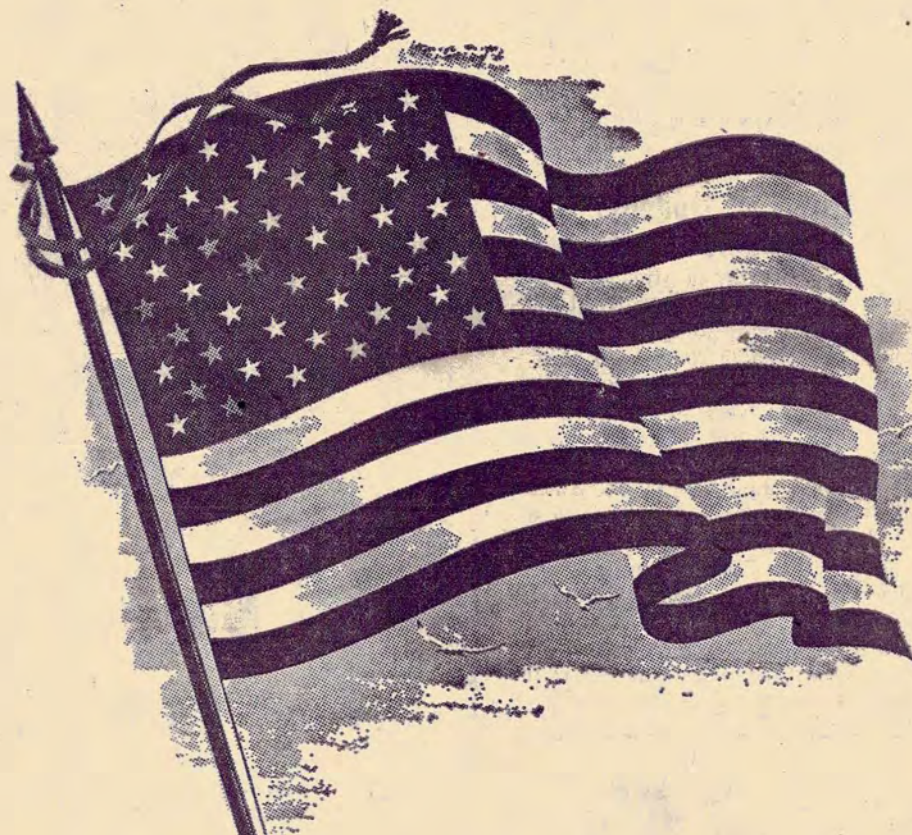

SECOND ANNUAL CHAIN OF BOATS BY THE ST. PAUL POWER SQUADRON

The second annual "Chain of Boats" parade will be held by the St. Paul Power Squadron, Thursday, July 4, in observance of National Safe Boating Week, June 30 through July 6.

Theme of this year's observance is "Safety First—The Golden Rule of Boating."

Two parade routes will be followed by boaters of the St. Paul Power Squadron, and all boaters in the area who wish to participate, from Holiday Harbor in St. Paul to Hudson, Wisconsin and from Stillwater, Minnesota to Hudson.

A flotilla of cabin cruisers and runabouts, decorated with banners promoting safe boating will leave Holiday Harbor in St. Paul at 1 p.m., Thursday, July 4. It will be joined by boats at South St. Paul, Inver Grove, Hastings, King's Cove and Prescott marinas enroute.

After cruising down-river on the Mississippi, the parade will then proceed up the St. Croix river to Hudson.

A second flotilla, comprised of boats and boaters from Af-ton, Windmill, Sunnyside and Muller marinas on the St. Croix river, will cruise from Stillwater to Hudson.

The entire group will participate in Hudson's three-day "Summer Festival." Between 5 and 6 p.m., the parade will pass in review at Hudson Harbor. Judges and parade officials will

award prizes and trophies to the best-decorated boats of each marina. They will also award a grand prize for the best-decorated boat of the parade.

Following the parade, and at dusk, color-sound movies on safe boating and water safety will be shown.

The St. Paul Power Squadron is a unit of the United States Power Squadrons, an organization dedicated to promoting safe boating through education. Classes are held all during the year in the St. Paul area by the local unit. The basic "Piloting" class, which is free to all those interested, will start on September 9, 1968. Location to be announced.

The Minnesota Orchestral Association will begin the next phase of its New Dimensions fund campaign on June 14, it was announced today by Judson Bemis, President of the Association.

Both Hawks and Robbins were optimistic about the success of the campaign. They cited the community's magnificent response to the New Dimensions fund program which, as announced recently, has now reached \$8,123,000, including the Ford Foundation's grant of \$2,000,000.

EXPLORER SCOUTS CONFERENCE AT COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY

The national conference will bring together over 2,000 elected delegates to represent more than 300,000 Explorers from all parts of the Nation, according to Schultz.

Theme of the conference will be Keys to Tomorrow, and the daily programs will be devoted to speakers, discussions, and special activities related to Individual Improvement, Dedicated Service, and Trained Leadership.

The local delegates will help to develop a national program that will interpret Exploring to others and expand Exploring as a dynamic youth movement, Schultz said.

Among the features of the conference program are Young American Night to recognize outstanding teen-agers, individual skill events, a major service project with all 2,000 Explorers participating, a variety show featuring Miss Teenage America, and election of the chairmen for 12 regional Explorer conferences to be held in 1969.

Vacation Time— Use Your Head— Not Your Heart

The advent of summer brings a vacation-with-pay gleam to the eye of millions of Americans. And a word of advice from the Minnesota Heart Association. Remember, you may be on vacation, but your heart doesn't get one!

