline."

Cretin is the only military day school in the state of Minnesota to receive the Honor rating.

The junior ROTC program was begun at Cretin in 1917. Col. Robert B. Fahs is the pre-

sent commandant and is assisted by a staff of five non-commissioned officers. Col. Fahs is a graduate of West Point, and former head of the ROTC unit at the Ogontz campus of Penn State.

A regular program of inspection, drill, and instruction is carried on by the military instructors assisted by the Cadet Officers who are chosen from the junior and senior classes. Cadet non-commissioned officers are also chosen from the upper classmen; they have extensive responsibility for leadership and training among their fellow cadets.

Extracurricular activities available to the cadets through the military program consist of the Rifle Team, the Crack Drill Squad, National Rifle Association, and the Military Marching Band.

Chris Montez To Appear In Northrop

Singer Chris Montez, a protégé of Herb Alpert, will perform at 8 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 12, for University of Minnesota students and alumni in Northrop auditorium.

Montez will provide the entertainment portion of the annual Homecoming concert and dance sponsored by the Union Board of Governors. The dance, from 9:30 p.m. to 1 a.m., in Coffman Union will follow his performance.

"My sound is light and happy and falls between rock and pop," Montez says.

Montez, who is originally from Los Angeles, has recorded three albums for Albert's A and M Records — "The More I See You," "Time After Time," and "Foolin' Around."

Satirical Romp By Tommy-Katie Students Oct. 18

One of the most delightful satirical romps which ever graced Broadway will be presented by a combined cast made up of College of St. Thomas and Colege of St. Catherine students on two successive weekends, beginning October 18.

The Pulitzer Prize-winning "Of-Thee I Sing," which features the rare tandem talent of the late George and Ira Gershwin, will premiere in this season's first dramatic presentation on October 18 in Foley Theater on the St. Thomas campus. Following the opening the night of October 18-19 at St. Thomas, the play and its cast of 30 moves to the St. Catherine campus for a two-night, weekend presentation, October 25-26.

Such great early thirties songs as "Love Is Sweeping the Country" and "Wintergreen For President" will revive some dormant memories with a professional zing, lately much absent from theater. 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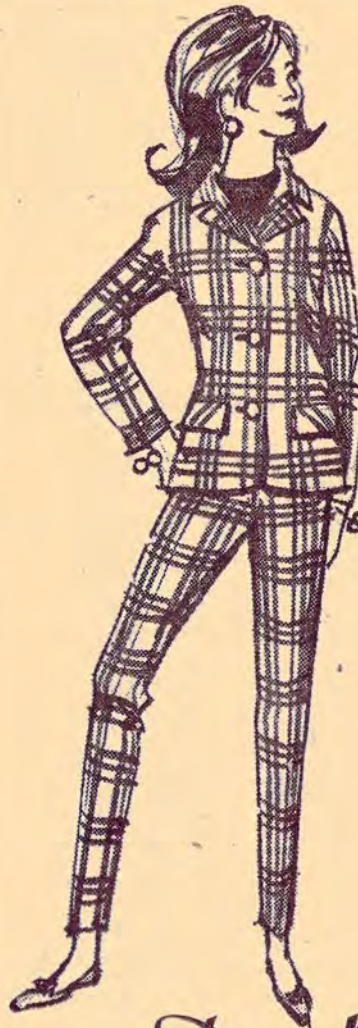

The event is open to the public and there is no admission charge.

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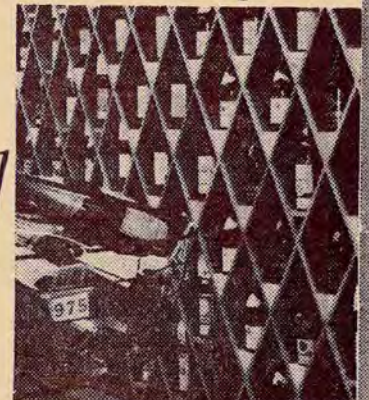
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Air Patrollers To Hear General

Gov. LeVander Urges To Employ Handicapped

Governor Harold LeVander today urged Minnesota citizens to actively support the goals of National Employ the Handicapped Week thru October 12.

In a proclamation issued from his office, the Governor emphasized that the handicapped have already proven that they can produce, work safely, and maintain good attendance records.

"Millions of handicapped Americans have demonstrated that they can hold just about any job in the country today—if they are given a chance," the Governor said.

"That is what National Employ the Handicapped Week is all about—to make us aware of the obstacles which the handicapped must overcome, not just the obstacle of their injury, but the hurdle of getting a job," the Governor said.

"I am personally calling upon the mayors of our towns and cities, our business, labor and civic leaders, our veterans, professional and other organizations to work together to throw open the doors of opportunity for our handicapped friends and neighbors," the Governor said.

The Governor pointed out the Minnesota State Employment Service placed 6,814 handicapped persons in jobs during the 12-month period ending June 30, 1968.

"This statistic indicates to me that Minnesota employers are convinced that hiring the handicapped is good business and that the only real concern is whether the handicapped person can do the job for which he is hired," the Governor said.

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Hunting Tips

Some hunters shoot ducks. Some shoot deer. Some shoot each other.

Many of those who die of accidental gunshot wounds during the hunting season might be saved if their companions knew how to stop bleeding.

With hundreds of hunters taking to the fields and lakes this week, Judge Otis Godfrey, chairman of St. Paul Red Cross safety programs, advised: "add a couple of simple cloth compresses to your hunting gear."

"The best method to control bleeding is to apply hand pressure to the wound with a thick pad of cloth. Although the dressing should be clean, a dirty cloth is better than none. If the wound is deep, the dressing should be inserted into it and firm pressure applied," the Judge said.

"Do not remove a dressing that becomes soaked with blood. Apply more layers on top of it. Direct pressure can be maintained by bandaging the compress firmly in place.

"Elevate a bleeding arm or leg if no fractures are apparent. Lay the victim down but keep the injured part higher than the victim's heart. Maintain normal body temperature, but do not overheat.

"Remember, a small entry wound may be misleading; extensive internal injuries may have occurred. All gunshot victims should receive medical attention as promptly as possible.

"All hunters should know first aid. The St. Paul Red Cross offers free courses throughout the year," Judge Godfrey said.
