## St. Catherine's President Traces Growth of Catholic Higher Education In St. Paul Area

Sister Mary William, CSJ, president of The College of St. Catherine in St. Paul, traced the growth and the development of Catholic higher education in the United States at the annual President's Convocation in the Jeanne d'Arc Auditorium.

In the convocation address, Sister Mary William stated: "The story of the development of Catholic higher education runs parallel with the story of development of religious communities. Between 1900 and 1955, fifty-five such colleges were founded under the patronage of religious communities and most often subsidized by the bishop of the diocese in which they were founded. Catholic education developed from the top down, so that often the first Catholic Colleges found themselves to be more secondary than college."

Sister continued the growth of Catholic higher education by citing the growth of St. Catherine's: "The College of St. Catherine was one of the fifty-five colleges founded by religious communities between 1900 and 1955, under the patronage of Bishop Ireland. Students came to Derham Hall in 1905, but none persevered as far as the college level until 1913 when the first degrees were conferred upon two students."

"In 1905, the aim of St. Catherine's was to give its students a liberal education which will train and develop all their powers simultaneously; to impart culture together with broad scholarship; and to train Catholic girls to be silently virtuous and religious and to teach all, irrespective of denominational differences, to respect, appreciate and encourage religion and Christian morality. Today these aims remain the same."

It is the belief of the administrators of the college that the end of education is not just vocational but the development of the whole woman, spiritual, intellectual, moral, physical, social, in such fullness as to enable her to meet the emergencies and the routine of life intelligently. It is the belief of the college that by a program of education in which religion, art and science go hand in hand, it is giving to the world which needs it more today than ever before, the leaven of fine womanhood."

## Takarazuka Troupe Japanese Dancers Perform at Northrop

The Takarazuka Dance Theatre from Japan will present two performances in Northrop Memorial Auditorium at the University of Minnesota on Tuesday and Wednesday, October 20 and 21, at 8:30 p.m. The first of the two performances will be a part of the University Artists Course—Masterpiece Series, and the second will be a special concert presented by the same auspices.

Widely heralded in its first performances in this hemisphere, the company opened a cross-country tour with a week's run at the Vancouver International Festival in British Columbia. Since then, it has crossed the continent, and opened at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York City on September 14.

The company, which performs on this tour is actually only a part of the entire company of several hundred dancers which is trained and centered in Japan. Forty-two girls will be seen here in a production which promises to outmatch scenically and costume-wise, any other company which has appeared in Northrop with the possible exception of the Metropolitan Opera. Accompanying the group will be an orchestra made up of western instruments and instrumentalists which will play special arrangements of the original Japanese scores. Conductor of the orchestra will be Emerson Buckley, a familiar figure in Northrop Auditorium. Mr. Buckley has conducted the Summer Session Orchestra here four times since his first appearance in 1951.

The all-girl Takarazuka Dance Theatre was the inspiration of the motion picture, "Sayonara" and its members appeared on the screen in Cinerama's "Seven Wonders of the World" and in the Italian production of "Madame Butterfly."

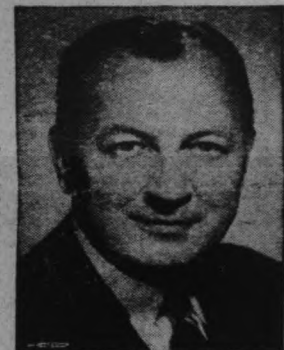

way to encourage more organizations to combine with the Community Chest, reduce the number of demands on you, and also reduce the burden of work on all the volunteer workers who carry the solicitation workload.

One of the hardest parts of the Community Chest effort is to get contributions that are fair share gifts for 42 agencies. A study of the work of any one agency would justify a minimum of a dollar contribution — so a minimum individual gift for all 42 could easily be considered to be \$40 — but this is far above the average neighborhood contribution in our communities. Remember though, no matter how small the contribution you can give, it is very important in gaining our needed goal.

