Children will be given small spears with which to try and haul apples out of a tank of water. Many of the apples will be numbered and will entitle youngsters to prizes donated by some of the 38 store members of the Highland Civic Association.

"We think the apple spearing contest will provide some real fun for the youngsters and at the same time give the parents an opportunity to take care of their back-to-school needs," Mr. Watrud said.

Public Schools Open Tuesday, September 8; 42,800 City Youths Back to Age Old Routine

More than 42,800 St. Paul public school boys and girls will get back into the routine of studies and school activities Tuesday, September 8, following Labor Day week end. The estimated enrollment figure, 42,869 (October 1, 1959), is an increase of more than 361 youngsters over the October 1 enrollment of 42,508 a year ago (1958).

Superintendent of St. Paul public schools Forrest E. Conner explains the following series of events which are designed to get the city's educational machinery rolling:

B'nai B'rith to Have Booth at State Fair

Local Gas Dealers Provide Scholarships To 6 Area Colleges

Gasoline service station dealers of the Twin City metropolitan area will provide Oil Centennial scholarships to local colleges and the University of Minnesota according to an announcement made today by E. Lee Hopkins, Chairman of the Dealer Scholarship Committee of the Minnesota Petroleum Council.

Hopkins, himself a service station dealer, said the small business man recognizes the need for well educated young men and women in our democratic society and in order to assist in relieving the existing shortage, have banded together to set up this fund. Further, the dealers feel that emphasis should be placed on the colleges and the University of Minnesota in the area in which they derive their livelihood.

In 1958 three hundred and twenty-eight dealers contributed over fifteen hundred dollars that was in turn paid to the faculty on student aid in sums of two hundred and fifty dollars each. Augsburg, Macalester, St. Thomas, Hamline, St. Catherine's and the University of Minnesota were the recipients. Letters of appreciation were received from the presidents of the schools as well as the six students who received financial aid from the fund he said. The St. Catherine's dealer scholarship was awarded to Miss Barbara Bossus, the 1956 Princess Kay of the Milky Way according to Hopkins.

Apostolic Delegate to Dedicate New Library Jackson Graves At St. Thomas College. In Late October Remodels Store

Archbishop Egidio Vagnozzi, apostolic delegate to the United States, will deliver the main address at dedication ceremonies of the new O'Shaughnessy Library October 28-29 on the College of St. Thomas campus. Announcement was made this week by the Most Rev. William O. Brady, archbishop of St. Paul and chairman of the board of trustees, and the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president of the school.

It will be the first official visit to the archdiocese of St. Paul since Archbishop Vagnozzi became apostolic delegate in December, 1958. He will participate in several archdiocesan events. An Apostolic Delegate is a representative of the Pope, without diplomatic status, who watches over the status of the Church in the country in which he is stationed, keeps the Holy See informed of conditions there, and serves as intermediary between the hierarchy of the country and the Holy See.

The new three-story, \$1.6 million dollar library is a gift of Mr. I. A. O'Shaughnessy of St. Paul and the late Mrs. O'Shaughnessy, well-known benefactors. Construction of the building was announced on the occasion of the installation of Father Shannon as President in May, 1957. Mr. O'Shaughnessy is a St. Thomas graduate and a member of the board of trustees.

Full schedule for the two-day dedication ceremonies will be announced later.

Among the special guests for the ceremonies Archbishop Brady has invited all suffragan bishops of the province of St. Paul to meet the apostolic delegate and participate in the dedication ceremonies of the library.

Archbishop Vagnozzi has an extensive academic background. He holds three doctorates — in Philosophy, Sacred Theology and Canon Law. When he was named Counselor of the Papal Nunciature at Lisbon, Portugal, at the age of 36, he was the youngest Counselor in the foreign service of the Holy See.

He has held many diplomatic posts, among them several in Washington, D. C., covering a ten year period where he has served as Secretary of the Apostolic Delegation, Auditor, and Counselor.

Highland Jr. High Adult Education

The Adult Education program at Highland junior high school anticipates another busy season, it was announced Wednesday by Kenneth Hamann, director.

Since Monroe junior high school has discontinued its Adult Education program, Highland junior high school will offer classes in some 35 subjects on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays at 7:30 p.m., beginning September 23.

Notices will be sent home with pupils shortly after school opens in September. Adults may register at the school September 21 in person, or by mail or calling MI. 8-8800 any time before. Registration closes September 23.

