## Historic Site Marker Dedicated

An historic site marker erected in Rice Park in downtown St. Paul will be dedicated in ceremonies scheduled for 1 p.m. Thursday, November 6, at the park, Haydn L. Stright, president of the Ramsey County Historical Society, said today.

The marker was produced under the auspices of the St. Paul City Planning Board with funds from a Hill Foundation grant, but the Ramsey County Historical Society has arranged for its installation, Stright said. Thus, both the society and the planning board are joining in dedication ceremonies.

Others taking part will be George McPartlin, president of the city planning board, and Mayor Thomas Byrnie, who will accept the marker on behalf of the city and county.

Robert Baker, assistant corporation secretary and company historian for St. Paul Insurance Companies, will give a short talk on Henry M. Rice, one of the outstanding figures in Minnesota history and the man who gave the city the land for the park which bears his name.

The dedication of the marker is one of a series of events planned this fall to mark the 20th anniversary of the Ramsey County Historical Society, Stright said.

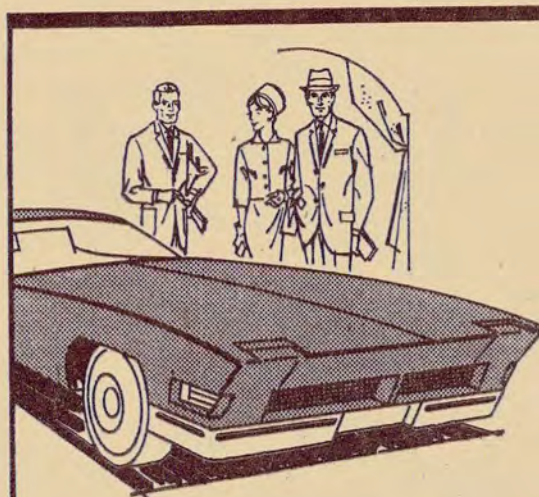

The popular George Gershwin musical, which includes such standards as "I Got Rhythm", "Embraceable You", and "Strike Up the Band", will be presented in the OLP auditorium, 880 Portland Ave., at 8 p.m. on the three dates as well as at 3 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 23.

## Cretin High School To Hold Open House

"Tell It Like It Is!" will be the theme of the annual Open House at Cretin High School, 495 S. Hamline, St. Paul, to be held on Sunday, November 9. Both parochial and public elementary school boys and their parents from all over the Twin Cities area are invited to hear students and faculty explain the programs of the 118 year old Catholic military high school, and to tour the school.

The school facilities will be open from 1:30 to 5 p.m. The Cretin Military Marching Band, which represented Minnesota at the inauguration of President Nixon, will be on hand. Derham Hall, the adjoining girls' high school which carries on cooperative classes with Cretin, will also hold an Open House that afternoon.

Language, science, data-processing, and military demonstrations will be performed for the visitors; other academic subjects will be explained. There will be demonstrations of the athletic programs, as well as the social and cultural activities of the school.

Entrance will be into the new building from Albert Street.

In this area, St. Paul's Day Activity Center for Children is in St. Paul's Church on the Hill, 1524 Summit Ave., serving children from three to seven years of age. It will be open from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Laurel Day Activity Center in St. Mary's Episcopal Church, 1895 Laurel Avenue, for children eight to twenty-one will be open from 10:00 to 12:00 a.m., and 12:30 to 2:30 p.m.

Merriam Park Community Center at 2000 St. Anthony Avenue for young people twenty-one and over, will receive visitors from 10 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 2 p.m.

Day Activity Centers are community based programs to train mentally handicapped boys and girls and adults who live at home or in foster homes. Participants are taught social skills, good work habits, use of leisure time, contributions to family living, and are prepared for schools and sheltered workshops. Nine Day Activity Centers serve nearly two hundred mentally retarded in St. Paul and Ramsey County and provide invaluable service for those attending. ## Rodeo Draws 200 Cowboys To Auditorium Nov. 7, 8, 9

More than 200 cowboys, including leading money winner Larry Mahan of Oregon, will compete for upwards of \$10,000 in prize money in the St. Paul Rodeo championships at the Auditorium, Nov. 7, 8 and 9.

The cowboys will be riding broncos and bulls and roping valves valued at \$800,000 by John Snow of Rodeo Inc., who will supply the stock.

