All dressed up in a new package for older high-school age young men, the new Exploring program will be launched by the Boy Scouts of America in November, Mr. Arthur H. Kruse, chairman of the Council Explorer Committee of the Indianhead Council, Boy Scouts of America with headquarters in St. Paul, announced today.

Based on surveys made for the Boy Scouts of America by the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan and other groups, the new program is just what the young men asked for.

The researchers questioned a cross section of the two and a half million young men between fourteen and sixteen years of age and turned up some good advice on the type of program young men want and need.

Exploring now will open its doors to all young men whether or not they have been Boy Scouts, and they may join when in the ninth grade or above and fourteen years of age. Those fifteen, sixteen, and seventeen years old may join regardless of grade. At the present time there are over 460,000 Explorers in uniform. The Indianhead Council has 73 Exploring units with 1761 members.

The new program will offer the opportunity for Exploring posts to specialize in any one of many subjects ranging from agriculture, chemistry, hi-fi, and publishing to zoology. Posts would be designated by their specialty such as atomic energy post or radio post. This step ties in with another finding by the survey that programs which direct the emergencies of young men in one area are more popular.

In addition to vocational exploring, five other areas of experience will form the backbone of the new Exploring program. The variety includes social, outdoor, personal fitness, service, and citizenship activities, which will be self-initiated, planned, and carried out by the boys with adult advisers and consultants.

The researchers learned that high school students are definitely dependent on parental standards and parental guidance. Outside the home this need for adult advice and assistance will be met by the advisers who will not run the show, but show the young men how it can be done. In order to help the Explorers run a better "show", a change in the organization of the post will take place as regular officers—president, etc.—replace the present crew system.

Along with these big changes has come another new look. Although the forest green uniform will still be worn to official functions, an optional outfit of blue sport coat, white shirt, maroon tie, and grey slacks has been added for informal affairs. To signify a modern, forward-looking, creative, farcical, and dynamic program, a new Exploring emblem has been designed.

To add to the newness of the program, the Boy Scouts of America will soon publish a revised Exploring handbook which will serve as a complete guide to the new program.

## College Receives Grant For Psychiatric Nursing

The College of St. Catherine has been awarded a grant of \$14,700 from the National Institute of Mental Health for undergraduate psychiatric nursing improvement of the teaching of psychiatric nursing. This announcement was made by Sister Mary William, CSJ, college president.

Sister Mary William stated: "The psychiatric nursing experience is had during the senior year and covers a twelve-week period. Prior to this, the instructors in the nursing specialties attempt to teach the emotional aspects of patient care within their particular area. In the remaining period of her senior year the student is prepared to apply the principles of mental health with all patients.

With the aid of this grant, the Department of Nursing will be

able to integrate the study of mental health throughout the total basic curriculum in nursing by the use of a two-fold approach — by directly helping the student nurse and by helping to develop faculty understanding and appreciation of the emotional aspect of illness."

Director of the staff for this project will be Sister Edith, CSJ. Sister received her Master of Science degree in Psychiatric Nursing at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., and for the past year has been on the faculty of Catholic University. The names of other staff members will be announced later.

Sister Mary Jane, CSJ, is the Director of the Department of Nursing.

Clinical facilities used by the College of St. Catherine for the teaching of psychiatric nursing is the psychiatric unit at Miller Hospital.

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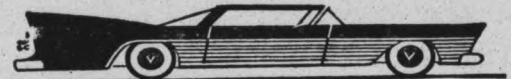
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# Novel Musical Events Scheduled at Macalester

Musical offerings at Macalester college will include two series of chamber concerts and an appearance by the Minneapolis Symphony this season.

An unusual lecture-recital series is planned around Donald Ferguson, former head of the Macalester music department, Rafael Druian, concert master of the Minneapolis Symphony, David Lloyd, widely known tenor, and John Simms, head of the piano department at the University of Iowa. Mr. Ferguson will lecture on the music each of the performers will present one week in advance of their appearance. The remaining two lectures will take place March 9 and May 4; Druian will appear on October 6, Lloyd on March 16, and Simms on May 11.

## UNICEF 'Trick or Treat' For World's Needy

How much is a dime? To our kids it means a candy bar, an ice cream cone or a comic book. But somewhere in the world a dime will feed 50 hungry kids a glass of milk. Ten pennies will provide enough vaccine to protect 10 kids against TB.

