Precinct caucuses to convene February 28

Precinct caucuses of the three legally-recognized political parties in Minnesota—American, Democratic Farmer Labor, and Independent-Republican—will be held at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 28.

Precinct caucuses, the smallest political unit, are convened every two years to pick precinct leaders and support candidates and issues.

Anyone who is at least 18 years old by November 7, 1978 and who generally agrees with the party's principles is eligible to participate in the party's caucus in the precinct

Final community meeting set to review plans for Groveland gym

Following the completion of minor design modifications to accommodate the needs of handicapped persons, plans for the Groveland School joint-use recreational facility and gymnasium are now ready for review by the community.

According to Groveland Playground Booster Club president Jerry Tschida, representatives from the St. Paul School Board, Mayor Latimer's office, the St.

Paul Department of Community Services, and Windsor/Faricy Architects will be on hand this Thursday, February 16 for a final community meeting to discuss the architectural plans.

The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. in the Groveland School auditorium, 2045 St. Clair Ave.

Construction of the 9500 square foot facility, which will be attached to the north wall of the present school building, is due to begin in the spring, according to Larry Hagemeyer, chairman of the Building Committee.



**Lecture series set on
noted Minnesota women**

Ed. note: The first lecture in the following story is included for those who receive their Villager already Tuesday, February 14.

Author Abigail McCarthy will open a series of four lectures on distinguished Minnesota women at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, February 14 in St. Joseph Hall at the College of St. Catherine.

McCarthy's talk will focus on Jane Grey Swisshelm, St. Cloud's controversial 19th century newspaper editor. Denounced by her political enemies as a "strong-minded woman who deserted a husband," Swisshelm attained national prominence by her outspoken support of abolition and women's rights.

The three other lectures in the series will be given on consecutive Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m. at St. Catherine's. The series will be introduced by Sr. Karen Kennelly, professor of history and academic dean at St. Catherine's.

Educator Maria Sanford will be the topic of the second lecture on February 21. Geraldine Schofield, former University of Minnesota English instructor, will review Sanford's career as a teacher and public lecturer.

Labor activist Eva McDonald Valesh will be discussed by Rhoda Gilman, Minnesota Historical Society supervisor of research, on March 1. Gilman will analyze Valesh's role in Minnesota's Populist past and her efforts to blend the causes of women's rights with economic and social justice for the working classes.

Fanny Brin, crusader for world peace, will be the subject of the final lecture, which will be given by Barbara Stuhler on March 7. Stuhler, an associate dean of continuing education at the U of M, will discuss Brin's commitment to pacifism and her leadership in the National Council of Jewish Women.

The lecture series, which is free and open to the public, is sponsored by the Minnesota History Learning Center at the Minnesota Historical Society, in cooperation with the College of St. Catherine.





MISCH- MASCHE

This time around I hope to mix my pitches, keep loose, touch a lot of bases and possibly wind up close to home. After all, Spring training is just around the corner... doesn't that justify a little baseball terminology? And make you feel like Winter won't be able to keep us in the cooler very much longer?

Of course, from Thursday through Monday, you've got President's Day Sales all over the lot, which should heat up the local action considerably.

First, some capsule comment on the political scene around the state. How'd you like that fast move by Humphrey the younger, when he 'skipped' the Third District Congressional race in favor of a statewide battle for the Attorney-General's position. Must have been a bit unnerving for those who were already in the fray... but it came off as a clear signal to all the senatorial hopefuls that Muriel really isn't going to test the electorate on her own, this Summer and Fall. Accepted practice, at least, seems to be only one prize per family in any single contest.

Naturally, all the speculation on the Attorney-General's job centers around Warren Spannaus and his likely appointment to a federal judgeship when the expected expansion in those ranks takes place. But let me lay this on you... and you're not going to find out where the idea came from. Just say a 'usually reliable source':

Suppose Rudy Perpich, the Guv, finds out—as the legislative session progresses—that the job is no longer his first luv. After all, he hasn't really committed himself—beyond the point of recall—to go for the four-year stint. He may find working with the legislature, on what now has to be considered HIS program, a little like pulling teeth—and feel he'd rather be an ex-governor, on the range pulling teeth. Then, after the shock waves had ebbed to just a ripple, wouldn't you look for Spannaus to apply for that top spot on the state ticket? It would probably be his for the asking... and about the only way to avoid a DFL free-for-all. Plus, it would cut the appointee incumbent list down from four to two. So much for "original," speculative thinking!