To make it easier for people to give the amount they feel they should, firms have instituted in-plant payroll deduction programs which spread the contribution over the year. Even from your home you can make a pledge for next year and be billed for it on a monthly or quarterly basis.

We are hopeful that more and more people will take a responsible attitude toward this great community effort and give a fair share. For hourly workers this is considered to be 1/4 of an hour's pay per month. Salaried people are encouraged to give from 1 to 3% of their annual salary. We cannot look for national support for our local agencies. They depend on what you and I, the residents of Ramsey County, give. Let's give generously!

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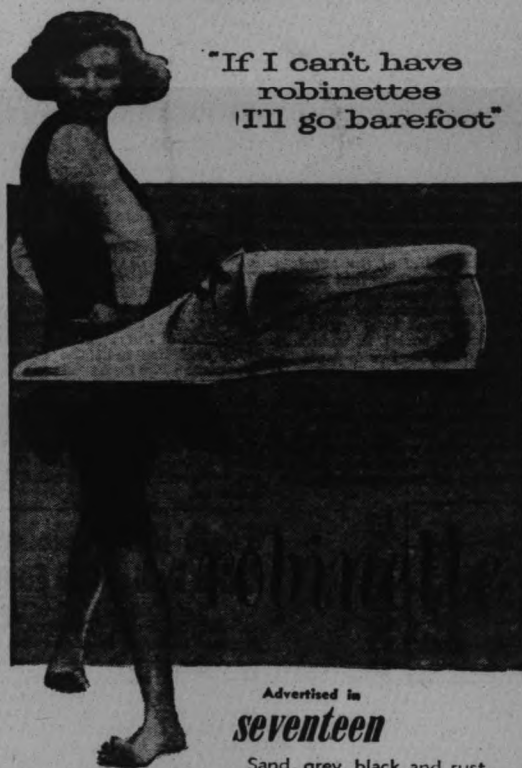

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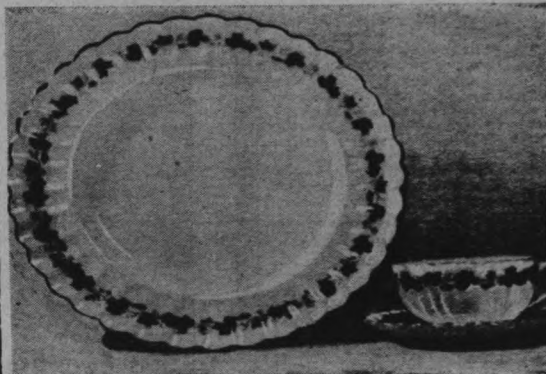

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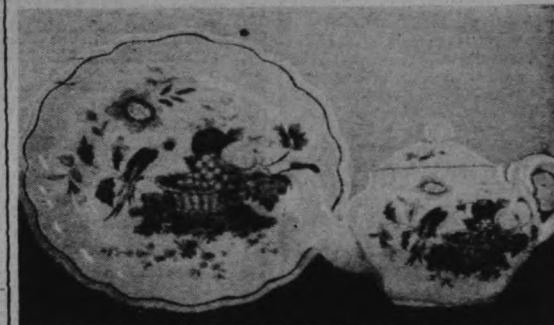


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## Playground Activities Announced

Commissioner Holland announced that there are 26 year-round centers open and in full swing, and 13 seasonal playgrounds which operate for a limited time under professional leadership, until October 31.

At all year-round centers, children of pre-school age, between 4 and 5 years, have their season at the playgrounds also, usually once a week on Tuesday, between two and three-thirty in the afternoon. The youngsters learn how to play together, to appreciate simple musical rhythms, and are taught simple crafts activities.

