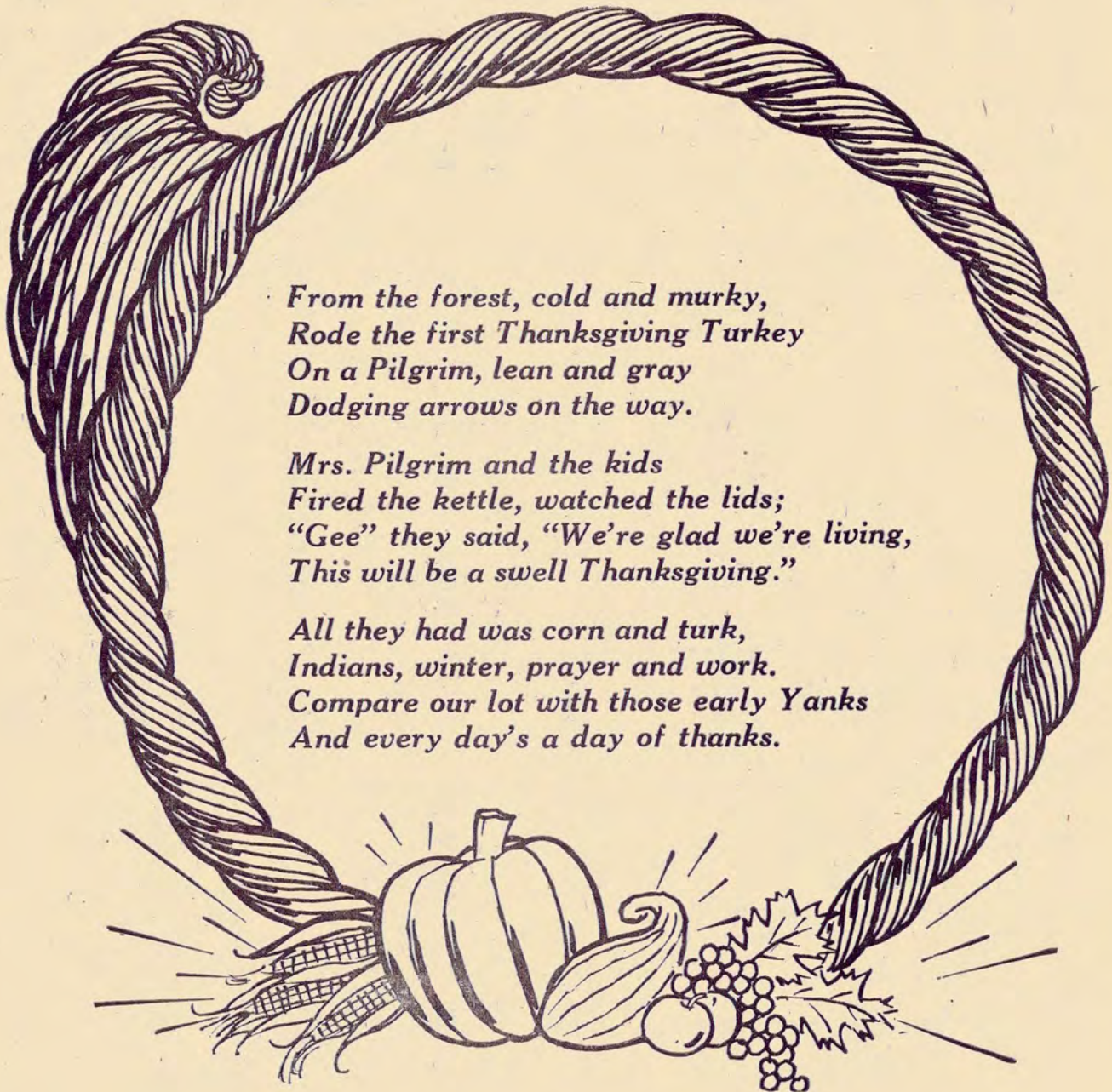

Guthrie Approves 6 Plays For 1969 Theatre Program

Six of the seven plays to be performed by the Minnesota Theatre Company during its 1969 seasons at Crawford Livingston Theatre in St. Paul and in Minneapolis' Tyrone Guthrie Theatre were approved by the board of directors of the Guthrie Theatre Foundation.