St. Catherine's Announces Nursing Program Change

The second major change in the education program at The College of St. Catherine Department of Nursing, St. Paul, and the St. Mary's School of Nursing, Minneapolis, within the past eighteen months has been announced by Mother Antonine, provincial superior of the St. Paul Province of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

In October, 1957, St. Catherine's had both a three and four year program in Nursing. The three year program was terminated with the class being admitted in 1957 and graduating in 1960. The Sisters of St. Joseph established an independent school, St. Mary's School of Nursing, for the three year program. St. Catherine's School of Nursing, which now offers only the four year training program, is using the clinical facilities of St. Joseph Hospital, Miller Hospital and Ancker Hospital in St. Paul.

After a study by the administration and faculty at St. Catherine's and the administration from St. Mary's Hospital, it has been decided to change the 48 month nursing program, leading to Bachelor of Science degree at St. Catherine's, to a four year academic year program. At St. Mary's School of Nursing, the 36 month program has been changed to a three academic year training program. This change is now going into effect.

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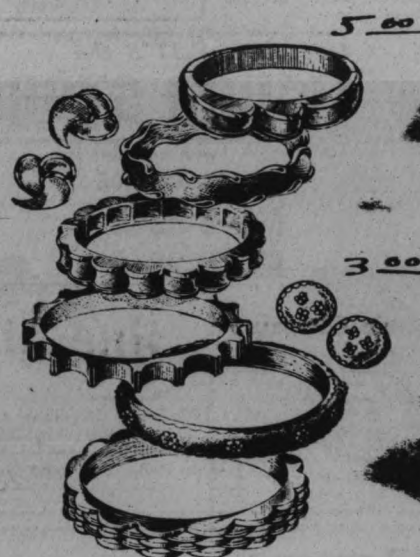

Lutheran High School to Open this Fall With Plans for New School Next Year

Twelve congregations of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod have in regular meetings voted to support a Lutheran High School in St. Paul beginning with the fall semester. This year only freshmen will be admitted. Classes will be held at Bethlehem Lutheran School, Forest and Margaret Sts., for the first year. Negotiations are presently under way for a building site of about 20 acres. The property under consideration is between Highway 36 and County Rd. B and between Dale and Western Aves. It is hoped that this site might be developed for the 1961 school term or sooner if possible. Architects are presently being interviewed as to costs in developing and building this site.

The development of a Lutheran high school is not to be misinterpreted as a criticism of the public school, disinterest in the public school, or unwillingness to support it. Public education is a community effort and therefore the responsibility of every citizen.

The members of the Church recognize this responsibility and willingly support and uphold the public schools. The Lutheran church maintains its schools because in them its children receive a specifically Christian education which the public school cannot supply.

Some 50 students are anticipated for the present school-year. Applications are now being received and processed. Registration for new students will be held on September 8 at Bethlehem between 9 and 12 a. m. Besides the principal another full time teacher has been employed.

The remaining staff members will be well qualified local people who will serve on a part time basis. The course of study for the present year is religion, English, social studies, mathematics, general science, music, and physical education.

With the exception of religion these are the courses as prescribed by the State of Minnesota. Anyone interested in further information about the school may contact the principal, Mr. E. F. Fieberg at SU. 8-8875.

Macalester Gets Gift From Weyerhaeuser Family

Macalester college has just received a \$350,000 gift from the Weyerhaeuser family of St. Paul for an addition to the Macalester Rudolph M. Weyerhaeuser Library, president Rice announced. The addition will be built on the South side of the current library and when finished will have a capacity of 120,000 volumes.

The present structure was built in 1941 when the college had an enrollment of 650 students. It was named after the late Rudolph M. Weyerhaeuser who, for many years, was a member of the Macalester board of trustees.

Sun and Spray Hard on Auto, Says AAA Official

Sunshine and breezes may do wonders for the human exterior, but the same combination is pretty hard on the shining paint and glittering trim of your car, Homer Thomas, general manager of the Automobile Club of Saint Paul, said today.

"Hot sun and moisture, especially salt water spray, are far more damaging to car finishes than winter's slush and snow or the dirt and dust of the city," the Auto Club expert explained. He added that salt air is also very harmful to the unprotected metal surfaces of autos unless they are cleaned repeatedly.

To eliminate, or at least minimize the harmful effects of water-side weather, Thomas suggested that beach-bound vacationers give their cars a thorough cleaning and waxing before leaving home, and on their return they should hose-off the car — especially the undersides of fenders and the backs of bumpers — with clean water.

