

Conservation Lectures At St. Catherine's

A nationally known expert in the fields of conservation and pollution will give two free public lectures at the College of St. Catherine Thursday, March 20.

Dr. John J. A. McLaughlin, oceanologist and chairman of the department of biological sciences at Fordham university, will speak at 1 p.m. in Jeanne d'Arc auditorium on the topic "The Effect of Man's Intrusion on Marine Productivity."

His second lecture will be given at 7:30 p.m. in Marian lounge of St. Joseph hall. He will speak on "Conservation and Pollution."

Dr. McLaughlin is spending Thursday and Friday (March 21) at St. Catherine's as a Danforth Visiting Lecturer.

In addition to giving two public lectures, he will speak before a number of classes during his visit. The public is invited

Dr. McLaughlin will speak Friday at a 9:30 a.m. class in Room 101 of Mendel hall on the topic "Cultivation of Marine Micro-Organisms."

He will also lecture on Friday to a 1:05 p.m. class in Room 106 of Mendel hall on "Estuarine-Marine Career Opportunities."

The visiting lecturers program under which Dr. McLaughlin comes to St. Catherine's was initiated in 1957 by the Arts program of the Association of American Colleges.

RARE VOLUME DISCOVERED IN COLLECTIONS FOR GOODWILL INDUSTRIES BOOK FAIR

The collection of books in preparation for the St. Paul Goodwill Industries Spring-Book Fair at Apache Plaza March 27, 28 and 29 has turned up a rare find.

Mrs. E. E. Reisdorf, St. Paul, President of the Auxiliary To St. Paul Goodwill Industries, spotted the old, leather-bound book when it was brought in by an employee, and recognized it as something of unusual value.

Though the book was written in Latin, she concluded that the volume was one of a series of commentaries on the Bible. Mrs. Reisdorf discovered that there were three other volumes: but only one had a titlepage, dated 1669 in Roman numerals.

Wondering if it was really that old and, if it was, if it was of any value to a collector, Mrs. Reisdorf wrote to the American Bible Society and Foyles of London, a rare book agency.

An attempt was made to translate the Latin title-page to English. Two words that were decidely not Latin bore investigation, for it was believed that these two words might be the key to the mystery.


The two words—Matthaei Poli—were discovered to be the name of the author of the books, Matthew Pole (or Poole, as he is more commonly known), a rebellious Presbyterian minister of the 17th century. The volumes discovered at St. Paul Goodwill Industries were

an incomplete set of Poole's life work, "Synopsis of the Critical Labours of Biblical Commentators." The books are valued highly because only 4,000 first edition sets of the five-volume work were published in 1669. According to The New Schaff-Herzog Religious Encyclopedia, the "Synopsis," which took ten years to write, "... will maintain its value forever ... Few names will stand as high as Poole's in the Biblical scholarship of Great Britain."

The mystery of the leatherbound volumes was solved—or was it? Like all mysteries, it leaves an even greater mystery in its wake: How did St. Paul Goodwill Industries get these books in the first place?

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS—50 YEARS

"Arise women voters of East and West, of North and South, in this your first union together: strong of faith, fearless of spirit..." called Carrie Chapman Catt in her address to the 50th anniversary of the National American Suffrage association on March 24, 1919.

Another fifty years later, March 24, 1969, the League of Women Voters of Minnesota joins with Leagues across the nation in celebrating the beginning of women's right to vote, and celebrating the organizing of the League of Women Voters. March 24 was chosen as the kickoff day in Minnesota because it was fifty years ago on this day that the Minnesota Legislature granted women in this state the vote for presidential electors. The goal of the colorful yellow jonquil suffragettes was reached.

Governor Harold LeVander will be proclaiming the week of March 24 as 1969 League of Women Voters week in Minnesota. Resolutions commemorating the 50th anniversary are planned in both houses of the legislature.


Celebrating its golden anniversary, the League is planning a full day of special events March 24. Legislators and constitutional officers are invited to have coffee with the League from 9:30 to 11 a.m. in the capitol rotunda. Each legislator will receive a gold flower for his lapel. Leaguers and friends from all over Minnesota will be greeting their elected officials at this event.

Former ambassador Eugenie Anderson will join Governor LeVander, Economist Walter Heller and James Hetland, director of the Metropolitan Council, to highlight the luncheon program at the St. Paul Athletic Club. They are four of the national 50th Anniversary Sponsors committee of the League. The luncheon will be from 12 to 2 p.m. in the fifth floor lounge of the Athletic Club, preceded by a social hour in the Emerald Room at 11:30 a.m.

