

SENIOR CITIZEN'S HIGH RISE—at 899 S. Cleveland, as it will look when completed in October. There will be 144 one bedroom units. Total cost of the project was \$1,784,667. There are already over 1,600 applicants which will be processed according to the time they were filed—beginning with 1965. The land was donated to the City of St. Paul by the Ford Motor Company and resold to the Housing and Redevelopment Authority. Applicants must be 62 or older, show a financial need and be six month residents of the City of St. Paul. Rentals begin at \$33 per month.





League Studies Schools

St. Paul's public schools have been the focus of the local item study of the League of Women Voters of St. Paul this year, and several new conclusions have already been reached. Added to its long-standing position advocating adequate financing for the public schools, the League now favors an increase in St. Paul's bonding limits to 10% of the full and true value of all taxable property in the district. This would be the same level as other independent school districts in the state. The League also has a new position in favor of additional state aids which recognize St. Paul's special school problems, such as a high municipal tax burden, a large number of low income families, and large numbers of deprived students. For this reason, the League has been lobbying at the state legislature to encourage the passage of H.F. 1668 and S.F. 1388.

Enriching its study of the

schools, the League has scheduled a bus tour visiting a number of representative schools of all levels — elementary, junior high, high school. A bus will leave the south parking lot of Midway center at 9:15 Thursday April 24, and return about 2:30 p.m. Reservations have been handled by the League office. The tour includes a standard school lunch at Harding High school.

City Center for Learning proposals will be presented at a briefing session May 1 at the League office, 26 E. Exchange. Mrs. Roger Palmer, 445 Mt. Curve, and Mrs. Leon Goodrich 1735 Rome, are chairmen of the study committee.





'Let's Stop Helping Communism' Is Title of Lecturer's Address

Alan Stang, author, lecturer and columnist, will speak on "Let's Stop Helping Communism" April 29 at St. John's Catholic Church of Little Canada Church School Auditorium at 8 p.m.

Stang's speech will key on the subject of Western help to Communist nations. His latest book, "The Actor," traces the career of John Foster Dulles and the late diplomat's role in our foreign policy, which Stang cleams "has kept the Communists in business right from the start."

The final thrust of Stang's talk, however, centers on his views on the war in Vietnam. Stang says, "American technology, equipment, supplies and

credit keep the Communist's war alive in Vietnam—and it's high time this aid to the enemy was stopped." He adds, "If we stopped helping the Communists, the war in Vietnam would end in a few months, and Communism would begin to disappear from the face of the Earth."

Stang will provide new insight into the growing detente between our nation and the Communist bloc. He urges every American to become involved because "we're the financiers, the suppliers, and the industrial brains that Ho Chi Minh employs to kill our sons and brothers, and, as Americans, we're the only ones who can put a stop to it."

The St. Paul Area TRAIN Committee, part of a nationwide network, has been formed to Restore American Independence Now. Its immediate concerns include a prompt halt to all aid and trade to Communists, and a call for victory as a goal in Vietnam.

MPLS. MAYOR'S RACE . . .

From the looks of Gerald Hegstrom's yard signs — Dan Cohen should walk away with all the marbles. The myopic typeface and blue and yellow-green colors are hardly the "medium for the message" for a candidate whose recognition factor with the people of Minneapolis was a scant 5% prior to the current race. Cohen on the other hand racked up an impressive 75% rank in recognition. It is notable that Naftalin — a dropout — had a factor of over 90 percent. Hegstrom is the kind of candidate who comes across very well on a person to person level — as does his opponent, Cohen, but he lacks the charisma of the modern candidate in big groups, on the microphone or over the tube. If dynamics count, count Cohen in. A man by the name of Goff is laying the groundwork for Hegstrom, and HHH money and support is being committed to iron out the Minneapolis mess. The prize: reapportionment will do unto Frazer what it did unto Judd in the 71 legislature. It's no secret Cohen has his eye on the Potomac, and the Mayor's race is a "groom in." They'll (Hegstrom and Cohen) both be at the Symphony ball "Spectacle of Light" but only one will be light on his feet. It won't be Hegstrom, or Eugene McCarthy and Carl Rolvaag didn't really muck about in the Minneapolis DFL cookie jar! Cohen's only problem is the problem all GOPers face when the boys in the board room smell an easy victory. Meanwhile, the other DFL candidates in the city show a lot of pride but not much else. Bill Smith (5th Ward Black) is another candidate who was had on yard signs. His are impossible to read at all, and he is a fine candidate. He is the first DFL Negro to make a serious threat in that ward, though it is doubtful he'll pull one off this year on Greenstein who has the right hand fooling the left pretty much in the ethnic jungle of North Minneapolis. I attended a Smith fund raiser last week, and aside from gallant afro-asian fashions and good hard rock music there was little of the whiff of victory in the hall. In all, Minneapolis is turning liberal as the smart people move out and the old and poor begin to take over the city. Unfortunately, the DFL is caught with its boxing gloves on, and a political philosophy which would be plausible enough if the guy who had his hand on the rudder last trip wouldn't have been so anxious to abandon ship. (Outside St. Petersburg Fla. Mpls. has more senior citizens per capita than any other city in America.)

Cohen — down the middle seemingly — has won the respect of Labor (and why not, they can't vote DFL forever when their contemporary manifesto is: "keep what we have and don't let anybody in,") and he has a knack for saying the right thing cleverly. A good example was the recent bus fare hike. The bus fare increase is a non-issue. Cohen blasted the TCRT suggesting they could play their own slot machines in Las Vegas rather than filch nickles from Minneapolitans. Now, who doesn't like that kind of talk? The Mayor of Minneapolis has no power in the matter of bus hikes — except for the publicity he might gain in being against it. (Like the guy in California who was running for Secretary of State and got elected by being against parking meters.) The Minneapolis papers, among the most liberal in America, are against Cohen, seemingly. They, however, are accountable for his high recognition factor with the voters, since they have quoted his most quoteable quotes with regularity. That's been about four a week for three years. At any rate, the DFL in literature to its faithful are dubbing Dan a computerized, well financed, Wall Street Candidate. (Some people don't know the war is over — then there are Democrats who write newsletters who don't know the Depression's over.)