Commissioner Holland also stated that many hundreds of our youngsters are taking part in the annual Yo Yo tournament at the various recreation centers, and that on Saturday, October 10, the city championship finals will be conducted at Valley Center, corner of Valley and Jackson Streets. The prizes for the championship will be donated by the Donald F. Duncan Yo Yo Company. The first prize is a bicycle; second, third and fourth prizes will be trophies and merchandise. The Commissioner also discussed the Halloween celebrations at all the city playgrounds on Friday, October 30. He explained that although the 31st is on Saturday, the playgrounds are closed on that day and consequently the celebrations will be held on the 30th. Many American Legion posts, V.F.W. posts, parent-teacher associations and all the playground booster clubs are providing ways and means for the enjoyment of our youngsters at all playgrounds, under the supervision of the professional staff of the Recreation Bureau.

Commissioner Holland also discussed the series of meetings to be held by the Superintendent of Recreation with the presidents of the various booster clubs, for the purpose of acquainting them and their members with the program of offered by the department, the professional leadership at each of the various recreation centers.

Highland Park and West Seventh districts will meet on October 19, at 7 p.m. at Highland Park Clubhouse.

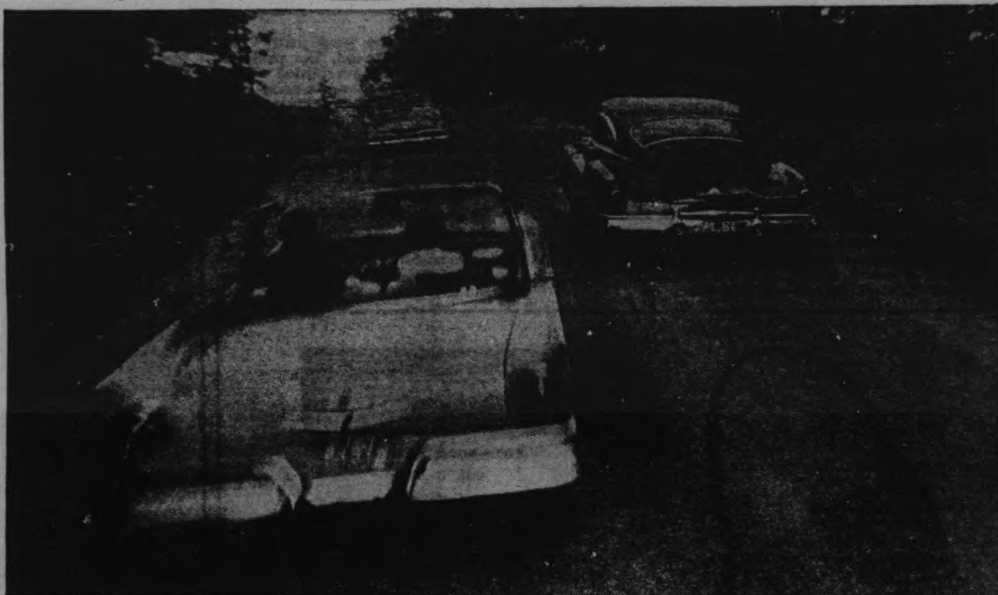

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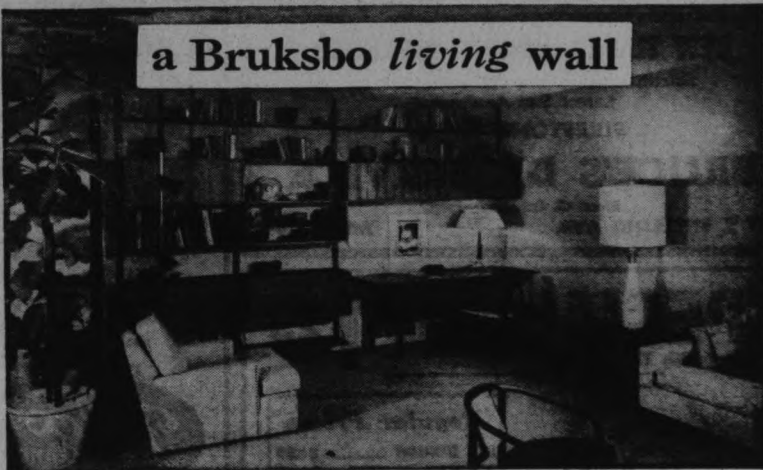
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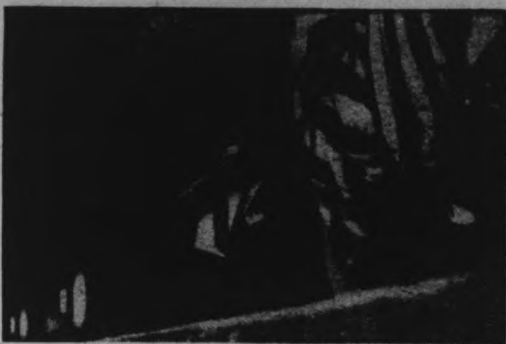

