## Six hurt in **New Year's** accident

Six teenagers were hurt and the driver arrested for investigation of driving under the influence following a single-vehicle crash on a rain-slick roadway early New Year's Day.

The driver, Shawn Francis Healer, 19, of Napa suffered facial cuts and head trauma, according to California Highway Patrol Officer Mike Rasmussen.

He was treated at Queen of the Valley Hospital, released to the custody of the CHP and booked into the county jail for suspected felony DUI.

### St. Helena dodges flooding

Heaviest storms miss area

Water levels are falling in St. Helena, avoiding dire predictions of a flood-filled

Bert Johansson, St. Helena's police chief, said the level of the Napa River near the city crested at 4 a.m. and has been receding ever since.

"It was a non-event," Johansson said. St. Helena experienced flooding of Lodi

Lane in the middle of the night and a mudslide at Silverado Trail and Pratt Avenue. While some agricultural land was inundated by minor flooding, Johansson said, no homes were threatened.

The Napa River near St. Helena peaked

### Napa TV viewers without cable or satellite lose NBC programming

SAN FRANCISCO — More than 100,000 San Francisco Bay area households, including those in the Napa Valley, have lost the chance to watch NBC unless they get cable or a satellite dish because the network's new local affiliate has a transmitter that is out of range of their antennas.

Station managers say they are working on improving the signal's reach, but in the meantime, many fans of "Friends" and the "West Wing" in the

nation's fifth largest television market will have to decide whether to spring for cable, or go without their favorite shows.

As of Tuesday, NBC dropped its affiliation with San Francisco-based KRON. NBC programming will now be aired on San Jose-based KNTV, which NBC bought in mid-December. KNTV's signal originates too far south to reach many Bay Area