The rodeo, first to be staged in St. Paul in 21 years, will be promoted by John Rauchnot of Hudson and sponsored by Friends of the St. Paul Police.

Two world champion bucking horses — Major Reno and Yellow Dynamite — will be among the 60 broncos ready to challenge the riders.

Some 3,500 school police and members of the Ramsey county junior Sheriffs will be guests of St. Paul business men. Five shows are slated with Matinees Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

### 100 Accepted for 'U' Alcoholism, Drug Counseling Program

Response to the University of Minnesota's newly-established certificate program on Alcoholism and Other Drug Abuse Counseling has been "overwhelming" according to Professor Robert W. Schwanke, assistant director of the School of Public Health and coordinator for the program.

More than 250 applications were received for the fall quarter class. Only 100 students could be accepted.

The high response to this program is partially based on greater recognition of this rapidly growing public health problem, Professor Schwanke said.

"It is also a clear indication of just how badly both lay and professional persons need and want additional and more accurate information on both alcohol and other drugs, the nature of the addict, and how to counsel him," he said.

The new course, designed principally for professional or lay counselors, is the first in a series of three General Extension Division evening classes with alcoholics or other drug abusers. The program is supported by a grant from Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Butler of St. Paul.

The institute is open to the public, free of admission.

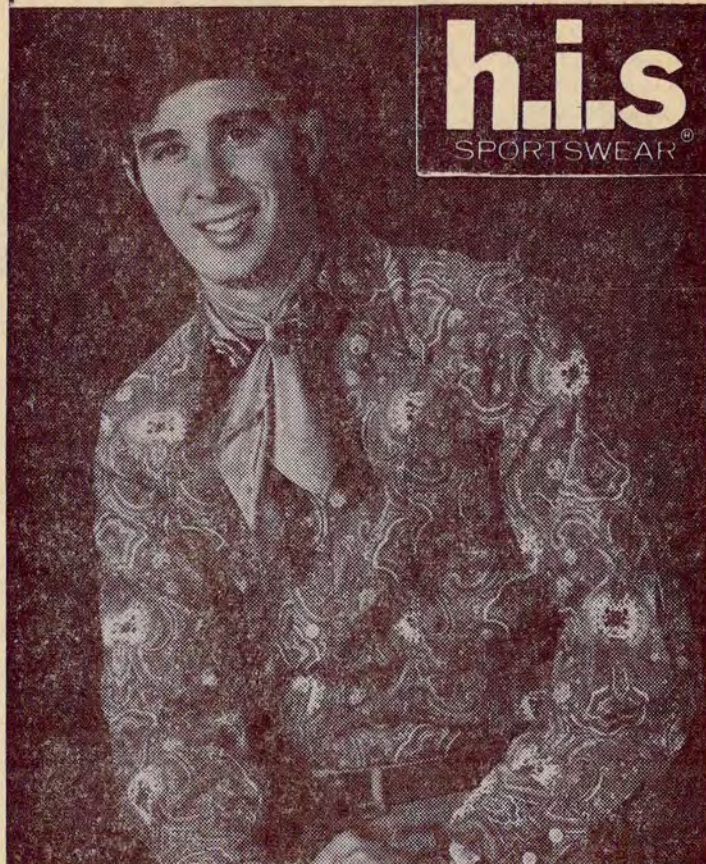

# EDITORIALS

## SPEED TRAPS . . .

We were criticized rather roundly, recently, for an item we carried on speed trap locations in and around the general Highland-Groveland area. While justification can surely be found for or against such public service journalism, we felt the service was warranted by the fact the City is broke, faced with the likelihood of staying broke a bit longer and threatening to cut police and firemen as a result. Our point was clear. Speed traps, by their nature do not constitute a priority worthy of their cost in manpower and equipment. Either make them more economical, or let other policemen handle flagrant speeders in the line of their normal patrol duty. All this to-do to nab housewives and businessmen in a hurry for a luncheon or business appointment seems unjustified to begin with, but when seniority officers with experience and ability that could be used elsewhere are put to the speed trap task, we have to wonder about the cost of our police department. The other day, an unmarked patrol car was parked under the canopy—on private property—at Coleman's Restaurant on Ford Parkway, pointed out, ready to chase a speeder coming down the hill towards the bridge. This only says one thing to a motorist: "dumb cop." In a day when the public image of the department is sagging, when law enforcement on the more critical and criminal level is sadly lacking, the citizen finds little in the actions or strategies of the police force in St. Paul to whet his appetite for giving up more tax dollars. We feel the citizens are justified, and will continue to expose the various levels of incompetence when they occur on our doorstep.

