Parochial Schools Open September 3 Public Schools Start September 9

One of the main occupations of childhood and youth—vacationing—will give way to another of its main businesses—studying—when grade, junior high and high school students go back to school in the next few weeks.

Parochial schools will start Tuesday, Sept. 3, the day after Labor Day. Minneapolis public schools (for the benefit of our readers west of the river) will start on Wednesday, Sept. 4. St. Paul public schools will start on Monday, Sept. 9, one week after Labor Day.

South American Bishop At Gloria Dei Sunday

Members of Gloria Dei will be joining with many other Lutherans in the world during this busy week of the Lutheran World Federation being held in Minneapolis. Delegates from the various countries are being entertained by Gloria Dei. The young people of the congregation are planning for a very busy and inspirational weekend. Dr. Bishop Bo Gieritz of Gothenburg, Sweden, spoke at morning services last Sunday and Dr. Bela Lesko of Buenos Aires, South America will speak at services this Sunday.

Buscs will take members of the congregation to the closing Festival Service at the State Capitol approach on Sunday, beginning with a Band Concert at 3 p. m.

FR. ROGER CONNOLLE, superintendent of schools for the Archdiocese of St. Paul, declared that newcomers to the city should get in touch with the school in their parish, if they have not already done so. The schools are crowded, and parents should register their children immediately if they want them to attend the parish school. Fr. Connolle explained that most first graders entering parochial schools had their physical examinations before entering public school kindergarten last year, so in most cases none is necessary now.

However, all students should have a dental check-up at least once a year. Those who are due for such check-ups should have them before school starts and get a slip from the dentist stating that the work has been done.

DR. RICHARD HANSON, assistant superintendent in charge of St. Paul elementary schools announced that the dates for kindergarten registration are as follows:

Children whose last names begin with a letter from A through H register on Monday, Sept. 9; I through R register Tuesday, Sept. 10; S through Z register Wednesday, Sept. 11.

To be eligible to enter kindergarten, a child must be five years old by December 31, 1957.

Kindergarten school sessions will begin Thursday, Sept. 12. Morning sessions at the beginning of the year will run from 9 to 11:15 a.m. Beginning Sept. 30, the morning sessions will run 15 minutes longer, from 9 to 11:30 a.m. Afternoon kindergarten sessions will be from 1:15 to 3:30 p.m.

WHEN GOING TO SCHOOL for registration, parents of kindergarten children should bring along the health record as filled out by a physician before school starts and a dental card indicating the child has visited a dentist. The Board of Education, through the Parent Teachers' Association, is also recommending that children between sixth and seventh grades—that is, those entering junior high school—should have a physical check-up before starting school.

Any child with known or suspected problems in sight or hearing should have special tests and have the necessary eye glasses or hearing aids fitted before school starts. School authorities stress the importance of good vision and hearing in the child's ability to do good school work.

STUDENTS COMING from outside St. Paul, or those moving from one school district to another can register at the school on opening day, or if they prefer, the week before school starts. (Continued on Page 12)

Tweeds, Bulkies Are Fashion News in Autumn Sportswear

An easy but neat silhouette fashioned from coarse-appearing materials in brilliant colors and 'rustic' patterns is the news in sportswear for fall.

The slim silhouette is very gently eased by deep unpressed trouser pleats or soft folds at the waist for skirts. Often they are cut on the bias to fall free but close to body lines. Pleated skirts hang straight and soft.

Sweaters, falling under the influence of the new "shaggy baggy" theme, will be neat and

slim, but with wider shoulders. Blouses and jackets will be easy-waisted with many over-blouses. Double-breasted effects and brass buttons are dominate. Rugged tweeds and heavy knits comprise the bulk of fabric news, and in a multitude of ways. Knits appear as tweeds and tweeds appear in wool, cotton, and silk as well. Shetlands, mohairs or any coarse-type fabrics will be good.

Over-sized blanket type plaids, nubbed tweeds, novelty stripes and "turn of the century" prints follow the predominant fall fashion theme of the country look. Scandinavian and Swiss patterns continue their popularity climb. The color note is rich but not loud with tone-on-tone and muted shades of brown and gold. Cider, a russet orange, and Barley and Husk, hemp shades, are new and important colors.

Sportswear manufacturers have made an effort in the opposite direction from dyed-to-match, which is still a top favorite. In almost all lines this season, there are planned coordinates that take more than one sweater or blouse. Often they go one step further, trimming the tops with skirt fabric.

Principals will be in school during that entire week.

The St. Paul Bureau of Health has ruled that all children up to 15 years of age new to St. Paul schools — either public or parochial — must have an examination for ringworm of the scalp by use of the wood lamp before admission to school. This does not apply to kindergarten children except those who come from outside the city.

Until Sept. 13 the ringworm clinic in Room 211 of the Bureau of Health in the public safety building, 101 E. 10th St., will be open Monday through Friday from 1 to 3 p.m. This service is free.

Beginning Sept. 16 the clinic will be open only Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons from 3 to 4.

A card will be issued to each child by the Bureau of Health indicating results of the scalp ringworm inspection.