Bob Johnson, who spent a dozen years in the state legislature representing many of us hereabouts, opened his gubernatorial campaign offices last week... a little later than Quie and Durenberger, who may now be considered to be 1-2 for the spot in I-R ranks. But nobody will deny that taxes will be a central, if not THE central issue in the upcoming campaign. And anybody that's served with him, will acknowledge Bob's savvy in the realm of taxes. When he says we should reduce them by at least \$250,000,000 in order to become properly competitive for job-growth, attraction and retention of industry, I'm inclined to listen.

Bob also advocates amending the state constitution to allow citizens to place important policy questions on the ballot. Initiative and referendum are, of course, the real ultimate in citizen participation. But you don't think for a moment our legislature would hazard such a large voice from the people, do you?

Who knows what would happen if the citizens of this state could speak out on major questions... like taxes and expenditures. It might shake the rafters (of a domed stadium?) much like the great big furore in California, where more than enough people (1,500,000) signed a petition for stringent limitations on taxes, to be voted on in June. There the citizens now hold a very large club... forcing Jerry Brown and company to unload much of that three-billion dollar, inflation-fed surplus they now enjoy. Will it take something like that to get our tax overload corrected in Minnesota?

Still closer to home. Let's credit Rosalie Butler with at least a get-out-the-vote assist, when she filed as an Independent. Only real contest on the April ballot... unless the Gay Rights question gets on and creates a storm. I see nothing gained—at this point—in having that issue come up for a vote. Perhaps Archbishop Roach's statement was helpful in diffusing an issue which really needn't be a subject of our front-and-center attention.

In the primary, the only hot seat is Seat "A," where the DFL failed to endorse. Maddox has enough labor blessing, and possibly also money, to make it tough on the other contenders. What happened to John Rowland? He fell short of endorsement, and when the field in Seat "A" got too crowded, he just withdrew.

Fortunately, we have some school board races to make voting at least a little more interesting. For a two-year term, Catherine Piccolo (a near miss last time) is challenging recent appointee and DFL-Labor endorsee Wayne Wittman. They should run 1-2, or more likely 2-1, respectively.

Incumbents Barrette, Griffin and Weber will be challenged by Kathleen Vellenga and Dan Bostrom, plus a ringer trading on a name. But that will be in the April election. So you see there is still reason to go to the polls... even if you're a Republican!

For Republicans certainly won't find much in the way of party candidates when they pull the voting lever... no Republican mayoral candidate, and only one primary contest for Council (B) where three have filed. Two other spots (D & E) have a single GOP candidate, while four spots are totally unrepresented on the ticket. I guess I'd have to applaud the wisdom of the GOP in not even trying to field more candidates in the city election at this time. Why waste money when it can be put to better use where the opportunities for victory are apparently greater. The partisan politics forced on us by the DFL-dominated legislature is working for them, far better than they could ever have hoped. Maybe we'll have to split the DFL... to get a semblance of two-party competition once again.

Remember the old days when government expenditures were based on whether the cost-benefit ratio made the investment worthwhile? Now the first question one has to ask is whether there's Federal money available for the project.

But let's get a little more local, as I promised in the very beginning of this hit-and-missile epistle. How about the progress being made on the various district plans in St. Paul?

District 13 seems further along than most of the areas within the Villager distribution area. That's primarily the Merriam Park area, Lexington-Hamline, and parts in-between up to University Avenue. Among the main theses was a statement that private reinvestment should be the basis for keeping District 13's 70-year-old neighborhoods in good functioning condition for another 70 years.

Here in deference to space, are seven of the 14 main points made in their recommendations:

- * THE SELBY AVENUE DESIGN AND USE STUDY should determine how to improve business and make the mixture of land uses more harmonious.
- * SELBY AVENUE SHOULD BE REOPENED BY REHABILITATING THE EXISTING BRIDGE, not by constructing a new one.
- * THE SHORT LINE ROAD SHOULD NOT BE UPGRADED into a major traffic route.
- * THE RAILROAD BRIDGE OVER SNELLING AVENUE north of Marshall avenue should be rebuilt.
- * DUNNING FIELD SHOULD BE REDESIGNED to meet the needs of the neighborhood and the college (Concordia).
- * ALDINE PLAYGROUND IMPROVEMENTS—long delayed due to Short Line extension plans—should not proceed as soon as possible.
- * THE NEIGHBORHOOD COMMERCIAL AREAS need off-street parking and improvements in image.

