VA Widows Benefits

An estimated 2,575 widows in Minnesota of veterans who died as the result of military service will be eligible for up to 36 months of educational assistance from the Veterans Administration beginning December 1.

John R. Murphy, manager, VA Center, St. Paul, also said that starting at that time, the wives of approximately 2,160 totally and permanently disabled veterans in Minnesota will also be entitled to VA educational assistance payments of \$130 a month—up to a maximum of 36 months—for full-time institutional training.

The allowance for three-quarters time training is \$95 a month, with \$60 being paid for half-time training under the new law granting these widows and wives VA educational help for the first time in the history of veterans' benefits in the United States, Mr. Murphy said.

Widows and wives now eligible for this benefit will have until December 1, 1976, to complete their training under this new program, he said. Women who become eligible in the future for VA educational assistance due to the service-connected death or permanent and total



Murphy said eligibility of widows and wives does not depend on when their husbands served in the Armed Forces; however, he added, if a widow remarries or a wife divorces her disabled husband she loses her entitlement. It will not be necessary for eligible widows and wives to contact the VA for detailed information on this new program.

He said that in the near future the Veterans Administration will mail explanatory material with widow's dependency and indemnity compensaiton (DIC) checks and with compensation checks for totally and permanenty disabled veterans.





FLOOD PLAIN MANAGEMENT TO BE TOPIC OF SEMINAR

Control and prevention of floods will be the topic for a one-day seminar at the University of Minnesota Dec. 10. The seminar, entitled "Flood Plain Management," will be held in Nolte Center on the University's Minneapolis campus.

It is designed for county and municipal officials, legislators, agricultural extension specialists, ground area usage personnel and anyone else who is concerned with recurring flood conditions in Minnesota.

J. Wesley Walters, who spent 35 years on water resource projects with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and has been a consultant for state and private agencies since his retirement in 1965, will begin the seminar at 9:15 a.m. with a history of floods in Minnesota.

An introduction to flood plain management will be given at 10:30 a.m. by James Goddard, a Tucson, Ariz., consulting engineer. Formerly an engineer with the Tennessee Valley Authority, he was responsible for developing the Local Flood Relations Program, which provided

information and counsel to more than a hundred communities vulnerable to floods.

Goddard will discuss identification of flood plains, flood frequencies, land use regulation, insurance and engineering measures.

James Ringenoldus, head of the water resources division of the Harza Engineering Co. of Chicago, will speak at 11:30 a.m. on structural measures for flood plain management.

At 1:30 p.m. James Goddard will discuss economic and social aspects of flood plain management, and at 2:30 p.m. St. Paul attorney Frank Murray will speak on legal aspects of Minnesota flood plain management. A panel discussion and summary will close the institute.

TAP CITY . . .

The Mayor's proposal for a Hotel and Motel tax points squarely to the "end of the road" (quotes mine) regarding ways and means to solve or alleviate the City's financial crisis. It is no longer a matter of partisan concern that the city is broke-there are elections for that-it is, rather, a time for people living within the City Limits to fish or cut bait on whether they want a first class city or something less. The Hotel and Motel tax of itself is undesireable and incongruous with the new progressive commercial climate of the core city. Again, the Mayor appears to be the victim of some bad advice from his colleagues, whose competence is best measured by their inventions in the past three years: to wit; the garbage tax proposal, the telephone tax proposal, the water tax, and the sophomoric and politically encumbered Charter Proposal. The recent referendum for increased taxing authority was in a class by itself for its negative approach - and, worse, for the small amount of money spent on communicating its basic "we are broke, help us out" theme.

If nihlism is not, in fact, the prevailing mood of the current administration, it is difficult to locate any optimism or leadership strong enough to carry either the day or the message to the people of St. Paul in a positive way. A lack of positive thinking has been the problem on 4th and Wabasha ever since the politicians became mesmorized by the irrelevant and totally unimportant Butler-Rosen, Butler-Byrne opera. Mayor Byrne, in honesty, has been the victim of negative politics and negative government, but has shown little, if any inclination, to redress the problem by making an effective contact with the people and selling his programs. That many of these programs had little merit and have been rebuked by the voters overwhelmingly, coupled with the fact that the Mayor was reelected handsomely to a second term is a paradox only made possible by the Butler phenomena. Mrs. Butler's motives need not be questioned, nor the integrity of her bid for the Mayor's officeyet in sum-her methods of political exploitation and the willingness of a bored press to amplify her incessant carping has set the city back a decade in four years of childish political nit picking. Throw in the antics of the Court House research director, historian and curator of the marble indian, one Charles McCarty, and you must see the total price we have all paid for all the laughs we've had since somebody shoveled the wrong sidewalk on Summit Avenue. Some shovel. Some snow!

The case then, if for no other reasons than those mentioned above, rests with the voters, and since all the politicians and other actors on the local political scene are down in the mouth, it is time for the people to start thinking about how much money it will take to do the job of making St. Paul a better city.

In the Spring of 1970, we can decide if there's anybody around who can spend it wisely. Meantime, I say give it to the group that's in, before they trim every department back to relatives and friends and blame it all on us.

STATE U MONSTER . . .

The U. of M, budget is the biggest gyp in your state tax dollar. The University grows, like Everest, simply "because it's there," and the State loses a frighteningly high percentage of graduates to other states each year. The whole basis of State Universities and Land Grant institutions for higher learning is outmoded in the jet and space age. The local university is a part of the national education system and should be supported through tuition and Federal money entirely. Industry is not attracted to the state because it has a fine institution of higher learning-they simply send their recruiters out for manpower, and locate where there are tax,
