Changes Are Sought In City Charter

The Napa City Council will be asked Monday night to place three charter amendments on the ballot for the May 5 municipal election.

Ed Huber, in the role of an interested citizen, has been placed on the agenda to describe three changes pertaining to the city's elections:

1. A section to provide for a vice mayor to be appointed and approved by a majority of the council within 30 days after the election of a mayor. The proposal stipulates the senior council member (the one with the longest period of continued service) shall become the vice mayor if an appointment is not made by the council.

Vice Mayor

At present, there is no provision for a vice mayor in the charter. In the mayor's absence, a mayor pro tem is selected from the remaining council members.

Huber's interest is in seeing that Napa would not be without a mayor again, as it is now as the result of the resignation Jan. 1 of Lathrop C. Brown because of ill health and the failure of the council to agree on an appointee to fill out his unexpired term.

2. A section that would change the provisions of the charter that states a person must have been an elector and resident of the city for two years to be eligible for office, and supplement the requirement that to be eligible to hold elective office a person must have been a resident of the state three years and a resident and elector in the City of Napa for only one year.

3. A section to change the provision for filling vacancies on the council. Under the present charter, a vacancy is filled by an appointment by the remaining members of the council. The charter does not stipulate how soon this must be done.

Election

Huber proposes an amendment that the council must make an appointment within 45 days, and if it fails to do so, the city clerk must call a special election to fill the vacancy.

Whether elected or appointed, the person named to the vacant council seat or the mayor's position would fill the unexpired term of the person he replaces, under Huber's amendment. At present, the charter states a council appointee shall serve only until the next election, regardless of how much of the term of his predecessor remains.

Huber told The Napa Register yesterday that he would insist, because of the time element, that the council give him a yes or no answer Monday night. He stated he would consider any suggested alternates.

LBJ Rebukes Unjustified Speculation

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson denounced today what he called unjustified speculation on how the war is going in South Viet Nam and how it might be waged.

At his first formal news conference since becoming President 100 days ago, Johnson also disclosed the United States is developing a 2,000 mile-an-hour plane which shows great promise for both military and commercial use.

And he announced a list of major government appointments.

But the protracted war against the Red guerrillas in South Viet Nam, which critics say is going badly, captured most attention at the 30-minute televised news session at the session at the State Department's International Conference Room.

Johnson told a questioner that speculation about neutralizing Viet Nam, or that the anti-Red campaign is "losing" or "going to pot" does "our cause a great disservice."

And he declared that "too much speculation has already taken place, a good deal of it without justification," concerning future strategy.

He declined to say whether the campaign would be carried north to Communist North Viet Nam but indicated that no such plans have come before him yet as President. He noted Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara is about to make an inspection trip to South Viet Nam which can be the basis of further action upon his return.

Johnson led off with volunteer announcements on the development of new aircraft, and his list of government appointments.

That roster was headed by William P. Bundy, top aide in the Pentagon and brother of Johnson's special foreign affairs adviser, McGeorge Bundy, named to the important post of assistant secretary of state for far eastern affairs.

Johnson treated the new airplane as a development of great significance.

He said the program was set up in secret in 1959, with Lockheed Aircraft in charge of the program. The engine was built by Pratt and Whitney, he said, while Hughes Aircraft developed the fire control and missile system.

2,000 MPH
Johnson gave no details of the aircraft's performance, except to say that it flies at speeds in excess of 2,000 miles per hour.

Greeks Rap U.S. Stand On Cyprus

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Thousands of Greek students, denouncing the United States on the Cyprus issue, clashed with police in front of the U.S. Embassy here today.

A crowd of students estimated to number 4,000 marched through the streets of downtown Athens to the embassy buildings and hurled paper red fezes—a symbol of Turkey—on the embassy lawn.

A cartoon of President Johnson wearing a red fez was hoisted up by students who screamed: "America keep your hands off Cyprus," "American murderers," and "Yankees back to Texas."

Clashes
Greek police had thrown a cordon around the embassy building, and clashes erupted when they waded into the students to break up the demonstration.

They also marched to the British embassy and then to the office of Prime Minister George Papandreu with signs saying "NATO out of Cyprus." There was no violence.

A U.S. embassy spokesman said, meanwhile, that the Greek government had expressed displeasure with the U.S. stand in the U.N. Security Council debate on Cyprus Friday.

The United States supported a resolution allowing Turkish Cypriot leader Rauf Denktaş to give his views on the conflict between the Greek and Turkish communities on the Eastern Mediterranean island.

CORE-Market Dispute Settled

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A supermarket chain has settled a dispute with the Congress of Racial Equality that brought picketing, boycotts and the newest civil rights weapon — the shop-in. CORE initiated the demonstrations, contending Lucky Stores, Inc., had reneged on agreements to hire more Negroes in addition to those already working. Lucky denied discrimination and charged CORE with wanting "reverse discrimination."