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## University Artists Course 1959-60 Season Begins With Recital by Opera Star Blanche Thebom

The 1959-1960 musical season will be inaugurated on Wednesday, October 14, when Blanche Thebom sings in Northrop Auditorium for patrons of the University Artists Course—Masterpiece Series. The recital by Miss Thebom will open the eight-concert Masterpiece Series which this year is entering its forty-first season. Other programs scheduled for the series include the Takarazuka Dance Theatre, The Philharmonia Hungarica, pianist David Bar-Illan, tenor Cesare Valletti, the Bach Aria Group, violinist Nathan Milstein, and pianists Rudolf Serkin.

No newcomer to the Northrop Stage, Miss Thebom was last seen here as Prince Orlofsky in the Metropolitan Opera's production of "Fledermaus." Only a short time before that performance, Miss Thebom appeared as a speaker before patrons of the University Artists Course at a special concert announcing the establishment of the New Artists Series.

Miss Thebom, one of America's favorite singers, has been a major member of the Metropolitan since her history-making debut during the 1944-1945 season. Her regular appearances on the Telephone Hour and other radio and television programs have made her known to millions of music-lovers outside the opera house. She has also made outstanding successes in Vienna, at England's Royal Opera, Covent Garden, The Glyndebourne Festival, Buenos Aires Teatro Colon, Stockholm's Royal Opera and at the premiere Festival in Athens, Greece. Two seasons ago, Miss Thebom made a widely-hailed tour of the Soviet Union, sang at London's Royal Opera in the revival of Berlioz' "The Trojans," and made a seven-week tour of Latin America for the State Department and appeared for the U. S. at the Brussels World Fair.

Noted for her beauty, the singing star's wide-ranging versatility is represented on a large repertoire of recordings for RCA Victor and Columbia Masterworks, including the complete Metropolitan's performances of "Cosi Fann Tutte" and "The Rake's Progress" and the complete "Tristan und Isolde" with Kirsten Flagstad.

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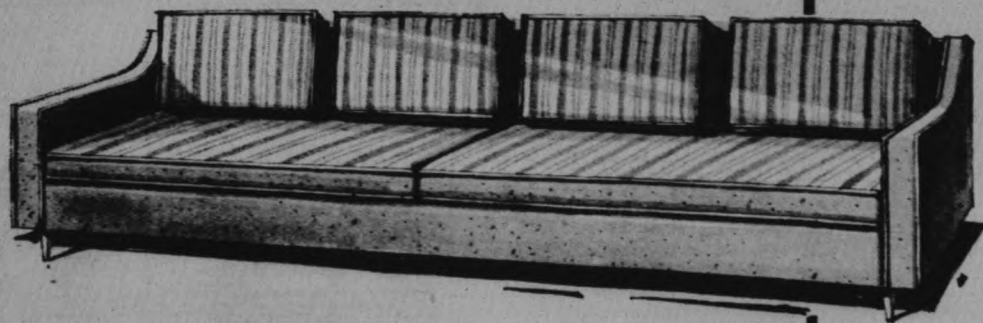

