Vets Observe Hospital Week

The Veterans Administration Hospital in Minneapolis will observe National Hospital Week May 11-17 with special displays in the main lobby.

The theme for the observance, "Your Hospital—Pathway to Progress in Community Health," emphasizes how today's hospital is establishing new pathways to channel health care to benefit the entire community.

Dr. Arthur J. Klipen, Hospital Director, said the displays will show the various facets of hospital treatment, education and research, "the three main functions of the VA medical program."

Dr. Klipen said that this year has brought increased opportunity for VA to cooperate with the rest of the nation's medical community through the sharing of highly specialized medical resources, the continuation of medical research efforts, and more training of doctors, nurses and other specialists.

He said continued emphasis is also being placed by VA upon outpatient treatment. Extended

care programs emphasize placing patients away from hospitals after they no longer require intensive hospital treatment. In nursing homes and foster homes in the community, the patient receives the degree of care he needs and can also regain some measure of independent living.

The traditional role of the Veterans Administration hospital has been to provide care for disabled veterans within its buildings. The hospital director said this has not changed, and there is also a continuing cooperative relationship with the nation's medical community in the sharing of highly specialized medical resources, especially in Minneapolis.

VA hospitals throughout the nation are joining other hospitals in the country in marking the observance, held annually during the week of Florence Nightingale's birthday, May 12. The observance gives people an opportunity to learn more about the hospitals in their community, he said.

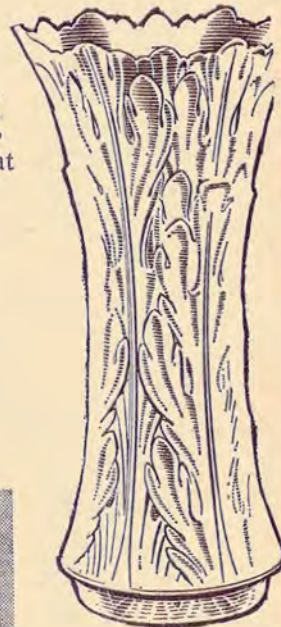
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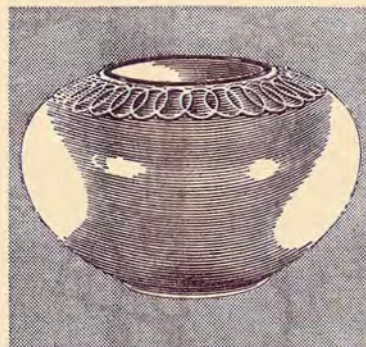
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Normandale College Announces Two-Day Health Careers Fair

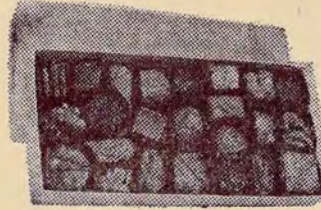

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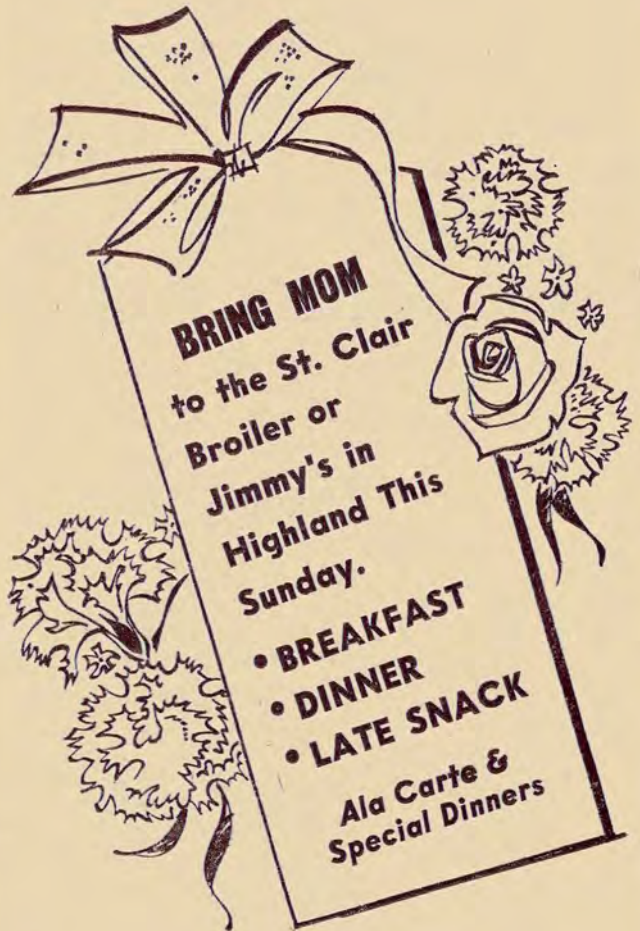
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ST. THOMAS BREAKS GROUND FOR 3 MILLION DOLLAR PROJECT

Ground was broken recently at the College of St. Thomas for construction of a new \$3 million classroom and faculty office building on the St. Paul campus.

The Most Rev. Leo Binz, Archbishop of the St. Paul-Minneapolis Archdiocese, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Terrence J. Murphy, president of St. Thomas, shared honors in the traditional turning of earth. Archbishop Binz is chairman of the college Board of Trustees.

A representation of faculty, administrative staff and the student body also was present.

Construction of the five-story, structure will begin immediately, Monsignor Murphy announced. Located on a site just off Cleveland Avenue, the new building will complete a Quadrangle of modern college buildings, all of which are in harmonious design and faced in Mankato limestone. It will be ready for use by September, 1970.

Monsignor Murphy characterized the new facility as "a college in miniature." It will house, in addition to offices, class and seminar rooms, a 577-seat capacity auditorium with two balconies; the college's Management Center, an extensive and modern audio-visual complex; psychology department facilities, and an adult education center.

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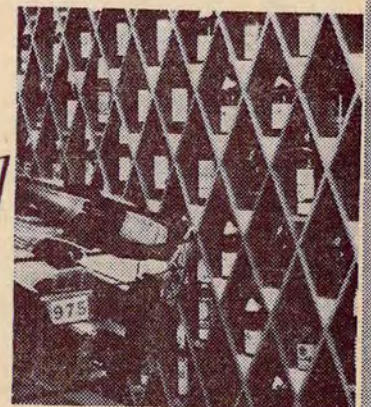

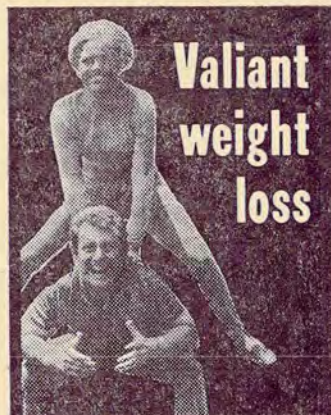

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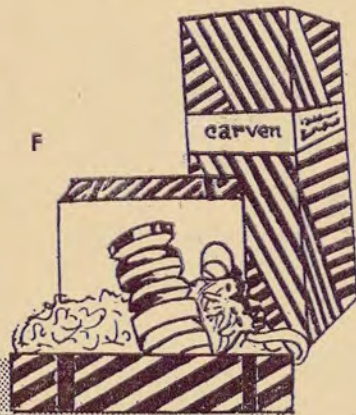
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
