Cretin Dad-Son Banquet Jan. 29th

Two Notre Dame All-American's, 'Ed "Moose" Krause, Athletic Director, and Alan Page, Minnesota Vikings, a "top" NFL rookie last season, will be featured at the annual Cretin High School, St. Paul, Dad-Son banquet, Monday evening, January 29th, at the Prom, St. Paul.

Cretin is a Christian Brothers High School with over 1,200 boy enrollment. Krause, a three-time All-American in two sports, football and basketball, 1931-33 is well known in the mid-west.

After WWII he returned to Notre Dame serving as basketball coach from 1946-49, as well as football line coach. He established an outstanding won-lost basketball team record. Since 1948 "Moose" has served as the Athletic Director of the University of Notre Dame. He is married and has three children, the oldest, Edward Jr., being an ordained Catholic Priest.

Alan Page, a two-time Notre Dame All-American, 1965-66, was one of three players drafted by the Minnesota Vikings in the first round NFL. He is recognized, after one season of play, as one of the "top rookies" having continued his Notre Dame football defensive greatness as a tackle. He was a three-year defensive regular with national championship Notre Dame teams. Currently he is employed by a Minneapolis auto dealer. Page, 23 is a native of Canton, Ohio, he is married having one daughter and residing in Bloomington.

An All-American rating was awarded the Plaid Line, Highland Park Senior High School newspaper, in the 77th All-American Newspaper Critical Service of the National Scholastic Press Association for 1967.

More than 1,000 student newspapers for high schools all over the nation are judged in groups divided by enrollment, frequency of publication and method of printing.

The top honor rating, All American, represents superior accomplishment and is reserved for top publications. Entries in the NSPA Critical Service are judged in all areas of production from coverage of news through writing and make-up. Fewer than 5% of the papers entered receive All-American.

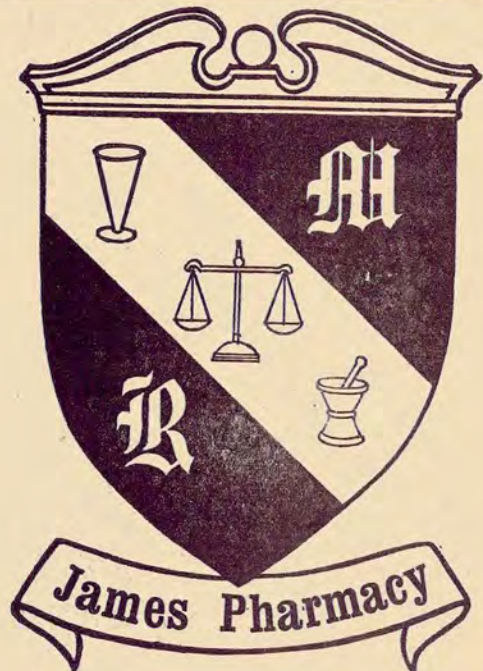

If you are thinking about getting a new movie camera, be sure to see the Yashica Super 60 Electronic. With this beauty perfect pictures are a cinch every time. It doesn't have ALL the features in the world, but enough to make it about the most useable camera on the market.

A six to one zoom ratio, reflex viewing, f-stops from 1.8 to 32 (never again overexposed pictures in sun and sand or snow), range-finder in viewing system, as well as f/stop and over or under exposure warning. The most easy to read footage scale of any camera we've seen. Power zoom works independently of or with film drive, three filming speeds, backlight and spotlight control.

CHOP CHOP