Why is it that many babies learn to walk in a new pair of shoes?

The most probable reason is that the old shoes were too small. If you will notice, babies use their little toes for balance. When they walk in their bare feet or socks the little toe of the right foot points to two o'clock while the little toe of the left foot points to ten o'clock. This function cannot be accomplished if the old shoes are too small. After the babies learn balance the little toes become less and less important and close in with the other toes. 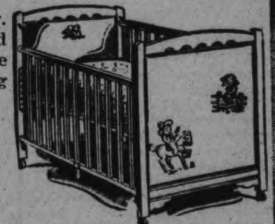

for kindergarten enrollment. Children who will be five years old on or before December 31, 1959, will be admitted, with registrations starting Tuesday, September 8, for children whose last names begin with A-H; initials I-R, on September 9, and initials S-Z, on September 10. Regular sessions will begin on Friday, September 11, with half-day sessions. Morning kindergarten sessions at the beginning of the school year will run from 9-11:15 a. m. Beginning September 21, the morning sessions will run fifteen minutes longer, from 9-11:30 a. m. Afternoon kindergarten sessions will be from 1:15 to 3:30 p. m.

Elementary schools — Beginning Tuesday, September 8 at 9 a. m., elementary school classes will be full time, with the exception of first grade morning groups, which will follow the schedule indicated for kindergarten during the opening weeks. Additional information concerning initial kindergarten and elementary sessions will be given parents.

High schools — Students new to junior and senior high schools this year who have not registered must do so at their respective schools during the week of August 24. Motorists Urged to Keep Eye Out for Youngsters Flocking Back to School

Bouncing rubber balls . . . school bells ringing . . . joyous shouts from small children. These are the signs that school is open again. And, around the state, the Minnesota AAA and police departments are appealing to motorists to use extra caution to prevent accidents as thousands of Minnesota school children flock back to classrooms after summer vacation.

Colorful AAA posters displaying the "School's Open . . . Drive Carefully" messages are being put up by police departments throughout the state. The posters are reminders to drivers that boys and girls will be crossing the state's roads and streets again . . . and that extra care is needed for their protection.

"Many children will be attending school and walking in traffic for the first time," said E. Ray Cory, Austin, Minnesota AAA president. "It's up to motorists to do everything they can to protect our children and prevent accidents."

School Safety Patrols and the police will be on the job at most intersections, but not all crossings can be protected in this way.

"Last year, nearly 50 percent of the 2,083 pedestrians involved in traffic accidents in Minnesota were school-aged youngsters," Cory said. "And most of the nation's pedestrian traffic deaths occur in the very young or elderly age groups."

The AAA official added that, in most of the traffic accidents involving school-aged youngsters, the accident happened away from an intersection, which "points up the need for caution on thoroughfares . . . as well as at intersections."

He also cited the ever-increasing number of school children and the number of new schools.

"Motorists should be on the alert for new school zones and school crossings because of this fact," he said.

The AAA official listed the following driving rules motorists should follow with the opening of school:

1. Obey school crossing guards and policeman.
2. Observe all limits in school zones.
3. Be extra careful of children riding bicycles to school.
4. Watch for children crossing streets in the middle of the block . . . between parked cars . . . and other unexpected places.
5. Obey all school bus regulations.
6. Promote driving courtesy by setting a good example yourself.
7. Be extra alert for children in bad weather.

Dr. Korn, Head of Jewish Historical Society, To Address "Book Launching" at Zion Temple

Dr. Bertram W. Korn, president of the American Jewish Historical Society, will appear as the guest speaker at an unusual "book launching" event Wednesday evening, Sept. 16, at Mt. Zion Temple, St. Paul. The board of trustees of the temple will be hosts to the community to introduce Rabbi W. Gunther Plaut's "The Jews in Minnesota—First Hundred Years," just released.

Six years of researching, using and often discovering original sources, the author has written the third in the American Jewish Historical Society's series of communal histories. Rabbi Plaut's human stories are set in a framework which traces the organic growth of communities, especially those of St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth. He tells how their organizational structures were formed and what forces were thereafter at play. The author analyzes divergent religious philosophies and the importance of national backgrounds. He shows how the sociological constellations of the community had a direct bearing on the theology and ritual of the reform and conservative congregations.

Dr. Korn, a distinguished scholar and author himself, has written the foreword to the book. He himself is an authority on American Jewish history during the Civil War era, and serves the 1800-family reform congregation Keneseth Israel, Elkins Park, Philadelphia. He is chairman of the committee on History for the Central Conference of American Rabbis. He is a graduate of the Hebrew Union College, and holds an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws, Temple University.

