Heat loss photos of Highland area homes to be on display

Aerial infra-red photographs of Highland area homes will be on display at two neighborhood banks during the next few weeks.

The photos, which indicate the level of home heat loss experienced on one evening at about this time last year, will be interpreted for interested area residents by a specially trained team from the St. Paul Housing and Redevelopment Authority. HRA employees will also offer tips on techniques available to homeowners to conserve energy.

The heat loss photo display is currently on view at First Grand Avenue State Bank, 1071 Grand Ave. Viewing hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Mon-

days through Thursdays, and from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Fridays. The display will close on March 24.

An identical exhibition opens this coming Monday, March 20 at MidAmerica State Bank of Highland Park, 2004 Ford Pkwy. Viewing hours there will also be from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays, and from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Fridays. The display will remain on view at MidAmerica through March 24.

Homeowners who view the display should know the amount and kind of insulation they are now using, and the number of homes between theirs and the nearest intersection.

HiGroMac hosts meeting to form area District Council

The Highland-Groveland-Macalester Community Association has volunteered to act as convenor at a public meeting in behalf of Districts 14 and 15 to facilitate eventual City Council recognition in St. Paul's citizen participation process.

According to current HiGroMac president Howard Guthmann, the meeting has been set for Thursday, March 30 at 7:30 p.m. in the Faculty Dining Room, St. Joseph's Hall on the campus of The College of St. Catherine. Mike McTeague, chairman of the HiGroMac board will serve as temporary chairman to get the session underway, and until a permanent chairman is chosen.

Other organizations in the area have been apprised

of HiGroMac's move toward formation of a district council that could include both District 14 and 15 into one combined group, to be known as "Southwest Area District Council."

The two districts include the area between the River on the West and South, Summit Avenue on the North, and the Shortline and 35-E Freeway cut on the East.

Senate District 63 DFL convention set for April 1

Inver Hills/Oneida college courses to begin March 27

A college level course in Human Sexuality is one of 28 classes being offered this spring as part of the Inver Hills/Oneida Education Center inner-city program. The class will meet from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. on eleven consecutive Wednesdays beginning March 29 at Family Tree, a community health clinic located at 1599 Selby Ave.

Goals of the course, are to help individuals develop a better understanding of their own sexual attitudes, values, behavior and identity; to help desensitize individuals in dealing with sexual issues; to help individuals better appreciate the issues related to adolescent sexuality; and to help individuals gain a better understanding of sexual variations, deviations, offenses, offenders and victims.

The course in Human Sexuality is one of the many course offerings developed by the Inver Hill/Oneida Education Center inner-city program to meet the needs of individuals who are interested in further schooling for job advancement, a career change, or simply personal development.

The courses being offered usually emphasize

practical information applicable while on the job and in other day-to-day situations. The cost is \$11.50 per credit, and tuition assistance is available. Students are also welcome to use Inver Hills/Oneida educational counseling services free of charge.

The 28 classes being offered this term begin the week of March 27. All are being held at community centers, churches, schools, and other facilities within St. Paul. Classes offered in this area will meet at Homecroft School, the St. Paul Jewish Community Center, the Adult Community Education Center (old Gordon School), the Minnesota Opera Company, Oneida Education Center and, of course, Family Tree.

Spring term classes will be offered in the following subject areas: business management, career development, English, human services, law enforcement, learning lab, psychology, physical education, secretarial skills and speech.







Casey assumes superintendent's post at Saint Thomas Academy

Archbishop John R. Roach and the Board of Trustees of Saint Thomas Academy, upon the recommendation of a search committee chaired by Joseph T. O'Neill, have announced the appointment of J. Patrick Casey as superintendent/headmaster of Saint Thomas Academy effective July 1, 1978.

Casey, a 1953 graduate of St. Mary's College in Winona, received his M.A.T. degree in Theology and Psychology at St. Mary's in 1970. He did additional undergraduate work in Industrial Arts at Stout State University, Menomonie, Wisconsin, and has worked toward an Ed.S. degree at the College of St. Thomas.

