SPEED TRAPS . . .

We were criticized rather roundly, recently, for an item we carried on speed trap locations in and around the general Highland-Groveland area. While justification can surely be found for or against such public service journalism, we felt the service was warranted by the fact the City is broke, faced with the likelihood of staying broke a bit longer and threatening to cut police and firemen as a result. Our point was clear. Speed traps, by their nature do not constitute a priority worthy of their cost in manpower and equipment. Either make them more economical, or let other policemen handle flagrant speeders in the line of their normal patrol duty. All this to-do to nab housewives and businessmen in a hurry for a luncheon or business appointment seems unjustified to begin with, but when seniority officers with experience and ability that could be used elsewhere are put to the speed trap task, we have to wonder about the cost of our police department. The other day, an unmarked patrol car was parked under the canopy-on private property-at Coleman's Restaurant on Ford Parkway, pointed out, ready to chase a speeder coming down the hill towards the bridge. This only says one thing to a motorist: "dumb cop." In a day when the public image of the department is sagging, when law enforcement on the more critical and criminal level is sadly lacking, the citizen finds little in the actions or strategies of the police force in St. Paul to whet his appetite for giving up more tax dollars. We feel the citizens are justified, and will continue to expose the various levels of incompetence when they occur on our doorstep.

FILTH . . .

One of the filthiest two blocks in St. Paul are the two blocks from Finn to Mt. Curve on Ford Parkway. The sidewalks are littered, the street is filthy, the fence across the street at the Ford Motor Co. is windblown with debris—including some very old newspapers. With Coleman's closed and the buildings adjacent, unoccupied, it presents a rather slum-like appearance to the visitor coming across from Minneapolis. Write your councilman if you agree!


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Decency Lecture At St. Thomas