Selection of works by French, Irish, English, Russian and American playwrights—bridging four centuries of creative effort—was made by Peter Zeisler, Edward Payson Call and Mel Shapiro of the Guthrie staff.

The Alchemist by Ben Jonson, 15th century English play-

program of the parish school wright, and Ardele by contemporary Frenchman Jean Anouilh will open the eight-week St. Paul season at the Crawford Livingston Theatre in mid-April.

The Minneapolis season will open in late June. The five-play repertoire includes: Troilus and Cressida by William Shakespeare; Cockle-Doodle Dandy by Sean O'Casey; Uncle Vanya by Anton Chekhov; a new American play which cannot be announced yet because negotiations are still in progress, and another play yet to be selected.

The Tyrone Guthrie Theatre series will continue for 25 weeks, closing near the end of December after some 200 performances. The first three Minneapolis plays will premiere in July, followed at six-week intervals by opening nights for the sixth and seventh productions of the year. Performances at both houses will be given eight times per week—at 8 p.m. Monday through Saturday and at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday and Saturday.

DR. ARTHUR S. FLEMING, president of Macalester College will deliver the Sermon at the Thanksgiving Eve Service, sponsored by the Southwest St. Paul Cooperative Ministry, which will be held at St. Leo's Church, Cleveland and Bohland, Wednesday, November 27 at 8 p.m. The service will be colorful and impressive.

2 PHOTOGRAPHIC EXHIBITS SHOWING IN GOFFMAN UNION

Two photographic exhibits currently are on display in Coffman Union. They are "Children of the World," a photo display by Rohn Engh, free-lance photographer for national magazines; and a photo documentary of "The Walker-Bryant Art Workshop."

The Engh show is set up on easels in the CMU main lounge, where it will remain through Friday, Dec. 6. It shows camera glimpses of children on their way to growing up, as photographed in Africa, Europe and Central America, as well as in the United States.

Engh attended the Maryland Institute of Design in Baltimore and was a painter before taking up the camera, a medium he now uses exclusively. His work has won many prizes and awards.

"The Walker-Bryant Art Workshop" documents a summer art project for high school students primarily from inner-

city areas, conducted last July. Almost 100 students attended the workshop, which was sponsored by Walker Art Center and the Minneapolis public schools with the help of the Minnesota State Arts Council. Professional artists and teachers worked with the children, stressing new approaches and unconventional materials. Projects were in a variety of media, including large-scale sculptures and environments using light and sound.

The show was originally produced for Walker Art Center.

Federal Agencies Hiring Picks Up

Hiring by the Federal agencies throughout the state of Minnesota has begun to pick up. This was announced by Mr. Peter Bann, Executive Officer, Federal Job Center, at Fort Snelling. The new hiring criteria for all Federal agencies appears to be met and replacements were being hired during the month of October within the new limits.

Bann explained that throughout the state of Minnesota, there are 30,000 people employed by the Federal government. About 20,000 of these people are actually employed in the Twin Cities area in approximately 80 different Federal offices.

There are immediate employment opportunities for Food Service Workers, Nursing Assistants, Licensed Practical Nurses, Air Traffic Control Specialists, Engineers, and several other skilled type positions out of the State of Minnesota.

Clerk-typists, clerk-stenographers, and secretaries continue to be urgently needed in Washington, D.C. In addition the government of the District of Columbia needs policemen.

People interested in any information about Federal employment are urged to contact Center, Building 57, Fort Snelling, St. Paul, Minnesota 5111. Bann explained that the staff at the Federal Job Center is easily accessible by telephone. The number is 721-6391.

many symbolic flashbacks in order to present a continual series of time juxtapositions. The definition of space can also be utilized in many ways. A scene which may start in Scrooge's office can rapidly become a shop, home or graveyard.

Based on drawings by famous illustrators such as Searle and Cruikshank, some of the traditional 19th century costumes will be exaggerated to point up grotesque qualities of each character, for example, impossibly hunched shoulders or absurdly elongated hands which hint at character traits. False faces and wigs will heighten certain qualities. Some sequences will be mimed, using pre-recorded voices to intensify dream-like qualities of various episodes.