Casey's professional experience began at St. Patrick's High School in Chicago as mathematics teacher and athletic moderator for five years. He then moved to Benilde High School in Minneapolis where he was teacher, assistant principal, and

He and his wife, Terry, and their two sons, Sean and Kevin, reside at 5840 Tenneson Drive in Fridley.

Casey succeeds James P. Clark, who resigned as headmaster effective June 30, 1978, to assume educational responsibilities in another area.

There's a feeling I get when we get to the Ides of March . . . that maybe Ide (sic) just as soon be somewhere else basking in the sunshine about this time of year.

Maybe it's because I didn't take a winter sun-break. Maybe it's because I hear some 90 seniors at Highland Park High . . . along with more from four other high schools in this metro area . . . will be spending a full week in the land of Sweet Lalani—starting next Sunday.

So I look out the window and see what we euphemously refer to as 'snow flurries.' It makes you wonder what the weather will be like Friday for the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade. That's also the day when one heckuva lot of kids discover they're at least part Irish . . . so they can 'can' the classes in favor of going downtown to watch the big parade.

And so the calendar tells us that Spring will barely be here . . . such as Spring is around here by March 21 . . . before Easter arrives forthwith—so very, very early. Let us be among the first to wish you all a Happy Easter! (Passover, by the way, comes a lot, lot later this year.)

Now with so many elm trees being felled by city crews (most of them, of necessity, I understand), you may have to drive around a bit to actually find out when the leaves will begin to sprout. Gad, I came home the other evening to find the boulevards on our whole end of the block a veritable disaster area. Doesn't it make you feel kinda 'naked'? Sorta like moving to a housing tract in a newly developed, heavily bulldozed area.

Many of us might not live long enough to see shade trees grow to comparable heights . . . unless we resort to fast-growing silver maples or something of that genre. Must be good biz, though, for the residential landscaping people.

On the other hand, maybe it isn't the long winter and the weather at all. Maybe it's the fact that the legislature is in session that's making so many of us a little uptight, along about now. Of course, there's nothing new in that. Back in 1866, a New York surrogate by the name of Tucker came up with a gem of a statement that's never outlived its usefulness and apt application. "No man's life, liberty or property are safe," he said, "while the legislature is in session."

Of course, it used to be bad enough when our Minnesota solons got together for about 120 days every two years. But now we have to suffer these untold certainties every Winter and Spring . . . and with all that social engineering that's being attempted up there on the hill, well . . .

It seems our legislature taketh away in off years, and then giveth back a few dribbles in so-called tax "cuts" during election years. They blasted us with scary rates of 16%, 17% and 18% in the upper brackets last year, and now have dropped it back to 17% (instead of the previous 15%) just to show us their hearts are "in the right place."

This inflation is an incumbent legislator's dream . . . he can repeatedly point to the tax cuts he helped to pass . . . when in truth he's done nothing more than modify an atrociously large automatic increase.

Wait and see . . . sooner or later we'll find out that the adjustment could have been much larger . . . but not before our boys and girls on the hill will have found another new way of making all that surplus disappear.

Maybe, it's about time we gave you a little cause for optimism. It came to us in a 'Report Brief' from the City's Planning Division, and featured some population and housing facts, based on a longer report called, "St. Paul in the Mid-70's: A Case for Confidence." For instance, were you aware that while St. Paul's population declined about 5% between 1970 and 1975 (down to 295,104), the number of households increased by 4% to 108,443? Obviously the average size of a household has been declining. Consider this: "The proportion of households that are families dropped from 8 out of every 9 in 1950, to 6 out of every 9 in 1975."

It seems "the young adult (18-24) and early middle age (25-44) groups are increasing in St. Paul, while the late middle age (45-64) and elderly groups are essentially stabilizing." Rather shocking to find out that I'm already in late middle age. Anyway, where the population is being lost, as we all know, is in the preschool and school age groups.

As you might expect . . . with 'families' now representing only two-thirds of the city's households, multiple family (3 or more) units, increased 47% between 1960 and 1975, while single family (1 and 2) units decreased by 5%. By 1975, multiple family units thus comprised 35% of St.

Paul's total housing. Construction of single family units is picking up again, however, with 296 permits issued in 1977. That's the second largest number since 1965.