The Governor's Residence, 1006 Summit Ave., is the site of a reception given by Mrs. Le-Vander to honor the 50th anniversary of the League of Women Voters and of granting women the vote for presidential Thursday, March 20, 1969


electors in Minnesota. Five invitations have been sent to each local League in the state by Mrs. LeVander's staff. Space limitations allow only 350 to attend. Representatives of the outstate Leagues will be received from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Twin City area guests will come from 3:30 to 4:30. Those attending will be representatives of the 5,800 members of the League of Women Voters in Minnesota.

Resort, Summer Camp Workers Sought

The Minnesota State Employment Service has opened its annual campaign to recruit approximately 1,500 people to staff the state's resorts and summer camps for the upcoming season.

George J. Vavoulis, Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Employment Security, said approximately 500 requests already have been received for counselors, housekeepers and maintenance personnel.

Young people 19 years of age or older with two years of college and camping or other recreational experience are being sought as camp counselors, Vavoulis said. Also in demand are people with Red Cross Life Saving certificates or Water Safety Instruction certificates.

There will be openings for nurses, dieticians, and office workers as well as for cooks and kitchen help, groundskeepers and maintenance men, waitresses and cabin girls, dock boys and lifeguards, boatmen and lifeguards, boatmen and guides and laundry workers, Vavoulis said.

In addition to camp counselors, instructors are needed for such things as swimming, riding, sailing, nature craft, arts and crafts, canoeing, music, athletics, gun handling and other camp-related skills and activities.

Persons interested in summer work should apply early because most of the jobs will be filled during the next few months.

Applications are being taken at the State Employment Service, 369 Cedar St., St. Paul.



The Zion Baptist Choir, Willie B. Hale, director, The Cantorians, Kenneth L. Robinson,


director, and the Cantinos, Marlene Allen, director, will present nine selections with all three groups joining to present "We Shall Overcome," just prior to the intermission.

I said it before and I will say it again, the Legislature ought to put a stop to the chicanery being carried on by the Metropolitan Airports Commission. Public hearings to date have been a farce, testimony against the Ham Lake Site is being disregarded and the only testimony that the MAC wants to listen to is that of their hired consultants.

MAC! What about the testimony of the airlines, the air traffic controllers, the conservation department, air pollution experts, meteorologists, ecologists and last but not least the affected citizens.

Public testimony is of no avail, be it from an emotionally involved citizen crying out against injustice, or be it from professional bystanders, experts in their field, who condemn the MAC proposal.

If the opposition to MAC had the funds available to make studies, certainly they too could hire experts to condemn the airport proposal as MAC has done to praise its proposal. "Hired" expert testimony should not carry the weight that the professionals carry who are experts in their field and who have opposed this monstrosity.

The public stands back in amazement and in awe at what little they have to say in their government. This arrogant display of injustice is vivid proof of the usurpation of power by the few and is the reason we see our law and order crumbling from within throughout our country.

The Legislature has a mandate to act now!

We have another example of superb reasoning power by the Metropolitan Airports Commission. Mayor Byrne uses the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization statement that south of the twin cities would be the worst site for an airport. The MAC's argument that north of the twin cities is the place for an airport, but Mayor Byrne apparently will close his eyes to PATCO's testimony, or statement, that the Ham Lake site is a nightmare. PATCO's objections to the south is based on conflict of air space, air routes east and west across Minnesota, holding patterns for O'Hare, etc. Route structure and holding patterns can easily be changed by comparison to other factors.

The MAC commissioners should not listen only to arguments that they want to listen to, but should also listen to pertinent arguments that adversely affects their position. This abuse of public testimony is another example of why the MAC should have its pins knocked from under them.

Dear Sir:

The performance to date by the staff of the Metropolitan Airports Commission and by the commissioners themselves presents dramatic evidence that there is something to be desired in the present system of things in the metropolitan area among those who are supposed to be planning for the future.

The MAC started out seeking an airport site based on antiquated criteria and then proceeded to lay out runways that criss-crossed each other at ninety degree angles. The airport site of 15,000 acres leaves vast patches of unused land between criss-crossed each other at ninety degree angles. The airport site of airport concept would be limited to runways in one direction at any given time with resulting noise contours extending from the

runways for ten miles.

How much more wisely was the route taken by the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization. These people, who are very cognizant of airport landing problems and noise problems around airports, first developed a plan for an airport with a capacity that far exceeds the capacity of the plan that the MAC has proposed for Ham Lake and whose noise contours are greatly reduced by reason of the fact that their plan does not limit runway usage in one direction only.

PATCO having once achieved a design sorely needed in this day and age, proceeded to find a site suitable for such an airport. Thus, the Air Traffic Controllers demonstrate to the MAC a procedure that should be followed in establishing an airport. If the MAC were to do the job right, they should quit putting the cart before the horse and establish an airport for aviation.

The MAC could prove their greatness by admitting to their mistake, or to their smallness by blindly living with their mistake.
