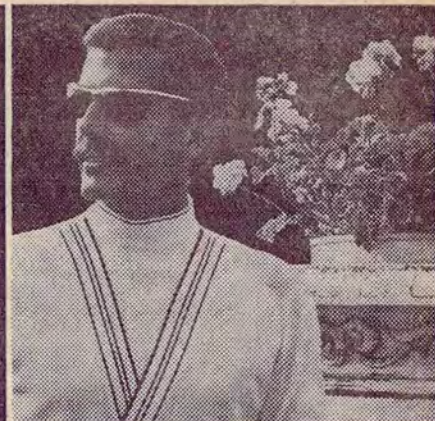

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"The Trojan Women" by St. Thomas, Kate Players

The Trojan Women is the story of the fate of the civilians who remain after the fall and destruction of Troy. The play concentrates on the women and children of this city.

Miss Mabel Meta Frey, chairman of CSC's speech and drama department, and director of this play, comments that "Euripides was the first Greek playwright to have women and children in his plays. In *The Trojan Women* it is the women who carry the dramatic impact of the play."

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Indian Lore On Cubs Agenda

Indian Lore, one of the most popular Cub Scout program themes, is scheduled for the month of March, according to Roy Hawkinson, Scout commissioner of the Indianhead Council, Boy Scouts of America.

In the 12 county area, 298 Cub Scout packs will include Indian crafts, games, arts, dances, costumes, and stories, as well as the study of specific tribes in their weekly den meetings. The monthly pack meeting of each pack, which is sponsored by a religious, civic, school, or other community group, will be a ceremonial night featuring a program related to Indian life and Indian-type ceremonies for the presentation of

advancement awards.

"The most important part of the Indian Lore theme," Hawkinson explained, "is that the things the Cub Scouts will do will be authentic and 'not just playing Indian.'"

The older Boy Scouts in March will follow the theme Emergency Preparedness, with the month's highlight being Scouts to the Rescue, Hawkinson said.

Activities that troops may include in their weekly meetings will be related to an emergency-feeding project and to troop and patrol mobilizations and equipment.

In addition to the basic troop program, many troops will also schedule training to earn the national "Prepared" troop citation, hold a parents' night to discuss summer camp plans, continue snow removal from around fire hydrants, and take part in a wild game feeding project, Hawkinson said.

Good Friday Symphony

The Minnesota Orchestra, conducted by Stanislaw Skrowaczewski, will present a Good Friday performance of Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 2, the "Resurrection," at 8:30 p.m. on April 4 at Northrop Auditorium. The work has been played by the Orchestra only twice before in its history—in 1934 under the baton of Eugene Ormandy, and in 1954 under Antal Dorati.

Guest soloists for the performance will be American soprano Helen Boatwright and Swedish contralto Birgit Finnila. The Orchestra will also be assisted by the 80-voice Chorale of the Colleges of St. Catherine and St. Thomas, directed by Earl Norwood.

Soviet cellist Mstislav Rostropovich, widely considered one of the world's greatest cellists, will appear as guest artist with the Minnesota Orchestra at Northrop Auditorium in twin concerts at 8 p.m. on Thursday, April 10, and 8:30 p.m. on Friday, April 11, under the baton of Stanislaw Skrowaczewski.

The concerts will also feature an appearance by the University of Minnesota Brass Band, directed by Frank Benciscutto, assisting the Orchestra in a performance of Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture.

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Gov. LeVander Asks Post Office To Issue Special Stamp Marking Anniversary Of Fort Snelling

Gov. Harold LeVander has officially presented Minnesota's request for a Fort Snelling commemorative stamp to the U.S. Post Office Department.

The stamp would be issued about Sept. 10, 1970, and would mark Fort Snelling's 150th anniversary.

Gov. LeVander made the request of the Post Office Department, and also presented to Postmaster General Winton Blount and President Richard Nixon, a special limited edition booklet outlining the reasons for a Fort Snelling stamp.

The booklet was prepared by a committee appointed by the governor last year. It contains a reproduction of the first known Fort Snelling postmark, drawings of the fort, a suggested stamp design featuring Fort Snelling's famous Hexagonal Tower, and other data.

It was pointed out to the Post Office Department that the establishment of Fort Snelling marked the beginning of Modern Civilization in much of the Northwest. As such, it is considered appropriate that a commemorative stamp be issued.

The stamp would become part of a special Fort Snelling anniversary observance planned for Minnesota in 1970. As another part of the anniversary, the state is restoring as much of the old fort's buildings as is possible.

Members of the governor's committee working toward issuance of the stamp are: Floyd Risvold of Edina, chairman; Wayne Hassell of St. Paul, secretary; Arthur W. Thom, Falcon Heights; Lester G. Brookman, Francis Meisch and Les Kouba, Minneapolis; and State Sen. William Kirchner of Richfield.

All committee members, except Kouba, are stamp collectors. Kouba has designed two U.S. duck stamps. Meisch drew the suggested design contained in the booklet presented to the Post Office Department.

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SCHOOLS ANNOUNCE SCHEDULES FOR 1969-70 KINDERGARTEN ROUND-UP

Kindergarten round-ups will be held in St. Paul's 61 public elementary schools throughout the month of April, co-sponsored by the city's PTA organizations. Parents whose preschoolers will be five years old on or before November 1, 1969, should be alert to round-up days in their areas.