Bain Boehlke will create the character of Scrooge and eight-year-old Peter Schimke will enact the role of Tiny Tim.

Music performed by a live orchestra will feature a score especially composed for this production by 16-year-old Scott Crosbie, junior at Edina High School. Vocal arrangements were composed by Roberta Carlson and Scott Crosbie.

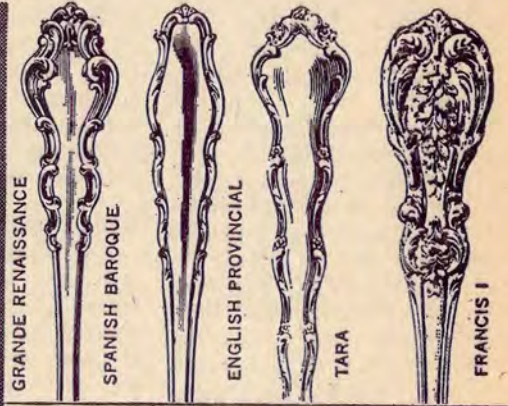

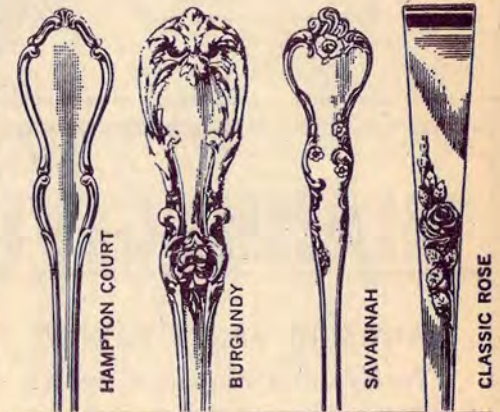

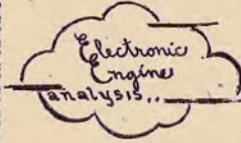
Eric Drucker plays the title role while Richard Scott plays

VA Take Strong Stand For Service-Connected Ailments

Prompt medical care for Viet-Nam veterans is a must at Veterans Administration hospitals and clinics.

Dr. Arthur J. Klippen, Director, Minneapolis VA Hospital, said that in a recent letter to directors of VA's 166 hospitals and 202 clinics, VA's Chief Medical Director Dr. H. Martin Engle stressed that veterans who develop medical problems within six months of their release from military service should be treated immediately without waiting until the veteran establishes his ailment as service-connected.

While service-connection is presumed for a six-month period, Dr. Klippen explained, beyond that the service-connection must be verified by a physical examination and comparison with military medical records.

The Director said VA hospitalization is available to all qualified veterans of active military service, but first priority is given those who need treatment

for service-caused or service-aggravated conditions. This group may also receive outpatient treatment.

Second priority for hospitalization goes to those veterans who are eligible for compensation for service-related medical conditions but who need treatment for conditions not related to their service. He said that when beds are available any war veteran who needs hospitalization may be admitted if he is financially unable to defray the cost elsewhere.

Thanksgiving Clothing Drive

Coadjutor Archbishop Leo C. Byrne today called upon all Catholics in the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis to join in the Thanksgiving Clothing Drive November 24 through 30 for the world's needy, made urgent through the suffering in Biafra, Nigeria, Vietnam, and the Middle East.

He named the Rev. George J. Freeman, archdiocesan vice-chancellor, as director of the campaign, which aims at massive donations of serviceable used clothing, blankets, bed linen, shoes, remnants, bolt goods, garden, farm, and carpenter hand tools for the poor.

He recommended the involvement of the youth in every parish in the drive so that "they will be helped to a better understanding of the world's needy people." Parish centers will be set up throughout the archdiocese for the sorting, packing,

and labeling of all contributions.

The campaign is part of the 20th national Catholic Bishops' Thanksgiving Clothing Drive which last year produced over 20 million pounds of clothing, with 344,985 pounds contributed in the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis. Donated items will be shipped overseas for distribution by Catholic Relief Services in more than 70 countries of Asia, Africa, and Latin America.