I might have written these lines earlier if Jan and I hadn't taken time out on Friday night to see the Central High-Highland Park girl's basketball finals in Region 3A. Some amazingly good athletes on both those teams, buoyed on (if you'll pardon the expression) by a large, enthusiastic crowd in the Washington High gym.

The Highland girls had beaten Central in late January, 55-38, and in mid-February, 44-41. But that was when Joni Hagemeyer, their 5'10" center, leading scorer and rebounder, was still in there. At season's end, she suffered a dislocated knee in a fluke on-court accident. The Scots lost that non-conference game to North St. Paul in overtime; then recovered sufficiently to get to the finals of the Region. Central won this one going away, 50-35, in spite of the efforts of Chris Durand and her cohorts to hang in there. What a classic it might have been between these two teams, if Hagemeyer hadn't been hurt! Congratulations to the Highland girls on their St. Paul City Conference and Twin City championship achievement and good luck to Central High in the state tourney, the third straight time they've made it to this classic.

Central won it all in 1976, and took consolation honors last year. Their only losses this season were those two to Highland, and a non-conference game in which three of their starters were missing, an 18-3 record to date. Highland finished at 19-3; their one conference loss came early, against Hill-Murray, again on a day when Chris Durand was out sick. This end of town seems to have lots of girl talent . . . now that we've given them a chance to be 'discovered'!

Before I run clean out of space, there's one more thing that ought to rate more than passing mention. With this issue we have put twenty-five years of the Highland Villager to bed. This March 15th issue begins the 26th year—in other words—and represents what is really our Silver Anniversary issue. Now we're not going to let it all go by quietly like this, you understand. We're planning a year-long series of nostalgic efforts to call attention to this milestone.

This publisher, of course, cannot take credit for all this longevity, so unique in the local community newspaper field. Why, I've barely lived here (in St. Paul, that is) for 24 years. You can credit me with another three years of residence in Minneapolis, though . . . at the tail-end of the forties. Actually this ownership is only in its eighth year here at the Villager.

But we do have someone still with us . . . albeit on a part-time basis . . . who was in on the origins of the Villager, back in March of 1953 . . . and that's Elizabeth Haas. So here's a toast to her for a quarter-century of continued association with this publication. (We'll follow up with a toast you can taste, Liz, after we get this issue put to bed.)

Parting pilfered punchline—Money will buy a pretty good dog, but it won't buy the wag of the tail. And a bonus finale—People rarely succeed at anything unless they have fun doing it. So have fun—even if it hurts a little. Hasta la vista!

Highland area student named Fulbright Scholarship winner

Seven hundred fifty outstanding U.S. undergraduates applied for Fulbright Scholarships to the United Kingdom this year. Larry Merwin, a senior at Hamline University and son of Mr. and Mrs. Otis Merwin, 1358 James Ave., was one of only 32 accepted.

A chemistry major, Merwin will study nuclear mag-

netic resonance spectroscopy at the University of East Anglia in Norwich, England next fall. NMR is a tool used by scientists to investigate the chemical structure and motion of a variety of compounds in the liquid state. Merwin's independent research will be supervised by Dr. Robin Harris, a noted expert on NMR.

A 1974 honor graduate of Highland Park Senior High, Merwin began accumulating college honors during his first year at Hamline when he received the school's Outstanding Freshman in Biology award and the American Chemical Society's Outstanding Freshman award.

The impetus to apply for a Fulbright Scholarship came from Merwin's academic advisor at Hamline, Dr. Clifford Creswell, who also studied with Harris.

Merwin is especially excited about the coming year's research because of recent breakthroughs in the study of NMR.

"I will be using some newly developed techniques and adapting them to find appropriate conditions for using NMR on Silicone-29 compounds," Merwin said.

He explained that silicone compounds are an "interesting" subject for study because "they are similar to carbon, and carbon compounds are the basis for all organic chemicals, in other words, life."

Merwin is due in London September 12 for a two-week orientation program before he begins his research. Right now, his plans are up in the air for when he returns from East Anglia. But after getting his M.S. degree, he hopes to go on and get a Ph.D. After that, he'll take a long look at a teaching graduate and undergraduate chemistry where he could also continue his research.

