A MOTHER'S CULINARY SKILL MAY PROTECT CHILD'S HEART

As Christmas approaches, mothers all over Minnesota will be busy shopping for gifts to fill the stockings to be hung by the chimney with care. In the interest of protecting hearts, the Minnesota Heart Association urges all mothers to pay as much attention to what goes into the youngsters' shiny new lunch boxes, and onto the family table.

A mother's skills in selecting and preparing foods can help protect the entire family's hearts. There is increasing evidence that a diet which controls the intake of cholesterol and saturated fats can reduce the hazard of atherosclerosis, a disease of the arteries which underlies most heart attacks. And youngsters stand to gain most from such risk reduction measures. In their formative years they will develop a taste for the right kinds of foods, and thus find it easier as they mature to adhere to a diet that reduces their risk of premature heart disease.

The typical American diet is rich in foods that contribute to the progress of atherosclerosis. To reduce this risk, scientists recommend a diet that is low in cholesterol and saturated fats, but which still provides all the nutrients essential to good health. Adopting this diet usually requires moderate changes in eating habits.

There are four goals to keep in mind in following the suggested diet:

- To meet daily needs for protein, vitamins, minerals and other nutrients.
- To control calories and maintain desirable weight.
- To avoid eating excessive amounts of food containing cholesterol and saturated fat, by lowering the total intake of such foods.
- 4. To see that more of the fat eaten is polyunsaturated, and less of it is saturated.


The Minnesota Heart Association can supply you with two new booklets containing recommended diets, receipes and tips on food preparation to achieve those four goals. The publications are: The Way to A Man's Heart, and Recipes for Fat-Controlled and Low Cholesterol Meals.

Scientists agree that diet is a factor in reducing the risk of heart attack. But there are other factors to guard against. See that your youngsters do not acquire the cigarette smoking habit; have them exercise regularly; keep their weight at appropriate levels; and take them for regular medical checkups.

This same plan of action applies equally to adults as a program to reduce their risk of heart attack. It is never too early or too late to start a campaign to protect the heart. Do it this Christmas and help to give your family the priceless gift of health



Gibbs Farm Museum

The scent of evergreens will fill the old farmhouse when the Gibbs Farm Museum, maintained by the Ramsey County Historical Society, opens for its winter season on December 15.

The farmhouse will be decorated for Christmas, with an old-fashioned Christmas tree surrounded by toys which belonged to children during the 1870's and 1880's, and boughs, festoons and other decorations typical of a pioneer farm home.

A Christmas tree, decorated with the types of ornaments made by children of about 70 years ago ,will be set up in the little white schoolhouse on the museum property. The school room has been restored to the period of the 1890's.

ARTS, SCIENCE FUND DRIVE EXCEEDS GOAL, SETS ALL-TIME MARK

The 1968 St. Paul Arts and Science Fund drive has reached its half-million dollar goal, raising more money than any previous appeal in the history of the cultural organization, according to Terrence G. O'Brien, financial vice president of the Council of Arts and Sciences.

O'Brien said the drive to date has brought in plegdes of \$500,052, exceeding the \$500,000 goal set for the current campaign.

The previous highest figure was the \$4342,000 raised in 1967 when the goal was \$475,-000.

"Due to expanding programs of all member agencies," O'Brien said, "the Council's Board of Directors had to set the highest goal in history for the 1968 campaign. The wisdom of this move seems to have been justified by the response of contributors, many of whom have raised their pledges from preceding years.

"The success of this campaign," O'Brien noted, "is due to the diligent efforts of more than 500 volunteers who translated their concern for the cultural life of our community into a most effective fund-raising effort."

He announced that the Guarantors Division, which includes pledges from \$100 to \$999, exceeded its \$40,000 goal by \$2,668, 106 per cent of its quota. Chairmen of the Guarantors Division are John Schorger, Thomas Swain and Dr. Charles Rea.

The Patrons Division, O'Brien reported, accounted for pledges of \$378,388, or 100.2 per cent of its \$377,500 goal under Chairmen J. Thomas Simonet and Edward R. Titcomb, and the Residential Division obtained pledges of \$28,996.48, or 88 per cent of its \$32,500 goal. Chairmen of the Residential Division are Peter Seed, Boyd Ratchye and Lehan Ryan.

