A testimonial dinner honoring Frank Deig, retiring athletic director and football coach at the College of St. Thomas, will be held May 13 at 6:30 p. m. in the school armory. Mr. Deig recently announced that he would retire from his post at St. Thomas after 21 years of coaching and teaching.

Named at that time to fill the athletic director's spot for a one year period was the Rev. Bernard Coughlin, a member of the St. Thomas faculty and the school representative to the MIAC.

A twelve man committee, composed of faculty, administration and alumni members appointed by the President, the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, are currently assisting in the selection of a football coach. Applicants are now being considered by the committee and Father Shannon is expected to make final selection in the next two weeks.

The dinner honoring Deig is open to the public. Principal speaker is Father Shannon. Gilbert Dapper, former St. Thomas athlete, will make a special presentation to the retiring athletic director.

Minnesota Story Told In Centennial Train

A rolling museum of Minnesota's past, present and future . . . the Centennial Train . . . will carry Minnesota's Centennial story throughout the state during the warm weather months.

The Centennial Train is more elaborate than the 1948 National Freedom Train, with twice as much exhibit space. It will have a 135-day run beginning April 19 at Winona.

Macalester to Install Foreign Language Lab

Macalester college will install a foreign language laboratory at the start of the next fall term in September. Named director of the new laboratory is Harry L. Bratnaber, Jr., 1175 Davern street, St. Paul, now of the language staff of St. Paul Academy.

The new foreign language laboratory will consist of a main room with 25 booths for student use. Each booth will be equipped with recording equipment. A master console will be located at the front of the room and from it will be played master recordings in a foreign language. These recordings, by means of a switching system, will be played into different booths or combinations of booths.

The professor will speak to the students from the master console using a microphone so that the students hear the professor in the booths. The student will hear the tape in his booth and will answer the questions which the master tape asks him by recording them into his microphone in the booth. At the end of the lesson the student will play back both the master tap and his recorded answers, comparing his accuracy of pronunciation, intonation and correct sentence structure.

Groveland Garden Club

The Groveland Park Garden Club will hold its Annual Plant Sale on Friday, May 16. The sale will be held in the garage at the rear of 1996 Fairmount Ave., beginning at 9 a.m. All types of Annuals will be available as well as some types of perennials.

Bring cartons to carry your plants in.

Six of the nine cars are filled with displays of history, resources, agriculture, industry, social progress and welfare and the future. The other three cars are for crew and maintenance.

The Centennial Train has been constructed at a total investment of nearly a million dollars.

John A. Young, director of creative services for Minneapolis-Honeywell Regulator Co., who designed the unit for the Centennial, says material to be seen, heard, touched and smelled all will be used to produce the Train's overall impact in a history car, a resources car, an agriculture car, a business and industry car, a social progress car and a car of the future.

Cooperating railroads are pooling their rights-of-way to effect movement of the Minnesota Centennial's biggest single project—the Centennial Train.

The best talent from all the 24 year-round recreation centers will be picked for the district finals.

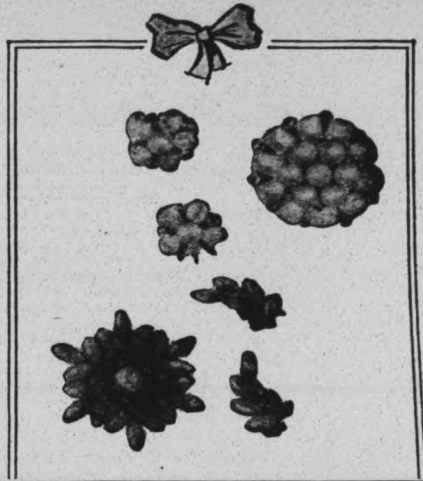

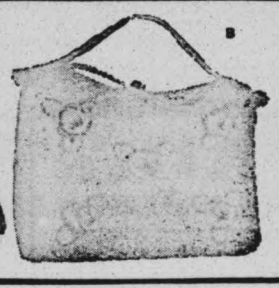

He had earlier earned three other academic degrees—the B. A. from the University of Minnesota in 1938; the B. D. from Oberlin Graduate School of Theology in 1945; and the LL. B. from the Minnesota College of Law in 1948.

St. Thomas Loan Approved For New Union

The College of St. Thomas was notified this week that it had received preliminary approval of its application for a loan of \$1,300,000 for the construction of a student union and cafeteria. The College has 90 days in which to submit detailed plans for final approval.

The student union would provide dining facilities for 400 boarders and 1000 non-boarders. School trustees have approved the construction of a \$1,800,000 three story building in the lower quadrangle, opposite the College science building. The College will raise a \$500,000 upon final approval of the federal loan.

