Inver Hills/Oneida to offer courses in Highland area

College level adult continuing education classes will begin the week of March 27 at six Highland area locations. Offered through the Inver Hills Community College/Oneida Education Center inner-city program. the classes are designed specifically to serve the needs of those who'd like further schooling for job advancement, a career change, or simply personal development.



Heat loss photos of Highland area homes to be on display

Aerial infra-red photographs of Highland area homes will be on display at two Grand Avenue locations during March.

The photos, which indicate the level of home heat loss experienced at about this time last year, will be interpreted for interested area residents by a specially trained team from the St. Paul Housing and Redevelopment Authority. They will also offer tips on techniques available to homeowners to conserve

The photo display is currently on view at Minnesota Federal, located at Grand and Fairview Ave. Viewing hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on March 1 and 2, and from 9:00 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on March 3.

The display will open at First Grand Avenue State Bank, 1074 Grand Ave., on March 13 and run through March 24. Viewing hours there will be from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, and from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Fridays.

Homeowners who visit the exhibition should know the amount and type of insulation in their homes, and the number of homes between theirs and the nearest intersection





Non-credit spring courses to begin at St. Catherine's

Registration for a series of spring non-credit courses is now being accepted at the College of St. Catherine, according to an announcement by its Office of Continuing Education.

The courses will be conducted one evening a week for seven or eight weeks beginning March 27, with the exception of one which will be offered on two consecutive Saturdays in April.

Offered for the first time will be Techniques for Coping with Conflict, a course designed to help participants identify conflicts in their lives.

Other courses include: Self-Understanding Through Journal Writing, Parent Effectiveness Training, and Assertiveness Training.

Building Career Plans and Skills is the course which will be taught on two Saturdays, April 8 and 15, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The instructor is Suzanne Sisson, training program manager at the University of Minnesota Hospitals. She will also teach Techniques for Coping with Conflict.

Self-Understanding Through Journal Writing will be taught by Christina Baldwin, author of the book "One to One: Self Understanding Through Journal Writing." The course will explore the use of the personal journal as a means of developing self reliance.

Parent Effectiveness Training, an educational program for parents, is open to couples and single parents.

In the Assertiveness Training course, participants will explore individual values, strengths and resources, and practice skills to improve expres-

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

Public meeting scheduled March 7 to help save remaining elm trees

What can area residents do now to help control the spread of Dutch elm disease this year?

Plenty.

Suggested actions will be explained at a public meeting for people throughout the St. Paul-Minneapolis metropolitan area at 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, March 7 in the fifth floor auditorium of the First National Bank of Minneapolis, 5th St. and 2nd Ave. So.

The meeting is sponsored by the Citizens League, a private. Twin City public affairs association. Speakers will include David W. French, University of Minnesota plant pathologist; representatives of neighborhoods which are carrying out an effective program in controlling Dutch elm disease; and representatives of the Citizens League, which recently published a report on the importance of neighborhood-city cooperation in controlling the disease.

The meeting will stress

ways a neighborhood can part of the March 7 proorganize itself.

According to the Citizens League report, if several trees on a block are afflicted with Dutch elm disease at the same time, the source of infection more than likely comes from within the neighborhood. If. such sources can be eliminated, significant strides in lengthening the lives of elms are possible.

Elm bark beetles will begin to emerge in April from beneath the bark of dead and dying elmwood where they survived the winter. They will fly to the nearest healthy trees to feed and, in the process, deposit deadly Dutch elm disease fungus.

In the two to three weeks between the time the snow melts and the beetles emerge, neighborhood residents should get rid of all firewood piles and other bark-on elmwood.



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

Some of you may wonder how come the Villager's "election issue" comes in a week earlier than might have been possible within our normal every-other-week schedule. Well, folks, it's just the way the calendar happened to fall this year. Besides, back in December, when we made up our 24-issue schedule of dates for '78, the prospects of a genuine city election worth writing about seemed rather

Who could have known at that time that Councilman Pat Roedler and Bob Sylvester would hang 'em up, giving way to some new candidates? Who could have guessed that in one slot (Seat "A") the DFL would fail to endorse? Who could be sure Councilwoman Rosalie Butler would draw formidable DFL-Labor-endorsed opposition and go independent for the general election in April? Who would have surmised that there'd be a dichotomy of endorsements for the School Board, between DFL and Labor?