District 14, which includes the Macalester-Groveland-Raldolph Heights, is pretty well finished, too, with its district plan. The area goes from Summit to Randolph and from the Short Line to the River. Let me select a few of their principal proposals:

- * Develop a comprehensive parking plan to resolve problems, with more off-street spaces all along Grand Avenue.
- * Increase park, playground and open space within district as land becomes available (the committee felt school closings may provide such opportunities.)
- * Localize Jefferson Avenue so as to become a neighborhood street (that may prove to be less than a total unanimous proposal).
- * Install 'basket weave' stop signs program throughout the district (to slow traffic in residential areas).
- * Begin mini-bus or dime zone fare along Grand Avenue.
- * Joint use gymnasium facilities onto Groveland School (now in the hopper).
- * Assess need for, plan and construct a multi-service community center. (Also via some closed elementary school?)

Next time we'll try to cover District 15, the area south of Randolph along the River to the 35E freeway cut and, if we can get some input from the Summit-Hill District, we'll cover some highpoints of their efforts, too.

In the meantime, if you're interested in what's going to be happening on both sides of the Mississippi, come to the District 15 meeting in St. Joseph's Hall on the campus of the College of St. Catherine next Tuesday night, Feb. 21. Unless you've already taken advantage of the sessions on the plan drafted for St. Paul's Mississippi River Corridor, held this past Monday night at the College of St. Thomas or Tuesday night at 360 Colborne... the School Administration Building. According to the Citizen's League, St. Paul has moved fastest in its planning, and is the first community to have completed a draft river corridor plan for submission to the City Council.

Plans for a "Great River Road" project were first conceived in 1938 but delayed until 1973, when funds were

He founded St. Thomas Academy in 1885 and was responsible for bringing the Christian Brothers to St. Paul in 1871. Captains for the alumni

teams are: Joe Sturdivant (STA '48), Bill Manley (C '48); Jack Hoffner and Jerry Thomas (STA '53), Doc Dolan and Jim McNeely (C '53); Bill Helfman (STA '58), Terry Cummings (C '58); Jerry Sturdivant and John O'Connell (STA '63), Dick Stoffel (C '63); Gary Armstrong (STA '68), Jack Tamble (C '68); Bill Malchow (STA '73), and Ted Smith (C '73).



finally authorized. It's a 70% federal - 30% local proposition, I understand. Well, like I was saying, there's nothing quite like federal funds to move a project along. But while the original concept was to build a major thoroughfare along the entire length of the Mississippi, the plan has now changed significantly, with the road currently envisioned as a recreational link utilizing existing highways.

Apparently the federal money will hasten river corridor improvements that we'd all like to see made... and, I guess we may as well go along with the system while the flavor lasts. I picked up a copy of the book which details the plan from Rick Wiederhorn of the City's Department of Planning and Economic Development. There are lots of nice goodies in there, but I'll just tease you with one... a residential recommendation, quote: "Existing single family detached residential will be continued along Mississippi River Boulevard. At the Ford Parkway intersection medium/high density residential development will occur within a mixed use area." (Should be a great view.)

Here's one tidbit I picked up from the Citizens's League CL News, and that will have to serve as our close: "The City of Minneapolis will contribute to the picturesque quality of the area by re-cobbling Main St. with the help of federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) funds."

Parting thought: I wonder what the cost will be, and whether it would ever even be considered without federal largesse!







St. Thomas College to grapple for MIAC wrestling crown Saturday

Athletic teams at the College of St. Thomas have captured 94 Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference team championships over the league's 58 years, more than any other conference school.

The Toms have won 16 baseball and tennis titles, 13 hockey crowns, ten football and basketball championships and have finished at the top of the league in cross country, soccer, swimming and track at least twice each.

But there is one trophy that has never graced O'Shaughnessy Hall's display cases. Since 1948, when wrestling became an MIAC sport, the Toms have been unable to capture a conference mat title.

In 1953, the CST grapplers fell one place shy in a six-team conference tournament, coming away with runnerup honors. Noncontender status was bestowed on the Toms for the next 23 years, until last season when St. Thomas finished a surprising second to conference champion Augsburg.