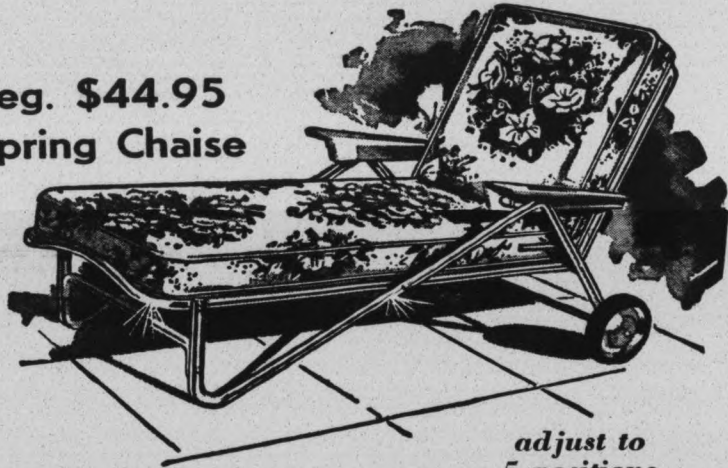

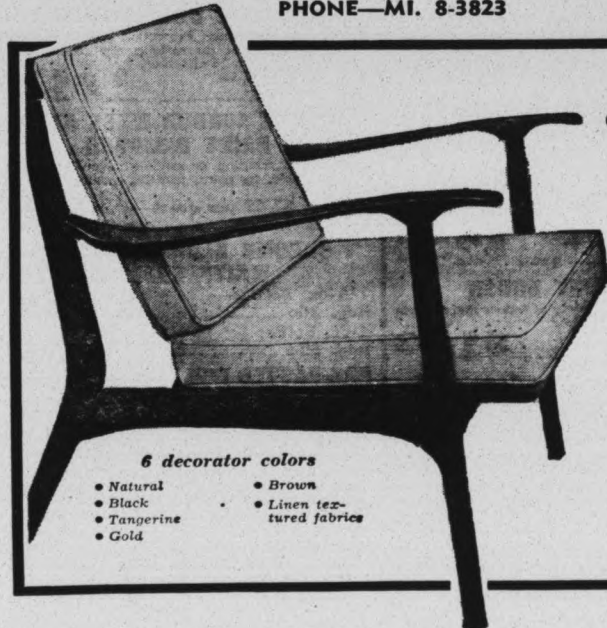

ly behind a massed colors unit, will be the U. S. air force drum and bugle corps from Bolling air force base, Washington, D. C. Winnipeg's police bagpipe band, escorted by Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers, will be the only musical group in the parade from outside Minnesota.

All floats are Minnesota products except for a lone import. The air force will transport a Bomarc guided missile here from Wright-Patterson field in Dayton, Ohio.

Military organizations will lead the first division, following the headquarters division. More than 1,000 uniformed men will parade in columns of eight abreast.

First float to be seen by spectators will be the Minnesota Statehood Centennial Commission's creation carrying Miss Centennial Minnesota, Diane Albers of Dundas.

Then will unfold a carefully-planned series of horse patrols, floats, antique autos and horse-drawn vehicles, high school bands, drum corps, drill teams, clowns, nationality marching groups, bandwagons and baton twirlers.

The three-hour parade will begin at 2 p.m. at the intersection of Thomas and Snelling avenues, four blocks north of University avenue (U.S. 12 and Minn. 52). It will proceed north on Snelling (Minn. 51) to the Minnesota avenue entrance of the Minnesota State fairgrounds. It will turn West on Minnesota to the carnival grounds, then north past the fair's paddock area and east onto the half-mile race track.

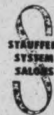

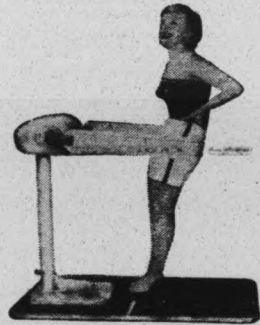

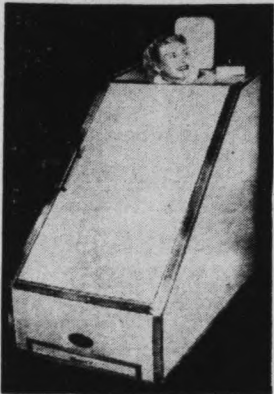

Among the problems that bring people from all walks of life to the local agency for counseling and information are marital and parent-child frictions, problems caused by illness and emergencies of all kinds and family distress because of individual personality difficulties of family members.

"Many people who use or support our local agency," he stated, "do not realize that we are a part of a national movement through which 275 organizations in 245 cities work together as members of the Family Service Association of America."

Citing a report recently released by the Family Service Association he stated that "nearly half the people of the United States now live in areas served by family agencies similar to ours."

"There are many reasons for the rapid growth of the family service movement throughout the United States in recent years," Mr. Schneiderman declared, "including a realization that in this modern age it is better to seek aid from a professional family counselor than to neglect problems until they get out of hand."

"From the Stone Age when families dwelt in caves, down to modern times, people have had to strive for secure, happy and united family living, but today in an age of better health and more abundance, we have to face the fact that almost every family has serious difficulties at some stage in life."

The report from the Family Service Association of America lists several causes for what appear to be increased tensions and strains in family life, including mass migration which severs established community ties, life's faster tempo, a lengthening life span, and the increasing number of people past the age of 65, and many others.

Also, it lists more specific causes for family distress, such as unemployment, industrial accidents, marital discord, restlessness among teenagers, and emotional illness.

Because of the complexities of modern family problems, family agencies employ trained and experienced counselors who not only understand and are able to help but can offer warm, human counsel. They are interested in preventing problems from developing as well as in trying to solve those of a serious nature.

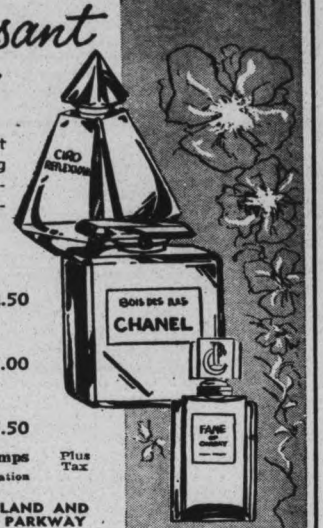

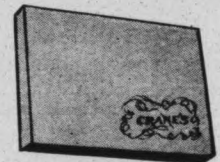