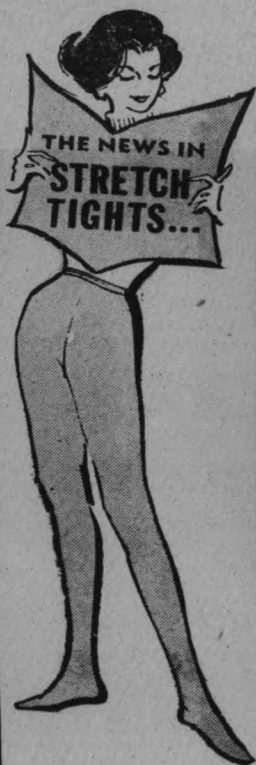

# Survey Points To Car Ownership, Ensuing Job, As Big Factors in Lower Grades For Junior and Senior Students

Does automobile ownership hurt the modern teen-ager's performance in school?

Yes, according to a well-known educator, and what is more important, the harm is far greater when combined with a lack of parental control in the usage of a car.

Dr. Keith Kavanaugh, principal of Niles Township High School, Skokie, Illinois, verifies the claim of a definite link between the use of the automobile and falling grades through a survey of 1,453 junior and senior students at the school, in a Northern suburb of Chicago. Conducted by the school's driver education with the cooperation of the research department of the Allstate Insurance Companies, the study is the most comprehensive yet undertaken on the subject.

The initial results of the survey show that students who own cars are more likely to be found in the lowest quarter in the scholastic standings. Their grades drop further when their study time is cut by the part time jobs they must hold to pay for the operation and maintenance of their cars.

However, the situation is not as simple as it might seem at first, Dr. Kavanaugh says. While "car owners" tended to be heavily represented in the lower quarter of their class, they were almost equally represented in the lower quarter BEFORE they got the car. This would imply that these students adopt the car as a diversionary interest. The acquisition of the car, though, would tend to inhibit—if not prevent—their academic improvement.

The most damaging effect of a car ownership is felt by those students who formerly ranked in the top quarter of their class. The survey shows that when they become car owners, 87 per cent of them drop in scholastic performance.

Of even greater importance than car ownership is the use of the vehicle, Dr. Kavanaugh says. Of those students using a car socially, the study showed a direct relationship between a decline in grades and an increase in the number of evenings a week the students drove. Nineteen per cent of those using an automobile one evening a week were in the bottom quarter of their class, while 61 per cent of those driving seven evenings a week were in that category.

"We firmly believe," Dr. Kavanaugh says, "that there is a very close connection between excessive use of a car and the exercising of parental authority. It is when the point is reached where driving interferences with study that car ownership or usage becomes harmful. Parents are an important factor in seeing that the teen-ager maintains the right balance between school-work and relaxation."

Regarding part time jobs, Dr. Kavanaugh says: "The combination of the car and a job nearly always resulted in lower grades. However, if the student did not

own a car and his job was on weekends only, he more often than not was found in the upper part of his class. The reverse was true if the job was on week days. In these cases the student was usually in the lower part of his class. If a student works, it would appear preferable that he work a full day on Saturday rather than an hour or so every school day. Perhaps we're prejudiced, but we feel quality education is a full time job in itself.

In determining the influence of various factors, such as part time jobs, on students' class work, the survey teams made a special effort to determine the

influence of the car alone upon grades, excluding other activities. Of the good students who had cars or the use of cars, but did not have part time jobs, 85 per cent suffered a drop in grades after they began to drive.

One result of the high school survey pays a tribute to the effectiveness of high school driver training, according to Dr. Kavanaugh. High school trained drivers have markedly fewer accidents and traffic violations than do students who learn to drive in other ways.

Students backgrounds in the survey were obtained through questionnaires filled out by the 1455 students who participated in the Niles Township High School's driver training program. The questionnaires covered the student's driver experience, the availability of a car, the kind and amount of use given a car, part time jobs, accident and violation experiences, high school driver training and other pertinent information. This information then was related to the student's scholastic record and his stand-in the class.
