Columnist To Speak Here On Civil Rights

Coming to St. Paul, is George Schuyler, a well known and widely-read syndicated columnist, who will speak on "Civil Rights Problems-Causes and Solutions" at the Lowry Hotel Ballroom, May 17th at 8 p.m.

Mr. Schuyler, a Negro conservative, has been a Newspaperman for half a century. He is a former feature writer for the North American Newspaper Alliance. His articles have appeared in Reader's Digest, Negro Digest, The Annals of the American Academy of Political Science, National Review and the Christian Herald.

He has written three books, "Slaves Today," "Black No More" and the best-seller, "Black and Conservative." He has contributed to two symposiums, "Behold America" and "What the Negro Wants." His impressive biography has appeared in each edition of "Who's Who in America" since 1934.

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"The Birds" On Showboat

A free-wheeling production of an ancient Greek comedy will highlight the 1968 season on the University of Minnesota Theatre's Centennial Showboat.

"The Birds," written by Aristophanes and translated by Walter Kerr, will be presented July 18 through Aug. 3.

"It is a wonderful, outrageous satire of life today," said director and "Captain" Frank M. Whiting.

The Showboat season opens May 23 with "The Rivals," a restoration comedy by Richard Brinsley Sheridan. The 18th-century story of a rich girl in pursuit of a poor man features Mrs. Malaprop (the originator of malapropisms) as a leading character).

The crew for '68 will include the following University of Minnesota students: Ken and Cathy Albers, Tom Butch, Michael

This is the 11th season the Showboat will be in operation on the Mississippi River. During this period it has attracted a total audience of more than 206,000 people for 1,000 performances.

Showboat performances are at 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday nights and at 7 and 10 p.m. Friday and Saturday nights. "The Rivals" will be presented May 23 through July 13 and Aug. 12 through 17 at the Minneapolis campus landing, and Aug. 5 through Aug. 10 in St. Paul.

"The Birds" will open July 18 in Minneapolis. The boat will move to St. Paul July 28 and the play will be presented there through Aug. 3. The more popular of the two plays will be presented the last two weeks of the season which closes Aug. 31.

Tickets for the Showboat are available by mail from the University Theatre Ticket Office, Scott Hall, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minn. 55455. They are available over-the-counter in Scott Hall and at metropolitan ticket agencies.

Medicare Handbook For State Elderly

Within the coming weeks, older people in Minnesota will be receiving a new copy of "Your Medicare Handbook," a new up-to-date guidebook on their Medicare benefits, how the program works, and how payments are made.

Ralph Gower, social security district manager, said the new handbook highlights the changes enacted in the 1967 social security amendments, improving protection and simplifying Medicare procedures.

In developing the new edition of "Your Medicare Handbook," Gower said, the SSA sought the suggestions of elderly readers as well as experts in the field of communications and representatives of professional organizations.

Delivery of the new red, white and blue edition to the 19.6 million Americans 65 and over will be cycled over the next 6 weeks.

In an introductory letter on the inside front cover of the new handbook, Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, reminds older people: "If you need further information or want help concerning your Medicare protection or any other social security matters, please get in touch with your social security office. The people there are always glad to help you."

Employees who receive tips should know that the reporting of tips for social security purposes can increase a wage-earner's benefits very substantially. However, in order to receive credit for tips under social security, the worker is obliged to keep his own records of tips received and to pay social security tax on them along with the rest of his wages.

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Mothers Can Offer Gift Of Longer Life

The woman in the kitchen is in the important position of being able to reduce her family's risk of heart disease. Beginning on Mother's Day, when gifts and messages of love are flowing her way, Minnesota Heart Association suggests that she, too, can give a gift—the gift of better health and longer life to her loved ones through improved dietary habits.

This will call for some changes in daily meal planning. The aim should be to cut down on foods rich in animal (saturated) fats and cholesterol, which increase the level of cholesterol in the blood. High blood cholesterol has been linked to development of atherosclerosis, the disease which underlies most heart attacks.

To achieve this aim, the housewife can serve more meals of fish, chicken, veal and turkey and less beef, lamb, pork and ham. She can replace milk with skim milk, and hard cheese with cheese products made from skim milk. She also can cut down on the use of eggs, which are very high in cholesterol.

