Macalester Will Publish **3 Economics Bulletins**

"How to Be Your Own Economist" is the name of three economics bulletins which will be published next week by Macalester college.

The bulletins were written by Dr. Arthur R. Upgren, director of the Macalester college bureau of economic studies. The bulletins will be sent to leading economists in the nation, to leading newspapers and magazines in the pation and business.

The second bulletin is entitled "Our Depressions are Getting Smaller." In this Dr. Upgren points out that we can reduce the size of our depressions by the methods we used in 1949 and 1954. He says that with these methods we can greatly reduce the size of any economic depression.

Third of the economics bulletins is called "What to do for the Recession of 1958." In this Dr. Upgren points out that reduction of taxes is the best way to fend off further economic recession in 1958 and get us started back on the path of economic growth and expansion. Dr. Upgren states that tax reduction can get us back to prosperity at a cost of less than nothing.

The three bulletins have a foreword by Dr. Charles J. Turck, It is the theory of Dr. Upgren that economics is a "liberating art" and that America needs economic abundance for the maintenance of its liberties. He feels that any person can learn the functioning of American economics and can understand how defunctioning of American economics and can understand how depressions and recessions can be reduced and even eliminated. Dr. Upgren says he has put his ideas so clearly and simply that the average man, after reading the bulletins, can understand how the American economy functions.

"Conquest" cameras will be trained on one of the nation's most famous heart surgeons, Dr. C. Walter Lillehei of the University of Minnesota, as he and his associates perform a delicate, miraculous, and revolutionary heart operation. The University scientists will demonstrate use of a specially-designed "heart-lung machine" which enables the surgeon to operate directly on the human heart without interrupting the patient's normal circulation of blood.

Family Day Care **Program Outlined**

The family day care program, formerly administered in this county by the State Department of Public Welfare, has been transferred to the County Welfare Board. This community service makes licensed family day care homes available for preschool children of employed parents. At present, there are more than two hundred licensed homes, some of which are in the Highland area. Employed parents may be referred to licensed homes in their neighborhood by calling the County Welfare Board.

Bethesda Hospital Additions Planned: Work Starts in July

A \$2,000,000 fund drive will be launched in April by Bethesda hospital to finance a 100-bed addition and a new 142-bed infirmary across the street from the hospital. The expansion plan was announced Saturday by Dr. Robert Holmen of St. Paul, chairman of the Bethesda board of mangers. mangers

Dr. Holmen said the public appeal has been planned to help meet the critical shortage of hosmeet the critical shortage of hos-pital facilities in the Twin Cities. The building program is sched-uled to be started this summer. Bethesda hospital is located at 559 Capitol boulevard, about three blocks north of the Minnesota Capital Capitol

Capitol.

Dr. Holmen, who also is president of the Board of Christian Service of the Minnesota Conference of Augustana Lutheran church, said the Infirmary will supplement the 137-bed Bethesda Invalid Home at 249 E. Ninth street (Ninth and Wacouta streets). This 50-year-old home has been operating at capacity, too. Future plans for the Invalid Home will be worked out after the Infirmary has been built.

Plans for the million-dollar hospital addition are being prepared. The six-story wing will be attached near the hospital's main entrance, extending to the sidewalk which runs parallel to Capitol boulevard. It will change the building's shape into a "T" form. A small extension at the rear of the present structure will provide space for enlargement of provide space for enlargement of nursing stations and installation of service elevators.

Infirmary plans have been comnammary plans have been com-pleted. Ground will be broken by July 1. The new building will have 142 beds on four floors, with construction permitting the later addition of three more stories and a total capacity of 250 beds.

Bring Records to Apply For Social Security

Persons applying for social security benefits can speed the payment of their claims by bring-ing the necessary records with them according to Palmer Elder, district manager of the St. Paul

them according to Palmer Elder, district manager of the St. Paul social security office.

Wage earners and the survivors of deceased wage earners should furnish a copy of the Form W-2 "Statement of Wages Paid" for the preceding year. In addition they should supply the information regarding earnings for the current year. current year.

current year.

Self-employed persons or their survivors should be prepared to furnish a copy of Schedule C (or Schedule F for farmers) and other supplementary schedules with their income tax reports for the preceding year. They should also furnish the cancelled check or other evidence that the tax has been paid. The estimated earnings from self-employment for the current year should be furnished.

No person should delay No person should delay con-tacting his social security office, because he lacks any of these rec-ords, Elder states. Delays in filing claims may mean a loss in bene-fits. However, if all the records available are taken to the social security office when an applicant seeks to file a claim, it will assure the earliest possible payment of benefits.