At the round-ups parents will be able to get acquainted with school staff members and find out what preparations need to be made for fall registration. "Let's Start Them Healthy," the theme of this year's round-ups, gives a clue to the kinds of information parents will want to have assembled for fall registration.

While round-ups do not replace fall registration, they help to avoid delays at that time through getting the right kinds of physical and dental examinations scheduled during the summer months. Parents will be

able to pick up health history and examination forms, dental cards, and emergency cards at the round-ups.

Kindergarten teachers will discuss ways to help children to be best prepared personally to make the first year in school a happy experience.

With two exceptions, round-ups will take place at neighborhood schools. For children of the Ericsson School district, the round-up will be held at the V.F.W. Hall on Payne Avenue. For children of the McKinley School district, round-ups will be at the schools which now enroll their older brothers and sisters. 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Bids Advertised On St. Thomas Facility

Federal authorization was received here to advertise for bids to build a three million dollar classroom and faculty office building on the College of St. Thomas campus, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Terrence J. Murphy, president, announced.

The bid call will be made public immediately. Monsignor Murphy said. Bids received will be opened on April 18, according to present plans, and construction contracts will be awarded on April 21.

The five-story building, designed by Haarstick Lundgren and Associates, Inc., St. Paul, is expected to cost in excess of \$3,013,665. A federal grant and loan, totaling \$2,188,524, has been authorized and is complemented by a gift of the required balance.

I. A. O'Shaughnessy, St. Paul philanthropist and long-time benefactor of the college, made the gift covering the college's commitment to the total cost of construction. Mr. O'Shaughnessy is a St. Thomas alumnus and a member of its Board of Trustees.

Due for completion before September, 1970, the new building was characterized by Monsignor Murphy as a "college in miniature." It will house, in addition to offices, a 628-seat auditorium, divisible into three separate lecture rooms; a Learning Center, including an Audio-Visual studio, recorded tape library and service center, listening rooms and booths; the college's Management Center and its library; foreign language department facilities including six electronic classrooms, and facilities for social science departments.

Covering 104,187 square feet, the building will be totally air conditioned and will connect with the O'Shaughnessy Library and Murray Hall student center by tunnels.

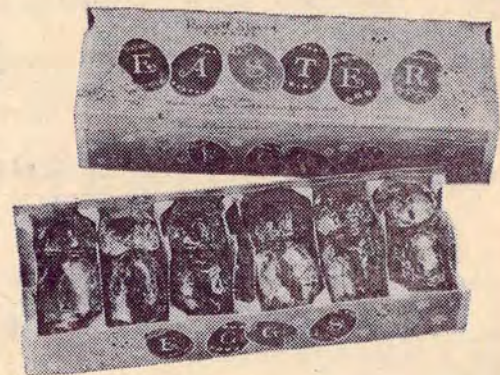

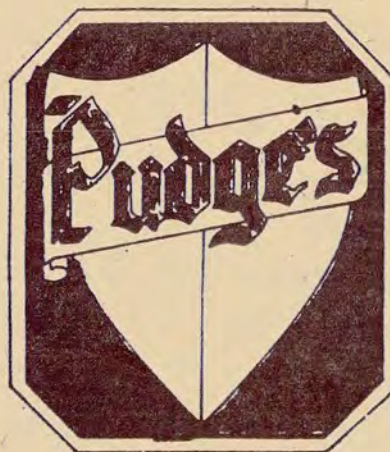

VA NEWS

The Veterans Administration reminded Minnesota veterans today that VA benefits are generally tax exempt and need not be reported as income on federal or state income tax returns.

Except for interest earned on GI insurance dividends left on deposit with VA (which is a reportable item), all proceeds from GI insurance policies are tax exempt, according to John R. Murphy, Manager, VA Center, St. Paul.

Other major items of income that need not be reported include educational assistance allowances, pension and compensation payments, subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees and grants for special automobiles and "wheel-chair" homes for the severely disabled, he said.

Murphy said all benefits to surviving dependents of deceased veterans and compensation allowances for dependents of disabled veterans are also tax exempt.

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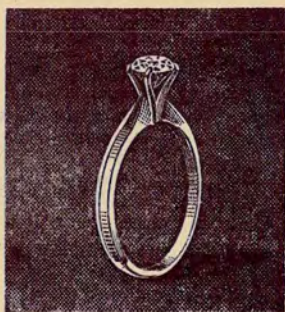

5. Rather cross and will bite when awakened from a sound sleep.

8. Likes people for friends. Would bite at first but can trust us now because we are nice to him.
9. Enjoys sunlight and warmth.

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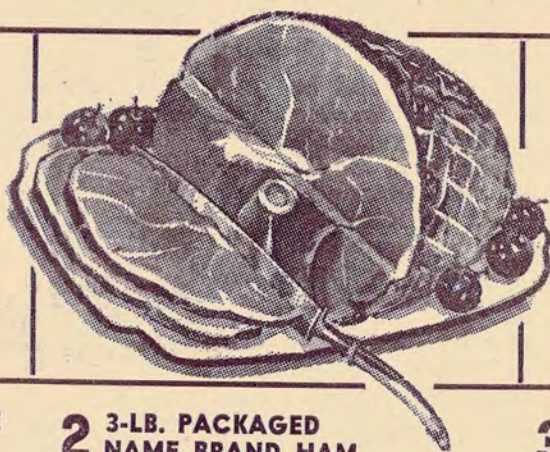