"The urgency of this year's appeal is even more poignant," said Archbishop Byrne, "when one considers the mass suffering born from the civil strife in Nigeria, Biafra, and continuing devastation in Vietnam, and the bitter aftermath of the still smoldering Middle East conflict. Through the Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, Americans can help alleviate this suffering by sharing their abundance.

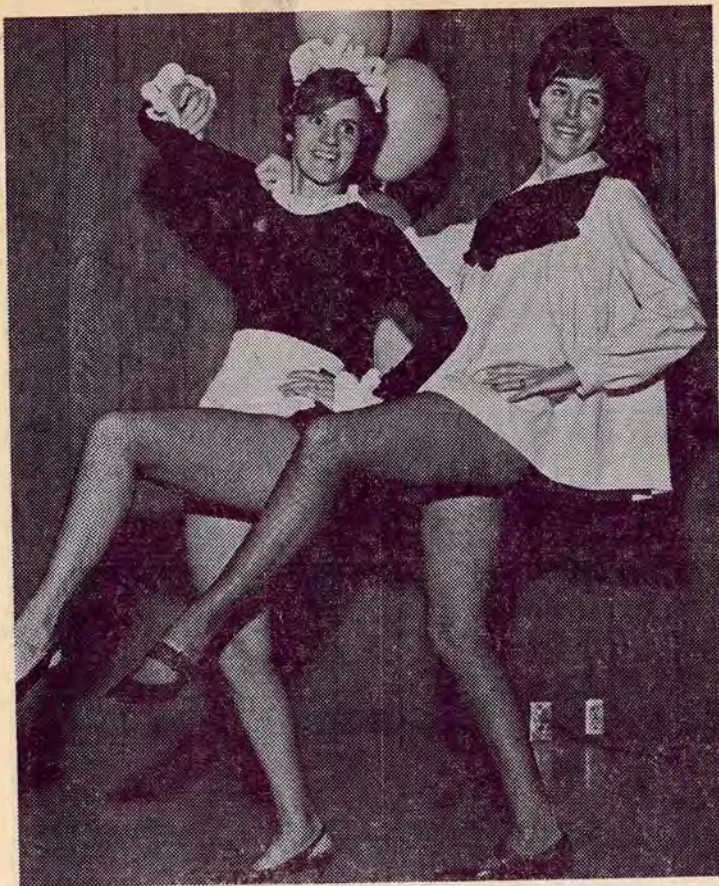

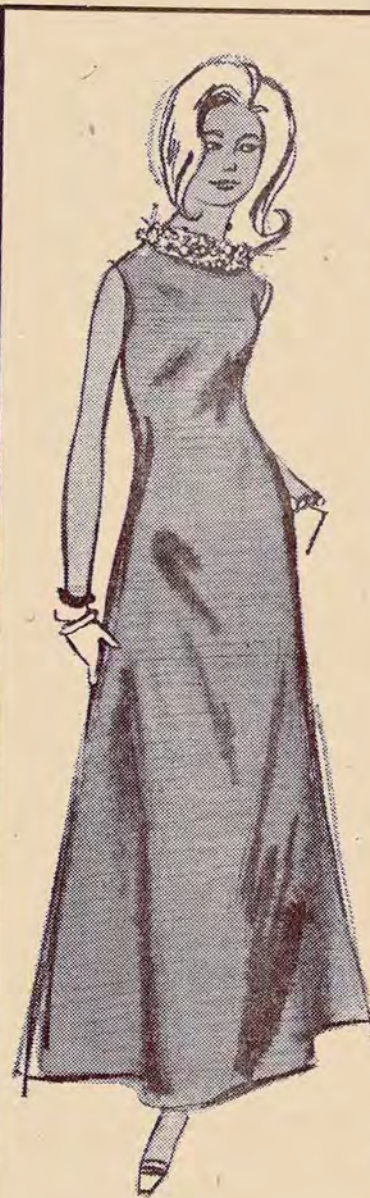

"Seal" Drive Underway

"Providing health information and services are among the top activities of our Christmas Seal organization," William F. Poppenberger, chairman of the 1968 Christmas Seal Campaign, said, as the annual campaign got underway this week for the Ramsey County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease association.

"Health information, facts, statistics and figures of many different kinds, particularly concerning the diseases of the lungs and breathing problems," he said, "are available at the offices of the TB and RD association, 614 Portland Avenue."

