

St. Thomas Awarded Grant for Bird Study

A grant of \$1,100 was awarded today to the College of St. Thomas by the National Science Foundation for support of a basic research project entitled "Bird Distribution and Nutrition." The study will be made by Dr. Lester J. McCann, assistant professor of biology at the College, and will continue for one year.

Dr. McCann will limit his study to Minnesota. He will conduct this personal research project on the theory that certain species of wild birds are affected in their distribution by the mineral content of available gravels. Most of his work will be with pheasants and Hungarian partridges. Dr. McCann will collect grit samples from areas with heavy bird population as well as areas in which birds are scarce. These samples will be chemically analized to determine which minerals can actually be utilized by the birds in their digestive process.

Dr. McCann conducted a simular research project several years ago while working for his master's degree. At that time he used captive birds to show how they were affected by the mineral content of gravel or the lack of it in their diet.

Your Dental Health

(Following is the twenty-sixth in a series of articles on "Your Dental Health" being presented by The Highland Villager in cooperation with the American Dental Association. Today, bad habits and teeth.)

Opening tops of bottles with your teeth may make you the life of the party but it's not a practice recommended by the dentist.

People easily damage teeth by using them for things for which they were not intended.

For example, the abnormal habit of biting on the ear part of eye glasses can be an important factor in migration of the teeth, dentists point out.

Bookkeepers, typists

stenographers are often guilty of biting pencils and fountain pens. In many of these persons, dentists have found considerable wear in

nave round considerable wear in the teeth.

Biting on matches and tooth picks, abnormal tongue pressure against the teeth, lip biting and cheek biting and continued clenching of teeth to control emo-

clenching of teeth to control emo-tions may all have an adverse effect, dentists say.

Persons in certain occupations are not apt to develop bad tooth habits. Upholsterers, carpenters and cobblers who hold nails be-tween their teeth develop typical dental allments. Seamstresses who bite thread and dressmakers who hold pins and needles between their teeth invariably suffer from bad tooth conditions.

Among children, the habit most detrimental to the teeth is thumb sucking. Most authorities seem to agree the habit will not cause an improper alignment of teeth, however, if it is discontinued by age

4 or 5.

Related to thumb sucking is the use of pacifiers. Dentists recommend that neither pacifiers nor nursing bottles should be used after age 6. They are likely to cause a protrusion of the front teeth and a narrowing of the dental arch.

A sleeping habit, known as pillowing, may lead to incorrect closure of the teeth. This is the condition in which the child sleeps with his cheek on his fist.

The tabulation which lists the

ten most common last names of the nation's social security ac-count number holders and the ten most common given names as evidenced by that count, shows that social security cards have been issued to more than 2.5 million Marys, including 43,017 Mary

Smiths.

On the basis of these figures, it can be estimated that one out of every 32 women in the United States, including women who have not been issued social security cards, is named Mary.

The Johns in social security records outnumber the Marys by about 350,000. Just about one out of every 28 men in the United

of every 28 men in the United States has the first name John.

Ten most common surnames, Elder said, are Smith, Johnson, Williams, Brown, Jones, Miller, Davis, Martin, Anderson and Wilson.