You might think this election a little pallid in comparison to some donnybrooks of the past. But have you thought what a dull primary it could have been . . . had Roedler and Sylvester not deigned to resign?

Showalter (Joanne), of course, is a shoo-in...with all the necessary credentials-blessings from the boss (Roedler), DFL and Labor...sans any real competitive

But look what happens when the party (DFL, that is) doesn't agree enough to endorse. What a different ball game then. Shows you how different the competition would be if we had an open primary instead of a DFL city conven-

As a result, Seat "A" for the city council looks to be something of a three-way race among Ron Maddox. Virginia Zasada and Bill Carlson, with a couple of heretofore unknowns thrown in for good measure. I couldn't begin to call that one. It just happens to be the only suspenseful battle in the whole primary scene. Unless Douglas Ward manages to challenge Catherine Piccolo and/or Wayne Wittman.

But here's an interesting sidelight to the election system the DFL-dominated legislature wished on the big three cities of Minnesota just a few years ago. The American Party candidates (3) appear on the primary ballot, although without opposition; the Socialist candidate for Mayor does. too. Of course, so do the IR's and DFLers...but not the Independents.

It makes a difference, although maybe not much, in the Butler-McMahon race, where another Independent is also running. Were Independents included in the primary, only one would be left in the general election...and chances for a clear-cut majority would be improved.

Somebody explain to me why it wouldn't be a better system to cut the Independent ranks to one also, via the primary. It could make a heap of difference sometime in the future. After all, according to a recent Harris survey, fealty to political parties is still waning nationally. In 1976, 54% claimed to be Democrats...the latest count came in at 43%. Republicans were down to 22%, from a high of 30% in 1971.

The greatest degree of Independent sentiment, the survey found, is in our very own Midwest...37%. Another 34% called themselves Democrats, and 24% Republicans. But look at the figures for the youngest voters, 18 to 29...41%, Independents; 36%, Democrats; and 14%, Republicans.

It might be safe to surmise that the DFL in St. Paul outnumbers the Independents...but aren't there many more Independents than IR's (Independent-Republicans)? Unless the IR's can muster more strength and make the 'Independent' half of their name more meaningful, shouldn't we make it a little easier for true "Independents" to get involved in the political spectrum? Who knows, some of them might even join a party sooner or later.

After all, we do want to keep this election process going, don't we? Either that, or save the taxpayers the cost of the whole voting operation...much like the legislature was suggesting with our Senate vacancy not so long ago.

You may or may not be aware of Mpls. "The City in financial trouble and will either sell or phase out in the not-too-distant future. But there was an interesting, if admittedly subjective article in its February issue, entitled 'The Best of the Twin Cities." Most of their "bests" in Goods and Services were centered in and around downtown Minneapolis but, believe it or not, they also 'found'' their way into St. Paul. They called the Bungalow Bake Shop at 1080 Grand Avenue, the Best Bakery; Natural Habitat Plant Shop, 1429 Grand, the Best Plant Store; Raess Quality Store, 1783 St. Clair, the Best Small Grocery; and the Hungry Mind, 1648 Grand, the Best Bookstore.

Under Sports, they called Fort Snelling State Park, the Best City (site for) Cross-Country Skiing. Food and Drink favorites included Weigh To Go, 238 South Snelling Avenue, as the Best Salad Bar.

The two women who authored the piece also called Summit Avenue at the Mississippi River in St. Paul, the Best Place to Watch the Sun Set; The Beebe residence at 2022 Summit Avenue, the Best Historic Architecture and, wouldn't you know, Downtown St. Paul was for them, the Best Place to Get Miserably Lost! You gotta have lived in the saintly city awhile to realize that there is actually some kind of rhyme and reason to the street-numbering system in this town. Nobody told me, tho... I had to figure it out for

The Minneapolis-St. Paul Metropolitan area, you may or may not know, ranks as the 15th largest metro market in the nation. Saw the updated figures and projections in a recent issue of Advertising Age, a media trade magazine. When it comes to growth in recent years we're, of course, way down the list . . . the South and West have fared much better on that count, along with Washington, D.C., obviously a GREAT growth area.