Besides the well-known programs of tuberculin testing of school children and x-ray serv-

ices for the general public, special rehabilitation classes are now in progress for asthmatic children and special classes for breathing improvement for adults with lung impairment convene twice a week.

The classes for asthmatic children meet on Tuesdays and Wednesdays at the Lindsay School, between 4:00 and 5:30 p.m. Children between the ages of 6 and 16, handicapped by asthma, are taught how to control asthma attacks through proper breathing.

Adults with chronic obstructive lung disease — such as emphysema, chronic bronchitis and asthma — are being helped in classes that meet twice a week at St. Paul - Ramsey Hospital.

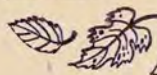
The Rev. George Freeman, archdiocesan director of the campaign, asked that young

OCTOBER STATE EMPLOYMENT HIGH

Although Minnesota's non-farm wage and salary employment in October declined seasonally from the September record-setting high of 1,276,100, the employment level last month totalled 1,267,500.

In fact, October jobs reached a high point exceeded only by the previous month, according to the monthly report on employment trends issued by the State Department of Employment Security.

Vavoulis said the increase of 41,300, or 3.4 per cent, from October 1967 follows the accelerated upward trend in Minnesota's economy which began in mid-1965. The level of non-manufacturing employment was up 27,000 from last year, as practically all major industries are, operating with a larger number of workers. Manufacturing jobs rose 14,200 during this period.

Unemployment was down to 33,200 in October, compared to 38,200 in September and 35,100 in October 1967. The unemployment rate was also down, to 2.0 per cent from 2.3 per cent the previous month, and from 2.2 per cent a year ago.

Minnesota's seasonally adjusted rate of 3.1 per cent last month compared favorably with the seasonally adjusted October

rate of 3.6 per cent for the nation, Vavoulis pointed out.

Vavoulis also reported that average weekly earnings for manufacturing production workers moved up in October because of higher hourly earnings and a slight increase in the average work week.

Average weekly earnings for October went to \$131.02 for 41.3 hours of work at \$3.18 per hour. In September, average earnings were \$124.14 for 41.5 hours at \$2.99.

Manufacturing employment declined seasonally by 9,200 from September. About 86 per cent of the decline stemmed from the canning industry. The largest employment rises during October occurred in sugar refining, with 900 workers added to process sugar beets, and in electrical machinery, which added 400 workers.

Compared to a year earlier, manufacturing industries operating at significantly higher levels of employment include textiles, up 18 per cent; electrical machinery, up 11 per cent.

Employment in nonmanufacturing industries rose by 400 jobs from September to October as seasonal gains in government and trade more than offset seasonal declines in construction, mining and public utilities.

Mali Tribe Song and Dance

Les Danseurs Africains, L'Ensemble du Mali, will offer the Twin Cities their first opportunity to see a program of song and dance staged locally that is deeply-rooted in the sacred and religious rites of the Mali tribesmen performing them, Saturday, Nov. 30 at 8:30 p.m. in Northrop Auditorium.

In most cases the different numbers will be the actual celebrations of the rituals and ceremonies of the tribe.

Before each performance members of the company perform ceremonies backstage to protect the sacred rites from the sacrilege of being performed in public view. The rites are also intended to protect tribe members from being profaned by being included on the same program with rites of other tribes.

The only concession made by the Africans to western theatre-going tradition will be to limit the program to two hours' duration. In their native Africa where no such traditions apply, performances often last for twenty hours or more, building to ear-splitting, eye-popping, mind-blowing climaxes that leave the audience as drained emotionally as the performers.

Some twenty productions will be offered on the program to be

presented here. Included will be rites and ceremonies from a dozen or more of the major tribes of the Republic of Mali world's oldest civilizations.

Some of the masks to be used who constitute some of the in dances have been in actual use by tribesmen for hundreds of years.

Social Concerns Seminar For Clergy-Laymen At Augsburg

A "Social Concerns Seminar" for clergy and laymen of congregations located in the Southeastern Minnesota District of The American Lutheran Church is being planned for Saturday, November 23, at Augsburg College in Minneapolis. The Seminar is being sponsored by the District Commission on Research and Social Action, in cooperation with the Commission on the Urban Church, the Commission on Town and Country Church Life, and the Committee on Social Service.

