## Senior Citizens Plan Park Program Of All-Day Picnics

## St. Catherine's Faculty Spending Summer of Work, Travel, Study

Study, teaching and travel will occupy many St. Catherine faculty members during the coming summer months. Sister Mary Davida will travel to the University of Indiana where she will attend the second conferences of Oriental-Western Literary and Cultural Relations in which the theme will be Asia and The Humanities.

## \$400 Scholarship Given St. Catherine's to Prep Future Teacher

A \$400 scholarship has been presented to the College of St. Catherine, St. Paul, by the Minnesota State Court of the Catholic Daughters of America. The scholarship is to be used at the discretion of the college, toward the preparation of a future teacher.

At the suggestion of His Excellency, Bishop Fitzgerald of the Diocese of Winona, the state Court has recently set up an Education Program through which its members will provide a scholarship in each of the four Catholic Women's Colleges in the State: St. Teresa in Winona, St. Benedict in St. Joseph, St. Scholastica in Duluth and St. Catherine's in St. Paul. It is the intention of the Minnesota State Court of the Catholic Daughters of America to continue this program for a period of ten years.

## St. Thomas Awarded Grant for Bird Study

A grant of \$1,100 was awarded today to the College of St. Thomas by the National Science Foundation for support of a basic research project entitled "Bird Distribution and Nutrition." The study will be made by Dr. Lester J. McCann, assistant professor of biology at the College, and will continue for one year.

Dr. McCann will limit his study to Minnesota. He will conduct this personal research project on the theory that certain species of wild birds are affected in their distribution by the mineral content of available gravels. Most of his work will be with pheasants and Hungarian partridges. Dr. McCann will collect grit samples from areas with heavy bird population as well as areas in which birds are scarce. These samples will be chemically analyzed to determine which minerals can actually be utilized by the birds in their digestive process.

Dr. McCann conducted a similar research project several years ago while working for his master's degree. At that time he used captive birds to show how they were affected by the mineral content of gravel or the lack of it in their diet.

His academic program will include the fields of sociology and social work. Mr. Goldstein joined the Jewish Community Center in 1949 following a community-wide survey of the agency which led to the merger of the Jewish Educational Center and the Jewish Center Activities Association into the Jewish Community Center. The recruitment and stabilization of a full time staff was accomplished within a year.

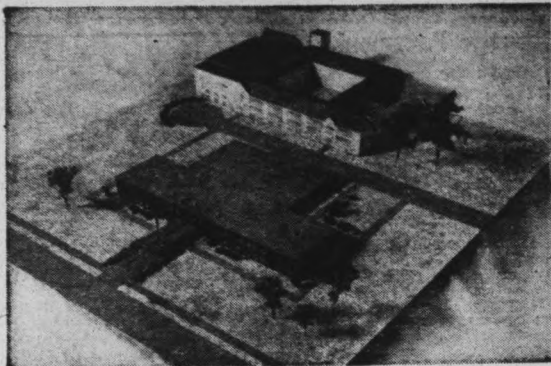

## Bison Are Shrinking

Giant bison with horn spreads of over three feet which have been frequently found in Minnesota postglacial peat bogs are thought to be the ancestors of our modern bison. In fact the shrinking size has been going on since the bison migrated from Asia to Europe early in the Ice Age. The earliest forms were truly gigantic having horn spans of up to nine feet. The skulls of three giant bison found in cutting through a peat bog in St. Paul while laying a trunk sewer are on display at the Science Museum.

## Your Dental Health

(Following is the twenty-sixth in a series of articles on "Your Dental Health" being presented by The Highland Villager in cooperation with the American Dental Association. Today, bad habits and teeth.)

Opening tops of bottles with your teeth may make you the life of the party but it's not a practice recommended by the dentist.

People easily damage teeth by using them for things for which they were not intended.

For example, the abnormal habit of biting on the ear part of eye glasses can be an important factor in migration of the teeth, dentists point out.

Bookkeepers, typists and stenographers are often guilty of biting pencils and fountain pens. In many of these persons, dentists have found considerable wear in the teeth.

Biting on matches and tooth picks, abnormal tongue pressure against the teeth, lip biting and cheek biting and continued clenching of teeth to control emotions may all have an adverse effect, dentists say.

Persons in certain occupations are not apt to develop bad tooth habits. Upholsterers, carpenters and cobblers who hold nails between their teeth develop typical dental ailments. Seamstresses who bite thread and dressmakers who hold pins and needles between their teeth invariably suffer from bad tooth conditions.

Among children, the habit most detrimental to the teeth is thumb sucking. Most authorities seem to agree the habit will not cause an improper alignment of teeth, however, if it is discontinued by age 4 or 5.

Related to thumb sucking is the use of pacifiers. Dentists recommend that neither pacifiers nor nursing bottles should be used after age 6. They are likely to cause a protrusion of the front teeth and a narrowing of the dental arch.

A sleeping habit, known as pillowing, may lead to incorrect closure of the teeth. This is the condition in which the child sleeps with his cheek on his fist.

## New Building At Cretin Will Boost Student Capacity To Over 1,400

The new addition to Cretin High School shown on this page will bring the student capacity to an estimated 1,400, provide much needed audio-visual classrooms and allow room in the old building for renovating the physical education area.

The present school, originally built for 650 students, is taking care of an enrollment of over 900 boys. In the past few years the number of boys that have been accepted are exceeded by nearly twofold by those rejected.

The new building is expected to provide for more boys and at the same time relieve the congestion of the overcrowded present facilities. Two extra freshman classes will be enrolled at Cretin this fall and will be transferred to the new Mary T. Hill High School before starting their sophomore year.

