Indianhead Council Boy Scouts of America Presents "58" Show

On Friday and Saturday, May 23 and 24, the St. Paul Auditorium will be the scene of intense activity as the Cubs, Scouts, and Explorers of the Indianhead Council, Boy Scouts of America, present their 1958 Scout Centennial-O-Rama Show.

Among the events of this show, which incidentally, is recognizing the Minnesota Centennial Year, will be a pageant by the Explorer Scouts depicting the history of Minnesota, another by the Boy Scouts, which will include Minnesota of the present and its industries and activities, both vacation land and outdoor activities, as well as a parade of the various Merit Badges of the Boy Scout Program.

The Cub Scouts will depict Minnesota of the future with hundreds of flying saucers, rocket ships, and a portrayal of their ideas of activities and equipment of the citizens of 2058.

The Cubs will also conduct an attack on the moon which will be guarded by moon men and their fantastic costumes. The attackers will approach by rockets, flying saucers and other space travel equipment, wearing space helmets, oxygen tanks and special ray guns. This promises to be the highlights of the show.

Performances of this annual event by the Scouts themselves will be on Friday evening, May 23, at 8:00 p.m., Saturday matinee at 2:00 p.m., and evening performance on Saturday at 8:00 p.m. All Scouts in the Council have been busy selling tickets for these performances to their family, friends and neighbors at 50c per person.

The show is open to the general public, and tickets are available at the box office at the Auditorium the days of the show.

VFW Post 1636 to Observe Memorial Day for 25th Year

Steiner-Nairn Post 1636, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, will observe Memorial Day at the flagpole on Edgumbe Blvd. just east of Hamline Ave. at 9:00 a.m. Friday, May 30.

The members of the post and auxiliary have been assembling at the site every Memorial Day since 1933 when the memorial marker and flag pole were acquired by the post.

A bronze plaque attached to the granite monument in 1937 reads: "Dedicated in memory of the heroic dead who sacrificed their lives in the wars of the United States of America. Erected by Steiner-Nairn Post No. 1636 Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States and Ladies Auxiliary A.D. 1937."

The plaque was stolen or destroyed by vandals between May 30, 1953 and May 30, 1954 and never recovered. Commander Sidney K. Schmuckler has set the replacement of this plaque as a major goal of the post and we hope to announce the rededication in the near future.

Our membership is open to any honorably discharged veteran of World War I and II or the Korean conflict.

Assisting in the Memorial Day observance will be the Raymond Smith Post 2609 Veterans of Foreign Wars. Commander John Simmer, his staff of officers and members of the post and auxiliary.

St. Thomas Adds Four Courses to Summer Session

Four special courses were added this week to the Summer Session at the College of St. Thomas. They bring to 104 the total number of classes which will be conducted.

The additions are for high school students or college freshmen who are deficient in the fields of English and math.

Fundamentals of English will give emphasis to grammar, spelling, punctuation, vocabulary building. It is designed to enable high school seniors or freshmen faced with college composition courses to strengthen their background for fall work.

For students needing additional algebra for college physical science classes, or commerce algebra for students in business and the social sciences, two special math courses are available during the summer.

Other features of the St. Thomas expanded session are eleven music courses and fourteen graduate courses in the Master of Education programs. No college department has fewer than two summer courses. The special Institute for High School Teachers in biology and mathematics, with free tuition made possible by a special grant of the Hill family Foundation, was closed this week with full registration.

All classes scheduled will be taught, regardless of enrollment size. Registration is June 16. The summer session ends August 8.

Military Awards day at the College of St. Thomas will be held Monday at 10:30 a.m. in O'Shaughnessy stadium. Eighteen awards for outstanding scholastic and military achievement will be made to members of the College Air Force ROTC detachment. Six hundred students are in the detachment.

Macalester Senior Wins Harvard Grant

Henry Ruf, Macalester college senior from Wausau, Wis., who will graduate in June, has just been notified by Harvard university that he is winner of a Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation scholarship.

Ruf will enter Harvard in September to take graduate work in logic and philosophical analysis. The Woodrow Wilson scholarship will pay his tuition and living expenses for the first year of his graduate study. It is valued at \$2200.

At Macalester, Ruf will graduate with majors in philosophy and political science.

He has outstanding accomplishments in oratory, debate and drama. He won the Minnesota intercollegiate oratory championship in 1956, won the national Pi Kappa Delta contest in oratory in 1957, won the WCTU state speaking championship in 1956 and won the Macalester Stringer oratorical contest in both 1956 and 1957. He was named number two debater in the nation in 1956.

German-American Folk Festival at Minnehaha Sunday

A German-American Folk Festival will be held on Sunday, May 25, 1958, at Minnehaha Park. The principal speaker will be Count Friedrich Graf von Saurma, famous Missile expert and special assistant to Dr. Wernher von Braun.

A 500 voice Chorus will sing German Folk Songs and in addition, the Concord Male Chorus of New Ulm will perform.

Schell's old time German Band also of New Ulm, along with gymnastic exhibition by the St. Paul Turners and German Folk dances in colorful costumes will round out the day's festivities. A soccer game between the Twin City German Soccer Clubs will conclude the program. Everybody is cordially invited.

10 Scholarship Winners Choose Macalester

Ten high school seniors from the midwest who have just won National Merit scholarships have chosen Macalester college and will enter there in September.

