U of M Heart Surgery To Be on National TV

The vitally interesting story of heart surgery at the University of Minnesota will be presented to a nationwide television audience Sunday, March 9 at 4 p. m. when CBS and WCCO Television present "Conquest."

"Conquest's" cameras will be trained on one of the nation's most famous heart surgeons, Dr. C. Walter Lillehei of the University of Minnesota, as he and his associates perform a delicate, miraculous, and revolutionary heart operation. The University scientists will demonstrate use of a specially-designed "heart-lung machine" which enables the surgeon to operate directly on the human heart without interrupting the patient's normal circulation of blood.

This feature of the new CBS Television series devoted to science and scientists was filmed at the University of Minnesota Hospital. Narrator will be Harry Reasoner of CBS, former Twin City television news reporter.

Anyone peeking into the Rossini home will find three cribs in

the nursery, three high chairs in the kitchen, three red wagons, and a well used double-decker triplet stroller in the attic.

The Rossini triplets were named after their father, Carl Sr., their uncle, Brother Carnac (William Coen), and Father Bernard Murray, pastor of St. Leo's Catholic Church. Mrs. Rossini has hopes of at least one of them one day becoming a priest.

"So far we've been fortunate that the boys have been healthy," Mr. Rossini reported. "Oh, they did get the Asian flu all right, but luckily each at different intervals. This Christmas was the first one that the boys were old enough to enjoy, and we all had a circus. Those three little red-heads went wild!"

Last summer the Rossini family flew to Nashville, Tennessee, to visit the boys' grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Coen. "The triplets behaved nicely on the flight," Mr. Rossini commented, "but we must admit we breathed easier when we got on the ground again."

Their paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Rossini, 1875 Hampshire Avenue, get the opportunity to enjoy the triplets more often, as they live just a block away.

"Yes, the triplets have been lots of hard work," Mr. and Mrs. Rossini stated, "but the work is nothing compared to the countless hours of pleasure they give us. Their bags of tricks are never empty."

St. Paul Chapter of Hadassah will have as its guest and speaker Mrs. Manache Eliacher of Israel at the regular chapter meeting next Wednesday at the St. Paul Talmud Torah. Luncheon will be served to both Rishona and Calmenson-Ziona groups at 12:45 p.m.

Mrs. Eliacher, now chairman of the Maabaroth project (transition camps), and of Hadassah's Vocational Education Services in Israel, is a descendant of an old Sephardic family whose members first came to Palestine in 1485. Since that time her family has been intimately connected with the fate and fortunes of Palestine and the State of Israel. Mrs. Eliacher was educated at the Evelina de Rothschild School in Jerusalem and is a graduate of the Jerusalem Girl's College. She speaks fluent Hebrew, English, French, Spanish, and Arabic.

Her voluntary public service started when she was sent to a World Jamboree in England as sole representative of the Palestine Baden-Powell Girl Guides here. Since that time she has served her country in many capacities, and continues her work no where Hadassah.

The family day care program, formerly administered in this county by the State Department of Public Welfare, has been transferred to the County Welfare Board. This community service makes licensed family day care homes available for preschool children of employed parents. At present, there are more than two hundred licensed homes, some of which are in the Highland area. Employed parents may be referred to licensed homes in their neighborhood by calling the County Welfare Board.

A family day care home is one which is licensed for five or fewer children during working hours. A home may be licensed if it meets the standards established by the Department of Public Welfare. Those wishing to provide family day care in their homes may learn of the need for homes in their neighborhood and requirements for licensure by calling Mrs. Ruby Pembroke, CA. 2-2892, ext. 243.

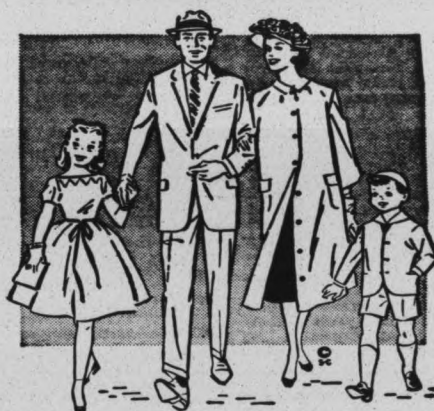

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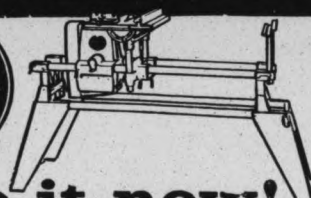

It is the oldest ballet company in this country and is the direct descendant of the Diaghileff Ballet that came out of Russia to startle and electrify France and all of Europe in 1908. The adjective "Russe" signifies its adherence to the traditions of the Russian School of Dance, a school that took the best of the Italian and France Schools and added a more dramatic presentation than ballet had therefore. Since the company was founded in Monte

Carlo and the term "Ballet Russe" is used by other organizations, it was felt the Monte Carlo would not only honor its so-called birthplace but distinguished it from other companies.