Instead of using butter for a spread, the housewife can serve the soft margarines that are rich in polyunsaturated fats.

Similarly, rather than use lard and other solid cooking fats, she can substitute the polyunsaturated vegetable oils. The latter can be used, for example, to brown lean meats, or to fry fish and poultry; in cream sauces and soups made with skim milk; for making hot breads, pie crust and cakes; for making cocktail snacks and, in cooking dehydrated potatoes and other prepared foods which call for the addition of fats.

To round out her daily selection of foods for a balanced diet, the housewife also should include vegetables, fruit, breads and cereals. In this way she can maintain good nutrition for her family, and at the same time help them to adopt new eating habits that are designed to protect their hearts.

The earlier the homemaker puts these dietary recommendations into practice, the greater the assurance of many more happy Mother's Days for all the family.

Commencing May 1 and through out May, you may pick up your phone, dial 225-6569 and find out whether you possibly have a hearing loss! It's easy, quick and simple.

This program is sponsored by the Sertoma Club of St. Paul. Sertoma President Don Newman explained the details of the telephone hearing test as follows:

Using the telephone company's equipment, similar to a recorded answering service, we have made it possible for everyone in the area to use their own telephone to get a quick hearing test. A person simply dials 225-6569 and immediately hears a recorded message. The voice explains that this is a simplified hearing test and that there will be four tones to listen for. After the four tones, the voice instructs the listener to switch the telephone receiver to the other ear and again listen for the four

tones. At the end of the test, the voice explains that if the listener did not hear all eight tones clearly he may have a hearing loss and should get in touch immediately with his physician or The St. Paul Hearing Society, telephone number 224-3171.

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Dr. Culver Named Academic Dean At St. Catherine

The appointment of Dr. Dwight W. Culver as academic dean at The College of St. Catherine has been announced by Sr. Fides Huber, C.S.J., president of the college.

Dr. Culver, who is currently completing his fifth year as professor of sociology and department chairman at St. Olaf college, Northfield, Minn., will be succeeding Sr. Helen Margaret Peck, C.S.J., effective June 1, 1968. Sr. Helen Margaret will return to teaching in the department of English in September.

Dr. Culver is a 1941 graduate of Carleton college, Northfield, Minn. He received the B.D. and Ph.D. degrees from Yale university. He began his teaching in the department of sociology at Purdue university in 1947 and an associate professor there before going to St. Olaf.

On leave during 1961-63, he participated in the Lilly Endowment Study of Pre-Seminary Education as associate director.

Dr. Culver's research and publications have been in the sociology of religion and in race relations.

His Ph.D. dissertation, supported by a Rosenwald fellowship in race relations, was published in 1953 under the title "Negro Segregation in the Methodist Church." In the same year he studied racial desegregation in education in Indiana as a contributor to the Ashmore project of the Fund for the Advancement of Education.

At St. Olaf, Dr. Culver is

chairman of the division of behavioral sciences.

His teaching includes the supervision of a January interim study of the urban community. This year, his students participated in the Model Neighborhood program on the south side of Minneapolis.

Among his non-academic interests, Dr. Culver enjoys playing the French horn in chamber music groups. He has served as a secretary of the board of directors of the Civic Orchestra of Minneapolis. He is now the vice-chairman of the Northfield Planning Commission.

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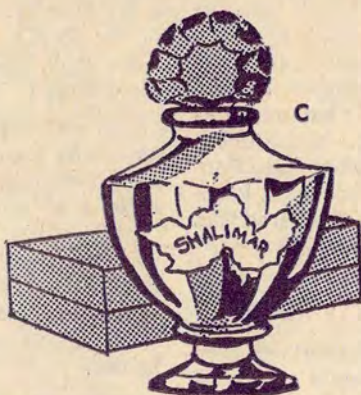
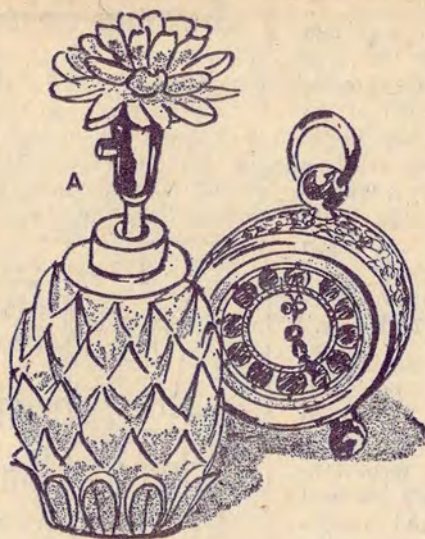