But Vitt Media, whoever they are, thought well enough of us here in these parts, to include Minneapolis-St. Paul as "one of the ten markets chosen for its especially good growth potential" and therefore did a special profile on us. Want to hear a little of what they have to say?:

'From 1960 to 1970, the Twin Cities were the third fastest growing market in the nation. Despite a burgeoning out-migration of people from other areas to the booming Sunbelt states, the Twin Cities managed not only to hold their continuing growth patterns, but to add to them, slowly to be sure, but steadily.'

Along with some favorable comments on our weatherproof skyway systems and our Metro council, they add the comment that "many former suburbanites are moving back to the city."

How about these impressions the Vitt Media team got from its interviews with local execs: "High on the list of priorities within the next five years is a new domed stadium, which should prove a boon to the city's professional teams and their singularly sturdy fans." (Over whose dead body? MFM)

There may be some questions, here and there, about what should be built on the Interstate 35E corridor in St. Paul. But the District 15 Planning Committee recently passed a resolution asking "the Metropolitan Council to adopt a plan for the 35E corridor which eliminates freeway automobile traffic from Highland Park residential streets and provides a satisfactory route for trucks from the freeways to the Midway and downtown St. Paul areas. Our preferred plan is to build Interstate 35-E on its original location. We ask that any environmental impact study consider the impact of present freeway traffic on Highland neighborhood streets..." The resolution was given widespread distribution to people and organizations concerned. Anyone disagree?

Energy note...Remember the words of the late J. Paul Getty: "The meek shall inherit the earth, but not its mineral rights."

There was a typographical boo-boo in our last column...or did you notice? With reference to Aldine Playground Improvements, the District 13 Planning Committee recommended that the (improvements)..."long delayed due to Short Line extension...can NOW proceed as soon as possible." Substitute "not" for "now" and you could have gotten quite a different impression!





J.J. Hill home to house new tenants come spring

With the approval of the Minnesota State Legislature, the Minnesota Historical Society will soon become the owner of the James J. Hill mansion, 240 Summit Ave. The four-story sandstone mansion, known for years as "The Hill House," has been the property of the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis since 1925 when it received the home as a donation from the Hill family.

A Senate sub-committee has approved a \$250,000 payment to the Archdiocese to assist with the cost of relocating the various Archdiocesan offices now located in the building.

The 32-room house was completed in 1891. From 1926 to 1950, the house served as the Diocesan Teachers College and housed the offices of the superintendent of schools and his staff.

According to Monsignor Ambrose Hayden, Vicar General of the Archdiocese, the future of the house is of concern to the Archdiocese, which has sought to preserve the building as near to its original state as possible.



Senate Report

by Senator Ron Sieloff District 63

At this writing, most of the significant legislation considered by the 1978 Legislature has not yet been finally acted upon by either the House or the Senate.

The Determinate Sentencing Bill, which was passed by both the House and the Senate in 1977, remains in a conference committee of the House and the Senate. The House and the Senate have taken two quite different approaches on the subject. The conference committee will have to iron these out before any final action can be taken.

Bills introduced to limit welfare funds for abortions have had several well publicized meetings in both the House and the Senate. A weak bill passed out of the Health, Welfare and Corrections Committee and will now be sent to the House floor. The Senate Health and Welfare Committee seems to be about evenly divided on the issue and has been unable to reach a consensus on what kind of bill will be sent to the Senate floor. It appears that the leadership in the Senate does not wish to have the issue presented to the full Senate, and ultimately to the Governor for his signature, because they wish to avoid taking a recorded position on the issue.

The bill to restructure public financing of political campaigns is now in conference committee. This bill was necessitated by a federal court decision which ruled that the present system of distribution of monies in legislative races was unconstitutional. The bill still has many problems and the exact nature of the conference report is still not known.