Institute Plans Course For Foreign Born

Five English classes will be offered, ranging from beginning to advanced studies. The citizenship classes are for those ready to become citizens of this country.

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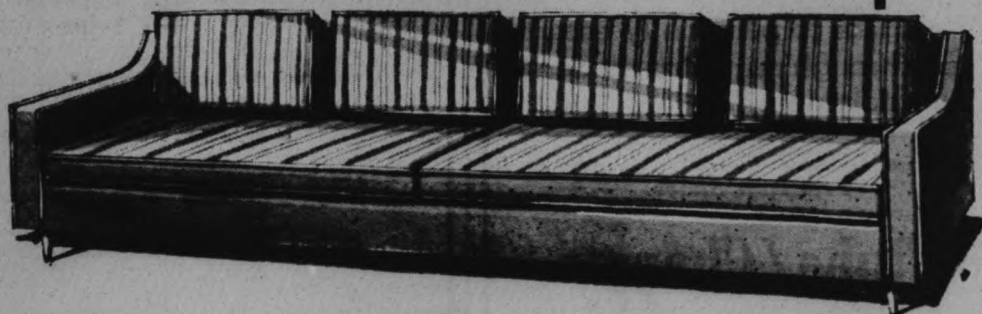

Groundbreaking For Bible Institute Held Sunday At Golden Valley Site

Groundbreaking services for the new Golden Valley campus for the Lutheran Bible Institute will be held Sunday at 3:30 p. m., it was announced by Pastor Bernt C. Opsal, president of the LBI. The new campus is located on highway 55, one-half mile west of Highway 100, four miles west of downtown Minneapolis.

The featured speaker for the afternoon will be Pastor Rudolph Burke, chairman of the executive committee of LBI. He is the associate director of the Board of World Missions of the Augustana Lutheran Church. Mr. A. E. Strom, the treasurer of the LBI board, will lead in Scripture and prayer. Mr. Alvar Nelson, former LBI business manager and presently the administrator of the Augustana Home in Minneapolis, will be the soloist.

The thirty-acre campus in Golden Valley will eventually provide for a student body of six to eight hundred students. The eventual plans call for dormitories, commons and education buildings, and auditorium. It is anticipated that construction for the first phase will begin this fall with a target completion date for the fall of 1960.

The Lutheran Bible Institute operates four schools located in Seattle, Washington; Los Angeles, California; Teaneck, New Jersey, as well as in Minneapolis where its national offices are also located. Faculty members from the four schools who will take part in a bi-annual retreat the first week in September will also participate in the ground-breaking ceremonies.

The Lutheran Bible Institute is an inter-Lutheran organization providing Bible training for laymen through its day school, correspondence course department, as well as an inspirational fifteen-minute daily broadcast called "Psalm of Life" which is heard over sixteen stations.

St. Thomas Receives Gifts of \$153,637.28

The St. Thomas Corporation was the recipient of \$153,637.28 in unrestricted gifts for current operating expenses given by alumni, business, parents, and friends of St. Thomas during the past year. Announcement was made this week by Emmet J. Murphy, assistant to the president and alumni secretary.

This is the largest total of unrestricted gifts in the history of the school.

Solicitation of funds from St. Thomas alumni was conducted by committees of class chairmen and associates through personal contact with their classmates. St. Thomas has 11,000 alumni. Over 250 served on the class committees.

For the preceding year, St. Thomas ranked 10th among men's colleges in the United States in total gifts to the annual fund.

The fundamental principles of Christian faith and the patterns of effective Christian living taught by the Augsburg College president, Dr. Bernhard Christensen a course in Norwegian folk painting and advanced calculus are listed on the curriculum of the extended 10th annual Augsburg College Evening School which begins Sept. 21.

Advance registration is now underway for the first semester program, according to Dr. Martin Quanbeck, director.

According to Dr. Quanbeck, the evening school classes are directed toward persons who want to continue their college education but are unable to attend classes during the day. This

also includes those who are not interested in qualifying for a degree, but wish to explore a special interest, as well as those already enrolled in college.

Students will register the first class day, Monday, Sept. 21, from 5 to 7:30 p. m. in Science Hall, although advance registration has been recommended. Tuition varies according to classes.

on the Augsburg staff. For church staff workers, a course will be offered in parish relationships. Also a course in contemporary poetry, freshman English, beginning Norwegian and office machine techniques.