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Nativity Parish "School Board" Plan

Members of Nativity parish in St. Paul will vote on a proposed constitution for a school board Monday, May 27 at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium. A nine-member planning committee which has met ten times in the last five months to draw up the proposed constitution and by-laws will present the constitution for ratification.

Nativity grade school is third largest in the archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis with 1176 students. It is staffed by 35 teachers and 10 additional professional personnel. The school is valued at over 2 million dollars.

As proposed, the nine member regulatory body, responsible for the policies and educational programs offered at the school. Registration is now open for Jewish Community Center day camp programs: Camp Centerland, for pre-schoolers ages 3-5; Camp Jack Butwin, for children completing kindergarten through second grades; Camp Adventure, for youngsters completing third through fifth grades; and Tweeners on Wheels, for boys and girls completing sixth through eighth grades.

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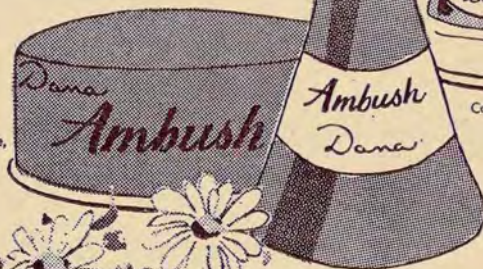
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Kaminski Named As Cretin Football Coach

THE UNMAKING OF A MAYORESS, 1968

There was Tommy Byrne, Billy Carter and Rosalie, the Butler kid. Billy found out that St. Paul Republicans would work twice as hard to defeat a conservative as they would to elect an Independent. Rosalie, the conservative, found out that she was on the wrong channel. Tommy found out that in St. Paul politics, you don't win elections, the other people lose them to you.

Bill Carter lost the primary because "somebody up there" wanted him to. Up there, being the GOP County office or the "A-Group," which in local GOP parlance is the code name for the fat cats, who no longer live in the City Limits, but can't ever remember when they weren't doing something good for St. Paul. Else, why would it take the brain trust behind GOP politics in St. Paul until after Winter vacations to determine who their candidate would be in the first place? A four-year term is hoped for. It takes that long for the meetings and committees that bungle municipal politics for the GOP to get through everybody's best toastmaster's story.

Next, there were the priorities established by the same people mentioned above over which council candidate would receive their (help). Jim Weyandt was the obvious favorite. Frank Loss, who was called a "good Republican" in a letter from the GOP County Office in the 1966 Election was snubbed completely. As was Robert Sprafka. R.D. Johnson was given nominal help and probably because he is the only real card carrying Republican that ran for public office in the election. (That includes Meredith, who was adopted by the GOP after Vavoulis elected him.) As it turned out, Sprafka was the winner, and though he worked tirelessly, and a prodigious amount of money was expended on behalf of his candidacy, he proved the same adage that Byrne proved—the other guy will lose it to you. In Sprafka's case, the other guy was Len Levine who chopped Holland up so bad within DFL ranks, that Sprafka's total was enough to overtake the 16 year veteran. Levine, a non-encumbent, had to fire away to get elected because his party made the mistake of endorsing six candidates instead of five. This left DFLers who liked Meredith no place to go but into their own column to eliminate a vote. A mistake—unless it was intentional! Net profit to the DFL: a good looking prospect in Levine in the place of the inevitability of Holland's defeat, if not this time, certainly next time.