Minnesota youngsters will again be offered a chance to share in the United Nations Children's Fund "Trick or Treat" project. Although traditional with spooks, witches, goblins and ringing doorbells the difference in the UNICEF TRICK or TREAT activity is that the UNICEF spooks are really angels in disguise.

Last year more than two million American boys and girls in some 7500 communities joined in making a gift of one million dollars to UNICEF. Minnesota's contribution to the 1957 "Trick or Treat" was \$15,000.

Contributions to the 1958 United Nations Children's Fund will help fight malaria, leprosy and other diseases in 90 countries. It will help supply equipment for penicillin plants in Chile, Yugoslavia and India. It will help establish more health centers as well as help in the training of health workers.

Unlike most United Nations agencies UNICEF is not financed by assessment, but by voluntary contributions, mainly from governments. The United States Committee for UNICEF sponsors "Trick or Treat." Many local organizations — religious, education, fraternal and civic groups are participating in Minnesota communities this year. Mrs. Wright Brooks, Minneapolis is chairman of the Minnesota UNICEF Committee. Headquarters are 1124 Metropolitan Building, Minneapolis, Minn.

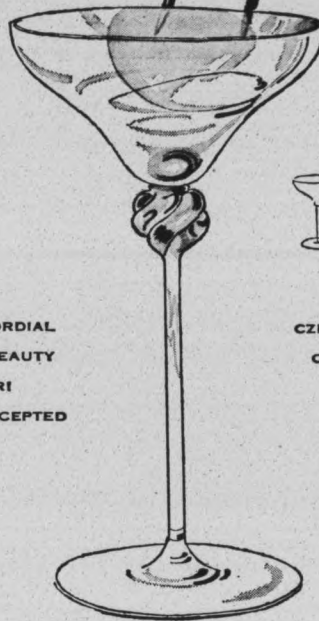
The Macalester Choir sings again with the Minneapolis Symphony in Northrup Auditorium on December 19 with a presentation of the Berlioz "L'Enfance Du Christ." This will mark a first performance of this work in the Twin Cities.

Martha England, translator of the Berlioz work will come to the Macalester campus to appear before classes and work with the choir in its final rehearsals. Vladimir Ussachevsky, pioneer electronic music composer, will present a lecture demonstration in February.

The Macalester Orchestra will present its annual Christmas concert in the afternoon of December 11. The Little Choir will assist the orchestra for this concert and will be heard again June 7 in the annual Baccalaureate concert. The Little Choir will be heard in Chicago this season while on tour in February.

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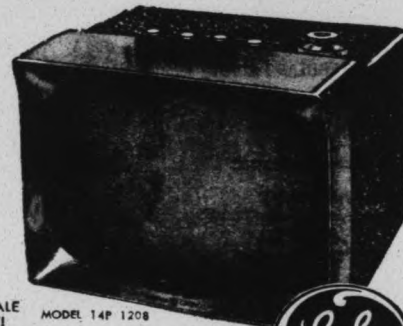
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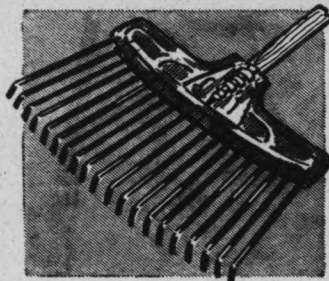


