"HIGHLAND HOLIDAYS" START TODAY

Holiday Civic Promotion Begins With 3-Day Sale; Santa Arriving on Dog Sled

Thirty-eight Highland Park business firms today opened their doors on a three-day sales celebration which marks the opening of Highland Holidays. Sponsored by the Highland Civic association, Highland Holidays will continue until Christmas and will be highlighted by special Thanksgiving and Christmas events.

Highland Park Merchants announced they have joined together to offer some of the most outstanding merchandise and service values in the six-year history of the Highland Civic association. Merchants are offering special items for the three-day kick-off event which runs through Saturday, Nov. 22nd.

Edgar Williams, Highland Civic association president, heralded Highland Holidays as a "combination civic and business celebration aimed at providing top merchandise values in a pleasant holiday shopping atmosphere."

One of the featured events will be a special appearance of Santa Claus touring business firms in the Highland shopping center area. Santa will tour the area in a genuine Alaskan dog sled pulled by five Alaskan racing Huskies starting at 1:30 p. m. on Friday, November 28.

Mrs. Mabell Hill, 2277 West Highway 36, St. Paul, owner of the dogs, will assist Santa during his three-hour appearance at Highland. A home economics teacher at Wilson high school, Mrs. Hill brought the Huskies and the sled back after spending 15 months in Alaska.

Thousands of Highland youngsters are expected to be on hand to greet Santa's arrival on the dog sled. Santa will start his tour at Ford Parkway and Kenneth street and then continue around Highland firms. Santa will distribute favors along his route.

According to Clarence Barr, vice president of the association, Santa will remain on hand at the Highland stores during most of the holiday season.

"This year will mark the first year that Santa could arrange his busy schedule so that he will be able to remain in Highland and be available for personal visits with Highland youngsters," Mr. Barr said.

Hands-Across-Border Conference at Mac

"Canadian-American Relations" is the theme of the annual Canadian-American conference which will be held at Macalester college Friday and Saturday, Nov. 21 and 22.

Twenty-four Macalester students will hold sessions with 24 students from United college, Winnipeg, Canada. The hands-across-the-border conference is one of the oldest institutions of its kind, having been started in 1940. It is alternated between the two campuses annually.

Sessions will include a discussion of the basic structure of the campus government of the two nations and the international cooperation and commonwealth status. Also to be discussed are such problems as the St. Lawrence seaway, Canadian-American defense program, and international attitudes.

Student chairman from Macalester is Brian Anderson, Red Wing, and student chairman from United college is Wally Fox-Decent, Winnipeg. Faculty chairmen for Macalester are Prof. Kenneth Holmes, Prof. Robert Goldstein and Dean J. H. Dupre.

Most of the Macalester students are members of the history department and have been preparing their materials during the past year. Macalester students will be host to the Canadian students at Coleman's restaurant, Port's restaurant, the Lowry hotel, and the Macalester cafeteria.

The book is one of the American Heritage series and has just been published by the Liberal Arts press, New, York, N. Y.

It illustrates the role of the federal convention in the formation of the American constitution. Central in the book are James Madison's Notes of Debate. To James Madison's descriptions of convention proceedings, Dr. Solberg has added materials designed to facilitate understanding of the work of the framers of the constitution.

He also puts the entire Philadelphia convention deliberations into a broader perspective. Through representative documents, he relates the federal convention to constitutional development and the formation of the union in America during the revolutionary era.

This treatment is especially from the Stamp Act congress in 1765 through ratification and adoption of the first ten amendments in 1791.

Dr. Solberg joined the Macalester faculty this fall. He came from Yale university, where he was a member of the history staff. His book has already been adopted by the history departments of Yale and the University of Chicago. It also is being used by Macalester students in history courses "Early U. S. History" and "American Thought and Civilization."