The Arts and Science Fund is a unified effort to provide year-round support for the city's six cultural and scientific organizaitons: St. Paul Opera Association, Science Museum, St. Paul Art Center, Schubert Club, St. Paul Philharmonic Society and the parent Council of Arts and Sciences.

Also part of the ASF total is an allocation of \$50,000 from the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners.

"A particularly significant aspect of the 1968 campaign,"
O'Brien concluded, "is the fact that our volunteers were able to complete their work in record time. This is the first time in the ten-year history of the ASF that our goal has been reached before the end of the calendar year."

Thin Ice Warning

"Getting into hot water" is only a synonym for trouble, but trouble from getting into cold water is a reality, and sometimes a tragedy, for many Americans each winter.

They are the skaters, iceboatmen and fishermen who fall through the ice while engaging in their favorite winter sports.

"All too frequently this trouble comes from going on the ice too early," says Judge Otis Godfrey, chairman of St. Paul Area Red Cross Safety Programs. "The first ice of the season is deceptive because normally it is not uniform in thickness. Wait until the ice is safe.'

Judge Godfrey made these additional suggestions for winter sports enthusiasts:

 Skate in supervised areas, ideally a shallow pond or lake in which the water is not more than waist deep. Skate with a companion.

 Avoid congregating on the ice in large groups.

• Build fires on the bank-NOT on the ice.

• Remember that ice is especially dangerous now, during thawing spells and toward the end of winter.

• Keep simple rescue equipment handy at skating areasropes, poles, ladders, or planks -in case of accident.

Student Newspaper Wins First-Class Honor Rating

Hamline's student newspaper, the Oracle, received a first-class honor rating in the 79th All-American Critical Service conducted by the Associated Collegiate Press Association for the second semester of last school

The Oracle received 3,595 honor points from the overall rating, 105 below the top classification of All-American.

Social Security Medicare News

R. H. Gower, social security district manager in St. Paul, to-day urged everyone who signed up for the doctor bill insurance part of Medicare, to spend some time between now and the end of the year in checking over his record of medical expenses.

He said that this is most important for those older people who incurred expenses for covered medical services between October 1, 1966, and September 30, 1967. If a claim isn't made for reimbursement of these expenses by December 31, 1968, it will not be possible to make a payment.

Gower pointed out that, in the past, some Medicare beneficiaries postponed making a claim because they thought that if the doctor declined to take an assignment, the patient had to submit a receipted bill with his application. Unable to supply evidence of having paid the doctor or the medical supplier, they failed to file a claim, he added.

"These people are in danger of shortchanging themselves," Gower said. "The 1967 amendments to the Medicare law eliminated the requirement that a bill submitted with a claim must be receipted to show that it was paid in full or part. Starting in 1968, an itemized bill showing the services or medical good received and the charges for these, even if unpaid, became sufficient."

Medicare pays for 80 percent of the reasonable charges of the covered services and medical goods, less an annual \$50 deductible that the patient must pay. If the expenses of the last 3 months in any year do not come up to the amount of the deductible, they can be carried over to the following year to reduce the deductible for that year.

All social security offices are prepared to help people make claims for doctor bills insurance payments, Evidence of the services received should be brought to the nearest Social Security office. Another "must" is the older person's Medicare card or other official document showing their health insurance claim number.














'Art of Poetry' Program in Search Of Local Support


The National Endowment for the Arts, Washington, D.C., will award a \$5,463 grant extension to enable the University of Minnesota to continue its "Art of Poetry" program, provided that the University raise matching funds.

Mrs. David LaBerge, director of the program, recently announced the beginning of a drive to raise the necessary sum. The grant extension and matching funds will enable the program to operate through the spring of 1969, she said.

During the winter and spring of 1968, the grant made possible a program entitled "Dialogues on the Art of Poetry," co-sponsored by the University's General Extension Division, the Minneapolis Public Schools and the Academy of American Poets.

Nine major American poets gave a series of public poetry readings and held seminars for Minneapolis teachers. In addition, the program brought local poets into Minneapolis classrooms to work directly with the students.

Biafra-Nigeria **Relief Contributions**

Contributions for Biafra-Nigeria relief are being received by the St. Paul Area Red Cross, following a plea by the International Red Cross for funds to pay for transportation of available supplies into the bush country of the African naiton.