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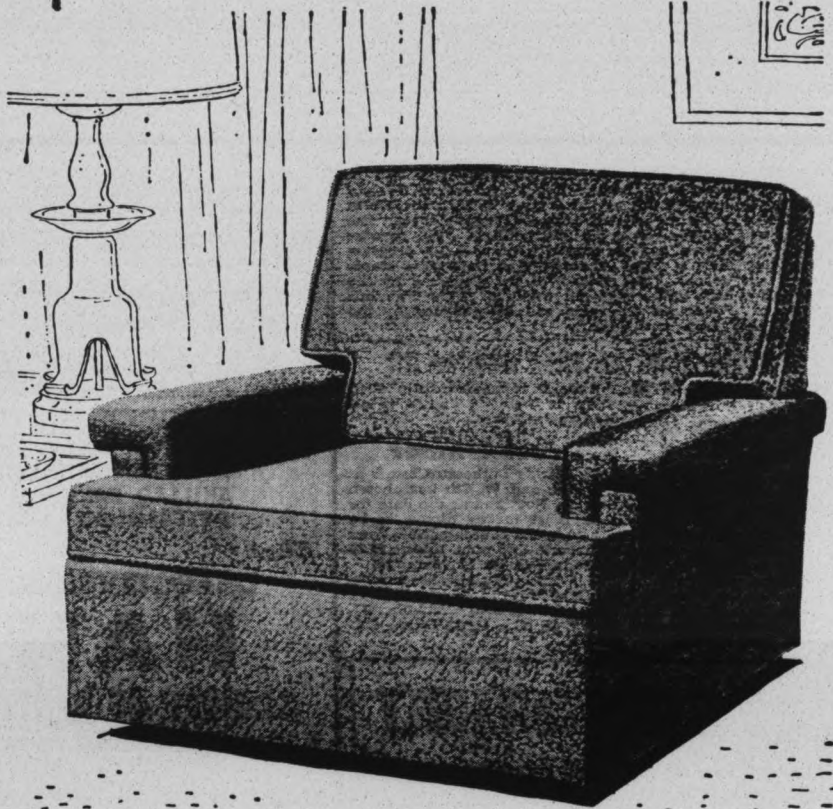
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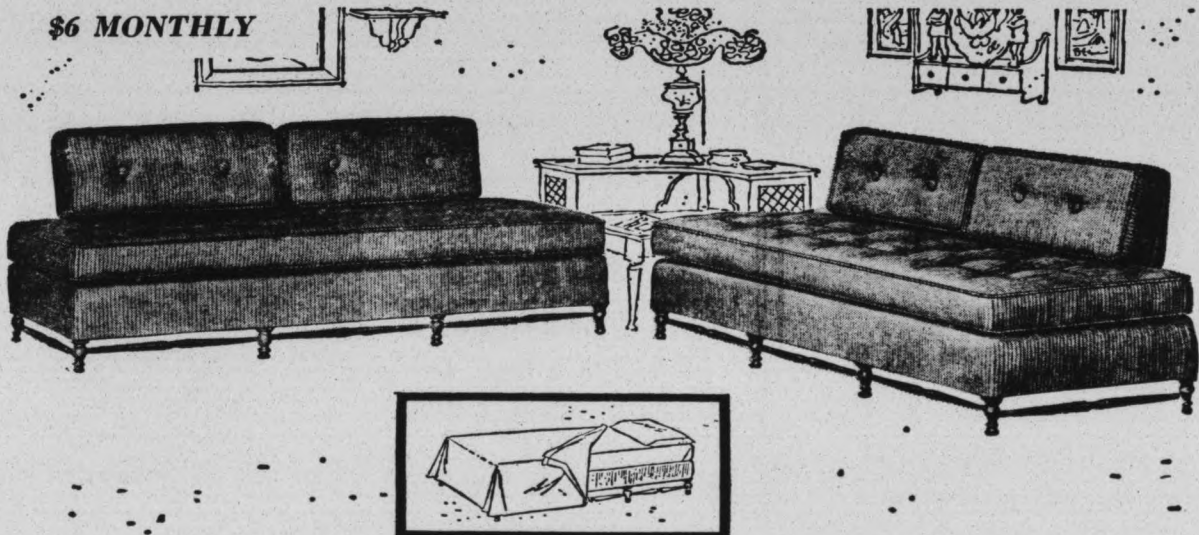
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## Safe, Sane Parties and Activities Planned for Halloween by Playgrounds

A complete uniform will be furnished each boy.

One league will be comprised of boys 8 to 11 years of age and another league of boys 12 to 14 years of age.

## Post Office Needs Women Workers for The Christmas Rush

The Post Office Department prepares far in advance for the huge volume of Christmas mail, and each year the Saint Paul Post Office requires 1,100 extra people to assist us during the Christmas Season.

This year, however, through a new system set up to expedite processing and delivery of mail, it will be necessary for this office to employ a large number of Christmas assistants who can work between the hours of 6:00 or 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 or 6:00 p.m. We expect this year's Christmas rush to commence the first week in December, and the fine assistance we usually receive from college students cannot be utilized this year until December 20, as most colleges will not close until December 19.

