St. Catherine's Plans New Library With Capacity For 300,000 Volumes

Lang and Raugland, Inc., architects and engineers of Minneapolis, have been selected by the College of St. Catherine, St. Paul, to design and supervise the construction of a new library building for the college. This announcement was made today by Sister Mary William, C.S.J., college president.

The new library building, which St. Catherine's has planned, will try to embody beauty, stability and utility. It will be placed just south of the Chapel and west of St. Joseph Hall, and will pick up the flow of life and activity as it moves outwardly from the chapel to the "commons" building and thence to the lecture halls.

Highland Sketchbook . . . George Granstrom And Len Chapman

Editor's note: This is the nineteenth in a series of articles designed to acquaint our readers with members of the Highland Civic Association. Names are drawn at random from the membership roster. One SKETCH will appear in each issue of the Villager.

The Highland theatre was the first commercial building in what is presently one of the largest shopping districts in the city. The foresight of George Granstrom proved to be invaluable in its prediction of the progressive nature of the community. Today,

after many theatres have closed all over the city, the Highland theatre, built in 1936, is still offering excellent attractions at popular prices and drawing well.

Mr. Granstrom also owns the Granstrom Grandview theatre, is associated with the World theatre, and is a director of Minnesota Entertainment Enterprises.

Much of the pleasant atmosphere that has been incorporated into the Highland theatre can be attributed to its manager, Len Chapman.

Len has managed the theatre since it was established and for three years before that managed the Grandview theatre.

Both Granstrom and Chapman are Highlanders. Granstrom lives at 1749 Randolph and Chapman at 2090 Wellesly. Chapman has five children, three girls and two boys, so doesn't have much time for his favorite pastimes, golf and tennis. Granstrom travels during his spare time.

Granstrom feels that the success of the theatre business in the Highland Park community reflects the general business success of the area and he predicts a bright future in the years to come for all Highland business firms.

Bismarck Choir Tonight

The Bismarck High School Choir, Bismarck, North Dakota's Ambassador's of Good Will and consisting of 78 voices, will make its only Twin City appearance in the Jeanne d'Arc Auditorium on the College of St. Catherine campus at 8:30 p.m. this evening. There is no admission charge.

The building, to be constructed of Mankato stone, is designed for bringing readers into friendly relationship with books and creating a quiet atmosphere for study and growth of spirit. Present plans call for a seating capacity of 500 students. Space will be provided in general reading rooms, browsing rooms, individual study tables and a few carrels for students pursuing honors work.

The faculty will be provided for with the construction of 75 carrels and a faculty conference room. Other special features will include the Department of Library Science, Rare Book Room, Historical and Archives Room, Listening Room for both record and tape recordings, and Photo-Copy room.

The new library will have a maximum capacity of 300,000 volumes.

The new library will be tangible evidence that the tradition of scholarship set by the founding Sisters of St. Joseph will continue.

In making the announcement of the construction of a New Library Building, Sister Mary William stated: "The library reveals more about an institution of higher education than any other single aspect available. Almost every new college has to decide, at its beginnings, between a building and a good collection of books. Sister Antonia, St. Catherine's first president, believed that an excellent collection of books was essential to the work" (Continued on Page 5)

Rev. Robert J. Wittman Named New St. Thomas College Registrar

The Rev. Robert J. Wittman was named to the post of registrar at the College of St. Thomas effective March 6, it was announced by the Very Rev. James P. Shannon, president. Father Wittman succeeds the Rev. Donald J. Gormley who was appointed pastor of Incarnation parish in Minneapolis recently by Archbishop William O. Brady. Father Gormley succeeds the late Monsignor James H. Moynihan.

Father Wittman will also continue in his present position as director of admissions at the College. He has also served as student counselor at the school from 1949 until 1957. He was on the faculty at St. Thomas Military Academy from 1945-49.

Ordained in 1938, Father Wittman was assistant pastor at St. Columba parish in St. Paul and St. Thomas the Apostle parish in Minneapolis. He was a student at Nazareth Hall and the St. Paul Seminary.