Franklin E. Truax, St. Paul chapter chairman, said checks, made out to the American Red Cross for Biafra-Nigeria relief, should be mailed to the St. Paul Red Cross, 413 Auditorium St., St. Paul, Minn. 55102. The money will be sent immediately to the International Red Cross in Geneva.

"Red Cross coordination of the huge relief operation for the starving victims of the civil war is imperiled by a shortage of money to pay for transportation of more than \$23 million worth of food and medical supplies, all readily available in neutral ports," Mr. Truax explained.

Work of the International Red Cross, which is serving as an umbrella for the relief operations of churches, private and public agencies and governments, started in July, 1967 and has been continuing undr extreme hardship because neither of the belligerents will assure safe conduct. Workers have been under anti-aircraft fire many times during the past month in which four have been killd and a number wounded.

Since early September, 500 night time airlifts from the island of Fernando Po, where supplies are stored, have carried 5,000 tons of food and medical supplies into Biafra-Nigeria. More than 700 refugee camps and 20 field hospitals are in . operation in the stricken area.

The Red Cross must have \$8 million to continue the flights from now until February.

MODEL OF IRANIAN DAM BUILT AT U OF M TO SOLVE EROSION

The \$50,000 cost of a model dam is "peanuts" compared to the cost of the real thing, according to Professor A. G. Anderson of the St. Anthony Falls Hydraulic Lab of the University of Minnesota.

The dam model has been constructed in a huge room at the hydraulic lab. The lab, located on the banks of the Mississippi river near Minneapolis, uses the river as a water source.

The real dam, worth an estimated \$150 million, is being constructed on the Karun River in Iran.

At the hydraulic lab, water shooting from the end of the "ski-jump"-type model spillway rises over three feet above the water surface during maximum flow. The actual dam being built in Iran is 80 times larger than the model.

The model is being used to determine the most economical, best-engineered spillway design. Spillway design in a dam is especially crucial data effects of downward at a construction of erosion near the dam structure—which could lead to collapse of the dam—and effects on the topography in the area of

the dam during periods of maximum water flow.

The model, including the spillway and a mock-up of the river gorge, is being built according to the latest field findings of geologists, engineers, and other scientists at the actual dam site under the sponsorship of the designers of the dam, Harzo Engineering International of Chicago, for the government of Iran.

The Karun Da mproject is important to Iran's future growth. The dam will provide eectrical power to all parts of the country, meeting the everincreasing needs of that rapidly developing nation.

"This model is typical of the research we do for consulting engineers who are responsible for the overall design of a given real system," Anderson said.

"Our interest in these projects has considerable educational benefits to our students. We are able to do an engineering study of ral-life problems as well as facilitatiing on-going technical developments.

"The use of models is quite common in hydraulics projects, saving millions of dollars in materials, time, and labor as well as providing an improved hydraulic system."

VA Flight Training Program

Veterans in Minnesota taking flight training under the GI Bill will get Veterans Administration payments on a monthly basis starting in January 1969.

Payments have been made quarterly in the past, but the long period between payments often caused a hardship for both the trainee and flight school operator, according to John R. Murphy, Manager, VA Center, St. Paul.

The new payment system was authorized by a law signed by President Johnson last month. Murphy said the system of monthly payments is in line with most other payments for GI training. Veterans attending college on a full-time basis, for example, receive monthly payments of \$130 per month if unmarried; more if they have dependents.

Those in flight training are reimbursed at the rate of 90 per rent of the cost of their flight training, but for each \$130 paid, their eligibility for educational benefits is charged one month. The \$130 rate applies regardless of marital status



It is apparent that proposed cutbacks in recreational facilities, library hours, and other city services are born more of necessity than any scheme to scare the voters into granting taxing authority the city needs to maintain current levels of operation. True, the case for tax authority this November, for the Charter a year ago, have been impotent and ill-advised in their approach to the basic physical and psychological needs of the constituants, and it could even be argued that the City Fathers are caught in the plight of the boy who cried "wolf" too often. However, it is increasingly evident that Joe Mitchell has nothing but feathers left in his mattress, and that the citizens are about to feel some of the pains of austerity rather quickly and acutely. In the case of closing down playgrounds on weekends, and libraries on Saturdays, we would take issue with the scheduling, and strongly urge that libraries be closed on Mondays and that playgrounds be closed on Mondays and Tuesdays.