But it's not as if Merwin hasn't been up in the air before. Besides citing the usual Minnesota pastimes of biking and camping, the rather quiet chemist hopes to continue to develop in a field of endeavor he first jumped into last summer because of its "completely different" nature. Merwin is an amateur skydiver.



And all this time you thought shamrocks were Ireland's most colorful export. Well, never mind. Patrick C. Power's *The Book of Irish Curses* ought to set you right soon enough.

Power's scholarly treatise on the time-honored tradition of losing your temper with a typically Irish flair offers a short, if sometimes overly explicated account of the whys and wherefores of cursing on the Emerald Isle. Kind of amore Than You Ever Wanted to Know About Cursing and as a Result Never Asked.

In fact, *The Book of Irish Curses* owes most of its general appeal to the language expressed in the oaths themselves (little having been lost, it would seem, in the translation from the 2,000-year-old Gaelic tongue to modern-day English).

Such thunderous invectives as "May the devil cut the head off you and make a day's work of your neck!" and "May the devil damn you to the stone of dirges seven miles below hell!" are the stuff that makes this book worth reading.

In between, Powers pauses for an analysis of cursing rituals, the kinds of curses once in style (including the dreaded Widow's Curse and Priest's Curse), and cursing formulae.

All well and good, I suppose, but the fascination this book holds—and could have held a lot more of—is revealed when one compares the richness of the Irish mode of expression in the English language with its paltry counterparts in the U.S. and England.

By the time the reader gets to the end of the book, it is not, to use Powers words, "blackly humorous" to advocate a return to Irish cursing formulae when what has succeeded it is indeed dull obscenity.



talking out of school

Public awareness, legislation and special programs developed during the past several years have greatly enhanced the quality of education enjoyed today by students with learning difficulties and those who are physically handicapped.

One group has received little attention, however. They are the students with high ability or special talents.

In an effort to provide parents of these children with a forum as well as a potential lobbying arm, the St. Paul Council For The Gifted and Talented was formed.

According to Barbara Ford, vice-president of the council, the primary goal of the group is to help "create a climate in schools and society which maximizes the development of human potential."

At the present time, our schools are sadly lacking in programs which challenge high ability students to realize their full potential. We believe the St. Paul Council for the Gifted and Talented can fill a real need within the community, and we encourage all parents of gifted and talented students to contact the officers of this organization.

TRAVELING TROPHY

This week's Traveling Trophy, the "Stuck in a Rut Award," goes to Mr. Ken Berg, Deputy Superintendent of Schools, for his proposal to spend \$20,000 to hire a consultant to evaluate the school district's achievement testing program.

Berg's proposal appears to be just another in a long series of efforts (including the attempt to cut the testing budget, random sample testing, etc.) to emasculate the only meaningful and objective measure we have to determine the school district's progress in educating our children.

Before Berg introduced this proposal at a recent school board meeting, a special meeting of the district's Evaluation Committee was held to examine the implications of just such a proposal.

The committee, composed of teachers, administrators and parents, was very much opposed to hiring an outside consultant for a task they felt qualified to undertake themselves.

They did recognize that a professional might be needed, however. If such were the case, they suggested the following guidelines be followed in the selection of a consultant:

1. The committee shall recommend two or three qualified evaluators, from which the board shall pick one.
2. That individual must be independent of the school district's testing program, have credentials as a program evaluator, and present examples of reputable studies similar to the one proposed.
3. That if such a professional were hired, he would work with the committee.

The introduction of this proposal by the administration is a clear indication that the recommendations of the Evaluation Committee have already been buried in the quagmire of administrative bureaucracy.

We can understand why the school administration continues to try to find a way to shut off a spotlight which reflects the effectiveness of the millions of tax dollars being spent on education. However, we urge the administration to follow the committee's recommendations and allow those who are involved in the day-to-day instruction of our children to help decide whether or not the present testing program meets the needs of our students.