At St. Thomas he served as veterans counselor and for 12 years was the moderator of the Mothers' Club. He is an amateur ornithologist.

Father Gormley assumed his duties this week at Incarnation parish. A tea honoring him was given by the faculty and staff members at St. Thomas, and a dinner in his honor was given by the priests on the campus.

"Father Gormley has served with devotion at the College and

Academy for the past 35 years." Father Shannon said. "His gracious manner, his personal kindness and his fine priestly example have inspired and encouraged generations of students and faculty at St. Thomas. We are grateful," Father Shannon added, "for his friendship, and we are immensely proud of the new honor accorded him by Archbishop Brady. We shall miss him very much, but we assure him our earnest prayers and best wishes in his new role as pastor of the Incarnation parish."

Two faculty announcements were also made by Father Shannon. The Rev. Marvin R. O'Connell, who has been completing graduate work at Notre Dame was named instructor in history at the College. The Rev. Terrence Murphy, who has been on leave of absence to complete work on his doctorate at Georgetown University in Washington, D. C., has returned to the political science department.

Parents of Little League candidates are urged to attend a meeting on Tuesday, March 31, at St. Leo's school at 7:30 p. m. to discuss plans for the 1959 season and register their youngsters in the program.

Any boy living within the following boundaries is eligible to play in the Highland Little League: Randolph on the North, Fairview on the East, and the Mississippi River on the West and South. Any boy who will be 8 years old on or before July 31, and not 13 years old until or after July 31 is eligible.

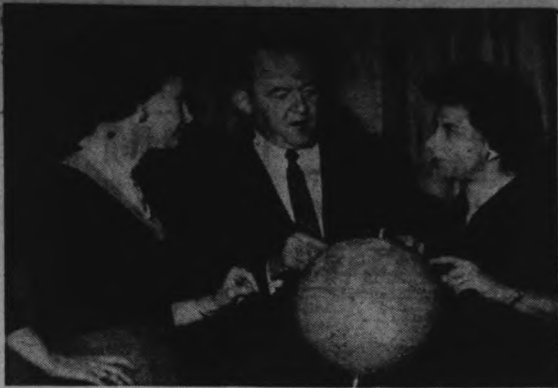

of a college and that a building to house them would come eventually. The 'eventually' has now come. It is not possible to have on hand all the money one would like to have before beginning such a project but we begin it with faith that the necessity and the excellence of the building will be both our spur and our reward for the demands made on us by our decision to build.

The estimated cost of the new library will be over \$1,000,000.

As the Sisters of St. Joseph received their education and returned to the campus they brought with them the books and research materials to which they had been introduced. Since the College campus was also their home, the books found their way into the College library. Large collections in foreign languages, particularly science and in French, German and Spanish literature have been accumulated. A recent visitor from Germany has said that the collection of German classics in the best editions is more complete at St. Catherine's library than in many a university in Europe today.

The administration officers of The College of St. Catherine have a long history of giving generous support to the library. The ratio of library expenditure to total institutional expenditure has always met the standards suggested by the Association of College and Reference Libraries, Committee on Standards. 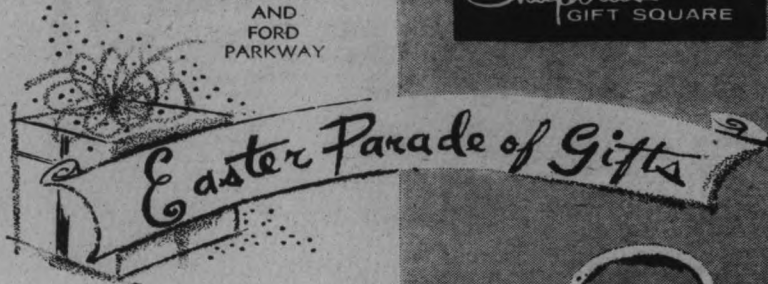