On the latter there are several schemes afoot to bridge the closing entirely. In Highland Village, for example, efforts are already underway between Lloyd Robinson, Highland Civic Association President and Frank Boudewyns, active Little League President and youth leader, to provide the four to five hundred dollars it would cost to keep Hillcrest Playgrounds open for the Winter season.

John Daubney, ex-mayor, lawyer and Ramsey County Board member is trying to free \$40,000 of County funds which were earmarked for land acquisitions (none of which are being made or under consideration this budget year) and place them in an underwriting position for the Parks & Playgrounds Commissioner Victor Tedesco. We heartily concur with John's thinking on the subject: "Since most of the County's money comes from the City, we should, wherever possible, help them out when we have the funds to do so." Regarding the library, Saturday is a prime day for young-sters to use the library. Most elementary and secondary schools

in the city have their own libraries, which youngsters can use for class related assignments, but the public library is used for recreational reading, or for the college or general public reference use, and it would be a very large inconvenience if it were closed on the one day most people have time to use it.

Generally, we can expect citizens to be alarmed-even up in arms-if and when cutbacks occur. The politics of the financial crisis the city faces make solutions extremely difficult. Senior Citizens (the ones that hollar the loudest about rampant youth on the streets) are the major voting bloc against tax reforms in the city. In St. Paul, they comprise an estimated 30-35% of the registered voters. While it is inconceiveable that existing City Services can survive even the inflation of rising materials and labor costs, it is the more frustrating that the city government unit, as we know it, cannot apparently survive its constituants travesty on logicnamely, that a class A city can continue on a budgetary plane, while its physical problems, the economics of the state and the nation, and the new increments of social disorder and public welfare acelerate annually. We have said many times in the past, that it is time for the citizens of St. Paul to either fish or cut bait on what kind of a city they want. If they want the typical American urban conglomeration, they are, by their apathy, headed directly for it: a core industrial, retail service center surrounded by a three mile belt of senior citizens housing, welfare oriented neighborhoods, slums and socially disorganized blight, with bad schools, bad streets, poor lighting, and the corosion of law and order that is bred by all of the above. We have purposely placed Senior Citizens at the center of our discussion here, and for a reason.

They are our best citizens perhaps. They built St. Paul. In many ways they have a greater stake in what happens than do young people who can move out to the suburbs, or further, and start new lives. Yet, senior citizens increasingly deter progress in the City with their vote. Nobody, least of all the local newspaper, has ever recognized their political importance to the city. They are rigidly aligned against any and all benefits to people other than themselves—education, general improvements, capital investment, industrial development and a score of progressive programs that city government must be engaged in today if a city is to have the vitality to survive the handicap of being big and cumbersome and alive with the potential for physical and psychological disease and breakdown.

We criticized the Charter Proposals two years ago, because they were sophomoric and politically naive. Mrs. Butler received the political bonus delivered by the hard core senior citizen and fixed income voters of St. Paul. We criticized the recent "tax ask" because it was negative, and from the small amount spent on promotinb even its negative appeal (an esimated \$10,000) it was hardly anything but a boy sent to do a man's job.

We have criticized the Mayor for allowing a tax, tax, tax image to haunt not only himself but his administration, and even further, City Government as an institution. It is evident that the voters in St. Paul have never been truly solicited for their support in a constructive way, and here, the enus falls squarely on the shoulders of the politicians. This is a partisan problem, for there is nothing recorded in the annals of recent times that would indicate that the Republicans are in serious danger of being any more creative in their approach to urban government than the Democrats.

Therefore, we strongly urge the Mayor and all city government officials to contemplate a program of public information and education of a magnitude which will communicate rather than confuse the senior citizen and fixed income voter of St. Paul. I would suggest a blue-ribbon bipartisan committee, and a neighborhood oriented task force to inform and sell better government to the voters. If as many people were engaged in this kind of activity as are engaged in the mid-Winter Carnival romp, you'd have your majority vote by Spring boys!

St. Paul, because of its size (relatively manageable) and because of its high order of social, ethnic and religious fabric, has great potential for building a model pyramid of well-organized, efficient government—government for all people, for black, white, business, labor, young and old. But, somebody has to tell somebody about it!