From the beginning—and ironically so—KSTP's pretty rookie assigned to cover the St. Paul election, held forth for Byrne victory in a way that should have had Butler's TV money looking for another station. It was ironical, because Butler favored KSTP-TV, and it was no small secret that KSTP-TV did not favor Butler. When doll baby and the new cherub-faced court house reporter from the local gazette ganged up on Butler in a TV debate, with Charles McCarty's educational background report, it was too coy that they both called it a "credibility gap" practically in the same breath and that Byrne was "set" with response and an attitude which reeked of collusion. It makes no difference at all to me, but one must follow St. Paul politics by learning the subtleties, the gimmicks, and the players cast in various roles, in order to follow the hoaked up show we've got here on both sides of the political fence.

Charles McCarty draws on a very simple-minded gut reaction with middle class voters who think he is something akin to a public defender. He is a court house character actor—a precious commodity, when you consider the fact that the marble indian can't talk. A town which can be made to read Don Riley every morning can surely be made to believe Charles McCarty!

Tom Byrne won—which is, after all, as it should have been. But it all rather stunk, really!

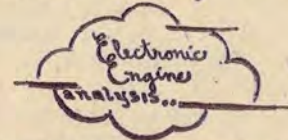

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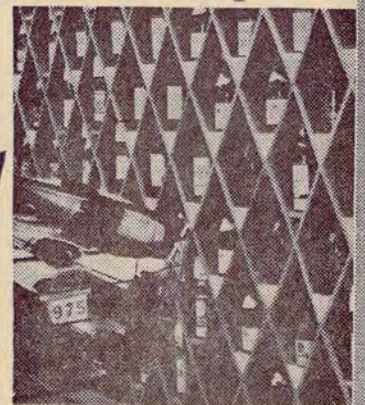
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Rt. Rev. O'Donnell, St. Thomas Dean Receives Distinguished Service Award

The Rt. Rev. William O'Donnell, academic vice president and dean of the College of St. Thomas, has received a Distinguished Service Award from the national scholarship honor society, Delta Epsilon Sigma.

Msgr. O'Donnell is faculty moderator of the Alpha Sigma chapter of DES at St. Thomas. He received the award at the group's recent national convention in St. Louis.

Msgr. O'Donnell has been dean of the College since 1945 and was made academic vice president in 1962. He is active in national and local educational organizations and has been treasurer and chairman of the American Conference of Academic Deans.

Msgr. O'Donnell's interest in Delta Epsilon Sigma has kept the society alive at the College. Alpha Sigma chapter was char-

tered in 1941 but was dropped shortly after because of the war. It was revived in 1947 but again dropped in 1951.

Delta Epsilon Sigma was one of two honor societies on the campus at the time and had trouble attracting membership. Under Msgr. O'Donnell's direction and effort, the two organizations were incorporated and the chapter reactivated in 1955. It has grown steadily. Msgr. O'Donnell was national president from 1959-61 and chartered seven new chapters in that time.

A native of Fort William, Ontario, Msgr. O'Donnell came to St. Paul while still a child. He attended St. Luke's grade school, Cretin High School and St. Thomas Military Academy before transferring in his senior year to Nazareth Hall, the preparatory seminary for the archdiocese of St. Paul.

From Nazareth Hall he went to the St. Paul seminary and was ordained to the priesthood in June, 1933. The same year he received his S.T.B. degree from the Catholic University in Washington, D.C., and was sent to the University of Louvain in Belgium. He received his doctorate in 1938 and returned to join the St. Thomas faculty.

Augsburg College Transition Program

Dr. Oscar A. Anderson, president of Augsburg College, has announced that Donald A. Chipman, counseling psychologist, has been named director of a six-week College Transition Program to be held at Augsburg June 24-Aug. 2. The program, developed by the Educational Development Center, Berea Ohio, is designed to assist high school graduates in making an effective transition to college life.

The Educational Development Center, founded four years ago, has received nation-wide recognition for its program designed to help students who have failed in college. What has been learned from working with these students and their problems has been utilized in designing an effective program to increase the chances of success for the new college student. Augsburg is one of seven colleges in the country selected for a pilot College Transition Program.

