In the meantime, the office of register of deeds is prepared to file copies of these discharges (separation notice DD-214) and to return the original and an additional certified copy for use with the bonus application, free of charge. charge.

For those veterans who have For those veterans who have previously filed discharge papers and have already received free certified copies, additional copies may be obtained for the sum of fifty cents per copy. Veterans should begin im-

wediate filing of these important papers to expedite the processing of their bonus application.
