VULCAN'S FIREWORKS IN HIGHLAND

If it snows, okay—if it doesn't, okay, too. Above freezing or below freezing — it won't matter.

Regardless of the ground cover or temperature, one of the outstanding events of the Winter Carnival—the spectacular fireworks display sponsored by the Highland Civic Association—will go off on schedule.

This free event will take place at 7:30 p. m. Sunday, February 2, on the Highland Park golf course, Snelling avenue near Montreal.

On this, the final evening of the Carnival, Vulcan, the mythical Fire King, will be in hot pursuit of King Boreas, ruler of the North Wind, to drive the mighty monarch out of St. Paul and make way for the coming of spring.

Rockets, Roman candles, bomb bursts and an assortment of other startling ammunition are enough to make any North Wind ruler beat a hasty retreat—and provide a good show for spectators, besides.

After dethroning Boreas in the midst of the fireworks, masked Vulcan—mystery man of the Carnival—will make his identity known.

This is the third year the Highland Civic Association has sponsored the fireworks display, always a popular event for children and grownups alike.

Francis D. Butler, St. Paul attorney, has been named chairman of the Minnesota State Bar association's newly formed Atomic Energy Law committee, according to State Bar association president James G. Nye of Duluth. Arne L. Schloeller, Minneapolis, is secretary of the committee.

St. Paul lawyers appointed to serve on the committee are Lawrence Hazen, Richard Post, Robert H. Tucker, Willard L. Converse, John G. Robertson, Robert F. Leach and Solly Robins.

The purpose of the committee, Nye said, is to study the legal, legislative, and administrative problems arising in the field of atomic energy. He added that a report with recommendations will then be made.

St. Thomas Gets \$4000 From DuPont Co.

The College of St. Thomas was one of 73 institutions of higher learning in the United States to receive grants of \$4000 it was announced this week by the E. I. DuPont de Nemours and Company of Wilmington, Delaware. The purpose of the grant is to advance the teaching of chemistry and other subjects contributing to the education of scientists and engineers. The grants are part of DuPont's annual program of aid to education.

The University of Minnesota and two other colleges, Carleton and St. Olaf, were included from this area. The University of Minnesota received a \$15000 grant;

the three colleges each received \$4000.

Of the St. Thomas \$4000, the chemistry department will receive \$2500; other courses \$1500. Colleges were selected on their records of strength in chemical education.

The institutions are to use the money to advance their instruction of the subject of chemistry and to stimulate interest in it.

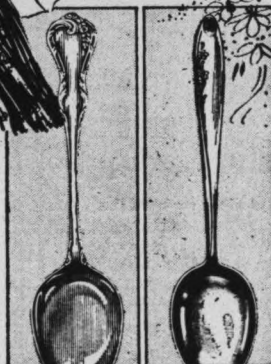

'Parade of Century' Will Tell Minnesota History in 200 Units

Plans for a Minnesota Centennial "Parade of the Century" to be held next May 16 were announced by Ray P. Speer, long-time State Fair publicity director and special Centennial Parade coordinator.

The parade will originate at the Minnesota State Fairgrounds, and after passing in review before the grandstand will travel south over Snelling Avenue to University Avenue where it will disperse. The entire route covers three miles and is expected to last three hours.