So to you, Mr. Berg, as well as to others in the administration who appear to be stuck in that rut of continually trying to find ways to terminate this program, we present the Talking Out of School Traveling Trophy—one garden size, forged steel shovel.

While you're digging your way out of that rut, you might just find that buried committee report!





Central and Highland Park take the lead as girls' basketball comes of age in Minnesota

Since girls basketball was first introduced as a competitive sport in the St. Paul schools five years ago, the two dominant teams have been Highland Park and Central high schools.

Highland Park captured the city title the first two years the sport was played, and this year took both the St. Paul City Conference and Twin Cities championships.

Central, which won the Class AA title at the first state tournament two years ago, returned last year and came away with consolation honors.

At the third annual State High School Girls Basketball Tournament which begins this Thursday, St. Paul will be represented for the third straight year by Central, winner of the Region 3AA championship game against Highland last Friday night.

Though the girls basketball program is still in its infancy in Minnesota, Highland Park coach Betty Richardson says it has already been well accepted by the students—both boys and girls.

"Before we had interscholastic sports, girls were limited to competing in intramurals," she said. "Basically society had said that girls were not to be too aggressive. It somehow clashed with a feeling that they should appear feminine."

"In the five years we have played competitively, this attitude has broken down. Now the girl athletes are looked up to as school leaders by the students, just as the boy athletes are."

Lou Kanavati, Central High coach, also finds a wide-spread acceptance for the program and for the girls as representatives of the school. "All the students are really behind the girls," he said.

Acceptance notwithstanding, the crowds during the regular season have not been good, due primarily to the times at which the games are played. The girls play their games at 4:30 p.m. at the opposing site at which the boys' game is played. Thus, if the Harding

boys play at Central at night, the Central girls play at Harding at 4:30 that afternoon.

In Iowa, where a very strong girls basketball program has been in existence for decades, the girls usually play the preliminary to the boys game. In St. Paul, the boys junior varsity teams occupy that slot.

It's been the tournament games that have really drawn the crowds, thanks, in part, to the recent decision of the Minnesota State High School League to hold the girls' state tournament two weeks after the boys' meet.

Now when the girls play their regional and state tournament games, they monopolize the high school

basketball picture because the boys program is already over for the season. Over the last two years, the final game of the girls' state meet has attracted an average of 10,000 people to the Met Sports Center.

Opportunities in competitive sports are also opening up for women at the college level, due to legislation which requires that schools receiving federal money must offer equal extra-curricular activities to both male and female students.

Although the popularity of girls' sports has increased remarkably in St. Paul over the past five years, most of the high school girls teams are coached by men.

"That's because most of the women who are qualified to coach girls teams are young," Betty Richardson said. "They are the ones who have played in high school and college on competitive teams. Because of declining enrollments, there is little opportunity to hire new teachers."

"Men also know more about coaching," she said. "They played on teams when they were in school and they usually have the necessary coaching experience. When a school is looking for a coach for its girls' team, it's obvious they're going to hire the person most qualified for the job."

Richardson herself helped to break the pattern by attending college in Idaho. "I went to Idaho because I wanted to take part in sports," she said. "There was hardly anything available in Minnesota at that time."


After finishing college, she coached in Idaho before returning to the Twin Cities. During the five years she's been in Highland, her teams have compiled a total won-lost record of 75-14.

Kanavati took the job at Central last year after the previous coach, Steve Studer, resigned to take an administrative post in Stillwater.

"I'd been coaching junior varsity at Central and was thinking of giving up coaching altogether when this opening developed," Kanavati said. "We had a tough situation, having to follow a state championship team. But we managed to beat Highland three times last year, something we hadn't figured on doing at the start of the season."

Kanavati, whose girls' teams have now racked up impressive 20-5 and 18-3 records in the last two years, says he really enjoys coaching the girls. "They're willing to learn and they have a lot of pride and enthusiasm," he said.

Central fans will get a chance to see just how much of both they have when the Minutemaids take on Mankato East in the first round action of the girls' state meet this Thursday at Met Center.



Next year's freshman class fills out fast at St. Thomas

The College of St. Thomas recently announced it has stopped accepting freshman applications for the 1978 fall semester.