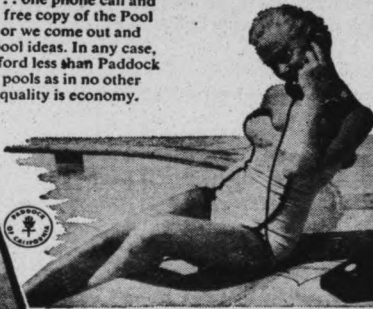

## Missiles Computer Model on Display

A model of a Remington Rand Univac computer, one of St. Paul industry's most widely known products, has gone on display at the St. Paul Science museum, 51 University, Elden Johnson, museum director, announced.

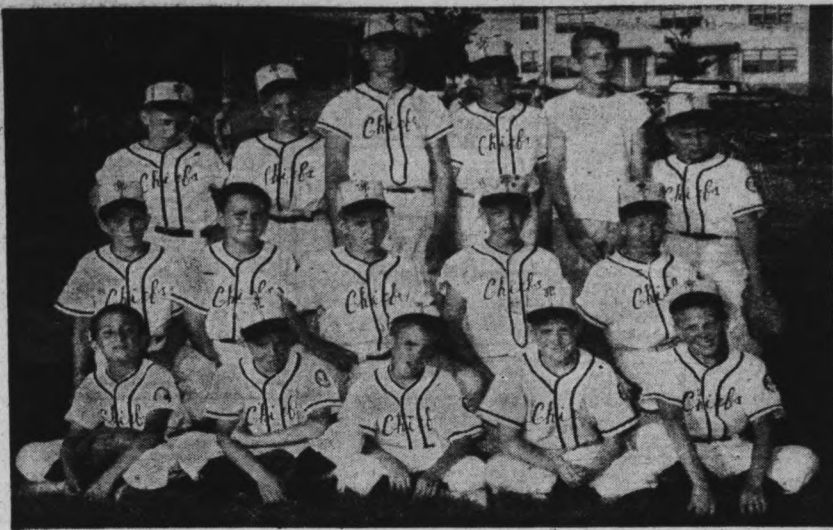

### If you're 72

### File an Annual Report If You Earn Over \$1200

In counting your earnings for the year in which you reach age 72, include what was earned after your 72nd birthday, as well as what was earned in the months before, Palmer Elder, manager of the St. Paul social security office declares.

Elder gave the following example to illustrate this statement: "John Doe celebrated his 72nd birthday on May 31, 1957. He was working as a watchman at \$200 per month. John thought it was unnecessary to file an annual report for 1957 because he had earned only \$1000 from January 1 until his 72nd birthday on May 31. We had to ask him to file an annual report for 1957 because

he had earned more than \$1200 for the calendar year 1957. Also, we had to tell John that he would have to return his social security payments for January through April — the four full months in 1957 before his 72nd birthday." John's earnings of \$2400 were high enough to cause him to lose all his benefits for 1957 but since he became 72 in May, only benefits for January through April have to be repaid.

Elder stressed the fact that all beneficiaries of old-age and survivors insurance must file an annual report if they reached age 72 after January 31, 1957, and 31. We had to ask him to file an annual report for 1957 because the calendar year.

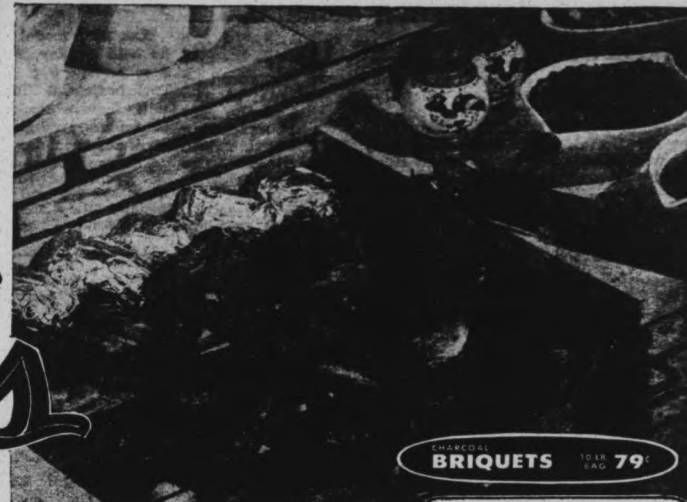

## Ten Most Common Names Are Tabulated

Mary, "plain as any name can be," is still the most popular first name, at least among women of working age, according to a recent tally of names in social security records, reported on today by Palmer Elder, district manager of the St. Paul office.

The tabulation which lists the ten most common last names of the nation's social security account number holders and the ten most common given names as evidenced by that count, shows that social security cards have been issued to more than 2.5 million Marys, including 43,017 Mary Smiths.

On the basis of these figures, it can be estimated that one out of every 32 women in the United States, including women who have not been issued social security cards, is named Mary.

The Johns in social security records outnumber the Marys by about 350,000. Just about one out of every 28 men in the United States has the first name John.

Ten most common surnames, Elder said, are Smith, Johnson, Williams, Brown, Jones, Miller, Davis, Martin, Anderson and Wilson.

The most popular first names as estimated from the study of these ten "first" families are:

Male: John, William, James, Robert, Charles, George, Willie, Joseph, Frank, and Richard.

Female: Mary, Dorothy, Helen, Margaret, Ruth, Betty, Elizabeth, Anna, Mildred and Frances.

The tabulation of most common names, Elder noted, is a by-product of a study to see whether the Social Security Administration's National Employee Index can be converted from typed strips to microfilm.

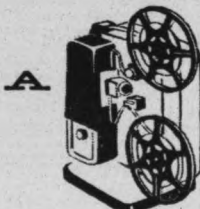