In past years, many of our Christmas assistants have been men and women who work in the post office during the evening hours, after having completed their normal day's work at some Saint Paul firm, and while we are glad to get their help, our dire need this year will be for those who can work during the day hours listed above. Our appeal, therefore, is to women, housewives as well as others who can be absent from their homes during the daytime. At the time of the manpower shortage, brought about by the war, we employed many women, and were more than pleased with the caliber of their work.

Women who would like to work in the Saint Paul Post Office from the first week in December until Christmas Day should contact the postmaster's office. The rate of pay is \$2.00 per hour for those who qualify as mail distributors by passing the Primary Scheme, and \$1.82 for those performing assignments which do not require this special knowledge.

# Rehearsals Begin For Centennial Pageant Depicting Lutheran Progress In State

Rehearsals have begun here and at nine Minnesota colleges for a Centennial play-pageant which will depict the role of Lutheranism in the state during the past 100 years.

Taking part in the production, "Of Grace and Growth," are Lutheran students from the University of Minnesota, and from nine Lutheran colleges. James S. Kerr, Minneapolis, associate editor of one magazine, is writer-director for the project.

A traveling group of more than 100, including a 60-voice choir, will present the pageant in eight Minnesota cities between Oct. 23 and Nov. 2, covering 1,100 miles in nine days for 14 presentations of the production.

Some 60,000 Minnesotans are expected to view the play-pageant in Rochester (Oct. 23, 8 p. m.); Duluth (Oct. 24, 8 p. m. and Oct. 25, 4 p. m.); St. Paul (Oct. 26, 4 p. m.); Albert Lea (Oct. 27, 4 and 8 p. m.); Willmar (Oct. 28, 8 p. m.); Fergus Falls (Oct. 29, 4 and 8 p. m.); St. Peter (Oct. 30, 4 and 8 p. m.); and Minneapolis, (Nov. 2, 4 p. m.).

Colleges taking part include: University of Minnesota (Lutheran Student Association and Gamma Delta); Augsburg College, Minneapolis; Concordia College, St. Paul; St. Olaf College, Northfield; Wartburg College, Waverly, Iowa; Northwestern Lutheran Theological Seminary, Minneapolis; Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter; Bethany College, Mankato; Dr. Martin Luther College, New Ulm; and Concordia College, Moorhead.

Production of the play-pageant marks unprecedented cooperation by Lutherans from 14 synods represented in Minnesota, and leaders of the project cite this as an indication of the scope and enthusiasm for the Minnesota Centennial Lutheran Pageant.

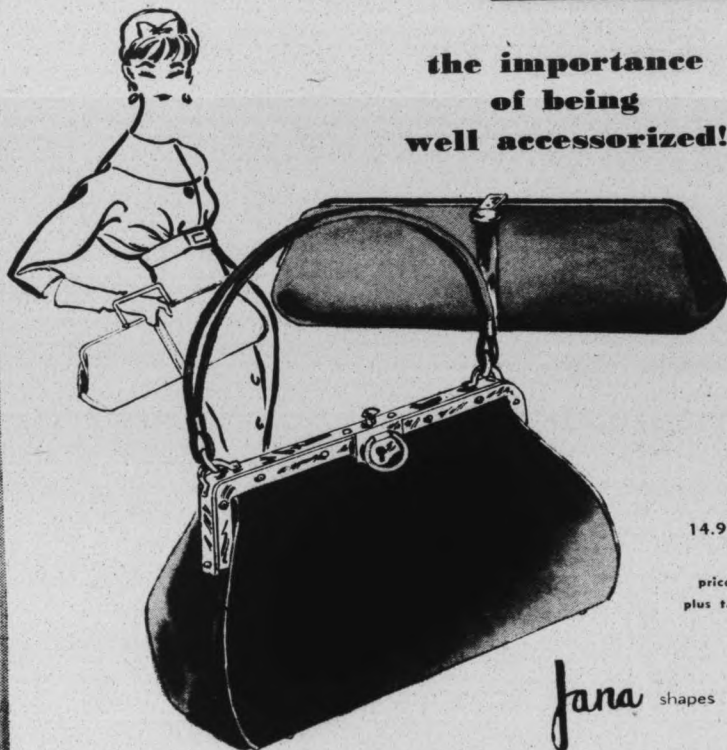