The Social Concerns Seminar is part of the continuing effort in the Southeastern Minnesota District, encouraging congregations to form their own Social Concerns Committees to address local, national and international issues from a Christian perspective.

The featured speaker for the Seminar, which will begin at 9 a.m. and conclude at 4 p.m., will be the Rev. Nicholas H. Holt, an Episcopal minister who is now serving as Associate Director of the Committee for One Society in Chicago. He will speak on the subject of Institutional Racism. The Committee for One Society, an affiliate of the Urban Training Center for Christian Mission, is supported by 23 cooperating Protestant, Catholic, Orthodox and Jewish denominations and agencies. The Committee for One Society, which accepts students for three, six and nine month programs, has the following purposes:

1. To analyze institutions (government, church, recreational, social, manufacturing, financial, etc.), to discover the extent to which equality of opportunity and equality of results exist, especially for black people.
2. To assess the data collected on institutions with respect to their racist mentality in practices.
3. To determine the possibilities for change within each institution.
4. To plan and implement methods of persuasion on confrontation with institutions that do not themselves initiate change.

All participants in the Seminar will have an opportunity to attend two of nine discussion group sessions on the following subjects: Organizing a Social Concerns Committee; Welfare Reform; Black and White Power; World Hunger; Poverty in America; Church Sponsorship of Housing Projects; Rural Re-

newal; Law and Order, and Police-Community Relationships; The Indian in the City.

Chairman of the Social Concerns Seminar planning Committee is Mr. William Bliss, a member of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. Staff services are provided by the Rev. Leonard E. Klippen, Assistant to the District President, Southeastern Minnesota District.

Trautwein Conducts Minnesota Orchestra

George Trautwein, associate conductor of the Minnesota Orchestra, will appear on the Northrop Auditorium podium for his first Friday evening conducting performance of the season at 8:30 p.m. on November 29. The concert will feature a solo appearance by Isidor Saslav, the Orchestra's Elbert L. Carpenter concertmaster, and also the world premiere of a new work, Symphony for Two String Orchestras, by composer Marcel Dick.

Mr. Saslav became concertmaster of the Orchestra in 1966, at the age of 28. His professional career began when he joined the Detroit Symphony as violinist at 17 years of age, one of the youngest members in the history of that organization. After six seasons with the Detroit orchestra, he accepted the position of concertmaster of the Buffalo Philharmonic where he served for two years before coming to Minneapolis.

Composer Dick has been head of the composition department of the Cleveland Institute of Music since 1948. An accomplished violinist and violist, he was principal violist in the Vienna Symphony for 13 years and held the same position with the Cleveland Orchestra for six years.

PINEHURST VS. PROGRESS

Over the years Pinehurst Ave. Homeowners and Ford Parkway Businessmen have gone to war. They are at it again. The names of the combatants have been omitted to protect the guilty.

It is difficult to view the latest "Pinehurst vs. Progress" dispute without placing one's tongue squarely in cheek. We must explain the terms: **Pinehurst** are the folks who bought houses on the street backing up Ford Parkway's busy commercial district. **Progress** is what the attorney's for the various and sundry encroachment and zoning schemes veritably bludgeon their chest cavities in the name of in their proclamations before the City Council when pleading against **Pinehurst**. **Pinehurst** generally fields a representative army—a state legislator seeking votes, a Councilman weak in the 11th Ward, a fistful of Mona-Lisa looking housewives (occasionally with babes in arms), some tough-minded pipe smoking professional men and a cluster of boy scout leaders, clergy and other tough folk to differ with. **Progress**, which has the last word at the hearing, has become more sophisticated over the years, fielding a small tactical unit patterned after the modern army concept of increased firepower and less manpower. This includes a heavy emphasis on the new weapons for conning the Council, such as elaborately designed and oriented graphic arts materials, slide presentations, recorded interviews et al. Their leader is well versed and somewhat more legalese in his conduct, hand-standing a bit and taking care of the little things which make Councilmen glow inside: like calling them "Mr. Commissioner" instead of "dunderheads" which **Pinehurst** spokesmen have been known to exclaim.