The shop-ins followed picketing and boycotts at stores in Palo Alto, Berkeley and San Francisco. CORE volunteers would monopolize the shopping carts, fill them and then refuse to pay for the groceries at the check-out counters after the prices were rung on the cash registers.

San Francisco Mayor John F. Shelley hailed the agreement, reached Friday after the latest of a series of meetings in his office, as "a milestone for the future here and throughout the country."

Details weren't announced, pending ratification by the 11 Northern California CORE chapters. But a group shopping-in at a Berkeley store was told the agreement called for between 45 and 75 Negroes among the next 155 workers Lucky hires by July.

13 Arrested In Rights Melee

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Fighting erupted in a civil rights demonstration in front of city hall in this university city of 76,340 yesterday. It resulted in the arrest of 13, both Negroes and whites.

Pickets, marching in a tight circle, were protesting what they said was police brutality in the arrest of six Negro youths two weeks ago. Police, who flatly deny the accusation, have headquarters in City Hall.

The demonstrators represented the Direct Action Committee, an Ann Arbor group publicly denounced in the past by the NAACP and the Congress of Racial Equality for alleged advocacy of violence. Three policemen were hurt in the brawling that started on a lawn and ended on the floor of the City Hall lobby. Of the 13 held, three said they were University of Michigan coeds. A woman, schoolteacher and five juveniles also were among those arrested.

Ruby Jury Not Complete

DALLAS (AP) — A special Saturday session in Jack Ruby's murder trial failed today to complete the jury for the historic case.

Two more jurors are required. The attorneys examined seven persons but excused all of them during the two-hour session.

The defense used the second of its three extra peremptory challenges.

Sinatra Claims Integrity Doubted

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Frank Sinatra Jr. says defense accusations that his alleged kidnapping was a publicity hoax have cast doubt on his integrity and forced him to cancel an engagement in Paris.

The singer, 20, made his remarks Friday at an impromptu news conference after his dismissal as a witness in the trial of three men accused of kidnapping him.

Airliner Missing

INNSBRUCK, Austria (UPI) — An overdue British airliner with 83 persons aboard was feared to have crashed in the Austrian Alps today.

Hospital Stay May Delay Glenn Race

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. must remain in Grant Hospital for the time being to recover from a brain concussion, his physicians said today.

The decision thus may cancel the astronaut's retirement from the Marine Corps until April 1, and postpone for the same period the start of his campaign for the Democratic U.S. senatorial nomination. He suffered the concussion in a bathroom fall last Wednesday.

The decision about retirement, however, was still in the air after the announcement. Glenn had asked Marine authorities

what avenues he could follow should he have to remain in the hospital.

He received the answer today. It was that (1) he could remain on active duty pending final determination of his condition, or (2) he can retire effective today.

The hitch came in Glenn's determination of what to do about disability retirement benefits. If he decided to remain on active duty he would be entitled to the benefits. If he decided to retire at once, as offered by the Marine Corps, he probably would have to give up the benefits.

Glenn and his aides are still pondering which step he will take.

His retirement was scheduled originally to take effect Sunday.

However, Marine regulations say that retirement orders are cancelled if the officer is still in the hospital on the day they are to take effect. The orders can be effective only on the first of each month.

The physicians today said that Glenn still suffers from dizziness when in motion. But he is improving, they said, although the improvement is gradual.

Short Causes \$3,000 Napa Home Blaze

Fire caused \$3,000 damage at the home of Kenneth F. Carden, 1150 Willow Ave., early this morning.

City firemen were called at 2:23 a.m. to douse a blaze in a child's playroom. The fire was caused by an electrical short in a faulty wallplug. It extended through the entire room and into the attic before being extinguished.

No one was injured in the blaze.

Damage to the structure was estimated at \$2,000, with another \$1,000 in damage to contents.

The house is owned by Marco Bancho, 1144 Willow Ave.

SUICIDE PILOT—

Attack Rumor Bolsters Security

WASHINGTON (AP) — A tip that a Cuban suicide pilot might try to ram President Johnson's jet transport reportedly was the reason for the wartime-type security surrounding the chief executive's Florida trip this week.

Neither the White House nor the Secret Service would comment on the report, published last night by The Miami Herald. Johnson was almost certain to be asked about the matter at his news conference today.

Without question, the security measures imposed during Johnson's 16-hour Florida visit suggested there was official concern about the safety of the President while in the air.

The Herald, in a story by Gene Miller, said the Secret Service had received a tip, apparently about a week ago, that a suicide pilot might try to ram Johnson's plane or that a Cuba-based missile might be aimed at the big jet.

According to the newspaper, the Secret Service considered these possibilities highly unlikely. However, it was said that officials decided to take no chances.

Pierre Sallinger, White House press secretary, had this to say about the report: "I do not

intend to comment on any story speculating on yesterday's (Thursday's) events. Security measures taken yesterday were taken for good and sufficient reasons. It would not be in the national interest to discuss them any further at this time."