Virginia Anderson, 1761 Gulden Place, St. Paul, is among the winners.

The scholarships are awarded by the National Merit Corporation. It is a non-profit corporation comprised of American industrial organizations which is giving \$20.5 million for college scholarships.

The Merit scholarships range in value from \$100 to more than \$2,000, with the average about \$650, for one year. The scholarships are renewable yearly, depending upon the student's grade-point average.

The program also includes outdoor inspection by the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president of the College, and Rev. Donald J. Gormley, registrar. Scheduled is a review and, at 11:30, crack drill competition in the armory by AFOTC squads from St. Olaf, the University of Minnesota, South Dakota State College of A & M, and St. Thomas.

Cadet First Lieutenant Richard J. Latshaw, Flight Commander, junior of 304 E. 25th Ave., Mpls., Minn., will receive the Chicago Tribune Silver Medal.

Cadet Major Joseph P. Summers, 883 Linwood Ave., St. Paul, Minn., junior Wing Adjutant, will receive the Chicago Tribune Silver Medal.

The "Minnesota Private College Hour," which is seen over the Twin Cities area educational television station, KTCA, will expand its program schedule with the beginning of the new academic year in September. The announcement was made today by the Rt. Reverend Monseigneur Baldwin Dworschak, president of St. John's University in Collegeville and newly elected president of the Minnesota Private College Council, following a meeting of the presidents of all fourteen participating colleges.

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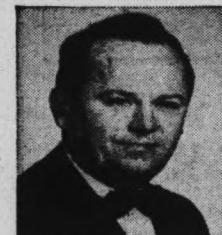
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HRA Urges Parents to Join And Combat Juvenile Delinquency

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Don't Lose Payments By Not Filing for Disability Freeze

Are you losing your social security protection by failing to file an application for a disability freeze? It isn't too late according to Palmer Elder, District Manager of the St. Paul Social Security Office if you act before July 1, 1958.

Severely disabled persons, who have been unable to work for a prolonged period, risk losing their future rights to disability benefits at 50, old-age benefits, and benefits for their survivors. By filing promptly Elder said, their social security records may be frozen as of the date they became unable to work. This will protect their future payments and the amounts payable.

TO QUALIFY for this "freeze" a person must have worked under social security at least 5 years out of the 10 preceding his disability including at least one and a half years out of the 3 year period before his disability began. Also, it must be established by medical evidence that his condition is so severe it prevents him from substantial gainful employment or self-employment and that it is expected to continue for an indefinite period. The disability may be of any nature but must have existed for six months or more.

If you are disabled, protect yourself and your family by immediately getting in touch with our social security office at 406 Post Office and Custom House, St. Paul. A free pamphlet, OASI-29, is available which explains the disability provisions in the social security law.

Your Dental Health

(Following is the twenty-seventh in a series of articles on "Your Dental Health" being presented by The Highland Villager in cooperation with the American Dental Association. Today, new dental materials.)

When your dentist selects a filling material for the cavity in your tooth he must answer a number of questions in his own mind:

Will the material shrink or expand afterwards? Will it be dissolved by mouth fluids? Will it resist the Forces of chewing? Will it resist the wearing action of opposing teeth? Is it susceptible to fracture? Is it injurious to tissues? Can the material be carved? Is it pleasing in appearance?

Dentistry has not yet found the ideal restorative material that fulfills all these requisites, but it is getting closer.

Porcelain, a modification of high grade china, is one of the most beautiful dental materials. It can be blended with pigments that imitate natural tooth colors. But porcelain is fragile and therefore its use is limited largely to front teeth where qualities of color and appearance are important.

Silver amalgam is the most commonly used filling material. It is an alloy consisting of about 50 per cent mercury, 35 per cent silver and 15 per cent other metals.

Gold is the workhorse of dentistry. It qualifies in every way except in esthetics. It has strength, affords accuracy in restoration and is durable. It does not expand or shrink significantly. It resists wear. The gold inlay is especially popular. This filling is made in the laboratory after a wax pattern is molded. Thus, the patient's time in the chair is lessened.

For the last several years, acrylic resins, plastics used to make bomber noses and furniture, have been used increasingly in dentistry. While still too new to determine its ultimate place in dentistry, plastic material has many advantages. It can be blended into almost any shade or color. It can be molded into any shape or form. It is not fragile. It is esthetically pleasing.

The unanswered questions on acrylic resins are how to control their high expansion when heated by hot foods and drinks, (the resins expand and contract 7 or 8 times as much as the tooth) how well will they withstand wear and how long will they maintain their color after they have been formed.

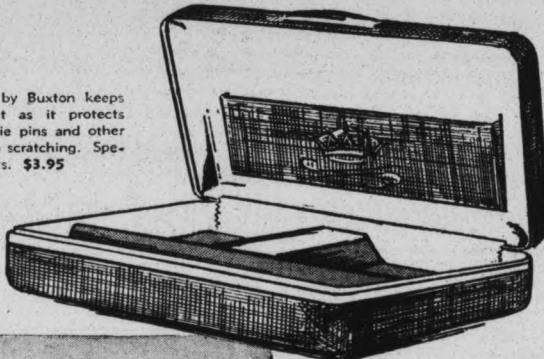