The bill to require deposits on beer and soda pop containers is still awaiting action on the Senate floor. There has been no movement in the House on this issue pending Senate action. A compromise bill introduced by Senator Borden has not been acted upon either. The last I have heard on this issue is that some type of compromise may be worked out.

A bill placing new requirements for certificates of need for health services recently passed the full Senate. The bill as passed did not include doctors' offices or clinics in the certificate of need requirements.

It appears that the Legislature will adjourn on March 17. As has been true for many years, most of the major legislation will be finally acted upon within the last few days of the session.

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



Dutch elm beetle could be breeding in your backyard

A recent survey of a 144block residential area of St. Paul identified more than 250 breeding places for the beetle responsible for the loss of thousands upon thousands of the city's elms.

These breeding sources, mostly elm woodpiles and stumps of already removed elm trees, become particularly critical after April 1 when the elm bark beetle emerges and begins infesting the tops of healthy elms within 600 feet of its winter quarters.

Because snow-covered elm wood is protected from the extreme cold which might otherwise destroy the beetle and its offspring, detecting and eliminating on-ground breeding sources is the most pressing part of St. Paul's disease control program, according to Judy Barr, coordinator of the city's Shade Tree Program.

Area residents who'd like more information on how to organize or participate in a program to identify and eliminate elm wood from their neighborhood should call 298-5660. Elm wood will be picked up by the city free of charge.

Report from the House

by Ray Faricy District 63A

Because many of the bills presently before the Legislature are in a state of flux, I thought maybe it would be well to point out one of the services provided for you by the Legislature.

The House Information Office is a public information source which strives to educate the public about state government, as well as promote state government and create an awareness of its existence on a year-round basis. Promotional efforts include:

(1) An annual statewide essay contest for junior high school students on a particular aspect of government.

(2) A booth at the State Fair which has as its theme "Meet Your Minnesota House of Representatives." Many publications are available at the booth and they also offer a quiz called "What's Your State Government I.Q?" All of the persons working at the booth operate in a non-partisan

(3) Non-partisan publications, including Weekly Wrap Up, which lists all bills introduced, covers all full committee meetings, reports on Floor action, and lists weekly advance committee schedules, bills that pass and their Chapter numbers as they will appear in the Minnesota Session Laws. This publication is sent weekly from House Information and is available throughout the Capitol complex. A monthly newsletter entitled "Session" or "Interim," depending on the status of the legislature, is also published. This publication typically provides comments, interviews and stories concerning activities in the House. The third publication is the daily and weekly committee meeting schedules which are available one week in advance. These schedules list committees that will be meeting, their times, place and the bills that will be before the committee that particular week.

By either writing or calling House Information, one can also obtain a brochure entitled a "Bill for an Act," which describes how a bill becomes a law in Minnesota. There is another brochure entitled "Guide to Minnesota House of Representatives" which shows visitors where they can find their representatives' offices, as well as all other areas of the Capitol and the State Office Building. House Chamber seating charts are also available.

Lastly, there is an Official Directory of the Minnesota Legislature which lists House and Senate members, their addresses, phone numbers, and House and Senate Committees and their members. It also lists House and Senate

DEPOSIT LEGISLATION

To the editor:

This past January, citizens from across the state mailed empty pop and beer cans to Governor Perpich to dramatize the broad support for mandatory deposit legislation. At the end of the month, over 3500 cans had been received by the Governor's office.

Deposit legislation would place a simple 10 cent refundable deposit on pop and beer purchased in throwaway containers: When you bring a throwaway back, you get your 10 cents back; if you throw it away, you lose 10 cents, you pay for the litter pickup, and you waste recyclable material.

Deposit legislation has several merits, including energy savings, consumer savings, resource conservation, litter reduction, and a net increase in jobs. These benefits have been shown in every independent study done on this issue. Yet the legislature continues to avoid the issue because a few affected industries have engaged in a heavily financed lobbying effort against the bill and have threatened labor with job losses-this in spite of the fact that studies show a net job increase. Instead, the affected industries want another tax!