That splendid organ was designed to work without a layoff. But the temptation is to make abnormal demands on it at just the time it has to work harder to keep you cool in heat and high humidity.

Your heart will sustain you in added activity only if you have trained it to do so gradually. Don't be a week-end athlete, or a two-week-on-end activist. Especially if you are near or in middle-age and have led a fireside existence.

Sedentary individuals, especially those who are consistent cigarette smokers, appear to be especially prone to lethal heart attacks, according to your Minnesota Heart Association.

You may be eager to squeeze the maximum out of your free time and money, but don't plunge into activities, particularly on that first trip to the beach. The water may be colder than you think, and sudden, extreme changes of temperature can affect even the healthy heart.

Moderation is the key in everything. Follow a nutritious diet, but don't overeat. Instead of rich, fatty foods, eat fish, chicken, turkey, lean meats, vegetables, fruit, skimmed milk, cheeses made with skimmed milk, and margarine and shortenings made with polyunsaturated vegetable oils. These are light, digestible, and the basis for a diet low in cholesterol and saturated fats, which promotes better health the year round.

Of course, if you are a heart patient, you should seek your doctor's advice before planning a vacation. For all others the foregoing advice boils down to this — if you use your head, you will be helping your heart. 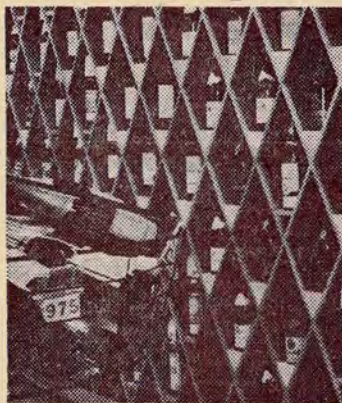

Eastside Theatre '.. Mitty' & '.. Alice'

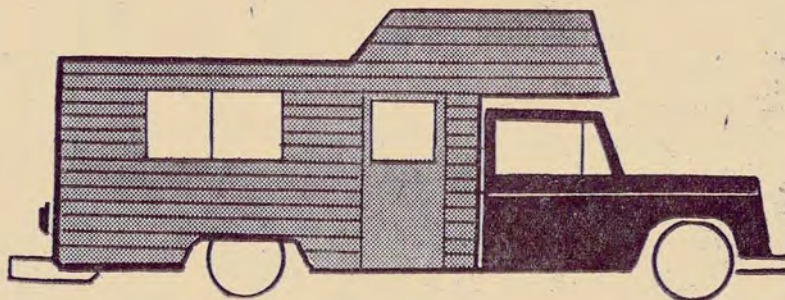
St. Paul's Eastside Theatre currently has two plays playing in repertory.

Barbara Waters Founders' Day Featured Speaker

Teachers Aide Program Opens Next Fall in Mpls.

The teacher aide program will be expanded by 200 persons when the Minneapolis Public Schools open next fall, according to program director Fred Hayen.

SOCIAL SECURITY 1967 BENEFICIARY RAISE

The social security amendments of 1967 raise from \$1500 to \$1680 the amount of total earnings a social security beneficiary may have in a year without any of his benefits being withheld. Mr. Ralph H. Gower, District Manager in St. Paul, announced.

He pointed out that this new provision applies to all monthly beneficiaries under age 72 but not to any person who is receiving benefits because he is disabled. (Special rules with medical considerations must be applied when people who are receiving benefits because of their disability return to work.)

No benefits will be withheld from a beneficiary if his earnings are no more than \$1680 in 1968. If total earnings exceed \$1680, \$1 is withheld from benefits for each \$2 of earnings between \$1680 and \$2880; above \$2880, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 of earnings.

However, no benefits would be lost for a month in which the beneficiary neither earns over \$140 in wages nor performs substantial services as a self-employed person. As under previous law, beginning with the month in which he reached age 72 no benefits are withheld

regardless of how much a beneficiary may earn.

Mr. Gower emphasized that, due to these new provisions, it is increasingly important that people approaching retirement age realize that they may be able to collect some social security benefits although they still continue to work. He urged those who wish additional information about social security payments while still working to visit the social security district office at 316 Robert Street in St. Paul or telephone 228-7911.

New Laws On Kids Health

Changes in Minnesota laws will affect children enrolling in Minneapolis Public Schools for the first time next fall.

Proof of measles immunization or a doctor's statement that the child has had red measles is required. An exception is made only if a doctor states that a child cannot have measles immunization, or if a parent states that his religion forbids immunization. This certificate is required for entrance into any Minnesota school.

Children who reach their fifth birthday on or before November 30, 1968 are eligible for kindergarten in September, 1968. In 1969 children must reach their fifth birthday on or before October 31, 1969; in 1970 on or before September 30, 1970; in 1971 and thereafter on or before August 31, to be eligible for kindergarten in September.

Election Judges Needed

The St. Paul Election Bureau will need about 100 more election judges for the November Presidential Election. The election will require 750 judges for St. Paul, and the Bureau estimates that only 650 will be available. Ordinarily examinations for election judges are given in "off-years" only, but the need for judges for the November election makes an examination necessary this summer.

The examination is a short one, involving checking names and addresses, simple counting and verifying of numbers, and general knowledge of elections.

Applicants must be qualified voters, 21 to 64 years of age and can not be present government employees. The basic pay is \$18.00 per election.

Applications can be made at the Bureau of Elections in the St. Paul City Hall up to August 2nd, with the exam being given at 9 a.m. Saturday, August 10th at Mechanic Arts High School.