The architect of the Toms' sudden upswing, CST head wrestling coach Dr. Tim Morrissey, 1784 Sargent Ave., has taken his squad one step farther this year. The CST wrestlers find themselves with an impressive 12-3 dual meet record, and squarely in the midst of a four-team battle for the conference title.

Morrissey points to Augsburg, Concordia, St. John's and his own squad as the teams to be reckoned with when the conference meets to crown a champion Saturday, February 18 in Moorhead.

Morrissey has two defending MIAC champions to guide his team in search of St. Thomas' first wrestling title.

Junior Mark Gerlach, 2005 Marshall Ave., a Cretin graduate, was the conference's top performer at 118 pounds last year. Some off-season growing and regular sessions in the CST weight room dictated a move to the 126-pound class this winter, but Gerlach's 17-1 record has Morrissey convinced that his former

will occur at 150 pounds where Morrissey has his third captain, Charlie DeVetter. Runnerup in his class last season, DeVetter will battle in what his coach calls "the toughest weight class in the tournament."

Also a runnerup in his weight class last year, John Zeuli will take a shot at the top spot in the 134-pound class. Zeuli carries a 15-1 match record for this season and is undefeated in conference action.

Dan Feely, a graduate at St. Thomas Academy and son of CST basketball coach Tom Feely, will fill in for Gerlach at 118 when the Toms head north. Freshman Steve Wright will wrestle at 142, and sophomore Mark Heitkamp will represent the Toms at 167. Rapidly-improving heavyweight Mike Kramer, now 14-4-2 on the season, is expected to bring home points in his weight class.

Ron Biersdorff and Tom Winkels will decide who will see action at 177, while Dave Heitkamp and Todd Nelson will do battle for the right to wrestle at 190 pounds.

Raider star will be stronger at the higher weight. Gerlach is one of the team's tri-captains this year.

Returning to defend his 158-pound conference title is tri-captain Kevin McNamer, the Toms' most valuable wrestler last season. McNamer's unblemished 14-0 match record marks him as a strong favorite going into the conference meet.

A critical battle in deciding the MIAC team ti-

talking out of school

After talking about school board bi-partisanship in our last column, we felt it only appropriate that we practice what we preached.

Consequently, we decided to split the two major political parties between the two of us. The following report comes from Talking Out of School's Democrat:

One of the purposes of the recent Democratic convention was to endorse candidates for the school board.

By 7:00 p.m. (11 hours after the convention doors opened), two school board candidates had been endorsed; two more endorsements were still needed. It was getting late and many delegates were leaving; a quorum would soon be lost.

The Fourth District Chairperson then urged the delegates to suspend the rules of the convention and take a voice vote to endorse the two candidates who had the most votes on the previous written ballot.

Instead, the delegates voted to operate within the rules, even though it meant no endorsement for the two seats on the board.

This responsible action by the delegates was consistent with earlier action taken on educational resolutions in which the two worst resolutions were either amended or rejected.

The outcome of the convention presents this community with a chance to build a coalition interested in electing candidates committed to schools and children rather than political expediency.

Let's hope that the community will do so, and that DFL Party leaders will not try to trump up some kind of endorsement that makes a mockery out of the process by which the rank and file chose to abide.

WHAT'S GOOD?

Esther Kellogg, that's what's good, say the parents at Highland Park Senior High School.

Involved in educational and community concerns within the Hi-Gro-Mac area for many years, Esther is being specifically lauded for her performance as the parent representative from Highland Senior and as the parent chairperson of the district-wide committee on improving student behavior in the secondary schools.

Area residents may remember that it was Highland Junior High parents, students, and staff that appealed to the school board two years ago to create a district-wide committee charged with finding ways of improving student behavior in the secondary schools.

The committee, under the leadership of Dr. David Frye, principal of Highland Senior, and Jim Toscano, area resident and parent, developed a behavior handbook for all secondary schools in St. Paul.

The school board, after a bit of prodding, finally adopted the handbook which is now being used.

Under Esther's leadership as parent chairperson, the committee has recommended, and the board has adopted, a plan to deal with the problems of truancy, as well as a student multi-purpose card. This card would be used as an activity card, a bus pass, or an identification card.

All of these accomplishments would seem to indicate a job well done by both Esther and the committee. Unfortunately, not everyone feels the same.

The last school board agenda carried a request for dissolution of the committee. Alerted to this (at 4:00 p.m. the day of the meeting), Esther appeared at the meeting and successfully argued for continuation of the committee.

Interestingly enough, no one will say who asked to have this item placed on the agenda.

