St. Joseph's Home For Children



A FEW YEARS AGO St. Joseph's Orphanage, 1458 Randolph, changed the name to St. Joseph's Home for Children. This event signaled the change in the type of work that the Benedictine Sisters are doing. They are now caring for children who are not necessarily orphans — (because of the newly formed adoption methods there are very few orphans left in America). Most of the children come from disrupted homes.

The Home is licensed for fifty children ranging in age from five to 15. Placement is on a temporary basis and is usually done to facilitate rehabilitation of the home and in the meantime provide a living for the children as near to that of a normal child as possible.

St. Joseph's became a reality in 1877 when the Benedictine nuns sacrificed hard work and long hours to get it started. Many problems faced the Board of Directors, but with the help of charitable people, the dream was realized.

Some years ago it became necessary to apply to the Community Chest for financial assistance. Subsequently this help has been a

great factor in meeting the obligations of the institution.

The Sisters no longer have charge of the placement except in an advisory capacity. The placement work has been taken over by caseworkers who do preliminary studies to determine the need and adjustment factors of the individual child.

The Home is licensed by the State Department of Public Welfare which conducts inspections and consultations regularly.

The children enjoy many privileges such as attendance at picnics, ball games, movies and parties sponsored by various organizations that regularly sponsor

Home activities. School is attended outside the Home in order that each child become integrated with his age group.

The present Home was constructed in 1900 in the then open fields on the end of the Snelling car line. The original home was downtown. Since 1877 over 3600 orphans and children from disrupted homes have been processed and rehabilitated by the home.

Does Sleeping Posture Effect Walking Habits?

I have heard only one lecture that touched upon this subject. It was the opinion of this authority that there has been an increase of cases of pigeon toes and splay foot (like a duck) since it has become popular to train babies to sleep on their stomachs. The speaker pointed out that animals that are anatomically similar to humans sleep on their sides.

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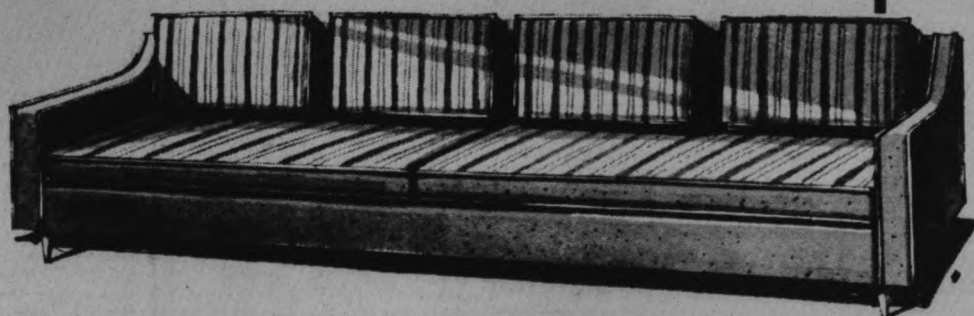

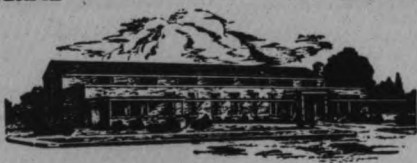

Former Tacoma Symphony Conductor Appointed St. Paul Civic Philharmonic Society Director

Leopold Sipe, conductor of the College of Puget Sound-Tacoma Symphony has been appointed music director and conductor of St. Paul Civic Philharmonic Society. In this capacity, Mr. Sipe will direct all four phases of the Society's program for the coming year. These include the formation of a professional Chamber Orchestra, the continuance of the St. Paul Civic Orchestra as an outlet for amateur and professional musicians, the establishment of an area Youth Orchestra and the organization of Music In the Classrooms for small professional ensembles working with the public, parochial and private schools. The programs are designed to supplement the work of existing music organizations in the Twin Cities area.

The announcement was made by Lawrence Platt, Jr., president of the Society, following a meeting of the board of directors.

Mr. Sipe is a graduate of Davidson College and received his Master's degree from Eastman School of Music. He also attended Julliard School of Music and studied conducting under Pierre Monteux. While at Eastman he played in the first violin section of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra.

He subsequently became director of the Charlotte Opera Association and the Charlotte Chamber Orchestra. The latter group toured the Carolinas under the auspices of Community Concerts. In addition he was first violinist of a professional string quartet which gave an annual series of nine concerts.

In 1956, Mr. Sipe was appointed conductor of the College of Puget Sound-Tacoma Symphony. In addition to his duties with the symphony, Mr. Sipe organized the Northwest String Quartet, was conductor of the College of Puget Sound Chamber Orchestra, founded the Tacoma Youth Orchestra, and served on the college faculty.

This past summer Mr. Sipe was one of 25 conductors in Europe and the United States who were selected to participate in the International Conductors Seminar in Holland, sponsored by the Netherlands government. During the two month period, he worked with three major symphony orchestras and two chamber orchestras.

Mr. Sipe, his wife and daughter expect to move here this month.

The DAV Commander urged civic groups, women's clubs and other organizations to contribute their time on the day of the drive.