The form of dance known as ballet started life as a form of entertainment at the Royal Courts in France and took nearly a century before it took its place among the professional theatrical arts, both independently and as a complement to operas.

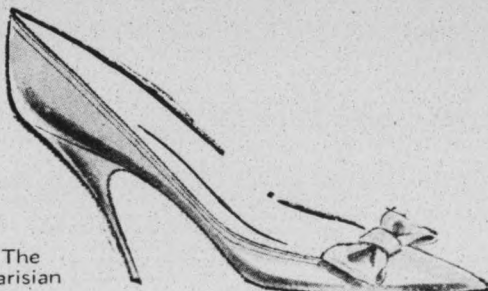

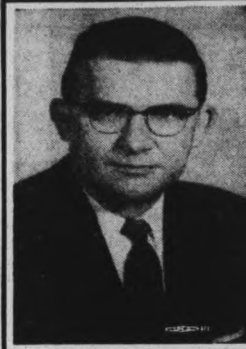

Bethesda Hospital Additions Planned; Work Starts in July

A \$2,000,000 fund drive will be launched in April by Bethesda hospital to finance a 100-bed addition and a new 142-bed infirmary across the street from the hospital. The expansion plan was announced Saturday by Dr. Robert Holmen of St. Paul, chairman of the Bethesda board of managers.

Dr. Holmen said the public appeal has been planned to help meet the critical shortage of hospital facilities in the Twin Cities. The building program is scheduled to be started this summer. Bethesda hospital is located at 559 Capitol boulevard, about three blocks north of the Minnesota Capitol.

Dr. Holmen, who also is president of the Board of Christian Service of the Minnesota Conference of Augustana Lutheran church, said the infirmary will supplement the 137-bed Bethesda Invalid Home at 249 E. Ninth street (Ninth and Wacouta streets). This 50-year-old home has been operating at capacity, too. Future plans for the Invalid Home will be worked out after the infirmary has been built.

Plans for the million-dollar hospital addition are being prepared. The six-story wing will be attached near the hospital's main entrance, extending to the sidewalk which runs parallel to Capitol boulevard. It will change the building's shape into a "T" form. A small extension at the rear of the present structure will provide space for enlargement of nursing stations and installation of service elevators.

Infirmary plans have been completed. Ground will be broken by July 1. The new building will have 142 beds on four floors, with construction permitting the later addition of three more stories and a total capacity of 250 beds.

Bring Records to Apply For Social Security

Persons applying for social security benefits can speed the payment of their claims by bringing the necessary records with them according to Palmer Elder, district manager of the St. Paul social security office.

Wage earners and the survivors of deceased wage earners should furnish a copy of the Form W-2 "Statement of Wages Paid" for the preceding year. In addition they should supply the information regarding earnings for the current year.

Self-employed persons or their survivors should be prepared to furnish a copy of Schedule C (or Schedule F for farmers) and other supplementary schedules with their income tax reports for the preceding year. They should also furnish the cancelled check or other evidence that the tax has been paid. The estimated earnings from self-employment for the current year should be furnished.

No person should delay contacting his social security office, because he lacks any of these records, Elder states. Delays in filing claims may mean a loss in benefits. However, if all the records available are taken to the social security office when an applicant seeks to file a claim, it will assure the earliest possible payment of benefits.

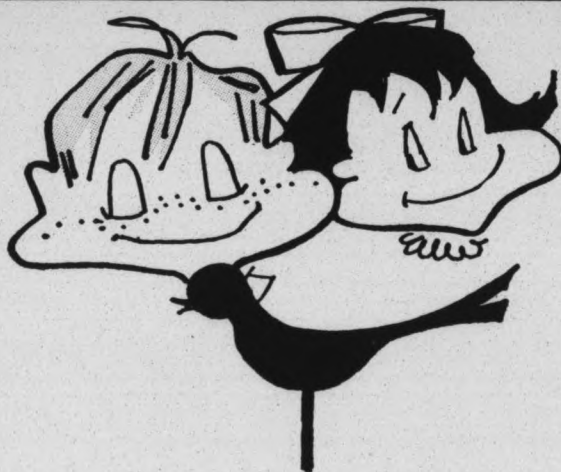