We understand that the assault on the committee will continue in the future, and that there may be an attempt to do away with the student behavior handbook.

We have a hard time understanding how anyone can be against requiring all students to behave in a manner which allows everyone to learn.

John Curran said: "The condition upon which God hath given liberty to man is eternal vigilance." It now appears that the condition under which the school district will require appropriate behavior is through the eternal vigilance of parents.

Talking Out of School salutes Esther Kellogg and the Student Behavior Committee of the Secondary Schools. We hope their vigilance will continue unimpeded.



HOW TO ... Buy Tender Beef

LOOK AT THE COLOR


The color of the beef you buy should be a bright red to dark red in color. This color tells you that the meat is juicy and will give you very little shrinkage and a lot of satisfaction.

MARBLING INDICATES FLAVOR

Marbling, or the thin threads of fat that run thru the red meat, contributes to flavor. The higher the amount of marbling, the more flavorful the cut of meat.

LOOK AT THE OUTSIDE FAT LAYER

The fat layer around the cut of beef is left there to insure tender cooking. When you buy a good cut of beef the fat should be firm and creamy white.



Village profile:

Diane Hammill and her dancing pen

When a woman does a "man's work," it isn't news any more; female truck drivers, auto mechanics or hockey coaches are hardly cause for comment. But when a 20th century woman takes on the task of a 8th century monk, that's news.

Today, in the Twin Cities alone, over 200 women cloister themselves at home for hours at a time to write painstaking prose or poetry with a chisel point felt tip pen, poised at a 15-degree angle. Diane Hammill, 186 So. Fairview Ave., is one of them.


Sunlight was pouring through the window onto a giant-sized desktop the day I visited her in her private scriptorium. In one corner of the room were bottles of India ink, a collection of pen-filled pots, and a jar of pure gold leaf. On a wall was a motto any monk from the Middle Ages could have lived with: "Accuracy is better than haste," it said in a script called "Chancery Cursive." On another wall was a message written in Pre-Carolingian Miniscule (no relation to Grocery-List Scrawl). Far from monastic, this one had a flavor better suited to a Women's Libber: "Ruts often deepend into graves," it warned.

How did I come to be here in this haven for handwriting? It was all the result of having gone to the College of St. Thomas to see "Dance of the Pen," an exhibition of calligraphy that proves penmanship is indeed an art when in creative hands.

The show, on view now through February 23 in Murray Hall at St. Thomas, is the second annual exhibition of a group of artists of which two-thirds happen to be women. The group was founded by Jo White, 1605 Summit Ave., who teaches calligraphy at the Minneapolis College of Art and Design. In April, 1975, she put a notice in Twin Cities newspapers announcing a meeting for anyone interested in calligraphy. To her surprise, 235 pen practitioners turned out and became charter members of Colleagues of Calligraphy. The works of more than 50 of them are now on display at St. Thomas.

Before attending the show, I consulted my dictionary and found out that the Greek prefix, "calli," means beauty. (No longer will I call my morning exercises callisthenics.) When I got to the show, the ornate lettering I expected to find was there, but I hadn't counted on the great individuality expressed in each artist's work. When I commented on this to Sally Brill, publicity chairperson for the event, she assured me that even the early monastic writings were distinct from one another. According to her, paleontologists have been able to detect the day one scribe retired and the next one took over.

It doesn't take a handwriting specialist to notice the individuality exhibited in Dance of the Pen, however, because each work of art is more than pretty print. Two of the works I admired most—"Child" and another called "Voice of the Silent"—were done by Diane Hammill.

I studied the works more closely, wondering how the art might reveal the personality of the artist. Not that I put any stock in graphologists' abilities to read personalities from handwriting, you understand. Diane's works were a lot more than mere handwriting.

Each of her works was direct and straightforward, suggesting a good deal of self-confidence. The ornamentation of each suggested a love of nature and a willingness to take extraordinary pains with delicate details. The messages in both works were the words of an Indian mystic, Rabindranath Tagore.

Diane graciously consented to an interview, and I had a chance to compare my speculations with reality.

I arrived at her home shortly after 9:00 on a -30 Celsius morning. I was still shivering from the ride over, but Diane's cheeks were somehow redder than mine. I later learned that while I'd been doing my 8:30 "klutzithenics," she'd been gliding up and down Summit Avenue on her cross country skis.

