The Talmud Torah, dedicated a year ago, is part of the George Kaplan Educational Building. When its rooms are not in use for the education of the Jewish children of St. Paul, the Talmud Torah is used by every major Jewish organization in the city for meetings and functions.

## Management Center Offers Supervisors' Course Next Week

The first conference in the new College of St. Thomas Management Center will be offered next Monday through Friday, it was announced today by John H. Farley, director. The week-long session will be entitled "Human Relations for Supervisors." Registration, limited to 25 participants, is open to supervisors from business and industry. Classes are from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily.

The Management Center is instituted to provide formalized training for those people currently working in industry in the Upper Midwest region. Future courses during a year-round basis will be developed in two broad categories: Fundamental courses for personnel taking administrative positions, and advanced seminars and workshops for experienced executives.

### Conference Leaders

The program was made possible through a grant received from the Elizabeth C. Quinlan Foundation of Minneapolis last spring.

Guest lecturers will consider what can be accomplished by a supervisor to improve his own human relations skills. Discussions here will consider the role of counseling and training functions of the supervisor as applied to his specific job situation.

Six businessmen from the Twin Cities area serve as an advisory board to the Management Center.

### Registration

All classes, seminars, and workshops will be held on the St. Thomas campus. Registration fee for the first week-long session is \$75 which includes tuition, classroom materials and luncheons served each day.

Other courses which will follow later are: Executive Appraisal and Selection, Executive Development, The Role of the Modern Corporation, Job Evaluation, A Communication Clinic, and Personnel Testing Service.

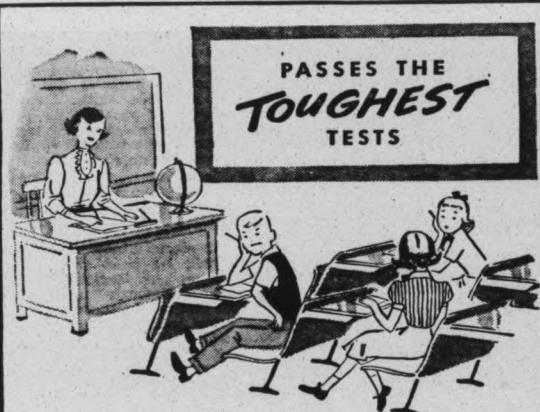
To the Editor:

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## Korean War Veterans Can Apply for Bonuses Starting Next Monday

Application forms for veterans who are eligible for the Korean war bonus payment will soon be in the hands of the various county service officers and will be available to veterans beginning Monday.

It will be necessary for veterans to have a certified copy of their discharge to accompany the bonus application for processing. In the meantime, the office of register of deeds is prepared to file copies of these discharges (separation notice DD-214) and to return the original and an additional certified copy for use with the bonus application, free of charge.

For those veterans who have previously filed discharge papers and have already received free certified copies, additional copies may be obtained for the sum of fifty cents per copy.

Veterans should begin immediate filing of these important papers to expedite the processing of their bonus application.

Registrations are now being taken for another year of Great Books discussions in our area. First meetings will be held the third and fourth weeks in September. The twice-monthly meetings are cost free. No scholastic requirements are made.

Here is the way it works. Twice a month groups of from 15 to 20 friends and neighbors get together at someone's home or in one of the branch libraries for an evening of stimulating and inspirational discussion of some of the world's great books.

#### Small Groups

The small group meetings provide a chance for individuals to express their ideas freely. Listening to differing points of view, too, becomes a pleasure in the expertly guided sessions. The Great Books plan provides for two trained leaders who guide the discussions by asking questions. Here is a way of meeting new and interesting people under circumstances that give you opportunity to find out what they are really thinking about important issues. You can compare thoughts on works by such

authors as Shakespeare, Freud and Mark Twain. There are no fees, no examinations, no graduation, it is just a wonderful way to gain more knowledge and to improve oneself by sitting down for an evening twice a month with a group of interesting people.

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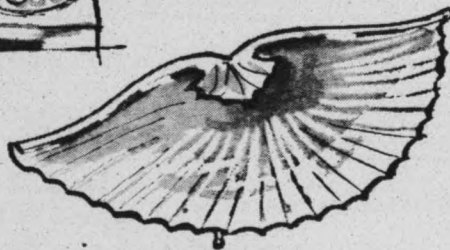
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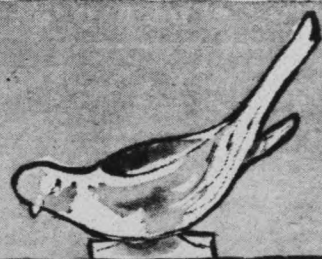


left: **ARDMORE VASE**, an elegant vase in a true classical design. The urn is ideal for formal flower arrangements. \$14.95

## Metallic-Yarn Fabric Requires Special Care In Dry Cleaning

The use of metallic yarns is a very important fashion note in fall and winter apparel fabrics. They are used in every conceivable fabric construction from sheers and chiffons for evening, crepes and matelasses for afternoon, to luxurious velvet evening coats and wool daytime coats.

The National Institute of Drycleaning, Silver Spring, Maryland, says that the majority of fabrics containing metallic yarns dryclean satisfactorily, but that some require very special handling in wear and in drycleaning. All metallic yarns are subject to abrasion or rubbing in wear. The imported yarns made of gold and silver plated copper filaments have a tendency to tarnish with wear and drycleaning. American-made yarns give much better performance in use, but some of these have limitations too.

Consult your drycleaner if you have questions regarding the care and cleaning of your household or wearing apparel items that contain metallic yarns.