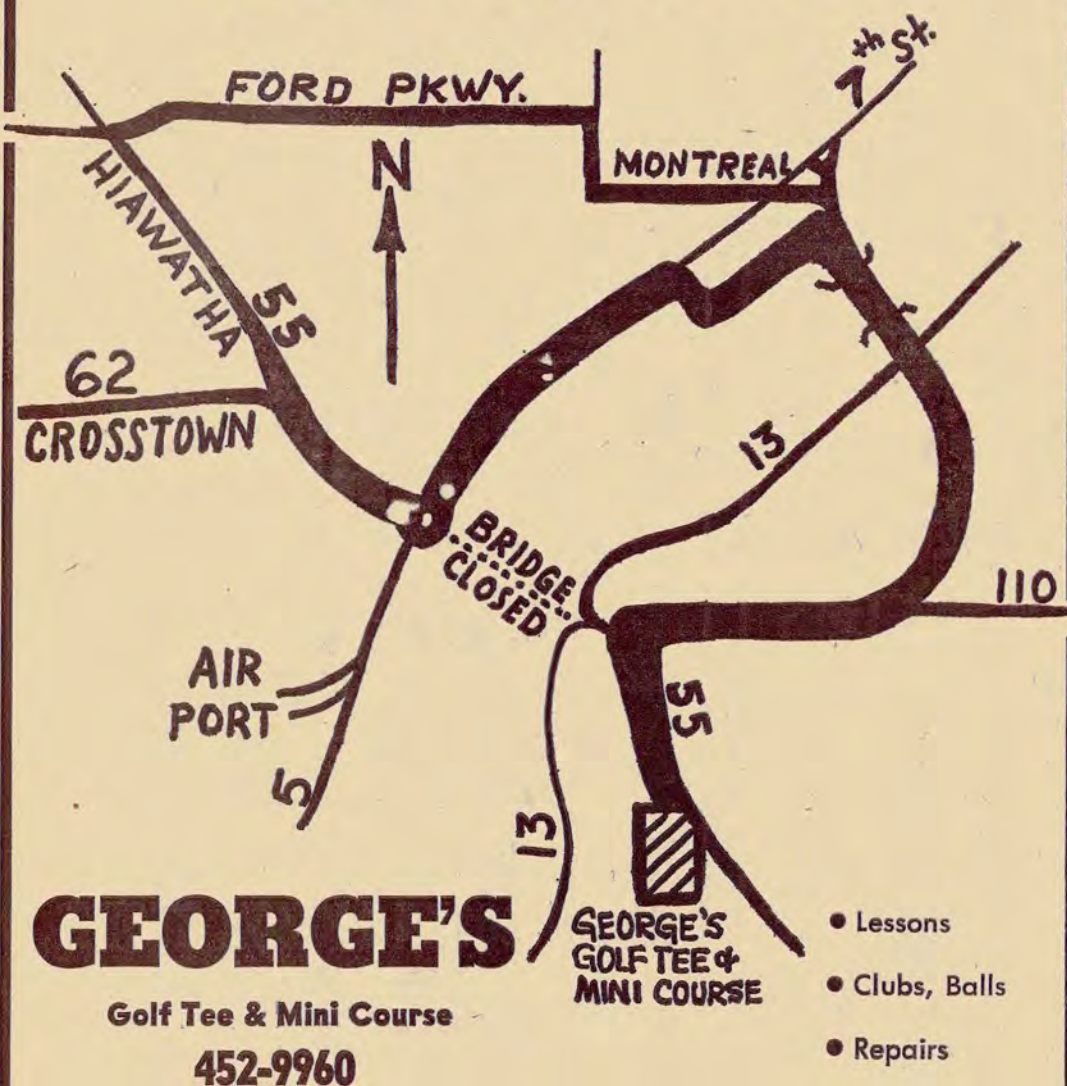

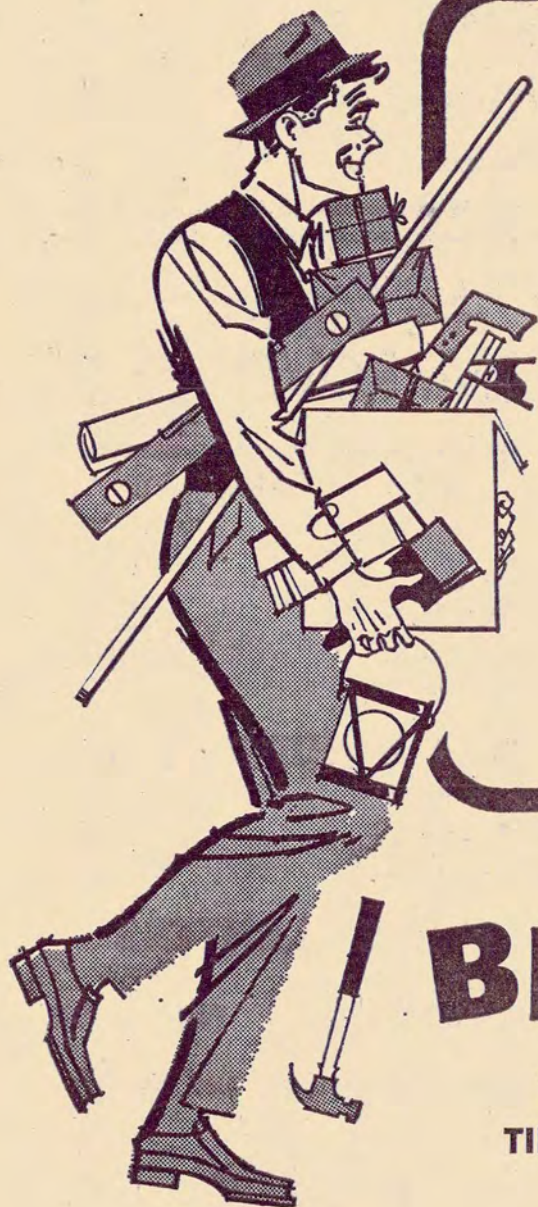