"Can an Orphan Annie perm and a fondness for cross-country skiing suit a mind attuned to Eastern mysticism?" I wondered, remembering Tagore's words she'd selected for one of her creations: "When the voice of the silent touches my words, I know him and therefore I know myself."

When I asked Diane about the quote, I found out that to her, though not to Tagore, the word "him" is the Him of the Christian faith. Diane, a Catholic, has an ecumenical approach about the spirit of God and is highly conscious of her own spirituality.

She attended St. Luke's Grade School, Visitation Convent and the College of St. Catherine. In fact, it was her status as an alumna of St. Kate's that gave her the chance to take up calligraphy. The college permits its graduates to audit any class, so Diane, whose B.A. was in art, sat in on Sr. Mary Judith Stoughton's course in calligraphy. Later she took a course from Minneapolis calligrapher Linda Christensen.

Diane's skill continued to develop, and soon she felt it was time she could and should pass it on to others. She then joined the guiding end of the pen in adult education courses at Groveland Elementary, Highland Junior, and the Jewish Community Center.

Meanwhile the public's familiarity with the art of calligraphy was growing, and word soon spread that Diane would do all-occasion cards, invitations, wedding announcements, certificates, favorite poems and sayings, etc., all for 25 cents a word.

First her brother, Fred, asked her to do a banner for his California community newspaper; Groveland School then asked for a logo for its community education newsletters; Columbia Transit needed stationery and Christmas cards; North America Liturgy Services wanted lyrics for a Christmas record jacket; McGuire's restaurant needed a poster... and so it went until Diane realized her hobby had become a business. Not a very lucrative one to be sure, but one well-suited to a lifestyle that makes plenty of room for three other main concerns—her husband, Patrick, and daughters Lisa, 13, and Julie, 11.

The tribute to childhood that Diane rendered as one of her works in Dance of the Pen suggested the charming personalities I found in her two children. And the strength, spirituality and willingness to take great pains that I noticed in her art all turned out to be reliable intimations of the kind of person Diane Hammill is—to her husband, to her children, and to just a casual acquaintance like me.

Report from the House

Tax time again. I thought it might be beneficial to point out some of the changes that have occurred concerning property taxes.

Prior to 1977, your home was assessed at 25% of the first \$13,000 of its limited market value, and at 40% of the remainder over \$13,000. In 1978 your home is assessed at 22% of the first \$15,000 and 36% of the remainder over \$15,000. In 1979 your home will be assessed at 20% of the first \$17,000 and 33 1/3% of the remainder over \$17,000. This assessment classification change will help offset any increase in assessed value of your home, and hopefully reduce your property tax.

The Homestead Credit, which gives you a State paid credit of up to \$325 on your property taxes when you file your Homestead Exemption form, has been maintained. This Homestead Exemption should have been recorded on your property tax statement and credited to your account. The effect of the Tax Relief Act of 1977 was that the maximum property tax credit available has been raised from \$475 to \$800. As an example of the effect of the legislation, I have listed some examples:

The importance of this data is lost if you do not file the yellow form in your State Income Tax packet to take advantage of the refund which would be sent to you by the State. I have been urging the Tax Committee to look at the possibility of having the refund actually appear as a credit on your State Income Tax returns. In other words, instead of being sent a check, you would be allowed to have the amount used as a credit against the tax to the State. Of course, if there were a refund due from the State, you would receive that refund in the existing fashion.

The problem with this is that now the refunds for all but the seniors and renters occur in a different fiscal year. At a time when our State has a surplus, we could get the credits into the proper year and thus enable us to take advantage of receiving our credit on our income tax returns in years to come. This also would probably save the State a considerable amount of paper work and costs in years to come.







In December, 1974, Tennstedt made his United States debut with the Boston Symphony Orchestra. Since then, he has appeared with most of the




Klaus Tennstedt major American and Canadian orchestras.



A Grand expansion

The sweet smell of success at Th'Rice Food School

It began with a chance encounter between two former Carleton College classmates at a Twin Cities department store several years ago.

"When I ran into Steve, we started talking about what we'd done, places we'd gone, things we still wanted to do," said Mary Rice, referring to her meeting with Steve Soderman. "Among other things, we talked about running our own store and starting a cooking school."

The store preceded the school by several years. Mary and Steve opened Th'Rice, 1086 1/2 Grand Avenue, in late 1973.

as a co-owner. The school opened less than a year ago after the store front next to Th'Rice became vacant.

