Dr. Harvey Mitchell Rice Named Macalester President

Macalester college has named Dr. Harvey Mitchell Rice, 51, Buffalo, N. Y., for its next president, to take office July 1, Dr. Arnold H. Lowe, Macalester board of trustees chairman, announced.

Dr. Rice currently is president of New York State University College for Teachers, Buffalo, N. Y., a position he has held since 1951. He will succeed Dr. Charles J. Turck, who resigned after serving Macalester 19 years.

Dr. Lowe said: "We selected Dr. Rice from more than 300 applicants. The committee on selection was unanimous in naming Dr. Rice as its number one choice. Our good fortune is that the man we wanted most, our first choice, accepted."

The Buffalo, N. Y. educator is a Presbyterian and a Republican. He was born in Mora, W. Virginia, Jan. 10, 1907. He received his A. B. degree in 1929 from Concord State Teachers college, Athens, W. Virginia; his M. A. degree in 1933 from West Virginia university. He received the PH. D. degree in history in 1938 from Ohio State university. Dr. Rice married Dorothy Dillard, Aug. 8, 1936. They have two sons, John, 17, and Bryan, 14.

Dr. Rice came up through a series of high school teaching positions in West Virginia. He became instructor in history at Ohio State university, 1938-43, and served as professor of history at New York College for Teachers, Albany, N. Y., 1943-47.

In 1947 he was named president of Oswego State Teachers college, N. Y., and held that position until 1951 when he took the Buffalo post.

Dr. Rice is a member of the board of Christian education of the Presbyterian church in the USA, Philadelphia. He is a member of the executive committee, American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, is a member of the American Association of School administrators and of

Disabled Children Receive Social Security Benefits

"A year ago the Social Security Administration first began paying benefits to disabled children over the age of 18," Palmer Elder, Manager of the St. Paul social security office said today.

"While the number of applications filed on behalf of disabled children is small compared to the number filed on behalf of children under 18, the benefits payable to disabled children will in most cases provide a permanent measure of security since they will usually continue as long as the child lives. Benefits to children under 18 who are not disabled," Elder pointed out, "end when the child becomes 18."

These benefits are payable to children of retired workers receiving social security benefits and those of deceased workers who were insured under social security at the time of death. The child must be totally and permanently disabled from a condition which resulted in disability before the age of 18, and must have been dependent on the parent, stepparent or adopting parent.

New Library Building to Rise at St. Thomas

(Preparatory work has started on the site of the new three-story, million-dollar library to be built at St. Thomas College. The following article about it is adapted from The Aquin, College paper.)

The new library will be erected in collegiate Gothic architectural style. It will be situated at the eastern side of the present quadrangle. Similar to present buildings, it will be faced with Manakato limestone.

Special features of the basement will be a complete audio visual department, a small auditorium adaptable for TV production, and a study hall.

FIRST FLOOR FACILITIES will include a reserve reading room, a browsing room containing books of general cultural interest, faculty lounge, and a Newman library room containing a special collection of Newman's writings and critical work.

The second floor will contain li-

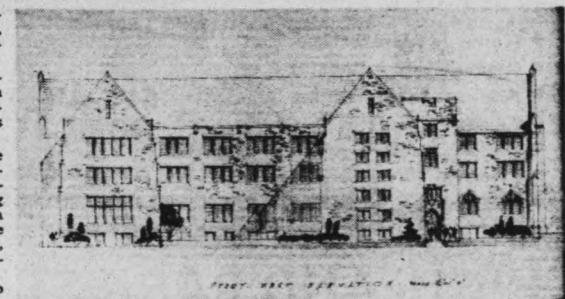
brary offices, archives department, general reference room, main circulation desk and listening rooms.

Third floor facilities will include seminar rooms, education curriculum laboratory, conference rooms, general work rooms and a gallery.

In all, the new library will be able to house a collection of 140,000 volumes, exclusive of reference works. There will be seating accommodations for 500. Although the library will not follow the current trend of open stacks, ready access to the stacks by permission will be available.