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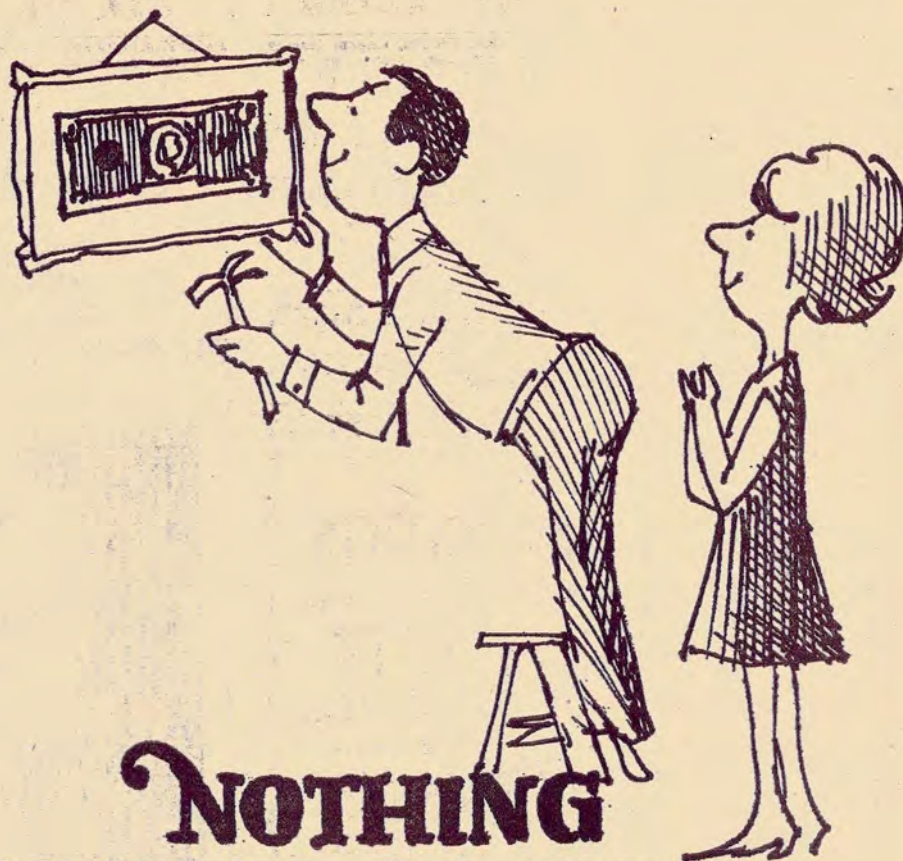