"We began as a small shop with an odd collection of quilts, fabrics, dishes and cookware," said Mary. "We found as we got into the business that we should try to specialize in what we knew best. We discovered it was food-related items."

The owners soon began to drop some of their marginal merchandise and started stressing cookware and cooking utensils.

"The change was gradual," said Steve. "I doubt if the avenue could have supported a store which specialized in cookware when we started up."

According to Mary, the opening of the cooking school coincided with a greater awareness of cooking on the part of the public. She cited *Time* magazine's recent cover story as indicative of America's growing concern with the preparation of food.

She explained that the boom in junk foods, fast food outlets and TV dinners caused Americans to neglect the art of cooking. "Now we are coming to realize that while these foods might have their place, they are hardly a substitute for good home cooking," she said.

"When we started the school," Steve said, "we had a choice between directing it toward demonstration or participation. We chose participation even though you can have much larger classes if you limit yourself to demonstration. We feel the students learn better if they actually go through the process themselves."

Kate O'Donnell, one of the students in the Techniques II course, agrees. "When you do it in class yourself, you have more confidence when you go home and try to make it on your own," she said. "When I make hollandaise sauce now, I know if I'm doing it right because I know what it's supposed to look like. If you try making it from a cook book, you just don't have the same amount of confidence."

Unlike the cooking classes at the technical-

vocational institutes where students learn to cook professionally for restaurants, the instruction at Th'Rice Food School is geared toward cooking at home.

"Some of what we do might be called gourmet cooking," said Mary, "but we try to keep away from that word. It tends to scare people away and make them think it's more difficult than it really is."

The basic cooking classes are Techniques I and Techniques II. Both meet for six two-and-a-half-hour sessions. Upon completion of the basic courses, students are encouraged to begin specializing in such areas as bread-making, soups, pastries, candy-making, etc.

Mary and Martha teach the techniques classes. For the more specialized classes, they are often joined by restaurant chefs and instructors from other more traditional cooking schools.

"Some of the classes Mary and Martha conduct consist of only one three-hour session," Steve said. "The idea is to come to class, learn how to make something by doing it under the guidance of a teacher, and then go home and repeat it there."

"In fact, if a group comes in with an idea for a class that we hadn't considered, we'll try to set up a session, provided there are a minimum of six students and an instructor qualified to teach it."

Th'Rice Food School has come a long way since a small group of people came over to Mary's house to run through some recipes back in 1975.

"We think we have the ideal situation right now," said Mary. "We have the store in its original location, and the six stoves which we use to conduct the cooking classes right next door."

The name Th'Rice is a stumper for most people who stop by the store and school. If it isn't obvious to readers already, Steve will now explain it: "We wanted to have the name of one of the owners in the title. The word 'thrice,' of course, refers to three, which in this case is the three owners—Mary, Martha and myself."

From the Legislature

As we move into the 1978 legislative session, a number of issues are closer to resolution. Up to this point, most of the work has taken place in committee, so much of my time has been devoted to issues in front of the committees on which I serve.

In Criminal Justice, a bill was passed this past week which attempts to correct the ever growing problem of juvenile prostitution and would allow a court to obtain jurisdiction over those responsible for juvenile prostitution. In our Criminal Laws subcommittee, we are about to pass an extensive reformation of drunk driving laws which will hopefully strengthen enforcement and help to more effectively get drunk drivers off the road. In the Governmental Operation Committee we have begun an extensive series of hearings on the state personnel system which will lead to improvements in the present system as well as correct any abuses that might exist in state hiring practices.

The third committee I serve on is Higher Education, and I have authored a bill which corrects some problems in the registration requirements of the Higher Education Coordinating Board. The Board is required to register all schools offering degrees in an effort to protect consumers from "matchbook" schools. My bill strengthens some provisions of that law and clarifies some ambiguous sections.

I have also had the opportunity to offer several bills which correct problems brought to my attention by Highland Park residents. One bill which changes an element of the no-fault insurance law was just passed by the Financial Institutions and Insurance Committee. Several other bills await committee hearings.

To many people the legislative process can appear to be a slow and cumbersome one. With much of the work taking place in committee, a lot of what takes place is unseen by the public. However, all committee hearings and floor sessions are open to the public. I would like to extend an invitation to anyone to join me at the Capitol to observe all or part of a day of legislative activity. Please call me and I can set up a time for your convenience. 