The Senate will be voting on a deposit bill within the next few weeks. Speak now or resign yourself to the alternative legislation now being considered—another tax that will be hidden in added consumer costs on nearly everything from newspapers to dog food.


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

From the Legislature

by Dick Cohen District 63B

With tax time coming once again, I thought it might be helpful to explain some of the changes in the property tax law. Though the legislature passed some 300 bills during the last session, I feel the number one issue in our district is property taxes. In 1973 the legislature set a goal of some day eliminating the property tax altogether. We have been working toward that goal ever since. I want to take this opportunity to explain the 1977 property tax relief bill and what it will mean to you, the homeowner.

In 1975 the legislature passed the "circuit breaker," which was the initial breakthrough in property tax relief. In 1977 we continued in that direction and developed further property tax relief measures. The table below will help explain what this means to you in dollars and cents.

Not included in the table is the homestead credit, which gives you a credit of up to \$325 on your taxes when you file your homestead exemption form.

I must remind you that efforts to lower your property taxes will mean nothing unless you remember to fill out the yellow form in the middle of your state income tax booklet.

The new property tax relief act increases the maximum property tax credit available for senior citizens from \$475 to \$800. It also reduces "assessment ratios" on homes. The former method was to assess a home at 25% of the first \$13,000 of its value and then at 40% of the remainder over \$13,000. The assessment ratio has now been changed so that in 1978 your home will be assessed at 22% of the first \$15,000 and 36% of the remainder over \$15,000.

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
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
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ASPC launches study of St. Paul neighborhood issues

talking out of school

"My kids are out of school more than they're in."

"I thought there was supposed to be a minimum number of school days required for students.

Why in the world am I paying so much for school taxes when my children are continually being excused from school?"

These somewhat pointed reproofs from Highland area residents are the result of what appears to be an inordinate number of times secondary school students have been dismissed from school of late. In fact, within the past three weeks alone, area senior high school students have been excused from classes a total of five half-days. Reasons given for the early dismissals range from parentteacher conferences, to teacher workshops, to arena scheduling, to PER meetings.

Talking Out of School recently asked St. Paul Public School officials how and by whom the decision to dismiss classes is made. This is the response we received: At the present time, the St. Paul School District requires a minimum of 176 days of school, but it is possible for school principals to dismiss classes pretty much as they see fit. The only requirement is approval from the downtown of-

Though we were assured that permission was not given without careful consideration, we ask: Five half-days in

At any rate, there is good news for all those parents and students who feel this system of dismissal has been abused. It comes in the form of a new state law which will require 175 days of school, including 170 full days of studentteacher contact time.

In essence, this will mean students may only have five partial days off per year. Even an hour early dismissal will be counted as one of the five.

WHAT'S GOOD?

When we posed that question to Groveland Elementary School principal Jerry Madigan, he bent our ears for quite a while about a myriad of good things happening there.

Only problem was our editor, Iron Mike Mischke, couldn't see fit to turn over a substantial part of this issue to a "Groveland Gazette." (He said we'd undoubtedly make a Misch-Masch of it, and one per paper seemed sufficient.)

We will, therefore, pass along as much Groveland good news as he and space permit.

The first item in the Groveland "What's Good?" grab bag concerns third grade teacher Nancy Fogelberg. According to Madigan, Nancy has made science come alive in her classroom with an approach that challenges her students at the same time it creates in them a desire to

A graduate of an aerospace course developed through NASA, Nancy uses an aerospace curriculum she helped to form. Map reading, geography and wind currents may sound like rather mundane subjects to most of us, but students in Nancy's class would undoubtedly disagree. Nancy's teaching method? Simple enough: Involve the

For example, when her class was doing a unit on weather, she rented a tank of helium, had each student fill a balloon with the gas and attach a return postcard to it.

As the post cards are returned (the sender is asked to specify where the balloon was found), the students plot their courses on a map. Post cards returned to date have come from as far away as Illinois and southern Michigan.