Charles E. Murphy, director of the college's admissions office, explained that St. Thomas had set a limit of 650 freshmen for the 1978 fall semester. They will be selected from a group of more than 900 whose applications have already been approved.

The decision to cut off freshman applications came approximately two months earlier than the college had projected. However, applications from students who wish to transfer to St. Thomas as

sophomores, juniors, or seniors are still being accepted, Murphy said.

St. Thomas, the largest independent college in Minnesota with an undergraduate and graduate enrollment of 4,139, had a fall freshman enrollment of 717 students. The freshman class was part of a total undergraduate day program enrollment of 2,527 students, largest in the college's 93-year history.

The current academic year is St. Thomas's first as a coeducational institution. Of the 231 women undergraduates enrolled, 170 are members of the freshman class.



Senate Report

The state legislature is passing too many laws without adequate evidence to support the need, and without the "due process" essential for a representative system of government.

The Senate Judiciary Committee, of which I am a member, had 17 bills on its agenda for a two-hour meeting on March 10, and an equal number scheduled for its meeting the preceding Wednesday. Some of the bills are short—only one page—but others contain up to 100 pages.

It is impossible for the committee to adequately analyze the consequences of these bills in the time allotted. Because the average legislator believes that his success is somehow measured by the number of bills he can get enacted into law, the legislative process economizes on its time by simply 1) dispensing with the requirement that the proponents of bills prove their cases, and 2) failing to adequately inform the public of upcoming proposals. A good example of the end product of this undemocratic procedure was the 1977 law that imposed a tax on public pensions.

Stability and certainty in our laws is as important as responsiveness to changing conditions. Our laws have taken on such a fluidity that it is virtually impossible to know how to conduct one's affairs without the advice of an attorney. And even attorneys have difficulty keeping up with the flood of legislation.

The legislature seems dead set on abolishing the rule of reason on every subject which it touches, and substituting for reason a bureaucratic, legalistic and inflexible structure which, by its nature, cannot cope with the infinite variety of subject matter it is designed to control. Hence, every year the laws must be changed. The system feeds upon itself.

This trend is accelerating. Soon there will be so many poorly conceived and conflicting laws that there will, in fact, be no law. Any legal position will find a statutory sanction somewhere. The legislature will then be indispensable since only it can undo its own damage.

The legislature must concern itself with these trends and strike a conscious and healthy balance between stability and change. Citizens must take the time to appear at committee meetings to force legislators to think through the consequences of their proposals.

Report from the House

Two House committees have given their approval to the 1978 Energy Bill and have sent it to the House Floor for a vote. The bill is a continuation of Minnesota's efforts to deal with energy conservation and addresses two needs: to bring existing homes up to modern energy efficiency standards and to protect insulation consumers from inadequate or dangerous materials and misleading claims.

If the proposed bill becomes law, a person selling a residential building after October 1, 1979, would be required to provide the buyer with an energy disclosure report prior to the time of sale. The report, completed by a state-certified, free-lance evaluator, would document the extent to which the building meets state energy conservation standards. The standards now being developed will cover attic insulation, storm windows and doors, caulking, weatherstripping, and other energy conservation measures which pay back their costs in fuel savings.

In addition to the disclosure requirement, residences which are renter-occupied would be required to meet caulking and weatherstripping standards by 1980 and other energy standards by 1983.

The second major portion of the bill deals with insulation standards and is basically a consumer protection measure. It would authorize the Energy Agency to set quality, information, and safety specifications covering insulation products, their labeling and installation. A state-supervised testing program would be set up to insure adherence to these standards.

This section of the bill would also prohibit various potentially deceptive advertising claims by requiring that all claims be backed up by valid test results or accompanied by appropriate disclaimers. Specific information would be required on insulation packages to help consumers in choosing the proper insulation.

These insulation standard provisions were developed by the Energy Agency after a study of the current situation in the insulation market revealed the existence of a few "fly by night" operators in the insulation industry who sell inadequate or downright hazardous materials to unsuspecting consumers. Oftentimes these materials are sold in unmarked packages, so that the customer is not informed of either the type of material or the manufacturer. When problems arise, the customer in this situation has little recourse. Given the current boom in the insulation industry, which is expected to continue and even increase with federal tax incentives, protection of insulation consumers is vital in preserving the credibility of energy conservation programs.

