Marinotes, Concert Chorus Arrive for Cretin High Fund Raising Concert

The "Marinotes, the dance band of St. Mary's College at Winona and the Concert Chorus of 80 male voices will arrive in St. Paul on Sunday, February 22 for the annual benefit concert sponsored by the Cretin Band Parents, the Cretin Dads Club, the Cretin Mothers Club, and members of the Cretin Alumni.

The benefit at 8 p. m. in the theater section of the St. Paul Auditorium will be one of the major fund raising projects of Cretin High School under the direction of Mr. Thomas Whalen, 686 Mount Curve Blvd., general event chairman.

The Concert Chorus and the Marinotes, under the direction of Brother Paul, F.S.C., a member of the religious order of Christian Brothers, travel about 10,000 miles each year and their repertoire includes music from all eras and of all types. The concert is presented on the order of a Fred Waring show, the first part devoted to serious examples of music and the second part offers excerpts from the modern musicals which have been presented successfully on Broadway.

Four highlights of the concert this year will be special numbers by the "X-men" who sing a madrigal composed in 1588 by Thomas Weelkes; the "Pitchhikers" a barbershop quartet who do a popular Little German Band number; the "Quartet Dance Chorus" with original comic choreography for three songs from "My Fair Lady" (Continued on Page 12)

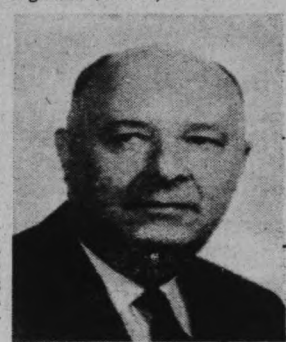

St. Catherine's Players Present Paul Claudel Play February 22, 23

"Tidings Brought to Mary" by Paul Claudel, the well known French poet and dramatist, will be presented in the Jeanne d'Arc Auditorium at the College of St. Catherine on February 22 and 23 at 8:15 p. m.

Claudel is also known to many as the French diplomat, who in 1935, negotiated the Kellogg-Briand Pact.

The story of Tidings takes place in the Middle Ages at a time when, like the present, France was going through a period of uncertainty. Claudels living faith reassures the doubters then as it does now. It is uplifting in Tidings that Claudel links in our imagination two daughters who strive for the spiritual salvation of France—Jeanne d'Arc by action and Violaine Vercars by humble sacrifice.

The rebirth of souls and the acceptance of that in the face of all the difficulties humans are heir to is the theme of "Tidings Brought to Mary." This is the story of Anne Vercars and his two daughters—the one bound to the earthly and the other bound to God. It is the story of Pierre De Craon, a builder of Cathedrals, and of Jacques Huey, the materialist. The story is dramatic and moving for Claude dealt with souls and not things.