To help make a subject like anatomy come to life (so to speak). Nancy has hung a skeleton in the classroom. The class feels so comfortable with the skeleton that the kids have christened it "Dr. Emily Bones." Last week one student even provided a pair of sunglasses for Dr. Bones.

Nancy credits the success of many of her projects to the support she has received from both parents and school staff. "It couldn't work without their help," she says.

Talking Out of School salutes Nancy Fogelberg for the extra lengths she is willing to go for her students.

We would also like to salute the many, many area teachers who are doing an exceptional job with their young charges. Unfortunately, we don't know who they all are. 





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Angel dust in the streets

The problem with PCP

Angel Dust. The name conjures up images of sparkling, white crystals on soft, feathered wings. Users of the drug know better.

According to the Drug Abuse Warning Network (DAWN), PCP now represents up to 25 percent of the psychedelic drug use in the nation. Chuck Peterson, pharmacist at the Hennepin County Medical Center's Poison Center, believes that PCP is "by far the most heavily abused drug on the street today."
Phencyclidine (PCP) was

developed in the late 1950's as a human anesthetic. Its use was discontinued when patients complained of hallucinations, disorientation and extreme agitation. Today it is manufactured legally by only one drug company, and then only for veterinary purposes.

The magnitude of the PCP abuse problem in the Twin Cities is reflected in the fact that in 1975 this area accounted for 15 percent of all PCP overdoses national-

Unlike street drugs such as THC or LSD, PCP is easy to make and the ingredients are readily available. It may be ingested in all possible ways, i.e., smoked, shot, snorted, or swallowed. However, PCP is most often ingested by inhaling the smoke from a joint.

According to the Poison Center, PCP is dangerous because the results of using it are so unpredictable. Unlike drugs such as Valium or Quaalude, PCP is bought on the street and is always

made in illicit laboratories. One time a user may ingest a concentration of ten percent PCP, the next time a concentration of 60 or even 100 percent. The effects of the drug are almost impossible for the ordinary user to control, and they can vary unexpectedly.

It was the unpredictability of the drug, and its often hellish effects, which caused its drop from use in 1968. It resurfaced as a street drug in the early 70's, and from 1976 to 1977 its use skyrocketed.

Today the Hennepin County Medical Center's Poison Center sees two or three PCP overdoses a week, and the center expects the number of PCP overdoses to spiral this spring and summer as it has done in the past few years.

Whether PCP's growing popularity rests on its own special effects is not known at this time. PCP is often sold as "street THC," which is the extremely difficult to extract hallucinogenic chemical found in marijuana. Sometimes PCP is passed off as other hallucinogens such as LSD, mescaline or psilocybin.

The effects of the drug are felt within two to thirty minutes, depending on the means of ingestion. Operating in a dream-like state. the "dusted" PCP user is normally uncommunicative and often stares into space.

During the next two to four hours the effects level off. A "come-down" is then experienced, marked by feelings of paranoia, irritation, isolation, and possibly suicidal behavior. In 24 to 48 hours a user returns to what he or she considers 'normal.'

Although the growing use of PCP seems to indicate that its users feel it triggers a positive experience, many people find using it unpleasant-sometimes in the extreme. Those using it for the first time report feelings of weightlessness and decreased body size, perceptual distortions, extreme feelings of apathy, and emotional and social isolation.

The long-term effects of regular PCP use are not yet known. What is known is that chronic users have shown definite symptoms of persistent, long-term disturbances in their brain functions and thinking patterns, even after two or three weeks of abstinence.

Depending on the degree, PCP overdose patients exhibit catatonic rigidity, seizures, and movements which are grossly uncoordinated. Deaths from a PCP overdose are often attributed to "behavioral toxicity," that is, while on the drug, users have burned to death, drowned or fallen. The complications of seizures have caused other deaths due to PCP overdose.

Two symptoms which mark a PCP overdose, rather than one from another drug, are nystagmus (a spasmodic, involuntary movement of the eyeballs) and increased blood pressure. Those suspected of having taken an overdose of PCP should be taken to an emergency room immedi-

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
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