NO RETURNS FROM BORDEN BILL

A 10 cent deposit placed on all beer and pop cans and bottles would reduce litter and solid waste, save energy and resources, and encourage refillable bottles. Unfortunately, labor unions, container manufacturers and beverage companies have always side-tracked deposit legislation with self-proclaimed "compromises" and "alternatives" that would have little effect in reducing throwaway packaging.

This year those industries and labor are supporting a litter tax authored by Senator Winston Borden (DFL, Brainerd). Borden's bill (S.F. 1904) is not a compromise for the public or the business community because it would eliminate the incentive not to litter—the deposit provision.

The heart of S.F. 1904 is a litter tax assessed on hundreds of Minnesota companies at the manufacturing or import level. Two related points should be recognized. First, Borden's bill allows large companies, including container manufacturers, breweries and bottlers such as Coca Cola, to pay a maximum litter fee of \$8,000 each for their contribution to the litter problem. Secondly, companies other than those responsible for "No Deposit-No Return" beverage container litter would pay the lions share of the litter tax.





'Films on Wheels' roll for area nursing home residents

What began as a way to earn a few bucks and see a few flicks flopped. So after deciding it was the musicals, not the money, that they really wanted to see, Dave Fantle (1658 Rome Ave.) and Tom Johnson (1906 Sheridan Ave.) tried the non-profit approach.

They've since earned the applause of hundreds of residents of area nursing and convalescent homes.

Tom and Dave dubbed the program "Films on Wheels" and they've been rolling 'em at places like Hayes Haven, St. Mary's and the Shalom Home for nearly two years now.

The two Highland Park seniors developed the original idea of showing vintage Hollywood musicals at the Jewish Community Center with the assistance of Ken Weintraub, JCC youth department supervisor. But when even going out and selling tickets door-to-door failed to draw a following, Tom and Dave figured it was just a question of finding the right audience—and the right price.

The doors they then started knocking on were those of area nursing

homes. Five of them have since become regular stops for Films on Wheels, and others schedule the shows at irregular intervals.

Dave and Tom order the films themselves, usually from Elliot Films in Minneapolis, but sometimes from as far away as Chicago. Costs range anywhere from \$40 to see Bing Crosby and Fred Astaire in *Blue Skies*, to \$85 to go out to the ballpark with Frank Sinatra and Gene Kelly.

After ordering the films, they arrange a schedule with all participating institutions, which then split the cost of the film rental between them. Dave and Tom's only pay-off is seeing the films free themselves, and bringing smiles to the faces of their audiences.

Tom and Dave are now seeking to enlist the interest of more area institutions so that costs can be trimmed even further than the presently pretty reasonable rates.

From the Legislature

As the 1978 session of the Minnesota Legislature comes to a close, the major issues and bills are making their way through the legislative labyrinth of subcommittees, committees, and the full floor of both House and Senate. The status of many of these bills is as follows:

Taxes: The Governor and the Senate seem to be in agreement on a tax package involving up to \$120 million in corporate and personal income tax relief, including an increase in the personal tax credit. Opposition to a cut of this size has surfaced in the House Tax Committee, but the general House membership favors the Governor's plan.

Sentencing: After several months of a deadlock, the House and Senate conferees appear to be moving toward a compromise which could produce the first comprehensive sentencing reform in the history of Minnesota.

Ban the Can: The Senate is trying to resolve the question of whether or not to go with the straight mandatory deposit bill or the "litter" tax bill, and the House is waiting for the Senate to take action.

I-35: It appears that Senator Coleman will put his agreement with the City Council into legislative form. The House-Senate Conference Committee on the issue will have an agreement to present to the Legislature then allowing completion of the freeway.

Tax-Increment Financing: A bill has passed the Senate which puts limits on the use of tax-increment financing. House action is expected to follow.

DWI Reformation: The House has passed a comprehensive reformation of the drunk-driving laws in Minnesota, and the issue will go to conference with the Senate.