## FILTH . . .

One of the filthiest two blocks in St. Paul are the two blocks from Finn to Mt. Curve on Ford Parkway. The sidewalks are littered, the street is filthy, the fence across the street at the Ford Motor Co. is windblown with debris—including some very old newspapers. With Coleman's closed and the buildings adjacent, unoccupied, it presents a rather slum-like appearance to the visitor coming across from Minneapolis. Write your councilman if you agree!

"Finnegan's Wake," a movie based on James Joyce's book of the same title, will be shown at The College of St. Catherine Tuesday, Nov. 18.

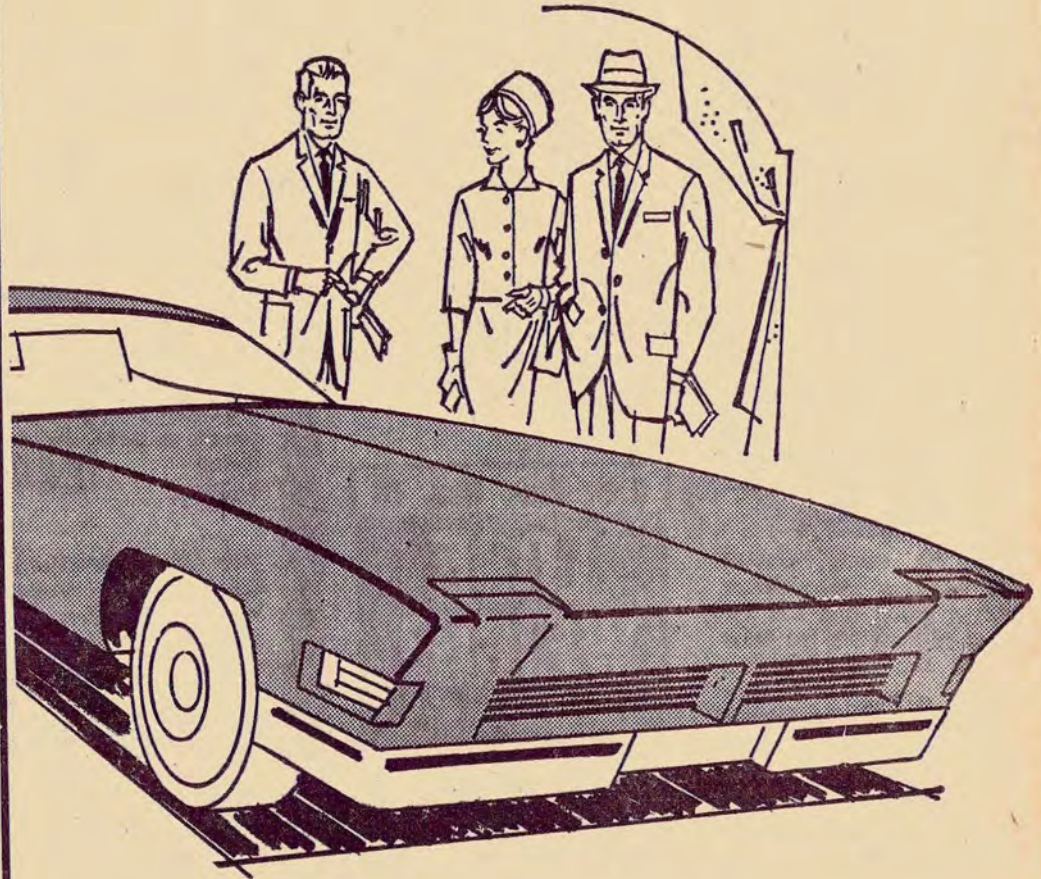

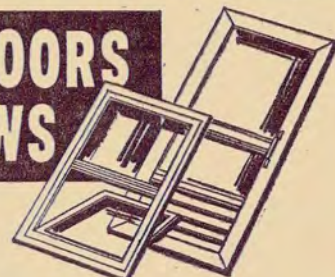