There are secret weapons of course, and it must be said in all fairness to both sides that both possess them and only use them as a last resort. The warlords of the Council, seasoned veterans all, act with impunity, in judging the winners. Communique's from the battlefield seldom tell the whole story as most of the correspondents eat with the generals (and drink with the generals.) It is a fact well-recorded in the journals and annals of Pinehurst vs. Progress warfare that **Progress** always wins. I'm afraid that any concise explanation of why will have to be left to a Churchillian effort on the part of some stronger military writer than I—perhaps SLA Marshall.

Nobody knows quite how the war started, but there is excellent intelligence to the effect that landlords in Highland Village developed a lot space for tenants without providing much parking for their customers.

But then you don't have to be a student of military affairs to know that a lot of wars have been started over a piece of land.

ELECTION . . .

The election surprised few. Nixon proved for the second time in this decade that less than half of his fellow Americans prefer his brand of leadership. His coattails regarding congressional races proved mini, and it is generally conceded that Agnew is the lightest weight to occupy the "heartbeat" slot in the postwar era. Locally, Emery Barrette discovered (if he didn't already know) that when it comes to winning the 4th Dist. Congressional seat from the entrenched DFL you need an issue. In the wake of HHH's defeat, speculation is running high that he'll come to rest in Gene McCarthy's chair. Nick Coleman, Wendy Anderson and Tom Byrne seem already to have their hats in the ring for Governor. Clark McGregor, 3rd Dist. Congressman who predicts every two years that Minnesota will have a Republican Senator in Washington has apparently recanted his turtle like neck again seeing HHH back in the picture. McGregor will be that Senator when all available

DFL candidates get food poisoning at the same bean feed, and from the duration of flight on his trial balloons, he apparently knows it. Harm Ogdahl, who tried unsuccessfully to make a scary thing out of law and order, lost—computer and all—in his bid to upset Frazer. In the State Legislature, there were few surprises, yet Jack Morris (Conservative) lost his seat in St. Anthony Park to a Methodist minister. The seat hasn't been held by a liberal since the 30's which should prove that God is not dead after all. (Note: Jack was working hard for Barrette in a professional capacity in his PR firm which might have something to do with his own defeat.) Jack and Emy Barrette and all their fellow travelers will no doubt be heard from in the 1970 Mayor's Race in St. Paul. By that time, adjustments will probably be made in the GOP County office which would augment their chances for success. The fellow travelers mentioned include some fine individuals who only need to get tough minded about their own political party to win City Hall. Bob Johnson is apparently entrenched here in 48-B as Representative: ditto, Joe O'Neill and Bob Christiansen in their Districts. We could expect Bob Johnson and Joe O'Neill to either fight over or arrange for Cliff Park's replacement when his Senate Seat comes up in 1970. Local DFLers appear something less than enamored with the Mayor's chances for re-election in 1970—especially since the public is now well aware of the fact that Mrs. Butler's arithmetic (even without a high school diploma) was apparently better than the ex-high school councillors. Crisis government continues—as it most assuredly will until realistic financing arrangements are granted by the voters. What is puzzling is the total lack of effective communication of the real problem that the Mayor is faced with. The more we hear his name mentioned as a potential Gubernatorial candidate, the more we get the impression that he is about to wash his hands of a mess. That is obviously not his intention, and can only be chalked up to some rather shoddy public relations. This problem has plagued Byrne from the beginning. His victory in the last election was lost to him, and until he realizes that his public image is in no way better because he defeated Mrs. Butler, he will find the going very difficult when he tries to sell himself into another elective office. His administration has a weak image with all but the hard core half of labor and senior citizens. Until he begins to communicate effectively, and because he is in a jam financially, he can hardly expect to parlay his fortunes. It appears Senator Nick Coleman only needs a little back room forgive and forget to make a strong bid for the Governor's race. (After McCarthy and Chicago, I wonder if anybody remembers Rolvaag and Keith, Nick?)

APE FOR AN APE . . .

Or so it would seem as Politicians cut back on Apes at Como to save money the City doesn't have. If they have to get rid of a few apes, it would seem the cutbacks wouldn't have to be confined to the zoo.

It's going to be a tough Christmas at City Hall—no free pointsettias this year either!