THE SPACE GIVEN to audio visual accepts and anticipates the trend toward increased use of those materials used in, and supplementary to, classroom work.

The chairman of the committee which planned the structure is Leonard J. Rogge, librarian at the College from 1932 to 1946, and



presently director of physical plant operations.

The building is a gift of Mr. and Mrs. I. A. O'Shaughnessy to the College on the occasion of Father Shannon's installation.

MR. O'SHAUGHNESSY, a 1906 graduate of St. Thomas, is the president of Globe Oil and Refining Company. He is a member of the College board of trustees.

Speech Contest Winner Will Get Trip

A statewide high school speech contest has been announced in connection with creation of a statue of Maria L. Sanford, Minnesota educator, whose likeness will be placed in Statuary Hall in the nation's Capitol.

Miss Evelyn Raymond of Minneapolis is working on a statue of Miss Sanford, one-time University of Minnesota professor who became known as "Minnesota's 'Apostle of Culture.'"

The Minnesota Federation of Women's Clubs, with cooperation of the Centennial Maria L. Sanford Committee, the State Department of Education and the State Contest Committee of the Minnesota Association of Secondary Schools, is conducting the speech contest.

Unveiling

Purpose is to find a 10, 11 or 12th grade student to recite the Marie Sanford "Apostrophe to the Flag" when the statue is unveiled in Washington. Miss Sanford delivered her "Apostrophe to the Flag" at the opening of the Daughters of the American Revolution congress in Washington the night before she died in 1920.

Mrs. Kermit V. Haugan, (7421 Lyndale Avenue South) Richfield, MFWC president, said each school will hold its own contest and 10 district winners will be named to compete in finals in the Twin Cities at a date before the close of the current school year. The winner will be chosen on a basis

Cancer Detection Program Is Subject of Meeting

The executive director of a leading scientific and medical organization will be the principal speaker at the cancer educational luncheon in the Hotel Lowry on February 17. He is Ralph A. Rohweder of Chicago, executive secretary for the National Society for Medical Research.

The society is a specialized public relations organization created and supported by the medical colleges and numerous medical and scientific groups, including the American Cancer society, the American Heart association, the American Medical society, the Army, Navy and Air Force. Major function is to build public understanding of the methods and needs of medical research.

Mr. Rohweder has traveled extensively throughout the world. He pilots his own airplane and will fly here for the luncheon.

He will discuss the work of his organization to further the medical research which some day is expected to wipe out cancer.

His father, Arthur V. Rohweder of Duluth, president of the Minnesota Safety Council, is a cured cancer patient.

The luncheon will mark the opening of an intensive program to interest all persons working in industry and business in learning the symptoms of cancer in time for early detection and cure.

The Twin Cities area is one of five to serve as a guide for a nation-wide project.

The St. Paul project is headed by William C. Figge, president of Theo. Hamm Brewing Co.

The project here is sponsored by the Ramsey county unit of the American Cancer society.

Senior Catholic Girls Can Apply For Scholarships

Scholarships with a total value of \$10,000 will be awarded by the Saint Paul Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women in a competitive scholarship program designed to assist high school senior Catholic girls in obtaining a college education to become a teacher.

It is an endeavor to provide more and better qualified lay teachers for the parochial schools of the Saint Paul Archdiocese. Scholarships are awarded on the basis of scholastic standing, aptitude and need.

In announcing the scholarships for the 1958 fall semester, Mrs. Charles L. Hayes, scholarship chairman, said "Under this program which was inaugurated four years ago, fifteen students have graduated and are teaching, and thirty more students are currently attending college.

The scholarships are open to Catholic girls from any accredited high school in the United States providing they teach for one or more years in this Archdiocese. Education students now in college who are having financial problems, may also apply. Students have a choice of three colleges, St. Catherine in St. Paul, St. Benedict in St. Joseph and