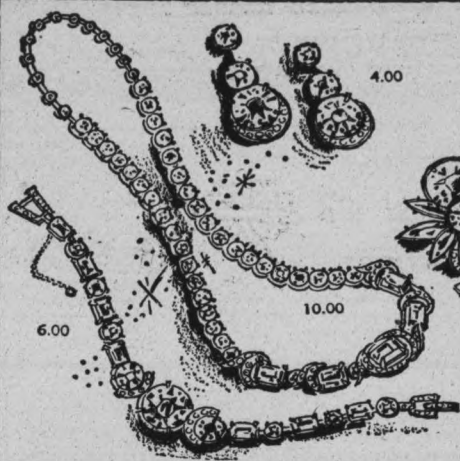

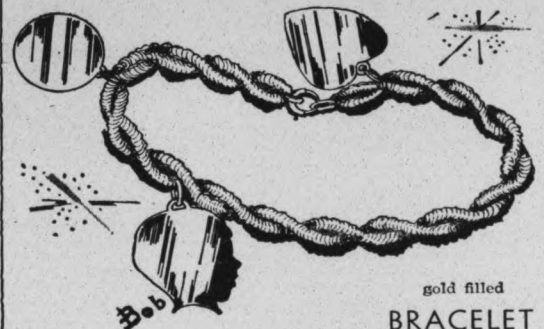

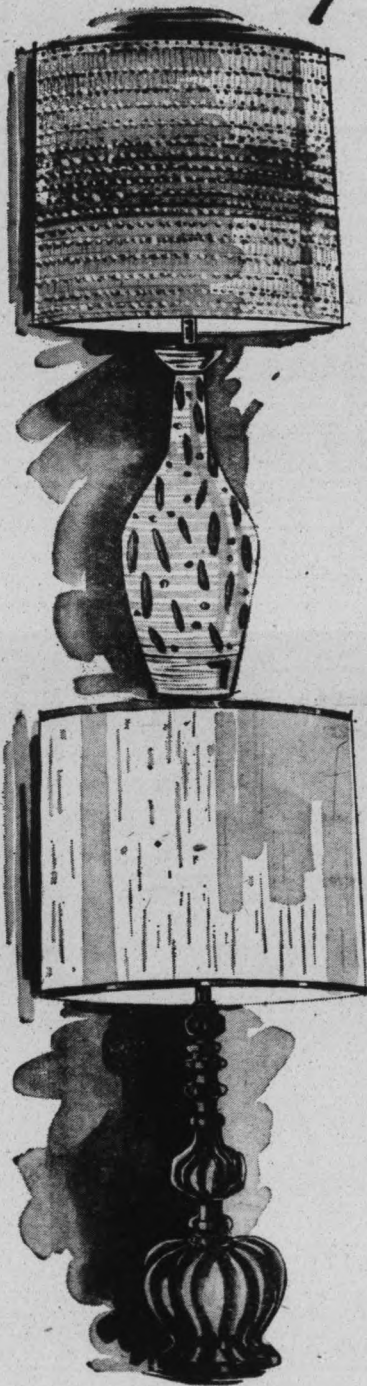

Jan Peerce, Versatile Tenor from Met In "Masterpiece" Recital November 25

Jan Peerce, leading tenor of the Metropolitan Opera, will appear in recital at Northrop Memorial Auditorium on Tuesday, November 25, for patrons of the University Artists Course "Masterpiece" Series.

The beloved American tenor, who is perhaps more versatile than any other tenor before the public today, has performed successfully in opera houses around the world, in recital, in night clubs, on film and on radio and television.

Peerce was the first Metropolitan Opera singer to appear in Russia since World War II and the first American artist ever to perform with Moscow's Bolshoi Opera, where he sang Alfredo in "Traviata" in Italian while his Russian colleagues sang in their own language. He also sang "Rigoletto" in Leningrad and "The Masked Ball" in Kiev.

In addition to his operatic performances, the tenor also has appeared with the Bach Aria Group in New York's Town Hall, the Metropolitan Museum and in a number of other cities. It was with this group that Mr. Peerce sang during the summer of 1955 at the "Casals Festival" in Prades, France, under the great Pablo Casals' direction.

This recital in Northrop will mark the tenor's first appearance here under University Artists Course auspices. He has, however, been a favorite of Upper Midwest audiences for the Metropolitan when the company has been here on tour.

St. Thomas Draws From 23 States, 5 Countries

Statistics released by the records office at the College of St. Thomas this week show that 23 states and the District of Columbia are represented by students now attending the school. In addition, 15 St. Thomas students came from five foreign countries and Guam, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico.

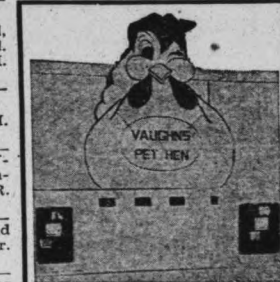