Second semester courses include personal finance, forms and philosophy of art, contemporary American literature and the church choir-school.

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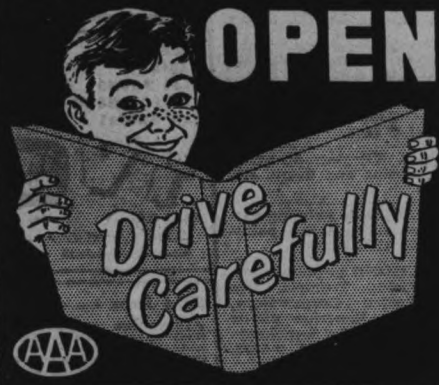

Vacation Photo Tips By AAA Club Official

Anyone taking a trip should take a camera along to capture beautiful scenes and exciting occasions, so that the whole family can enjoy them again and again, according to Homer Thomas, General Manager of the Automobile Club of Saint Paul.

Here are some tips Thomas has for your next trip by car.

Did you know that you can photograph from a moving car? Fast films now on the market make it easier to get pictures on the move.

Cameras with eye-level viewfinders are handier for taking pictures from a moving vehicle because it's easier to keep the subjects in the viewfinder.

Shooting from a moving car doesn't give much time to compose a picture—but you can always crop out parts of the picture you don't want after the film is processed.

Thomas suggests that before you go, let your photo-supply dealer make sure your camera is in A-1 condition. Have him thoroughly clean inside and out so that negatives won't be spotted. He suggests asking the dealer, too, for his advice on the kinds of film and filters you'll need for the kind of pictures you will want to take.

Thomas says there is one cardinal rule for motorists who take a camera with them: don't pack it away in a suitcase or in the rear of the car. Only a handy camera can get into action quick enough to catch all the roadside pictures you will want. He says also that the saddest day of the trip may come at the end when you encounter some particularly beautiful scene — and have no more film. Travelers should stock up on film at the start and have a roll or two in reserve.

Thomas suggests that you take your vacation pictures with an eye toward telling the complete story of the trip. Snapshots of road signs and historical markers help identify the places visited.

Photograph people while they are doing something. Snap them in action. Don't have them lined up staring blankly into the camera. People stand out better against a simple background.

At the beach or lake, beware of overexposing film in the bright sunlight. Take pictures in the morning or afternoon for best results. Remember, direct overhead light results in black shadows around the eyes of the subject.

By using a foreground object like a tree or person to provide a frame for the scene within your picture, you can improve scenic photographs and add interest to them, according to the motor club official.

To lead the eye to the center of interest when photographing buildings or monuments, use the diagonal line of a road or wall in your picture.

Flash equipment will enable

you to get those pictures indoors in a hotel, motel or cabin and also to take night scenes which are part of your vacation story. And Thomas recommends that when your trip is over, have your films processed as soon as possible and arrange the pictures in an album in order that best tells the story of your wonderful vacation.

Mac Evening Classes Offer 34 Courses; Pre-Registration Sept. 14-18

St. Thomas Freshman Enrollees Increase; 656 to Wear Beanies This Fall Semester

Officials at the College of St. Thomas announced today that 656 students have already applied, been accepted, and paid their freshman matriculation fee. The freshman class will be the largest in the history of the school with the exception of the post-war years of 1947 and 1948. Last year's freshman class, a large one by St. Thomas standards, was 569.

In addition, 66 transfer and other students will be attending St. Thomas for the first time as compared to 48 last year. Total enrollment at the College for the 1958-59 school year was 1515. The St. Thomas enrollment this year is expected to exceed 1600.

Officials believe that one of the main factors in the unusually large freshman class is the building program underway at the College. Recently completed men's residence, Dowling Hall, will provide boarding facilities for 300 students. Three-story O'Shaughnessy library, \$1.5 million dollar gift of Mr. I. A. O'Shaughnessy and the late Mrs. O'Shaughnessy, will be completed soon with dedication ceremonies scheduled for Oct. 28-29. Construction on a new student union, which will contain all campus eating facilities as well as bookstore, post office, student government officers, and lounge, was begun last month and will

be completed by the fall of 1960. Registration in the College begins September 14-15 for upper-classman with freshman registering Sept. 16 after placement examinations. Classes begin at 10:30 a. m. Sept. 17 after the traditional opening day Mass in the army at 9 a. m.
